Texas MD Population Exceeds 11,000

At the beginning of 1966, there were 11,218 physicians (doctors of medicine) in Texas and 292,088 in the United States. With the recent graduations from the nation's 88 medical schools, the physician population will reach a new medical milestone and go over the 300,000 mark.

The number of physicians in the United States has been increasing faster than the general population for several years. The population of Texas is currently estimated to be 10,700,000. At the present time, Texas has a ratio of one physician for every 954 people. The physician population growth in Texas is expected to be even greater in the very near future with the opening of the new University of Texas South Texas Medical School in San Antonio. The admission of its first class this fall will give Texas four medical schools.

The demand for medical service, according to the Texas Medical Association, will, of course, also continue to grow. In addition to the fact that Texas is one of the major "growth" states, new medical programs such as "Medicare" will put an increased load on the present physician population.

Individual physicians, through their county medical societies, the Texas Medical Association, and the American Medical Association, have done much to increase the physician population through extensive medical career promotion programs, developing medical school scholarship plans, supporting legislation to establish additional medical schools, and other activities designed to attract more young people into the practice of medicine.

According to the American Medical Association, there are more applicants to medical school, more students enrolled and more MDs being graduated than ever before. In the 1964-65 school year, the nation's 88 medical schools had a total enrollment of 32,428 students and graduated a record 7,409 new MDs.

Egg Price Report To Be Published

The Texas Department of Agriculture's Marketing Division will publish a new one-market egg price report, beginning July 19, according to Commissioner John C. White. Formerly, quotations from six separate Texas egg market areas were used in reporting egg prices.

"The advantage of the new policy," Commissioner White said, "is that the single state-wide price quotation for each grade represents a true market for the state, so the information is more useful to producers and buyers alike."

"Better transportation facilities and better communication within the egg industry have virtually equalized prices in the various egg-producing areas. The availability of realistic price information enables the industry to react more readily to fluctuations in the market. We believe that the one-market report will prove itself to be an invaluable marketing aid."

White added that the Poultry & Egg Market News, published each weekday in Austin, is available upon request to all interested parties.

Clarendon College to Offer Opportunity Loans to Students

Clarendon College has received application forms from the coordinating board, Texas College and University System, to be completed by any student who wishes to make an application for a student loan for the fall semester, 1966. Application forms may be obtained from the registrar's office at the college. Students are urged to complete the application forms well in advance of the fall term.

The voters of Texas authorized \$85,000,000 to create a Texas Opportunity Plan Fund. Loans up to \$1,000 may be made to any student who has insufficient sources for financing a college education, has been accepted for enrollment, is a resident of the State of Texas, has been recommended by two reputable persons in his home community, has completed an application for a loan, and has complied with other rules and regulations as required. Students must be taking at least one-half the normal course load.

This loan program provides a maximum of \$5,000 to any student for the first four years of college. In addition, loans are repayable beginning one year after the completion of college. Approximately 70 warehouses have failed to renew their licenses this year, through the grain harvest is well underway in many parts of the state. Grain stored in these warehouses is not protected by law, said White.

The McLean city council met Tuesday night for their regular monthly meeting, with Boyd Meador, mayor, in charge.

The council hired Lawrence Nicholson as night watchman, a job he has been filling on a temporary basis.

Christmas lights have been purchased jointly by the city and the McLean Lions Club. The lights will consist of aluminum and plastic with a bell in the center of each string.

Pampa's Annual Top o' Texas Rodeo To Kick-off July 27

Pampa's 22nd annual Top o' Texas rodeo will kick off July 27 at 3 p.m. with a big street parade, headed by the Amarillo Air Force Band, under the direction of Chief Warrant Officer Ross Whitehead.

Top attraction of this year's show will be Miss Molly Bee, famous TV, radio, stage and screen star of Hollywood, appearing nightly in the arena with Johnnie Lee Willis Western Swing Band of Tulsa, Okla.

The RCA approved rodeo, produced by Bueter Bros. of Elk City, Okla., will afford a purse of \$3,800, plus all entry fees in the regular rodeo contest, including calf roping, saddle broncs, bareback broncs, bull riding, steer wrestling and the popular cowgirl's barrel race. A special prize of \$250 is offered to the all-around cowboy.

Cy Tallon, popular rodeo announcer of Denver, Colo., will be on hand to describe all events. This will be Cy's fifth appearance in Pampa. A miniature rodeo, known locally as the Kid Pony Show, will be held on Tuesday, July 26, with performances at 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Boys and girls, ages 5 thru 15, are eligible to participate.

Rodeo dances will be held nightly in the National Guard Armory building, featuring Johnnie Lee Willis Western Swing Band and Molly Bee.

An expert children's photographer with all the necessary equipment will be here this Friday, July 15, to take pictures of children of this area.

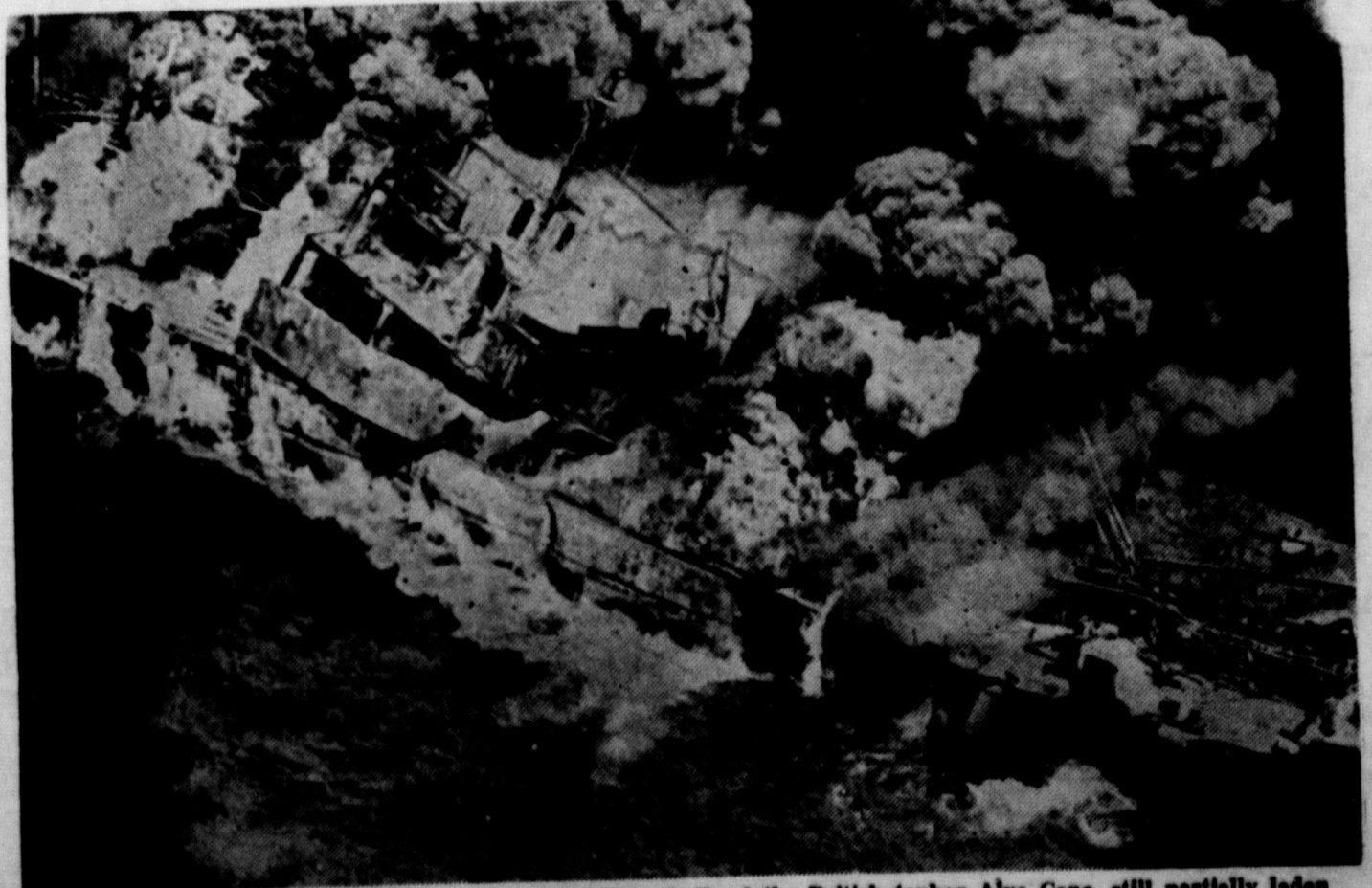
Pictures will be taken at the McLean News office from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

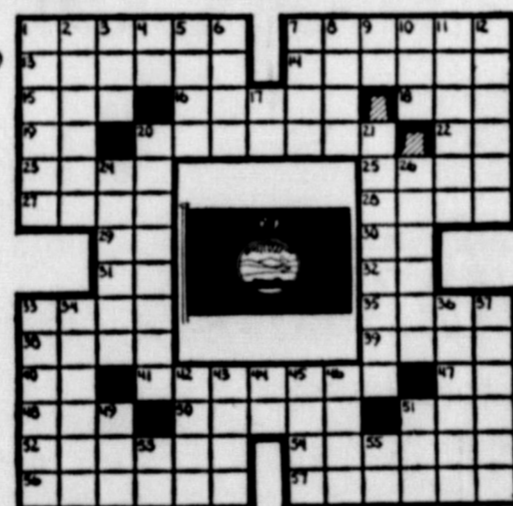

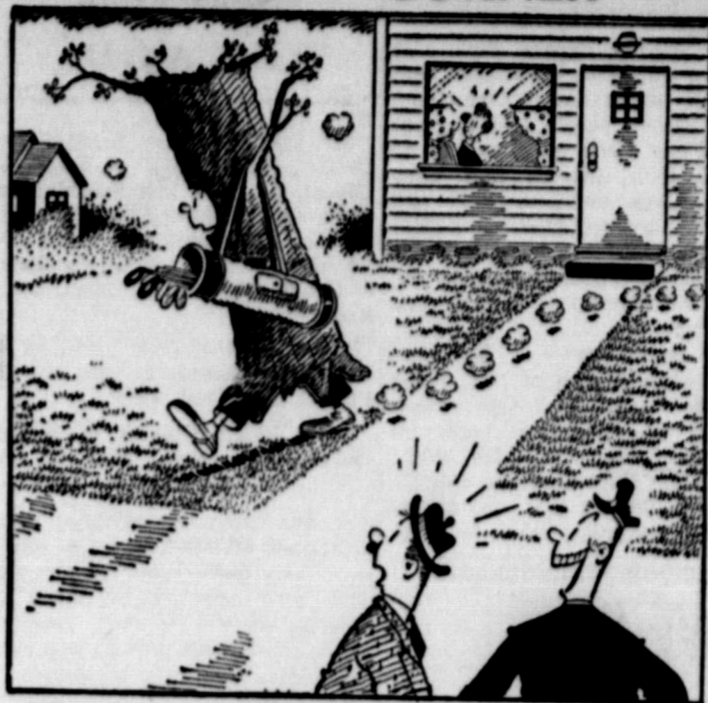
