Mustangs Stomp Tigers

It was a Republican (Abraham Lincoln) who liked to quote from the Bible "a house divided against itself cannot stand."

Perhaps the Democratic Party in Gray County should take note of that Republican homily.

I'm all for the two-party system. I think it makes our country healthy, but the victory throughout Gray County of Republican candidates was somewhat of a surprise.

It has been obvious to most observers of politics in the county that the Democratic party has been in a state of chaos. I'm not sure of the reasons, except that there has been much petty bickering and factional arguments.

Perhaps this election will make the Democratic Party in Gray County wake up and get back together, or this area will wind up a Republican stronghold.

I'm glad the election is over, aren't you? I know everyone hopes the new office holders have a successful term.

This campaign was one of the longest and most expensive in Texas history. One survey said over seven dollars was spent for each vote cast.

I think that is a shame. Perhaps we should consider England's system, and set a limit on spending by candidates.

The No. 1 Class B football team in Texas dashed any McLean hopes of an upset early in the game, Friday night on the way to a 48-0 Wheeler victory over the Tigers at Duncan Field.

The Mustangs rolled up an insurmountable 34-0 lead in the first quarter as they remained undefeated through eight games. Wheeler will host Booker Friday in a game of district unbeaten. The winner will represent District 1-B in the playoffs, in which the Mustangs advanced all the way to the state championship in 1977.

The Tigers will travel to Follett Friday for a 7:30 p.m. season-ending clash with the Panthers.

The script for the McLean-Wheeler contest was written soon after the opening kickoff as the Mustangs found the Tigers' south end zone with only 15 seconds elapsed.

Fullback Steve Ellison lost the football on McLean's first play from scrimmage, and Wheeler took possession on the Tiger five yard line. The defending state champs wasted no time as tailback Marvin Grimes crossed the goal on the visitors' first play.

Mike Evans missed the extra point kick, leaving the score at 8-0. But not for long. On Wheeler's next possession, it took only three plays for the Mustangs to double their

score. Grimes covered the last 48 yards for his second touchdown of the cold, windy evening, and quarterback Myron Jolly ran around the right side for two extra points on a fake kick to give Wheeler a 14-0 lead.

The Tigers seemed to be following Wheeler's game plan by this time as freshman Dudley Reynolds fumbled on McLean's first play and a Mustang recovered on the hosts' 22. Two snaps later, Bret Mosley got the ball into paydirt for the third time. Mosley fumbled just before crossing the goal but fell on it in the end zone. Evans' PAT made the score 21-0.

With 4:26 remaining in the first period, Benny Baker bolted up the middle from McLean's 23 yard line to up the margin to 27-0. A Tiger covered a fumble on Wheeler's unsuccessful extra point kick.

A high Randy Suggs punt was caught by the north wind a few plays later, and the Mustangs took over on the McLean 24. Baker got his second six-pointer from the two with 1:33 left in the first stanza, and Evans' point increased Wheeler's bulge to 34-0.

Ellison broke loose for 11 yards after the sixth kickoff to give McLean its initial first down with 55 seconds left in the opening period.

The Tigers' third lost fumble was next in the script. The bobble, this one by quarterback Tommy Eck, set Wheeler up at the McLean 45. Jimmy Ryan went in from two yards out with 6:46 to go in the half, and Evans' conversion left the score at 41-0.

Sophomore James Matheny returned the kickoff to McLean's 47 for the Tigers' best field position of the half, but on the second play Eck lost the ball on a bootleg

around the left and Wheeler again had the pigskin. After scoring on their first six possessions, the Mustangs were stopped this time due to a penalty and some good defensive plays by the Tigers. Matheny, Reynolds, and John Curry made key tackles during the series.

Jimmy Ryan intercepted an Eck aerial to close the first half. Wheeler's jolly indicated

that the second half would follow the same course as he returned the kickoff to the Mustang 44. Suggs made an apparent touchdown-saving tackle on the return.

Substitute quarterback Rich Brown sneaked in from the McLean two a few plays later, and Evans' fourth point left the scoreboard reading 48-0 in the third quarter.

Officials appealed to Jack Hightower, who contacted the state office. Black explained that the cost for moving the city utilities could be included in the highway construction project itself which will be paid for

Three RN's Hired At Hospital

Two full-time and one part-time registered nurse have been hired at McLean Hospital, according to Christine Winegeart, director of nurses.

Mrs. Virginia Davis, who moved here from Austin, and Mrs. Jeanette Fish, who moved here from California, are both full-time RN's.

The hospital now has three full-time RN's and four part-time RN's. In addition to the new employees, they are Mrs. Christine Winegeart, Mrs. JoAnn Brown, Helena Stubbs of Lefors, and Rosemary Trevino of Wheeler.

School Market Value Cut \$7 Million Following Assessment Appeal

McLean School's market value index was lowered by over seven million dollars following an appeal to the School Tax Assessment Practices Board in Austin.

Mrs. Shirley Johnson, business manager, told the school board Monday night.

Mrs. Johnson said that the Assessment Board lowered the value of single family residential dwellings from a total of \$12,045,073 to \$7,528,170, which lowers the value of the average residence in McLean from \$23,000 to \$14,000.

"This is still not good," Mrs. Johnson said, "but I feel this is more in line with actual worth than the earlier figure."

Other categories lowered were vehicles from \$1,753,355 to \$1,350,083, a reduction of \$403,272. Personal property was lowered from \$1,448,011 to \$1,425,659, and intangible personal property was lowered from \$34,709,501 to \$32,085,524.

The total reduction was \$7,566,504. One category which the board refused to reduce was Commercial/Industrial

Real Estate, which is valued at \$15,455,328. Mrs. Johnson said that the Assessment Board had each downtown building in McLean valued at \$32,000. "This is too much," she said, "but I feel like this is the best we can do."

The total market value for McLean Independent School District is \$107,797,775 following the reductions made by the Assessment Board.

Superintendent Carl Dwyer said, "Mrs. Johnson spent a lot of time on this and did an excellent job. I would like to commend her before the board."

The reduction in the overall value of the school district means that the school will receive more state funds from Austin next year than it would have if the original assessment had not been challenged.

In other action of the board, members opened sealed bids on a 1971 Dodge school bus, and voted to accept the bid of Hugh F. Gately.

Dwyer reported that the remodeling of the schools is complete and a final

inspection was to be held yesterday (Wednesday).

A textbook committee to adopt new texts for next year was approved by the board. Members of the committee will be Ron Cummings, Dorman Thomas, Bobbi Stalls, William McEroy, Cecil Reynolds, Jack Dorsett, Mary O'Neil, Mary Lowder, Jacques Riley, Virginia Holwick, Jan Johnson, and Vester Joiner.

Raymond Christian was approved by the board to replace Doris McEroy, who resigned as the resource teacher in high school.

Christian has been teaching for several weeks at the school.

A list of needed band instruments and repairs was submitted to the board for study. The board decided to take action on the matter later.

A new policy for leave by auxiliary personnel was sanctioned by the board. Auxiliary workers (cooks, janitor, bus drivers, and others) are presently allowed five days of sick leave per year, which can accumulate to 15 days.

McLean fumble on the ensuing kickoff, but the Tigers held the Mustangs this time, helped by a third down tackle by Rex Morris on the McLean 32.
The McLean offense then got into gear momentarily, with Morris ripping off 13- and 4-yard runs and catching a 21-yard pass from Eck. But the drive bogged down about 35 yards from the Wheeler goal.
The fourth quarter began with a punt by Jolly, the Mustangs' first of the night. A fumble by Reynolds turned the ball over once again, but McLean again held, and the Tigers' best chance of scoring was to follow.
McLean reached the Wheeler 19 in a march that included a 17-yard scamper by Morris and a 10-yard effort by Reynolds, but the drive fell short with 9:30 remaining in the game.

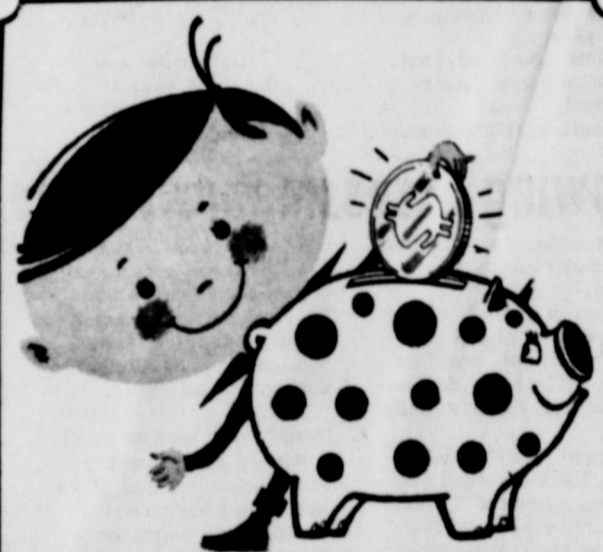

APRICOT POUND CAKE
 Preheat oven to 325 degrees.

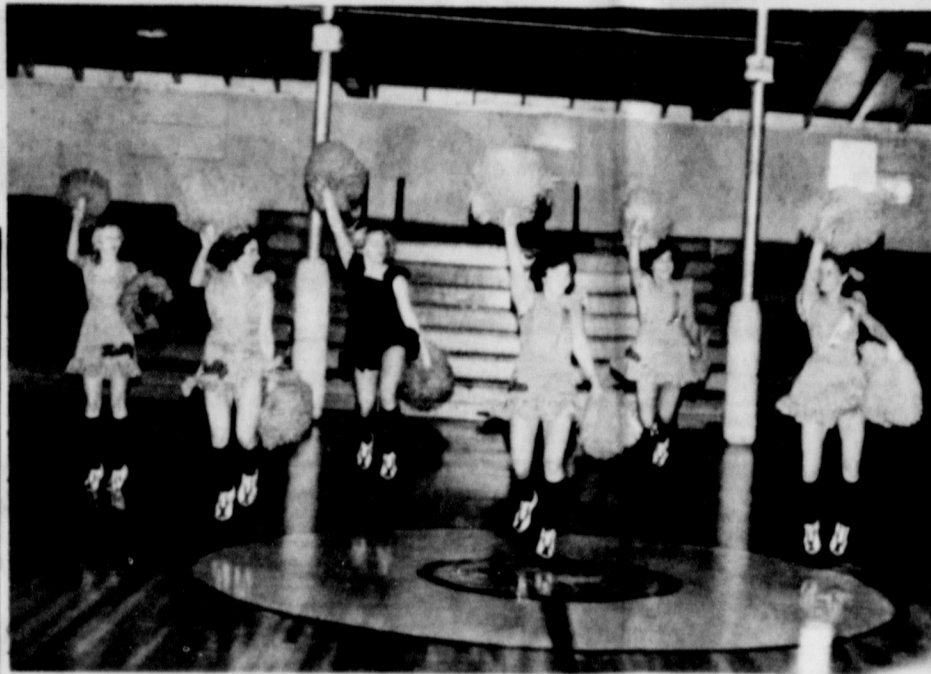

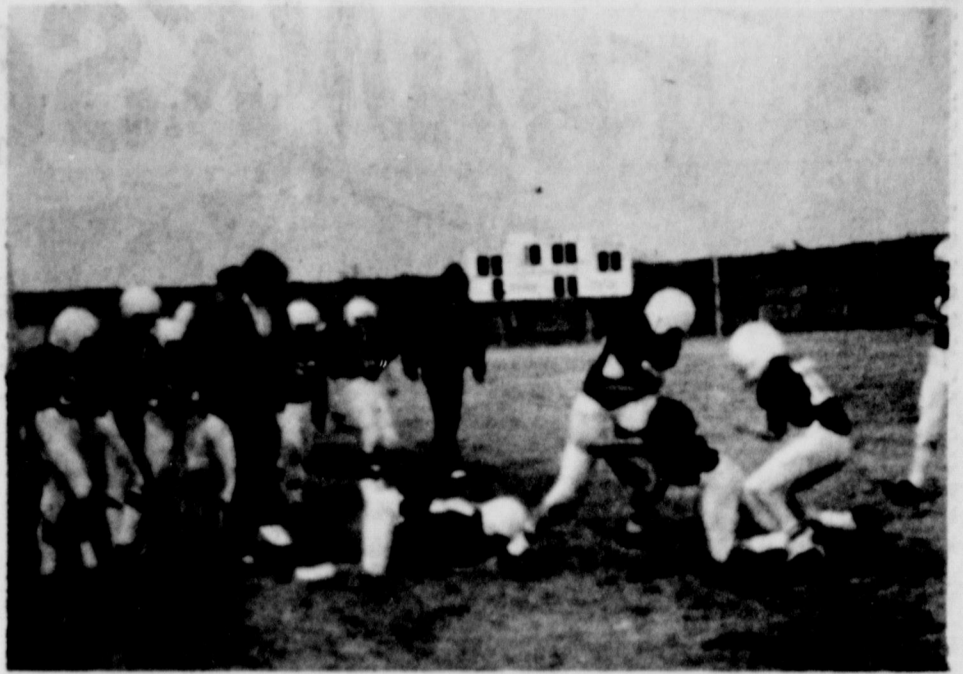

KEEP HOLIDAY MEALS SAFE TO EAT.
 Holiday foods can carry food poisoning bacteria—but simple precautions can prevent food poisoning and related holidays.
 Bacteria need the right combination of time, temperature and moisture to grow. When food remains between 40 and 120 degrees F., for three or four hours, bacteria grow and make the food unsafe to eat. And the only way to kill the bacteria is to heat food to 170 degrees F. Freezing doesn't kill bacteria, it simply slows growth.
 Turning to specific food safety guidelines, thaw the holiday turkey in the refrigerator. Fresh or freshly-thawed turkey should be refrigerated and used within 24 hours. When preparing the turkey, cook it until done throughout—with an internal temperature of 180 degrees F. And if it is to be stuffed, wait until just before placing the bird in the oven to stuff the cavity.
 Good sanitation during food preparation is important to prevent contamination. Make sure hands, utensils and cutting boards are clean when handling turkey and other holiday foods. Also, keep hands away from mouth, nose, hair or skin infections such as boils, open cuts and sores while working with food.
 After the meal is over, don't leave the turkey at room temperature long. Staph germs multiply rapidly between 45 and 115 degrees F.
 If turkey is part of the holiday buffet, use several serving trays instead of only one to keep the meat from remaining at room temperature too long. Bring out a fresh tray frequently to replace that partly used. The turkey stays at the right temperature—and bacteria don't have a chance to grow.

Foodborne illness can cause diarrhea, vomiting, stomach cramps and other unpleasant symptoms which can last for several hours or days. Young children and elderly people are most susceptible.

News from your County Agricultural Agent

FARM PRODUCTIVITY AND FARM-CITY WEEK

The contribution of agriculture and its role in the total economy of Texas and the nation should be recognized during Farm-City Week, November 17th-23rd. Agricultural efficiency and productivity continues to increase. Output per man hour of farm work has increased 30 percent from 1970 to 1976 compared to 30 percent for non-farm bus-

ness. Cash receipts from Texas agriculture should total about \$8 billion in 1978. This should add some \$50 billion in overall economic activity.

IRRIGATION DEMONSTRATION

During the Farm Tour which was held about a month ago, Leon New, Area Extension Agricultural Engineer - Irrigation, made some measurements on Clyde Brown's irrigation well.

As a result of the measurements, Leon believes that by repairing the pump, Clyde will be able to increase efficiency enough so that he can pump about 250 gallons per minute against 30 pounds of discharged pressure for approximately 85¢ per hour.

That is about what Clyde is currently paying to pump about 110 gallons per minute. In that situation, a pump repair job will enable Clyde to more than double his irrigation well output. We plan to make more measurements next spring after

the repair work has been done.
