He was a member of the First United Methodist Church in McLean, a member of the Masonic Lodge #889 and the Khiva Shrine Temple in Amarillo.

Arthritis Seminar To Be Held Tonight

When medical emergencies strike, we rush to our doctors and trust them to perform overnight miracles. It may be a car accident, a fall, a severe laceration... and medicine and surgeons are at once available. We expect the crisis to be over in a matter of hours.

Chronic disease is something else. Take arthritis, for instance, the most overlooked, under-researched, number one crippling disease in the nation. There are nearly 100 forms of arthritis, ranging from the mild type which does little more than "bother" its victim to the type that is fatal.

Chronic arthritis comes on slowly, gets worse slowly, and gets better slowly. There are no quick cures, no miracle drugs. Improvement does come in time and you've got to have faith that it will. You've got to work at it, with patience and grit.

All this, says the Arthritis Foundation, is what it means to have a chronic disease. The West Texas Chapter of this national group has joined forces with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in sponsoring a seminar on arthritis October 23 in Pampa at 7:30 p.m. at the Courthouse Annex meeting room. Purpose of the event says Elaine Houston County Extension Agent is to inform concerned individuals about the effects and treatment of the disease and what citizens can do in helping those victimized by it.

Highway Dept. Have New Film

"A Legac, Of Transportation" is now available for showing by area civic club and schools.

The updated slide presentation, produced by the Travel & Information Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, includes information pertaining to the new department responsibility: public transportation.

The slide program, which replaces "The Highway Story" is being loaned by the department's educational film library in Amarillo.

In June 1975 the 64th Legislature passed legislation that in effect merged the State Highway Department and another agency, the Texas Mass Transportation Commission, into a single multi-modal department--the new State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The responsibility of public transportation systems and highways was placed for the first time in Texas history in one entity, the SDHPT.

High Blood Pressure Affects The Young, Too

High blood pressure, commonly thought of as an adult disease, can strike teenagers and grade school youth also, according to the Gray County Heart Division of the American Heart Association.

Since it can exist silently for years, increasing an adult's risk of heart attack, stroke and kidney damage, it seems prudent for parents to have their children examined for high blood pressure--especially if one or both parents suffer from it.

While the real cause of hypertension in children has not yet been discovered, some research has suggested that overweight and a family history of it plays an important role.

In one study, high blood pressure has been detected in children as young as four years of age.

In a national health survey the 18 to 24 age group showed that 1.7% of the males had high blood pressure. Among females in that age group, it was 1.2%. But as age levels, females gradually catch up and then pass males in the prevalence of high blood pressure.

If untreated, high blood pressure can lead to heart attack, stroke and kidney damage. The younger the victim, the greater the reduction in life expectancy.

A disease that has no set symptoms, high blood pressure can attack silently for years with the first outward sign being the involvement of a major organ. By this time the opportunity for prevention of major complications may have been missed.

This is unfortunate because even though high blood pressure is a serious hidden disease affecting one in every six adults, it can be detected easily, painlessly and inexpensively and, in most cases, it can be brought under control by treatment.

The Gray County Heart Division is stressing the need for people at all ages to have their blood pressure levels checked. Treating even mild elevations can reduce the incidence of major complications, but only a doctor can treat it.

A hypertension program was recently presented to health classes of both Pampa Junior and Senior High Schools by the public education committee of the Gray County Heart Division of the American Heart Association. A film, "What Goes Up" was shown and each student's blood pressure was taken. Nurses helping with the program were Marge Penn, Jean Johnson and Cora Brantley.

Rev. Thames visited with the Jim Harrisons in Pampa Hospital this week and reports Mr. Harrison is very ill.

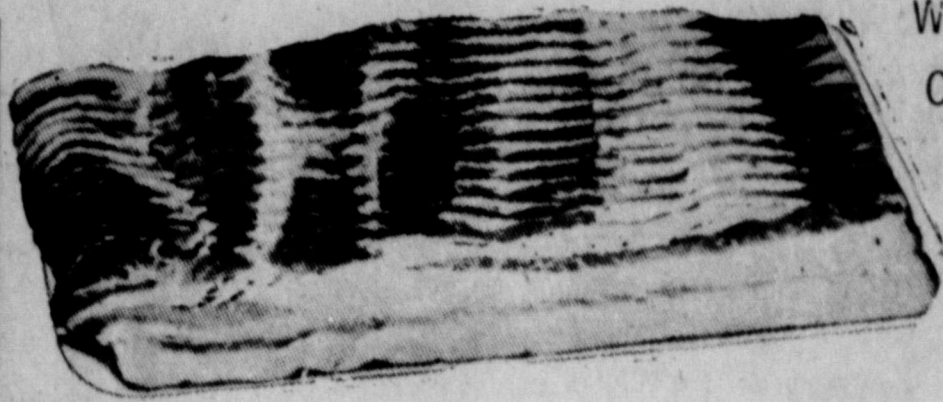

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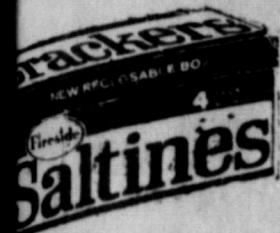

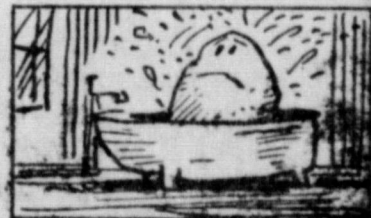
