Report Cotton Grain Sorghum And Diverted Acres

All producers should report their measured acres of cotton, grain sorghum and diverted acres as soon as possible. The final date to do this is Sept. 1, 1966.

Farmers will measure their own acres and report it to this office. Report the final acres by Sept. 1. After that date about 25% of the farms will be spot-checked for accuracy with no opportunity for adjustment.

If a farmer prefers, he may request measurement service instead of doing his own measuring. The cost of this service is \$7 per farm, plus an additional \$2 for each extra field. A charge of \$5 is also made for each terrace line to be plotted. The final date to request measurement service is Aug. 15, 1966. This service must be requested by Aug. 15 and then the farmer still comes in and reports the acres measured by Sept. 1.

Any producer who fails to report the acres by Sept. 1 will lose payment on the applicable program, and will not be eligible for price support.

All cotton producers should report the cotton acres, whether or not they signed to participate in the cotton program to avoid a marketing quota penalty. Cotton should be reported on every farm with an allotment—even if the cotton acres is zero.

Any excess grain sorghum acres must be destroyed by plowing. Shredding the grain sorghum will not be considered destroyed.

Cotton Marketing Cards
Cotton marketing cards will not be issued this year. All cotton buyers will be issued a list of excess producers subject to marketing quota penalty. All producers in compliance with the cotton allotment can sell their cotton without a marketing card.

ACP Program
Producers are reminded that burning stubble on the farm will make the farm ineligible for any ACP payments this year.

At the present time our ACP allocation for this year is exhausted and we have available only that cancelled from other farms. We hope to receive additional allocation soon. At the present time we can only make the request and issue the approval when funds become available IF the practice has not already been started.

NEWS from your County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

I don't believe it was this hot and dry in the 1950's. It appears to me to be an excellent time to cull your herd closely if the price continues good on stocker classes. The market has held up exceptionally well in spite of the fact that many cattle have been removed from pasture and placed in feed lots. Personally we anticipate a sharp drop on feeder cattle shortly unless the situation changes. We base this on the fact that finished cattle are still depressed and it appears the depressed market will be with us through September.

According to crop and livestock reporting service, 365,000 will be marketed from Texas feed lots during the July 1-September 30 period. This would be 71 per cent of the number on feed as of July 1 and 50 per cent more than marketed during the same period last year. Watch these figures, keep your pencil sharp, choose the proper class of cattle to be fed if you play the feed lot. Some feeders will come out winners while others are coming out losers on the same day.

The extremely hot weather has been a blessing to our cotton crop which looks better than I have seen it at this time of year. We have reached the point that a rain will be needed shortly.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Now that the wheat crops have been harvested, it is time to take a look at your farm to see if there might be some old gullies that you have been plowing in every year for many years so that you could keep on farming across them. Don't you think it would be wiser to construct a diversion terrace to carry off the excess water instead of letting your precious top soil wash away? Probably to wind up in some lake, there to do no one any good.

That top soil in the place where it will produce might some day be the difference in some of your loved ones not having to go to bed hungry. You know that doesn't seem possible here today in the land of plenty, but it can happen to us any time. A good diversion designed with eight to one front and back slopes with a 15 foot bottom channel will provide a good wide terrace that the operator can run a big sweep plow on the front slope and back slopes and also the combine can cut wheat from the terrace, thereby making the terrace farmable. To get a terrace of this type built will cost a little more money to construct to begin with because of the greater amount of dirt required to construct over a diversion with steeper slopes. I think you would rather have a diversion that was farmable than to have a terrace that was too steep to farm and grow only weeds.

The main reason for constructing a diversion terrace is to carry the excess runoff to a safe outlet. If there is not a safe outlet to spill the water into, a waterway should be completed to provide a safe outlet.

You can contact your local soil conservation service unit and get the engineering help to lay out and design these diversions.

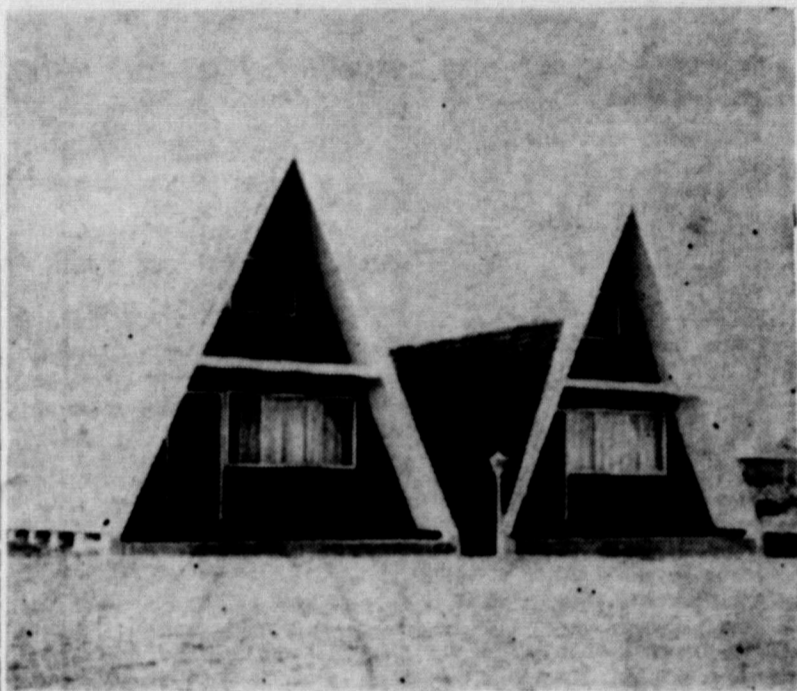
Top of Texas Rodeo To Begin July 27

Activities of the 1966 Top of Texas Rodeo will get underway next week in Pampa with the Miniature Rodeo scheduled for Tuesday, where some 300 young cowboys and cowgirls between the ages of 5 and 15 will vie for honors. The first performance of the Kid Pony Show will be held at 2 p.m. on the 26th, and the final performance at 7:30 that evening. Entries are now being taken at rodeo headquarters in the Pampa Chamber of Commerce office.

The big RCA rodeo will get underway Wednesday, July 27, with a giant parade through downtown Pampa at 3 p.m., led by the Amarillo Air Force Band. Riding Clubs from throughout the tri-state area will appear in the parade and be featured in the grand entry of the opening performance on Wednesday night at 8 o'clock.

Next Week Is Farm Safety Week

The Texas Safety Association this week urged Texas farm families to join in observing National Farm Safety Week, July 24-30. J. O. Musick, TSA general manager, also urged all persons and organizations allied with agriculture to unite in the nationwide effort to reduce the number of accidents among farm families. Accidents kill some 8,300 farm residents each year, and an additional 700,000 or more are victims of disabling injuries.

"This is an alarming situation, not only because of the grief to loved ones, the expense and unnecessary suffering, but also because of the monetary loss to the nation," Musick said. "Farm families and rural leaders must make a joint effort to eliminate hazards—at work, in the home, at play and on-the-road."

The 1966 farm safety campaign will place special emphasis on the prevention of highway accidents involving slow-moving farm vehicles. Farm residents are being urged to use the new SMV emblem on all slow-moving vehicles—such as farm tractors. The emblem, a fluorescent yellow-orange colored triangle with a dark red reflective border about 14 inches high and 16 inches wide, is placed on the rear of a slow-moving vehicle so it can be easily seen by other drivers, day or night, from a distance of 500 feet or more.

The motoring public is being urged to stay on the alert for the emblem.

"The average motorist does not realize how slowly the vehicle ahead of him is moving until it is too late to avoid a collision," Musick explained.

"Under normal conditions, recognition of the emblem would provide ample time for the motorist to safely reduce his speed."

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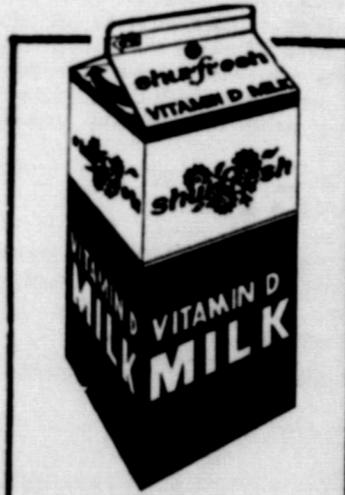
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
