## MAIL EARLY USE ZIP CODE

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history." Acting Postmaster Frank Simpson said today.

Nationally about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

"ZIP Code use and the cooperation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for our success. With the same or better operation this year, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush," Simpson added.

Simpson had advice which would help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season.

Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials: boxes, tape, wrapping paper, etc.

Use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved or that undeliverable cards will be returned if a return address is on the envelope.

## Operation Show Your Colors Gets Underway Here

McLean citizens are being urged by E. H. Holmes, commander of the local American Legion Post, to wear the small lapel U. S. Flags now being passed out in McLean. The local post is working closely with National Commander L. Eldon James' program, Operation Show Your Colors.

The American Legion's answer to the anti-Vietnam, anti-draft demonstrations perpetrated by a loud minority of college students and others, has received an initial response exceeding expectations.

The first pin was placed on the hand of Legislative Gov. John Connally as the Texas Department kicked off the program. When pinned Governor Connally gave his wholehearted support of the aims and purposes of "Operation Show Your Colors." The local American Post has received a supply of the pins.

The lapel flags, which are being passed out by the millions, are accompanied by a small card carrying the message, Operation Show Your Colors—Americans are serving the cause of freedom in Vietnam. I wear my country's flag to show that I support their efforts.

Commander Holmes emphasized that this is not just for Legion members only, but for all loyal Americans as a symbol of American unity.

## Texans Vote To Extend Cotton Quotas

Preliminary returns showed that Texas farmers voted along with other states to extend federal marketing quotas on cotton, peanuts and rice.

Gray county cotton farmers in the recent voting referendum voted well over 90 per cent to retain the quotas.

In Donley County, producers voted on both marketing quotas and the transfer of cotton out of the county, voting 206 to 71 against the transfer of cotton allotments out of the county, and 29 to 39 in favor of approving marketing quotas.

Eighty-eight per cent of Texas farmers voted for the upland cotton—34,615 to 4,729. Other quotas approved by Texans included long staple cotton, 329 to 47.

The vote extended current cotton acreage allotments with growers entitled to price supports.

Under a new federal cotton program, a farmer can collect government payments for diverting at least 12.5 per cent of his acreage to conservation uses. He can collect merely for participating in the program and become eligible for price support loans.

## Dickie Crockett Makes Two TDs In Final Game At SWC

Dickie Crockett, freshman halfback from McLean, gave Southwestern State College football fans a preview of things to come in Weatherford, Okla., Saturday night.

The 185-pound former McLean High School Tiger fullback scored two touchdowns as the Southwestern Bulldogs wound up their football season with a rousing 43-7 victory over Tarleton, Texas State College.

Crockett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emory Crockett, chalked up his first TD on an 82-yard punt return—the Bulldogs' longest scoring run of the year.

That came early in the final period of play, and Crockett followed it up a short time later with a one-yard scoring run.

The youngster has been used mainly this season to return punts and kickoffs. But Southwestern Coach Otis Desporte has been impressed with Crockett's ability and desire, indicating there will be plenty of action in the next three years for the McLean player.

Crockett, who is attending Southwestern on a football scholarship, graduated from McLean High School last spring, after a dazzling four years with the Tigers.

The Crockett name is a familiar one at Southwestern State. Dickie's cousin, Bill Crockett, played four years as a Bulldog halfback before graduating last spring.

Bill is now a coach in the El Reno, Okla., public schools.

**DUCK SEASON NOW OPEN**

It's full speed ahead for the fall waterfowl harvest as of sunrise, Wednesday, Nov. 24, when ducks join geese as legal targets.

The Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife reports that flocks have been building up lately, particularly because of cold weather in the north central states, which means in the zero or colder bracket.

The department noted that the duck opener will come as a definite relief to sportsmen confining their hunting to geese since they have seen great swirls of ducks arriving from the northland and even have had ducks buzzing their goose decoys.

The duck season, unlike the goose season, will be curtailed as to season length and bag contents. The duck season ends at sunset Jan. 2. The goose shoot does not terminate until sunset Jan. 12.

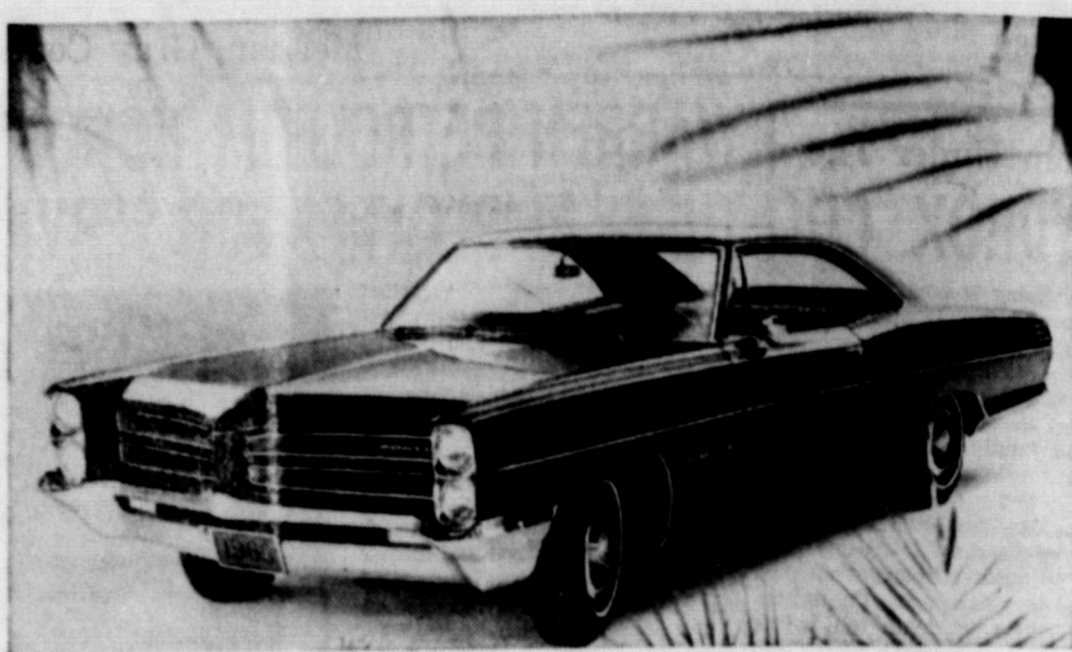
The daily limit on ducks is four and the possession limit eight, after the opening day. The daily bag limit on mallards and pintails is one each. The possession limit is two each.

Stratton kicked for the extra point, but the ball hit a goal post, failing to register.

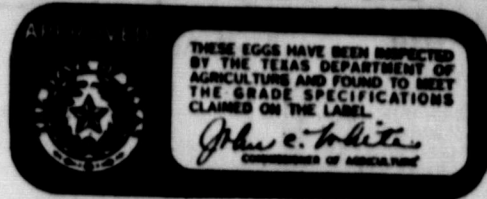

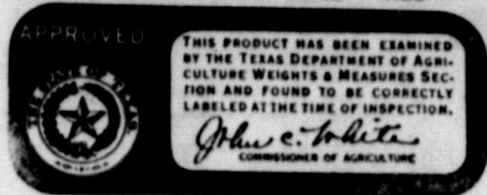

### CATTLE MARKET 1966

Just about everyone you talk to is optimistic about the cattle market for 1966. There are a lot of predictions that choice steers will hit 30 cents on the Chicago market by next June.

Most cattle feeders have been on a plus margin since this time last year. Some very good profits were made last spring and summer. This has caused some spirited bidding for replacement feeder cattle. However, considerable restraint has been observed by feeders that took a beating two years ago.

There are a lot of plus factors in the general outlook for cattle price. It has been estimated that total cattle numbers will be down 1.5 million head in January. This is the first year we have had a downturn in numbers in several years. Our human population is increasing at a rapid pace. Coupled with a decline in cattle numbers makes for a good outlook.

The big decline in cattle numbers is because of the large cow slaughter in 1965. It takes time to re-build the breeding herd.

Another plus factor is the fact that hog numbers are down. Prices are skyrocketing. People turn to beef when pork prices are high.

One negative factor we should keep in mind. Feed lot numbers of cattle were up seven per cent as of last Oct. 1. During the month of October, placements in feed lot were up an average of 17 per cent in five selected states, Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado and Nebraska.

### COTTON

Ginning is beginning to pick up and will be on the increase shortly.

For the benefit of the cotton growers in the McLean vicinity, I have placed with Henry Lowrance, McLean Gin manager, an excellent piece of literature that can be used to estimate your potentials in the 1966 cotton program.

I secured this leaflet from the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. It gives a brief run down on the provisions of the 1966 program.

It gives a good example of how the program would work on the average farm having a 100 acre allotment and given projected yields. Stop by the gin and pick one of these up from Henry.

### WATER TESTING

We are securing free water bottles and instruction sheets for testing individual water wells for the Alanreed community.

This is a free service. Should you have a well you would like to have tested, leave your name at The McLean News office, and we will supply you with the bottles for collecting the water, along with instructions.

## SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

All farm and ranch operators who are age 65 or over, and all farm and ranch workers who are also that old, are reminded by Hal Geldon, Amarillo social security district manager, that the 1965 changes in the law make it imperative for them to file their social security claims immediately. This applies even though they are still active on the farm and ranch.

The hospitalization insurance, which is automatic, and the medical insurance, which is optional at a \$3 per month premium beginning next July, require that social security claims be filed before those provisions can apply. Persons already 65 need to take such action now. Those who do not file in the current enrollment period will have only one other chance to enroll, and that will be at a higher cost in the October-December 1967 enrollment period.

Geldon urges all persons affected by the above information to talk with a representative of the Amarillo social security office when he visits in Shamrock on Nov. 15 and 22, Mondays. The representative will be in the Community Building from 10 to 11:30.

Even though a person's earnings may be too high to permit immediate payment of monthly retirement benefits, Geldon wants to feel sure that no eligible persons have lost out on the health insurance program because of lack of information.

## TAX SAM SEZ:

Every year the good tax folks send out a lot of letters asking taxpayers to come in for an audit.

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## NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Monroe Seitz is in the process of completing a diversion on his farm east of Laketon.

Pete Seitz has established about 50 acres to a dead sorghum cover to seed grass in. Pete will drill this cover to a mixture of sideots gramina and bluestem next spring. Bill Crisp plans to put in some underground irrigation pipe on his farm north of Alameda.

Charles Grigsby has completed 1,100 feet of pipeline for livestock water.

John Haynes has completed eight seep type ponds on his ranch north of McLean. These ponds were constructed with a dragline.

John Quirk has established 150 acres of cropland to a dead sorghum cover. John plans to seed this cover to blue gramina in the early spring.

How often do droughts occur? Droughts are one of the main concerns of farmers and ranchers in the Texas Panhandle. From 1892 to 1968, 16 years (24%) were very dry; 38 years (56.8%) were below average; 29 years (43.2%) were above average. We can see from the above figures that droughts and dry years are just as normal as wet years. If you are stocked on the basis of average rainfall you could be short of grass over 50% of the time. Since we know these droughts occur rather frequently, we should prepare for them. The past two years found many farmers and ranchers out of grass and feed.

To avoid damaging our grass during drought and dry years, we should stock on basis of the drier years rather than the wet years. Success in ranching business depends upon the amount of grass we produce rather than the number of livestock we have. A good many farmers and ranchers carry over a good supply of hay to feed during the first part of a drought. This helps to avoid damaging their grass and buying high price feed.

It was voted to eliminate the meeting in December and the Christmas party. The club will attend the all-clubs party in Pampa Dec. 9.

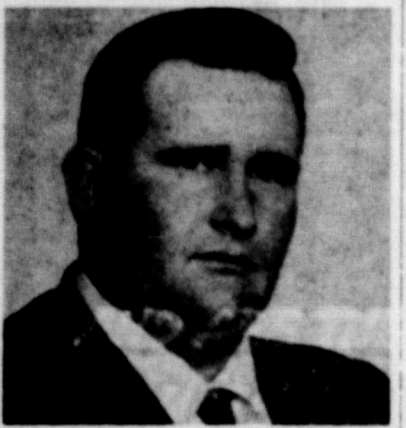

### Information Offered On S. S. Insurance

"Anyone age 65 or older, who is not receiving social security, railroad retirement, civil service, or old-age assistance from the welfare department, should contact the social security office now to file a claim for the new medical health insurance benefits," Hal Gelson, district manager of the Amarillo social security office, has stated.

People meeting these requirements could be better served if they file their claim now, he stated, rather than waiting until the deadline to file.

Gelson stated that anyone receiving old-age assistance from the State Welfare Department only should wait until he receives word from the welfare as to when to file for these benefits.

"As mentioned on previous occasions, any person age 65 before 1966 needs to file a claim in this enrollment period and decide whether to elect the voluntary medical insurance supplemental benefits. This means persons who are still fully employed and who have no idea of retiring in the near future," Gelson said. The address of the local social security office is 1005 Adams Street, Amarillo.

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
