Camp Sweeney To Begin 27th Year

Accent ON HEALTH

Texas Department of Health Resources

The first week in March is National Nutrition Week, a good time to remember that food to meet the physical needs of the individual is essential to good health. According to the Texas Department of Health Resources, dietary counselling is becoming recognized as a basic part of many kinds of health care.

Dietary counselling is the process of giving individualized professional guidance to help people to adjust their daily food consumption to meet their health needs. It's up to the patient to make wise food selections, which means that he must understand his own nutritional requirements and follow the advice of the dietary counsellor.

According to Dr. Helen Campbell, director of the special nutrition project of the Department of Health Resources, dietary counselling is often a component of the individual health plan, developed by a physician, for people with chronic illnesses and health-endangering conditions such as obesity. Frequently, the physician includes a professional, registered dietitian in the health care team.

The counselling may involve such factors as the patient's present food habits and eating practices. A variety of social economic factors, including ethnic and religious beliefs, must be considered to ensure that the dietary plan will be acceptable to the individual. The plan is developed, in writing, in consultation with the patient and is explained fully by the counsellor; in many cases, the patient's entire family is involved, since many people find it impractical to prepare special meals for one member of the family. Of course, the entire counselling process is supervised by the physician to make sure that the dietary plan satisfies the health objectives that have been set with the patient.

This approach places important responsibilities on each person involved in the health care process. The physician guides and directs the entire process, and must recognize the contribution that dietary counselling can make to the overall treatment plan. The registered dietitian must develop a dietary plan that satisfies the patient's health needs, and determined by the physician, while at the same time satisfying the tastes and habits of the patient. In most cases, a nurse provides follow-up supervision to ensure that the patient follows the plan that has been prescribed and reports on progress or difficulties to the physi-

cian and the nutritionist.

The central member of the team, of course, is the patient. The patient, or health care consumer, must become more aware of nutrition as a cornerstone of positive health, and must realize the importance of dietary counselling in helping to develop and maintain sound nutritional habits. It is also the patient's responsibility to implement the health care plan. Nutritionally, this means providing, preparing, and eating the foods prescribed in the plan.

It's also important for the patient to be able to get in touch with one of the professional team members whenever a question or problem arises.

According to Dr. Campbell, sound dietary counselling relies on seeking the answers to several basic questions:

1. Does the patient understand the condition for which the special nutritional plan is being prescribed?

2. Does the patient understand why certain foods are stressed, limited, or omitted?

3. Does, or can, the patient make substitutions in the plan to fit individual tastes and food preferences?

4. Is there a relationship between the foods in the plan and any medication prescribed by the physician? If so, does the patient understand that relationship requirements which might be mutually exclusive or conflicting?

5. Are there any dietary requirements, which might be mutually exclusive or conflicting? If so, can the patient manage to satisfy all of the requirements?

Medical scientist and nutritionists realize today that an individual's food consumption must satisfy a number of needs, including psychological and aesthetic gratification. It's not simply a matter of determining a narrow, rigid list of foods that are "good for a person."

Many different foods can be selected to serve the same nutritional purposes. That's why the team approach to dietary counselling is

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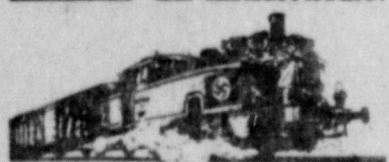

you and the LAW

Q: I am a school teacher who has been required by my employer to take an additional college course annually to retain my teaching position. During the past year I took the course, as required, paying for it out of my own pocket. Is that education expense deductible on my income tax?

A: Your expenses are deductible even if, as a result of the education you eventually receive a master's degree and an increase in salary. You may not deduct expenses for more education than your employer requires, unless you can establish that the expenses were incurred to improve or maintain skills needed in your position. Allowed itemized deductions might include tuition, books, and laboratory fees. If the courses taken qualify you for a new trade or business, the deduction will not be allowed.

Q: For the past year I have been paying my sister to babysit with my child during the day while I am at work. Can I claim a tax credit for child care expense under the new tax reform law?

A: When you figure your credit, you may include payments you make to relatives who are not your dependents for the tax year, even if they are members of your household, provided the services of the relatives qualify as employment subject to social security tax. If your sister is listed as one of your dependents, then you cannot claim a credit for the child care. To otherwise qualify for the credit you must be gainfully employed

or actively searching for a job during the year, your expenditures must have been necessary for you to keep your job and you must have a qualified individual, such as your child.

Q: Does the law which allows you to turn right on a red light also allow you to turn left onto a one-way street?

A: Yes, you may turn left onto a one-way street after stopping at a red light, if you are in the far left lane of a one-way street. The "right turn on red" law, however, allows cities to exempt individual intersections from the law by posting a sign prohibiting turns on red lights. Also, this law does not give you the right-of-way when you turn on a red light—you still must wait for pedestrians and other traffic to clear before making your turn.

Q: An eye doctor prescribed eyeglasses for me last year. Well, I know that the doctor's fee is deductible on my income tax return, but can I deduct the cost of the eyeglasses themselves and the transportation to and from the doctor's office?

A: Yes, the eye examination and the eyeglasses are considered medical treatment, so the cost of the eyeglasses may be included as a medical deduction. The same goes for the cost of the transportation to and from the doctor's office—it's deductible. These are claimed as deductions when you itemize on Schedule A, Form 1040.

HYDASIEVE CUTS CATTLE DIPPING COSTS--A Hydrasieve can make for a smoother cattle dipping operation and can cut costs, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In a feedlot demonstration using Coral cattle dip, the Hydrasieve lowered dipping costs, filtered out suspended solids and

reduced the amount of pesticide residue. To allowed 75 percent more cattle to be dipped per vat charge, cut waste pesticide volume in half, and reduced pesticide usage almost 30 percent.

"Whoso loveth correction loveth knowledge but he that hateth reproof is brutish" (Prov. 12:1). Solomon, by inspiration, here states a cardinal principle of God's people in and for all ages. There will be a corn production symposium on March 17 in Amarillo at the new Texas A&M Research and Extension Center at 6500 Amarillo at the new Texas A&M Boulevard West. The program will start at 1 p.m. and everyone interested in corn production and recent research findings about corn is invited to attend. Dr. G. B. Thompson, Director of Research at the new center, says that findings from the USDA Center at Bushland and the North Plains Research Field at Etter will be discussed. Program topics include: cultural practices, fertilization, irrigation, head smut and stalk rots, weed control, and insect control.

Last spring I asked Neil Stovall to give me a cost-return comparison between growing corn and sorghum. Neil and W. C. Epperson got their heads together after harvest last fall and came up with an advantage of \$67.32 per acre to corn. This comparison applied to grass infested land where top sorghum yields were not possible. Also, this was based on last year's corn production where they made about 7,000 lbs. of corn as compared to about 5,000 lbs. sorghum.

How do I get rid of worms in my peaches? I have been betting a lot of questions like this lately by concerned home gardeners. The little worm that gets in most fruit is the plum curculio. Several sprayings may be needed to insure that your fruit won't have worms.

We recommend using Malathion as a spray. The first spray should be made at the pink bud stage and the second spray made about two weeks after petal fall. Some growers may want to spray again in about two weeks. You will need to follow all directions on the label. Mix 2 1/2 tablespoons of a 50% E.C. of Malathion in three gallons of water. If you have been having problems with brown rot on your fruit then I suggest you add to the above mixture benomyl at the rate of 1 1/2 tablespoon of a 50% W.P. in the three gallon of water.

Now is the time to spray scale insects with a dormant oil if you haven't done so in the

last few weeks. Scale insects get on a lot of landscape plants. Last fall there were some pine trees infested with scale insects.

Dormant oils should be applied before new plant growth begins, when temperatures are between 40 and 65 degrees and no freezing insects through suffocation so all parts of the plant should be covered between 40 and 65 degrees and no freezing insects through suffocation so all parts of the plants should be covered. Follow directions on the label.

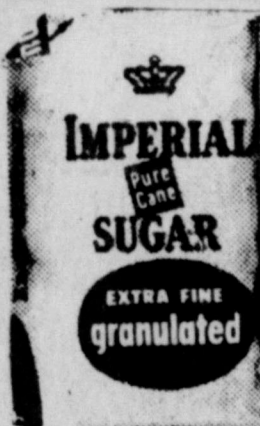

Canned and frozen vegetables can rescue budget-conscious consumers from increased prices on some fresh items, Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist, suggests.

She advises checking grocery markets for specials as the best economy measure.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Lettuce seems to be the most economical fresh vegetable item--and onions, potatoes (white and sweet), squash, rutabagas and turnips are among the better vegetable values.

In the moderate-price range, quality vegetables include carrots, broccoli, spinach, mustard and collards.

In the pork department features are scattered, but many are priced at budget levels. Consider Boston butt roasts, shoulder roasts, quarterloin cut into chops, smoked picnics and some brands of bacon.

In egg buying, prices are a bit more reasonable--and at dairy sections, key items include low-fat milk, cheese slices, cottage cheese and mild and sharp cheddar cheeses.

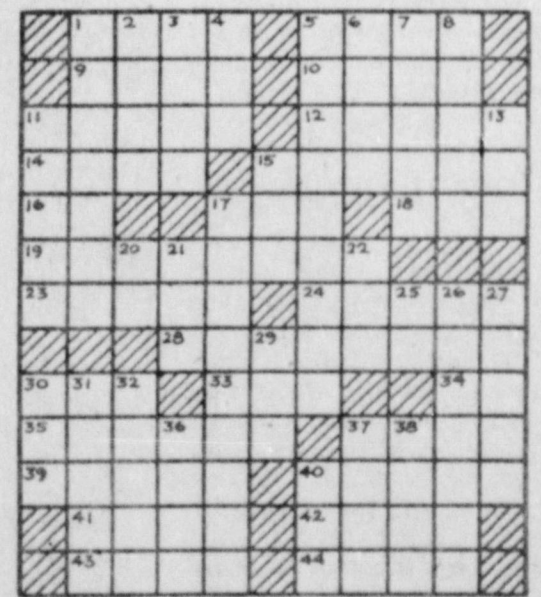

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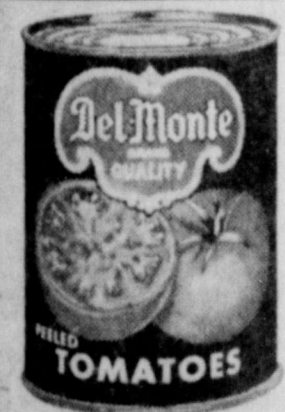

Early Preparations

Those early bird boaters manage to get out on the water well ahead of spring by starting now on launching preparations.

Taking care of properly outfitting a boat and being sure of good mechanical operation is important but, getting caught up on paperwork could be number one on the list of things to do.

A check of the boats' registration will show if it is valid. In Texas, a certificate of number or fascimile thereof must always be aboard and available for inspection by an enforcement officer when the motorboat is in operation on public waters. The certificate is valid until the expiration date shown on the card.

When you renew the certificate, the same number shall be issued, if you apply to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department within the 90-day period preceding the expiration date. All motorboats regardless of length or horsepower are required by law to register if operated on public waters in Texas. This same certificate of number will be honored by other states for different lengths of time if you boat on their state waters.

The number awarded to your motorboat must be painted, decal, or otherwise affixed to both sides of the bow of the boat in such a position as to provide easy identification. The numbers must be at least three inches in height, and must be of a color that contrasts with the background.

The validation decal must be affixed on a line and three inches of the registration number.

The Texas certificate of title law, which became effective Jan. 1, 1976, is for all new/unregistered motorboats in excess of 14 feet in length, and new/unregistered outboard motors in excess of 12 horsepower.

An owner of a new boat less than 14 feet in length and/or a new outboard motor less than 12 horsepower is not required to title, but may title if owner so desires.

Title applications, available at boat dealers and P&WD offices, and manufacturers statement of origin must accompany a request for boat registration for new boats and outboard

motors.

Applications for transfer of title and ownership must be filed no later than 15 days from date of purchase.

Insurance policies on the status of guaranteed can save the day if the boater become involved in an accident or a piece of machinery fails to operate.

If your boat is safe--you are not safe. Check the following items; bow lights, properly placed registration numbers, protection edging or fenders, cleat bilge (no rags, etc), ventilation, proper gas tank(s), proper motor (see capacity plate on your boat, white stern light.

Remember that equipment needs vary depending on the type and size of boat and a thorough understanding of the Pamphlet "A Digest of the Texas Water Act" will insure legal and safe operations.

Take along common sense when trailer your boat and check the current trailer regulations.

Unloading your boat into the water as well as removing your boat from the water, can be tricky. Find out how it is done before you attempt it.

Keep a sharp lookout for other boats, swimmers, fishermen, skiers, divers and weather. Observing the rules of safe boating insure an enjoyable season on the water.

 with an obstructed airway,
 and unwitnessed cardiac
 arrest victim, and a wit-
 nessed cardiac arrest
