Warren Hasse, popular sports announcer of station KPND in Pampa, returns for the second year to describe the events.



Lake Restrictions Are Lifted

A three year waiting period has finally ended as lake Mackenzie near Silverton received a substantial raise in water during the recent rainy period.

"The lake has received a 39.9 foot raise and most of it came in one day," said Jim Green, lake manager.

"We finally have enough water to use the boat ramp," Green continued.

The lake rules have been changed to allow all boats except house boats on the lake. All Texas rules and regulations concerning water safety and fishing license requirements are in full force at the lake.

One new lake regulation surpasses the state law as all boaters and skiers will be required to wear their personal flotation devices at all times while underway on the lake. (state law requires these life preservers be available for each crew member and skier)

The lake is over 80 feet deep at the earthen dam and water stretches nearly three miles up the Tule creek bottom.

Fishing opportunities for largemouth bass, channel catfish and walleye should improve as the water clears from the runoff. Future fishing prospects will include smallmouth bass which were stocked prior to the influx of water.

Camping, hiking, picnicking and all water-related sports are in full swing at the newly-filled lake.

Drought Program Is Approved

The Drought Flood Conservation program has just been approved for Gray County producers. This program has been in effect for about one month in several other counties. It was requested for this county on April 29, was approved by the state office on May 9 and just now has been implemented in the county after national approval.

The program offers eligible producers 80% of the cost for carrying out approved practices for conservation. Practices must be completed by November 30, 1977. Sign-up period to request approval under this program is June 8 through June 21, stated Evelyn Mason, County Executive Director. Producers must request the practice before starting it. Limit per person is \$2500.00.

Practices offered under this program are: DC-2 Drilling water wells, pipe and storage facilities

DC-3 Modifying Irrigation systems-irrigation pipe, land leveling and tailwater recovery systems

DC-4 Establishing permanent cover of grass

DC-5 Deferred grazing (between June 15 and September 30.)

DC-6 Dams and reservoirs

DC-7 Terraces

DC-8 Diversion terraces

DC-11 Listing chiseling


DC-14 Establishing interim cover (such as sudan, etc.)

DC-17 Stubble mulching

ACCENT ON HEALTH

Nursing and convalescent homes are familiar to almost everyone in the state, but a new type of care service is drawing the attention of Texas Department of Health Resources officials.

They are the institutions known as personal care homes and they appear to be quite numerous in Texas.

Personal care homes accommodate persons who don't need the degree of services provided by a nursing home or custodial care home, but many persons residing in these homes do need services above the basic provisions of food, shelter and laundry.

The Department of Health Resources has proposed new rules for the licensure of personal care homes, as well as new rules for the classification of services provided in nursing and convalescent homes and related institutions. Public hearings on the proposed rules are underway. Rule making and licensing authority are granted the Department under Article 4442c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes.

The Department believes there are significant numbers of persons not presently residing in nursing homes or custodial care homes who cannot maintain independent life styles. These persons need the presence of an intermediary to provide food and shelter, and in addition, some supervision or aid in everyday living, according to Howard C. Allen, Director of the Nursing and Convalescent Homes Division of TDHR.

However, said Allen, these persons don't need the usual and routine attendance during nighttime sleeping hours, nor do they require the care and services normally provided by a nursing home or custodial care home.

The facilities providing these services under personal care homes fall under three types, generally following the extent of services needed by the residents. Main

differences are these:

Type A personal care homes are designated for residents who are ambulatory, can provide their own self-help and are capable of following directions and taking appropriate action for self-preservation under emergency conditions.

Type B facilities may house residents who are ambulatory but may be mentally retarded; however, they are capable of following directions and taking appropriate action for self-preservation under emergency conditions.

Type C personal care homes are for residents who may be physically or mentally incapacitated or handicapped.

The Department believes that these persons can be accommodated in a personal care home or facility which doesn't have extensive services. But they do need and deserve the protection of the law in assuring that they are provided safe and sanitary living conditions and as needed are provided assistance in everyday living, said Allen.

Staffing would be far below that of nursing and convalescent homes since there wouldn't be the need for professional nurses and other professional personnel.

But, those in charge could provide such things as entertainment and transportation. They also could summon aid in case of an emergency or provide first aid, said Allen. They also could provide a wake-up service, supervise activities and a meal-time regimen, supervise self-treatment for physical conditions or self-carrying-out of a physician's orders. The operators of personal care home also could provide assistance in grooming and give hygienic assistance and provide counseling.

In addition to rules for the licensing of personal care homes, other rules would set out the classification of protective and non-protective services provided for persons in nursing and convalescent homes and related facilities such as personal care homes.

Athens has been a great place to visit on my Amtrak "Week on Wheels" in Texas, and I am impressed more than ever before by the tourism opportunities in the Lone Star state.

Athens is one of the places easily reached by fine highway from Dallas and Fort Worth, about 70 miles away.

Nearby is Canton, home of a fantastic flea market, which is considered the largest and most interesting of its kind in the United States. Visitors come by the thousands the first of each month for the market. Information concerning dates and housing is available from either the Athens Chamber of Commerce, or the Canton Chamber of Commerce.

Athens' black eyed peas are honored at a jamboree each August. There are shelling contests, a cook off for those producing the finest dishes utilizing the lentil, a country western show, terrapin races and other events.



Cattle Outlook Is Improving

Cattle prices show some improvement this spring and summer, says a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Price rises for feeder cattle should continue to be rather healthy through the second quarter of the year and into the early part of the third quarter. However, there will be some wakening of prices into the fall and winter. Feeder cattle prices should be out in July but should generally remain strong throughout the summer months. The improved outlook for cattle prices is a result of low beef production, some decrease in pork output, and further increases in population and disposable income.



Q: I know a couple that has never paid income tax, and they seem to get away with it. The wife has always wanted to pay the taxes, but her husband wouldn't do it. Is she as guilty as he is? If he died, would she be responsible? And one more thing, is it my duty as a citizen to turn them in?

A: When a joint return is filed, each spouse is liable for the full amount of the tax, interest and penalties due. However, fraud penalties don't apply to a spouse who had no intention of defrauding the government. So, the wife might not be held responsible. Although you have no legal duty to report them, you can. Anyone supplying helpful information to the IRS about tax evaders may receive a reward of up to 10% of the taxes collected.

Q: I moved out of an apartment a month or so ago, leaving a forwarding address. Last week a friend of mine watched the manager opening a beauty club package that was addressed to me. Is there anything I can do to stop this invasion of privacy?

A: Federal law prohibits opening or destroying the mail of another person. However, the Attorney General is the only one who can file suit. All you can do is report a suspected violation to the Postal Department. One other thing, you could institute private suit for invasion of privacy, and if you are successful, you could get damages for your "mental suffering". In most cases, though, one must base such an action on a very important, fundamental right, and it is uncertain whether the opening of a beauty club

package would be a violation of such a right.


Q: My divorce became final in April of 1973. I found out the other day that my husband remarried in October of 1972! Six months before the divorce was final! I have a copy of his marriage license. Is he legally married to this other woman?

A: His marriage became valid when the prior marriage to you was dissolved. It's valid if since that time your ex and his present wife have lived together as husband and wife and held themselves out to others as being married.

Q: What happens to my children if my wife and I do not have a will and we die at the same time?

A: The court will appoint a guardian to take care of each child that is under 18 years of age and to administer all of their property. The Texas law sets out a list of specific relatives from which the court will appoint a guardian, depending upon which relatives are alive and able to serve. If there are no relatives, the court will use its discretion in choosing a guardian.



San Antonio Woman Advances To National Chicken Contest

AUSTIN--Using a recipe adapted from a dish enjoyed during a Mexican vacation, a San Antonio woman, Kay Grizzard of 5111 Slayden Dr., was named first place winner of the Texas Chicken Cooking Contest.

She will advance to the national competition to be held July 27 in Jackson, Miss., according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"The participation of all of the 1,500 cooks throughout the state who submitted recipes for consideration is certainly evidence of the popularity of Texas chicken," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "We would certainly like to see Mrs. Grizzard return from the national contest with the \$10,000 first place prize."

The winning chicken dish,

"Chicken Yucatan," was sent to the judges "without even a chance to taste it," Mrs. Grizzard said.

CHICKEN YUCATAN

- 1/4 cup corn oil
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds
- 1 large clove garlic, minced
- 2 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 2 whole broiler-fryer chicken breasts, halved and boned

In a bowl, mix together orange juice, wine, parsley, flavor enhancer and salt. Add chicken and raisins. Marinate 2 hours. Heat corn oil in frypan over medium heat. Add almonds and saute over low heat until lightly browned. Remove with slotted spoon. Dry chicken on paper towels. Increase heat to moderate and add chicken. Brown all sides, adding garlic last few minutes. Add raisins and all but 1/2 cup of marinade; simmer 10 minutes or until fork can be inserted in chicken with ease. Mix corn starch with reserved marinade. Remove chicken to serving dish. Pour the corn starch mixture into the liquid, stirring constantly, cooking until liquid is thickened. Simmer about 2 minutes. Spoon liquid over chicken and raisins; sprinkle almonds on top. Serve with rice. Makes 4 servings.

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

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Pesticide Use Certificates Out Soon, Ag Official Says

AUSTIN—Texas farmers who have been waiting for private applicator restricted-use pesticide certificates, being issued by the Texas Department of Agriculture, need not worry that they've been overlooked. Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has assured.

"Recent production problems have caused a delay in getting the certificates from the printers and some

people have understandably registered concern about their certificates," Brown explained.

"By June 1, however, we should be able to start mailing out the certificates so that if you haven't received yours yet, don't worry," he added.

Certificates will be mailed to those private applicators who have successfully completed training required by national legislation. Under the provisions of the federal law, after Oct. 21, 1977, a license will be required for purchasing and using restricted pesticides to be identified by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Easter Seal Drive To Begin

The Texas Easter Seal Society with its network of affiliate treatment centers and volunteer chapters and representatives provided in the year ending August 31, 1976, some 85,215 units of appropriate therapies to 11,726 handicapped children and adults of Texas. This is an increase of 958 disabled citizens served in 1976.

This growth in needed services requires a concurrent growth in public support. Total income to the Texas Easter Seal Society and its affiliates increased by \$668,581. This represented an increase of 25% over the previous year. It is this measure of support, reflecting as it does public confidence in the programs of the Easter Seal Society, which made it possible for handicapped Texans children and adults to receive needed therapies, equipment and services.

The Easter Seal Action program program initiated in June of 1976 and provides information referral, and follow up services to the disabled of the states has proven to be a much needed and very successful service. Beginning last June with only 22 calls a month, the Action Line is receiving an average of 225 calls today. This service is designated to serve as a link between the handicapped and those services needed. With just a call, persons can receive assistance

in locating services they need, where it can be obtained and who can provide it for them.

"Actually, the need to spend additional money in establishing new service programs is not as important as we would suspect," state William F. Russell, Executive Director of the Texas Easter Seal Society, "but a more effective use of current budgeted programs is needed through a referral service such as the 'Easter Seal Action Line'."

The fact of such increases prompts the Easter Seal Society of Texas to constantly evaluate the needs of the handicapped; to strive not to duplicate existing resources; to advocate for the needs of the disabled; and to identify unmet needs.

"Easter Seal Action line, a 24 hour toll free number (1-800-492-5555) can be used by any disabled person and their families to obtain information regarding help they may need. The public is reminded that if they are handicapped or if they know of anyone is handicapped and is in need of help in locating a needed service, call the Easter Seal Action Line's toll free number 1-800-492-5555, night or day, seven days a week.

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Picnic foods such as fried chicken, roast beef, or baked ham, as well as potato salad, deviled eggs or cole slaw should be avoided if there is no way of keeping them very hot or cold. It might become unsafe to eat any of these within three hours due to bacterial growth, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Wheat harvest time is here. Farmers are busy getting wheat cut as soon as fields become ripe. There is also the possibility of a hail storm or other severe weather laying waste to a good crop at harvest time. At the time this is being written it is still too early to tell how the wheat crop is going to yield. Let's hope the yield is better than the price.

CATTLE FLY AND GRUB CONTROL

Hornflies are increasing in numbers on most cattle. Now is an excellent time to treat your cattle for grubs and flies at the same time. Several sprays, dips, pour-ons, mineral mixes and feed mixes approved for use in cattle grub control will give you control of horn flies.

Self-treatment devices (dust bags and back-rubbers) are effective for hornfly control if placed in areas that cattle frequent. However an adjustment period of 2-3 weeks may be required before the cattle will use the devices regularly.


Best results of grub control are obtained when animals are treated as soon as possible after the termination of heel fly activity and when grubs are small. This usually occurs in late May and June.

Before purchasing and using any of these grub control insecticides, read the label and follow the precautions and restrictions on use.

ELM BLACK LEAF SPOT

Recently Quentin Williams asked about what was causing his true Chinese Elm to have leaves turn yellow and drop off. Upon inspecting the leaves, they had small, yellow spots appearing first on the upper surface of leaves. These spots gradually develop a shiny black appearance. Heavy leaf spotting causes the leaves to yellow and defoliate in wet seasons.

Black leaf spot can be controlled with Zineb. If trees have been affected seriously in previous seasons, fungicidal sprays applied when leaves are unfolding, when they reach full size and again two weeks later will help prevent serious defoliation next

year. Raking and burning, fallen leaves will reduce opportunities for future infection.

HORTICULTURE TIDBITS

Did you know that one acre of grass gives off 2,400 gallons of water every hot summer day. This has a cooling effect of a 140,000 pound air conditioner—a 70-ton machine. A mature tree in front of your home can produce a cooling effect equal to 10 room-size air conditioners running 20 hours a day.

A properly located shade tree can reduce summer room temperatures as much as 20 degrees

LIGHTNING—A MAJOR KILLER

Lightning kills more people in the United States than do tornadoes, floods or hurricanes. And spring is the time when thunderstorms and lightning are generally common over much of Texas. Here are a few simple rules that could possibly save lives during an electrical storm.

Lightning seldom kills more than one person at a time.

The first rule is simply to learn to recognize the signs of an oncoming thunderstorm, from which bolts of lightning emanate. Watch for towering "thunderhead" clouds, distant rumbles of thunder and distant flashes of lightning which indicate an approaching storm.

Also, heed National Weather Service forecasts and warnings on radio and television to "get in out of the weather."

All experts on lightning agree that, when a thunderstorm threatens, the most important single thing is to get inside a home or large building, or inside an all-metal vehicle. An enclosed car or truck is described as an excellent shelter from lightning, for if struck it will allow the current to be discharged harmlessly into the ground.

When inside during an electrical storm, avoid using a telephone, except for emergencies.

If outside, with no time to reach a safe building or an automobile, there is another set of rules to follow.

Don't stand under a natural lightning rod, such as a tall, isolated tree in an open area. Also, avoid standing in small isolated sheds or other small structures in open areas.

Equally important is to avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape, such as standing on a hilltop in an open

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field, on a beach, or fishing from a small boat.

Get out of and away from open water. If you're swimming, the electrical current from a nearby lightning strike can flow through the water to you.

On the farm, get away from horses, tractors and other metal farm equipment.

Also get away from motorcycles, scooters, golf carts and bicycles. Put down golf clubs. Stay away from wire fences, clotheslines, metal pipes, rails and other metallic paths that could carry the electrical shock from lightning from some distance away.

In a forest, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees, but in open areas go to a low place such as a ravine or valley.

If isolated in an open field, drop to the knees and bend forward, putting the hands on the knees. In this position, if lightning strikes near you, the chances of it using your body as a conductor are minimized. Kneeling provides a low profile while at the same time keeping as small an area of the body in contact with the ground as possible. Lying in a ditch or hollow is discouraged for surface water or saturated soil is a better conductor of electricity than the surrounding area.

Groups of persons in exposed situations, such as hikers, should spread out—staying several yards apart—so if lightning strikes nearby, the smallest number will be affected.

Watch It Worth The Chance

Texas game wardens were busy in May in northwest Texas as over 478 water safety and fishing cases were taken to court.

"Wardens in region VI which includes Amarillo, Abilene and Lubbock, contacted 15,704 persons during May and approximately three percent of them were in violation of one or more of our department's rules and regulations," said Ted Wheelis, regional director of law enforcement.

"Fishing violations lead the list over water safety but we still had a fatality from a boating accident," Wheelis continued.

The most flagrant violation was fishing without a license as 281 cases were taken to court. Wardens working the lakes heard every excuse in the book from "I left the license at home" to "I could not find a place to buy one."

The number of fishing licenses sold in Texas is down this year and indications suggest anglers are going fishing hoping they will not be checked by a warden.

Texas has one of the lowest-priced fishing licenses in the United States but, it is apparent the first item left off the list for the vacation or trip is that \$4.25 piece of paper. A newly purchased license will not expire until August 31, 1978.

Court fines vary from \$10 to \$200 for each in-

fraction of the regulation and most embarrassed anglers have been paying a \$27.50 fine.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is still puzzled as fishing license sales continue downward swing. More fish, new lakes and professional services to pond and lake owners continue to come from the P&WD but, the angler has apparently failed to notice these benefits.

It is hoped by the P&WD that both water safety and fishing violations will drop but so far, it has not happened this year.

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World-wide Inflation Brings Pressures on Texas Rural Land

Inflation, both here and abroad is bringing new pressures to bear on prices of prime farm land.

In the not-so-distant past there were two well-defined rural land markets in Texas and generally in the South-west, according to Dr. Ivan Schmedemann of Texas A&M University. These were the traditional agricultural production market with land values depending on net returns and the consumption land market where other factors were more important to the owner than economic returns.

In recent years an inflation market has developed according to Schmedemann, who has made a number of studies of land values for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Real Estate Research Center.

The inflation market consists of both domestic and foreign buyers. In each case, land is bought to store and conserve accumulated wealth during present or anticipated periods of high inflation.

Widely dissimilar goals of these buyers affect both use of the land and rural residents. Production market buyers own the land for the specific purpose of earning a living.

An annual cash flow is of

prime importance to younger owners who are generally heavily indebted and are accustomed to an ever increasing standard of living. Older rural residents historically have used the land as a means of accumulating an estate and have placed less emphasis on the annual net income from the land.

Consumption market buyers are mostly absentee landowners who do not rely on the land as a means of support. They may buy land for such uses as investment, family use, potential retirement site, hedge against inflation, or "back-to-the-land" security.

Inflation buyers, both foreign and domestic, have quite similar reasons for ownership. They have accumulated wealth which they are investing in land, and in most cases, these are cash sales. While factors such as tax avoidance, cash flow, etc., are important, the rate of land appreciation is paramount along with the security and stability of the investment.

What is the effect of different buyers on the rural community? Schmedemann's studies show that the production market has resulted in land consolidation similar to that expected in the case of the inflation market. The result is that in each case there is some degree of migration from the rural

areas. However, since the owners of production land live in the area, they usually reinvest in the rural communities and have a vital interest in keeping them economically and socially viable.

This will not be the case with both foreign and domestic inflation landowners. They are absentee owners and have no personal commitment to the region or the rural communities.

The consumption landowners bring new resources to rural communities and are largely responsible for the growth in population numbers and the new economic vitality found in many communities.

"The welfare of the agricultural sector is of vital interest to the U.S. economy," Schmedemann says. "The importance of agricultural exports has been patently demonstrated in the recent past. The comparative advantage of American agriculture is of immense importance to both domestic and foreign consumers.

"The owners of production land are essential to the continued efficiency of U.S. agriculture. But a significant expansion of the domestic or foreign ownership of rural land for inflation purposes will prove, in the long run, to be a detriment to agricultural productivity," Schmedemann concludes.

Pattern Alteration

Surveys indicate that homesewing will boom in 1977 because of high ready-to-wear prices and the need to economize will turn women to homesewing.

Health Tips On Hyperactive Children

Hyperactive children can be like a human buzz saw, ripping through a house or disrupting school rooms. Yet they are not monsters to be feared and controlled like King Kong. They simply are children who have a disease that has continuing excessive, troublesome activity as a symptom, the Texas Medical Association says.

The disease often can be controlled by educational and drug therapy, author Patrick Casey, M.D., says in the June issue of "Texas Medicine," the TMA monthly journal.

Some other physicians say artificial additives in food may trigger hyperactivity and recommend a strict additive-free diet. But whatever the cause, parents, teachers and doctors need to work together to find out the child's problem.

Teachers play an important role diagnosing the problem because it often seems worse in the more controlled school environment. Parents should do their part in getting medical help for their children as soon as a problem is apparent. Of course doctors can aid hyperactive children by testing to rule out other problems and prescribing proper therapy.

Dr. Casey's study of hyperactive Galveston children showed that most of them do not have any strong physical evidence of nerve problems. Behavioral symptoms usually are the main sign of trouble. Serious repeated problems with learning, discipline or the family can be treated best by the parent, teacher, doctor team. Children may need special teaching or awhile to help them catch up with learning they missed because of hyperactivity problems. Certainly teachers also need to monitor and report a child's progress to parents and doctors. The parent can make sure children receive needed therapy at home and at school. Parents themselves often need help learning how to deal with the hyperactive child. The doctor often can advise parents and teachers and monitor treatment for its effectiveness. Social workers, psychologists, counselors and other professional personnel should be used when needed, Dr. Casey, a North Carolina University medical school professor, says.

One of the most important things to remember is to seek help early when a problem is suspected. Hyperactivity can get worse and become too big a burden for parents or school personnel to handle alone. But treatment often is effective and it can offer a new world to a child trapped by hyperactivity.

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
