

AUSTIN - Insurance made news again, as the State Insurance Board hiked rates for homeowners coverage effective February

Board staffers a week earlier recommended an average 47 per cent increase statewide in auto insurance premiums.

Board-approved The homeowners' rates will increase at an average of 8.3 per cent, fire insurance rates on homes 7.9 per cent for single-year policies and 14 per cent on three-year policies.

Rates were far less than those requested by the insurance industry.

Homeowners policy rates and extended coverage (storms, hail, riots, accidents, etc), vary by territories.

Homeowners' rates for average residences would increase as follows:

- Seacoast, 7.6 per cent. - Central, 7.6 per cent.
- North-Northwest, 12 per cent.

Rate on a \$35,000 brick veneer home in Galveston will go up from \$940 to \$1,021 for a three-year homeowners policy. The same type home in Houston would see a rate increase from \$814 to \$886, in Austin from \$654 to \$714 and in Lubbock from \$1,137 to \$1,283.

Amount of the annual increase on the same home would be \$17 in Galveston, \$24 in Houston, \$20 in Austin and \$49 in Lubbock.

VRA Study On

The House Elections Committee began a "major study of effects of the recently-extended and expanded Voting Rights Act on Texas.

The Committee will try to gauge impact of the law on local governments and recommend legislation needed to help smaller governmental units comply with complex VRA requirements.

All governmental units, under VRA, must submit to the U.S. Department of Justice any changes in their election laws, procedures or voting precinct boundaries dating back to Nov. 1, 1972, and in the future.

Elections Committee Chairman Rep. Luther Jones of El Paso said many small cities and other units don't have resources or required data to make full submissions and will have serious difficulty complying with requirements without assistance.

Lands Leased

Oil and gas exploration firms bid cash bonus payments of more than \$3.4 million on 91,000 acres of state land at a recent lease sale.

Most bidding activity was concentrated on state submerged tracts located in Texas bays. More than \$2.1 million of the total was put up for leases on 55,383 acres in the bay tracts.

Inexco Oil Company bid more than \$600,000 for 13 tracts, Monsanto \$377,609 for 11 tracts, Houston Oil and Minerals Corp. \$338,381 for 11 tracts and Exxon, \$200,004 for 12

Highest single bonus bid of \$117,936 was made by Kilroy Company of Texas for a Gulf of Mexico tract in Jefferson County.



The State Supreme Court refused to interfere with a lower court order transferring a Houston utility rate controversy outside the company's service area.

Third Court of Civil Appeals told The University of Texas it owes a construction company \$850,000 in a breach of contract suit.

The Supreme Court sent back to the trial court a Labbock woman's suit for damages from an auto dealer she claimed misrepresented to her that the car she bought had never been wrecked.

Reversing a trial court, the Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld a Burnet County man in a dispute with his sister over 356.4 acres of land inherited from parents.

Atty. Gen. John Hill said "short" (90-day) sessions of the legislature under the proposed new constitution cannot be confined to fiscal matters.

Preparations For The Hunter

Preparing for the fall hunting season means getting into good physical condition as well as getting your equipment in shape, says a wild-life specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. All firearms should be cleaned, checked and sighted in. Knives, hand axes and bone saws should be sharpened and wearing apparel should be in good repair to add to the comfort of thessehunt. Good footwear is essential. Exercising such as walking or jogging helps get the body in shape for hunting. Dieting off a few pounds will also help.

This fall he had to reestablish himself as starting Tech quarterback, which smacks of being as big a chore as following in the footsteps of your older brother, who just happens to be an All-Southwest Conference receiver.

Texas Waterfowl Season Set

By J. D. Peer I&E Field Officer

A daily bag limit of up to 10 ducks and reasonably longer waterfowl seasons on the High Plains of Texas were set by the Parks and Wildlife Commission in

The High Plains mallard management unit season is a straight 83 days, Oct. 28 to Jan. 18.

The 100-point system will again be used but bag and possession limits have some slight changes.

Canvasbacks and redhead ducks will again count 100 points per bird and there are not changes in 70-point duck which are mallard hens, wood ducks, and hooded i mergansers.

The 10-point ducks which are very popular among waterfowlers include pintail gadwall, scaup, shoverler, all species of teal and mergansers except hooded species. This is down five points for each bird over last year.

All other ducks are design nated 20-point value including the popular greenhead mallard in the High Plains management area.

If you hunt east of U. S. highway 81, check local waterfowl regulations for the different dates and gag limits.

Many hunters still do not understand the current point system being used, and the main point to remember is add the total duck points and if you are allowed one points, you are allowed one more duck of any point value including a canvas-

The 93 season on geese west of U. S. highway is it all together we'll be tough Oct. 18 - Jan. 18, Daily bag and possession limits area are two and four respectively with not more than one Ross' goose includ-



Ag Trade Surplus Continues

Agriculture continues to carry the load as far as the United States' balance of trade is concerned. In fact, it's the only trade area operating "in the black, " says an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The U.S. agricultural trade balance had a surplus of \$11.7 billion in 1974 while the nonagricultural trade balance showed a deficit of \$14.7 billion. Agricultural exports last year totaled \$22 billion and for the
