# Three Injured In Explosion

Three men were burned critically in an explosion Plant east of McLean Thurs-

day morning. Two of the men were flown to Parkland Burn Center in Dallas Thursday afternoon.

William Douglas (Doug) Clawson, 54, of McLean, a 35-year veteran employee at the company suffered second and third degree burns to 70 percent of his body, according to a Park-

Ernie Gary Fry, 30, also of McLean, had second and third degree burns to 39 percent of his body, the spokesman said.





AUSTIN -- Adjustments to rates charged for auto insurance will be made on policies written Nov. 1, 1978 and thereafter, according to new schedules adopted Sept, 6 by the State Board of Insur-

Of the forty rating territories in Texas, twenty will receive increases, eighteen will be reduced, and two

will not change McLean, co county 26, will have an or all increase of 1.6 percent, with some classifications staying the same, and some increasing

slightly. Present rates run from

\$226 in the Southeastern territory to \$363 in Harris county. McLean's present rate is \$249. New rates will be \$224 in the Southeastern territory, a \$2 reduction and \$377 in Harris county a raise of 3.9 percent or \$14. Mc-

Lean's new rate will be \$253. Insurance industry requests for increases were for an average of 8.9 percent on passenger cars, and the total on that basis would have been \$95 millions in additional premiums. The amount granted by the Board is a \$35 million increase, about \$60 million less than was sought by the insurance







S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the re development of blighted areas.
