SCS Approve Local Contracts

The regular meeting of the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District directors was held Dec. 15 at the county courthouse annex was called to order at 2 p. m. by Ralph McLaughlin, vice chairman, with directors Curtis Schaffer, Robert Sailor, and Milton Carpenter present. Others present were Perry Gruhlkey, SCS; and Lana Waters, SWCD secretary.

The monthly accomplishments of the SCS office for November were presented by Perry Gruhlkey.

The memorandum of Understanding between the District and the SCS was reviewed by the Board. This agreement lists the responsibilities the district and the SCS have to each other.

Great Plains contracts on Thelma Hill and June Woods were approved. A Great Plains application was also approved on Elmer Daniels.

Plans were discussed for a winter newsletter on Rangeland. One of the directors will provide an article for the newsletter.

A Conservation Awards program for 1976 was discussed and dismissed until next year when more time will be available for organization. The Board hopes to start as early as March on the Essay Contest for students in the district area.

Progress was discussed by the Board on McClellan Creek and Red Deer Creek Watershed easements. In McClellan Creek Watershed, bids were let to a Fort Worth Engineering Crew to stake and core-drill sites 3, 8, 10, 11, 12 & 13. The SCS has completed staking sites 1, 2, 4, 5, and 9. The Red Deer Steering Committee met 11-10-76 and made assignments for securing easements. Individual landowners will be invited to the next meeting.

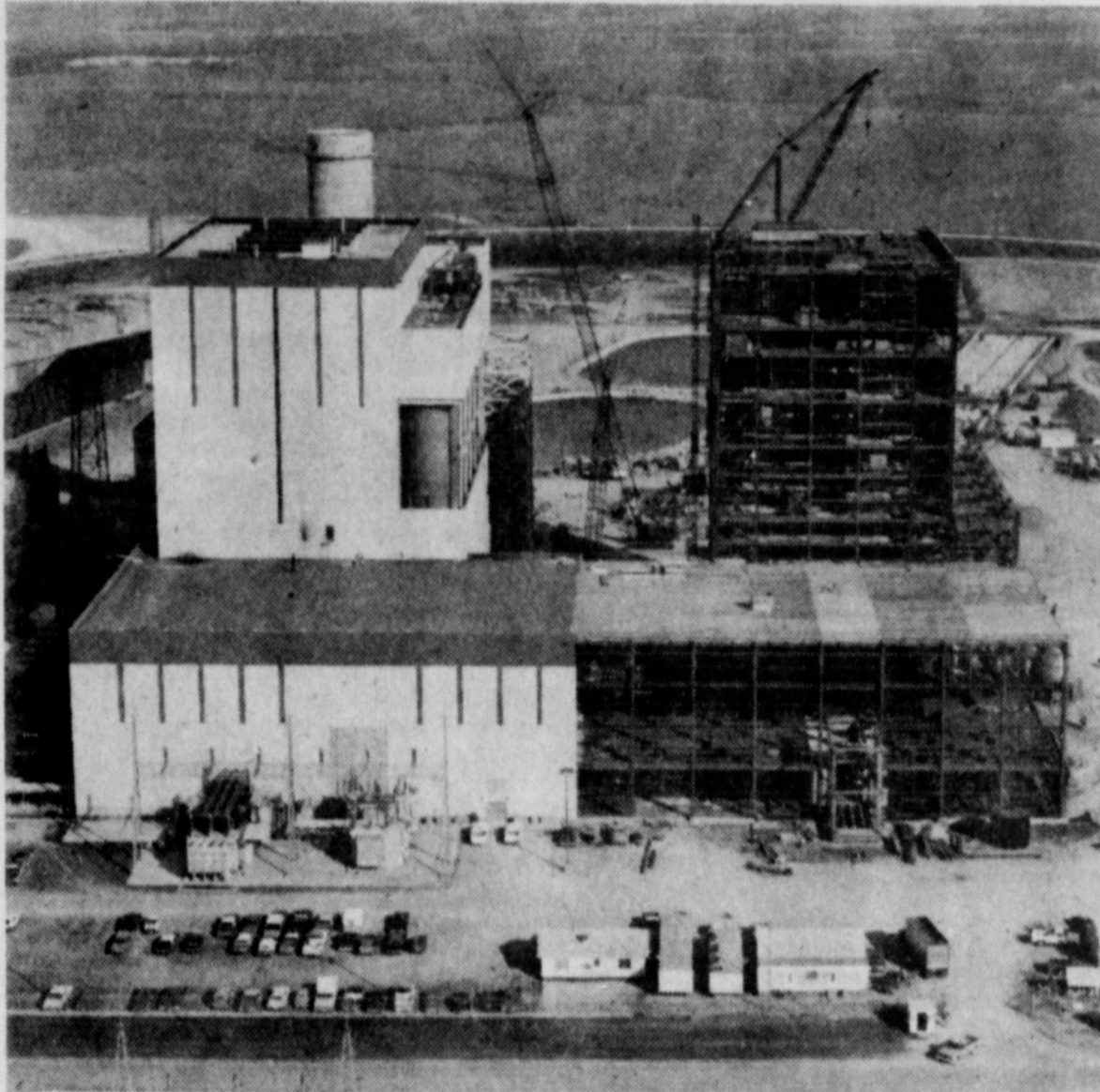

Construction work progresses on the second 350,000 kilowatt electric generating unit at Southwestern Public Service Company's Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo. Scheduled for completion in 1978, the generator will bring the total capability of this coal-fire plant to 700,000 kilowatts. A third unit of the same size is planned to go on the line in 1980.

S. W. P. S. To Invest \$500 Million In New Equipment

Southwestern Public Service Company will invest more than \$500-million during the next five years in new equipment and improvements, Berl Springer, president and chief operating officer of the electric company, announced recently.

Expenditures for 1977 will be about \$84.5-million. The new equipment and improvements are necessary so that SPS can continue providing electric service for the 45,000-square mile area it serves.

During the five-year period, southwestern will be required to borrow about \$300-million to meet these construction expenditures," Springer said.

Two additional generating facilities to be installed during this period will increase the SPS system capability by more than 700,000 kilowatts, bringing the total capability to almost three and one-half million kilowatts.

Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo, will be the site for the two new generating units. Construction has just started in Harrington #2 and it is scheduled to go on the line in 1978. Harrington #3 is scheduled for completion in 1980.

Both generators will have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as their primary fuel.

Transmission lines and transmission substations scheduled for completion during the five-year period represent an investment of about \$75-million with more than \$10-million being invested in 1977.

The construction of distribution lines and substations during this same period will require an expenditure of almost \$20-million.

Southwestern Public Service Company has offered \$100-million plus a plant site for the

nation's first gas-cooled fast breeder reactor. Roy Tolk, SPS board chairman and chief executive officer was recently elected a director of the newly-formed Helium Breeder Associates, Inc.

SERVE COFFEE CAKE FOR CHRISTMAS BREAKFAST—Before digging into that pile of gifts under the Christmas tree, serve your family a nutritious breakfast that includes Butter-Rich Coffee Cake, says the Texas Department of Agriculture home economist. Layers of pecans and coconut and a peach preserve glaze made it a special holiday treat.

From the TAP Kitchen

Texas Department of Agriculture - John C. White, Commissioner

BUTTER-RICH COFFEE CAKE

3 cups flour, sifted	3 eggs
4 tsp. baking powder	1 tsp. vanilla
½ tsp. salt	½ cup milk
2 tsp. lemon rind, grated	¼ cup peach preserves
¼ cup butter or margarine	1 cup flaked coconut
1 cup sugar	1 cup pecans, chopped

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Stir in lemon rind and set aside. Cream butter and sugar, beating well. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla. Combine milk and peach preserves. Add alternately with dry ingredients to creamed mixture, blending well after each addition. Spread 1/3 of the batter over the bottom of a buttered and floured 10-inch tube pan. Sprinkle ½ cup coconut and ½ cup pecans over batter, not quite to edge of pan. Top with half of remaining batter; sprinkle remaining coconut and pecans over batter. Cover with remaining batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes; remove from pan. Top with Peach Glaze. Yield: one 10-inch cake.

PEACH GLAZE

¼ cup peach preserves	1-½ cups powdered sugar, sifted
1 Tbsp. water	¼ cup flaked coconut

Heat preserves and water in small saucepan. Remove from heat; stir in powdered sugar. Spread over top of warm cake, allowing glaze to drip over sides. Sprinkle coconut over top.

Good health isn't something to envy in other people.

You can do many things to maintain your own health—or better it. And now is the time to come to grips with yourself by making some good-health resolutions, says the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Texas would be a much healthier state if everyone worked toward these goals, and you and your family can contribute to your own well-being and that of your community.

Promise during 1977 to give your body at least as good care as you give your car. Periodic examinations are the best way yet devised to detect bodily disorders while they can still be treated successfully. It might be considered preventive maintenance. So let your doctor look you over thoroughly once a year whether you're ailing or not. Make it twice yearly if you're middle-aged. Your physician can give you the proper schedule.

Dental troubles may not kill you, but sometimes they can make you wish you were dead. Check in once yearly with your dentist to make certain your teeth and gums are in good shape, and let him teach you the proper way to maintain your dental health every day.

There's another good resolution you can make. Resolve to give an occasional thought to such awesome problems as water conservation, pollution abatement, juvenile delinquency, drug abuse and the growing number of elderly people in our society. Lend your support as a responsible citizen to community efforts to solve them. After all, they affect you, too. Your health should be

of great concern to you. So get the good health habit by putting some healthful resolutions to work.

You'll live longer and enjoy life more, believes the Department of Health Resources, which wishes you a happy ending to 1976 and a healthy year ahead.

Do your clothes seem to fit a little more snugly these days? If so, it could mean you're putting on weight, which is a lot harder to take off than it is to put on. It's difficult during the holiday season to pass up the goodies which come your way. But if you've overdone it, resolve to start passing up the candied yams, gravies and cream-filled tidbits which almost invariably spell extra pounds and perhaps an early grave.

Too much weight contributes to high blood pressure, and may be associated with hardening of the arteries and various forms of heart disease. Also, it means impaired vigor, greater surgical risk and greater danger from otherwise minor illnesses.

On the other hand, if you've noticed an unusual loss of weight, you should consult your physician.

A good, physician-prescribed exercise regimen will keep your body in shape, tone up your heart muscles and put the spring back into your step.

There are many pursuits which people of all ages may undertake in order to get the needed exercise. While jogging might be all right for some people, brisk walking or other forms of exercise may be recommended for others.

Statistics linking smoking to cancer and heart disease continue to pile up—and it is tougher and

tougher to rationalize the smoking habit. If you still smoke, now's the time to quit. Tomorrow could be too late.

Safe driving is a habit everyone should get into. Drive and walk defensively, and you'll be less apt to wind up as one of the state's traffic statistics. And don't forget that the 55 mile-an-hour speed limit saves gas, saves lives, and applies to everyone.

While disease in Texas continues to be relatively low, the threat of epidemics hasn't subsided. Check the immunization records of your entire family—not just the children—as a safeguard against diseases and their complications.

Getting plenty of sleep is another resolution which will be of benefit—especially during the cold winter months when the body's defenses should be at their peak.

Nutrition goes hand in hand with proper rest. To provide your body with the essential nutrients to make it function properly, proper diet is necessary. Resolve to put tasty and nutritious foods to work for your body. Don't overlook fresh fruits and vegetables.

People living in towns and cities owe it to themselves and their neighbors to obey local and state laws pertaining to health protection. For example, if your town has a dog lease law, adhere to it. Keep your animals in good health and protected from rabies, which is still a threat—especially in rural areas.

You and the LAW

PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

Q: Our daughter in junior high school is threatening to move into an apartment with several other girls as soon as she reaches the age of 17. She keeps insisting that when she becomes 17, she is no longer a minor and therefore cannot be held against her wishes. At what age is she no longer responsible to the rules of the home?

A: Juvenile court jurisdiction is limited to acts committed by children after they are 10 years old and prior to their 17th birthday. After they reach the age of 17, there is no law which gives a parent authority to force a child to return to their home unless the child already was under the control of the juvenile court.

Q: A tree-trimming contractor came to our house soliciting business. If we hire him, would we be liable if he's injured while working in our yard?

A: A homeowner is not responsible to an independent tree-trimming contractor if the contractor is injured while working in the homeowner's yard, so long as the homeowner does not create a special hazard or interfere with the contractor. However, if the homeowner attempts to control the contractor, or supplies his tools, the homeowner could be held responsible for an injury. The key question is one of "independence". If the contractor is independent, the homeowner is not responsible; if the contractor is controlled or directed by the homeowner, the homeowner may be assum-

ing legal obligations for his safety.

Q: My neighbor's tree limbs overhang and damage the roofs on my carport and garage. The limbs are so low I can't build a small hot house in that part of the yard. Can I trim these limbs back even with the fence on the property line?

A: Common law property rights give the owner of land the ownership of the land beneath the property and the space above. A neighbor's tree limbs extending onto your property may be cut at the point where the limb crosses the property line. However, your neighbor has a legal right to require that his permission be given before you can trespass on his property in removing tree limbs.

Q: I plan to list a resident of Texas as executor of my will. Is it legal for me to name a co-executor who lives in another state?

A: A non-resident may be named executor of a Texas will. State law requires that if the executor is a person, an agent for service living in Texas must be designated by that person. If the executor is a bank, the law sets out two qualifications: first, that the state in which the bank is located must have reciprocity with Texas in allowing banks to act as executors of estates, and secondly, the bank must have registered with the Texas Secretary of State to provide an agent for service.

Cooking Wild Game In Microwave Ovens

Electronics devices have been used by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists in tracking wild game birds and in mapping their habitat and now the wild game cook has a chance to compliment the hunter and his birds with an electronic device--

the microwave oven. All game birds will be much juicier when prepared in a microwave oven. Experienced cooks recommend at least seven minutes per pound and piercing the skin before placing the bird in the oven will prevent popping.

Seasoned coating mixes and paprika will improve the color of the bird. A 10-15 minute standing time before carving helps the juices to set in the meat, and to keep the meat more moist.

After birds have started to brown, cover the wing tips, the high point of the breast and the narrow part of the legs with small tips of foil. This small amount

of foil will slow the cooking of these areas, but will not damage the unit.

A non-salted vegetable oil is best for basting the birds. Most microwave cooks recommend basting off the juices as they accumulate because the microwave will be attracted to the liquid, resulting in longer cooking time.

the edge of the grass or weeds where prairie dogs are feeding. Do not place the poison grain on loose or dusty ground or in the holes. Livestock should not be endangered when bait is scattered carefully.

After grain treatment, some will remain and these animals usually congregate in some portion of the town after several weeks. Then they can either be re-poisoned or gassed on an individual hole treatment.

With their feed supply short, this winter would be an excellent time to use poison grain before grass greens up next spring. If you have questions about prairie dog control, call or come by the Extension Office.

Cold weather also signals planting time for hardy trees and shrubs. Planting now allows trees and shrubs time to set out good root systems before top growth begins in the spring. However, several precautions should be taken. Plants should be kept watered to avoid damage from freezing weather. Also, staking is important to prevent damage from high winds. A good mulch of hay, dried grass or leaves will protect the root systems and retain moisture. Plants should not be fertilized until after the first growing season.

Most farmers are busy getting their tax records ready to calculate their 1976 income tax. The farmer's Tax Guide is now available in the County Extension office to assist farmers with their income tax preparation.

As I drive around Gray County, I see a lot of prairie dog towns. These pesky little critters cause a lot of damage to native range land. Ranchers can certainly afford the time and money it takes to control prairie dogs when you consider the amount of damage done and lost value from grass production.

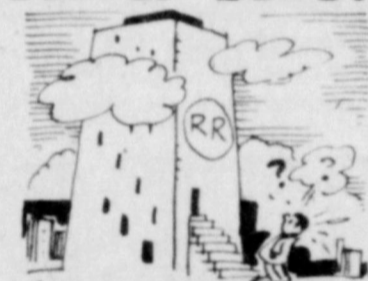
The most practical control agents for prairie dogs are poisoned baits and poisonous gases. Gases are more effective in warm, humid weather.

Poisoned grain bait may be effective any time when animals are active above ground and there is little competition from natural foods. Temperature and weather influence their activity.

When using poisoned grain, always pre-bait for a few days to accustom the prairie dogs to feeding on the new type of food. When it is readily accepted, apply the poisoned bait.

Each grain of strychnine treated grain (oats or maize) is sufficient to treat about 40 holes. Scatter about 1 teaspoon around each hole, near

Aerial Goose Survey Completed

A lack of water and dry winter storms in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains are being credited with a low count in the number of geese observed by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel during the annual December count.

"There is a lack of adequate water levels in most lakes in all areas from Dalhart to Lubbock," said Max Traweck, water fowl biologist.

"An estimated 30 to 40 thousand short-grass prairie Canadas were counted during the week-long survey which is one-half the number of birds we had in 1975," Traweck continued.

Reports from hunters and out-of-state fish and game personnel indicate larged concentrations in Colorado and it will take very cold weather in January to bring the geese to Texas.

Bukfalo lake, a National wildlife refuge near Umbarger, has a little water and the lake is holding approximately 10,000 geese. Various flocks of geese are using the large man-made lakes including Meredith, near Fritch, Greenbelt, near Clarendon, and Bull lake, a natural reservoir near Littlefield.

The 1976-77 goose season in northwest Texas continues through Jan. 23, 1977, with a daily bag limit of five, not to include more than one Ross' goose nor more than either two Canada or white-fronted geese in the aggregate.

Be Sure To Read The Instructions

Fishing lures, trolling motors, hunting knives, and shotguns all have one thing in common, an owner's manual telling you how to use, store, sharpen, clean or adjust the new item.

Most new outdoor items contain a guarantee from the manufacturer from the manufacturer giving the address and mailing instructions in event there is a defect in workmanship or materials.

Some items are stamped with serial numbers. Make a list of all these numbers along with a description of each item in event of theft and for insurance purposes.

File the owner's manual in a safe place for future reference in case the new item will not be used until next summer or the opera-

tions are forgotten.

Many sporting items require accessories before they can be used in the field such as gun cases for firearms, life preservers for boats, and fishing lines for reels. If you must purchase these items, be sure you match the right accessory to the new gift. A wrong-sized fishing lure and fishing line could damage or break an expensive fishing rod. Usually, damage to

sporting goods from misuse or neglect is not covered under manufacturer's guarantee.

Quality sporting goods items as a gift or purchased should last a lifetime if properly used and maintained. Most items seldom wear out and few are passed from father-to-son along with stories of giant bass and huge bucks adding more than monetary value to the equipment.

Also, there will be no charge for Directory Assistance calls from coin telephones or from hospitals.

Some customers not charged. Visually and physically handicapped people who are unable to use the Directory will be exempt from the charge. If you think you, or someone in your family, or a friend may be entitled to this exemption, please fill out the coupon below for more information.

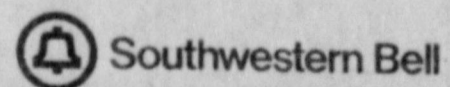

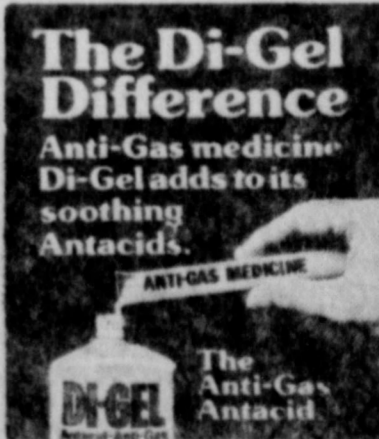

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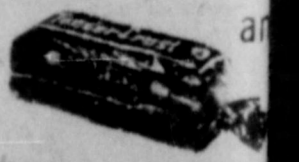
