

With All Readiness of Mind

'Now these were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind, examining the scriptures daily, whether these things were so'' (Acts 17:11). Paul and Silas had come from Phillippi to Thessalonica and then on to Berea. Therewere not many of the Jews in Thessalonica who responded favorably to the preaching of the gospel. (Acts 17:1-9) It seems that the response was much more favorable in Berea.' There nobility exceeded that of the Thessalonians because of (1) their readiness of mind to the proclamation of the Word, and (2) their examination of the Scriptures to see if Paul's preaching complied with that of the prophets.

Readiness of mind means simply an INTENSE AND HONESI INTEREST IN the word of God. Evidently they did not immediately, with the prejudiced minds, shed the Word as the proverbial 'water off a duck's back'' attitude so often manifested. And how often is the case that people form prejudiced ideas before the Word is ever preached! Every one ought to come to a study of God's Word with an open mind as well as an open Bible! The result of the "readiness of mind" and the compulsion to examine the Scriptures prompted many to believe in Berea, Acts 17:12. But it also caused the opposing Jews in Thessalonica to come down and stir up prejudice against the preaching of Paul and Silas. The pattern of opposition to the truth hasn't changed much. How often we hear such prejudiced statements as "Those people think they are the only ones going to heaven"; "They are just a bunch of Bible-quoting fanatics"; "I would hate to be so narrow-minded"; etc. Sad to say, such false misrepresentations generally obtain the desired result, that is, causing people to refrain from hearing any more truth. But thanks be to God that there have always been a few with the ' readiness of mind" to listen openly and honestly as the Bereans did, to the truth of God. Such are always of a mind to accept ONLY that which can be upheld by the Scriptures. "Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and MANY THERE BE WHICH GO IN THERE-AT: because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth untolife, and FEW THERE BE THAT FIND IT." (Matt. 7:13-14)

The latest USDA Cattle on Feed report for the seven major feeding states estimate there are 6,432,000 head on feed September 1, up 8 percent from last year's record low number, but still 6 percent less than the same date in 1974 and 4 percent below last month;s month's number.

August placements of cattl e on feed totaled 1,404,000 head, 10 percent more than last year and 22 percent abovr last month. Marketings totaled 1,586,000 head, 31 percent more than 1975 and 6 percent above last July.

According to USDA's Foreign Agriculture Circular issed Sept. 9. the 1976 USSR total grain crop is currently forecast at 205 million metric tons. This is an increase of 10 million tons above the previous forecast issed August 11 and approximates the official plan level for the year. The main reason for the 10 millon ton in-





Steer awayfrom green potatoes -- they may taste bitter and even be poisonous to some poeple. Solanin, an alkaloid found in the green portions, is responsible for this. Greening of potatoes is caused by exposure to natural or artificial light. Sometimes only the skin is affected, but greening may penetrate the flesh.

Home gardeners should discard green potatoes harvested from their gardens. Healthy homegrown and commercially grown potatoes should be stored in a dark place away from sunlight or artificial light to prevent greening.

The dampness increase the likelihood of decay. Use any cracked or bruised potatoes first.

Store potatoes in a cool (45 to 50 degrees f., if possible), dark place with good ventilation. Potatoes stored at 70 to 80 degrees F. should be used within a week or two because this higher temperature often causes sprouting and shriveling.

Consumers should avoid purchasing badly sprouted or shriveled potatoes or potatoes with irregular or knobshaped growths because they are likely to cause a good bit of waste.

Irises For Spring Landscape

The thrifty homeowner can take steps to get a ed irises now, says Joe VanZandt, county agent with the Texas Agricul-

Irises provide a striking addition to a garden or landscape with a minimum of care and expense,

Most types of irises should be dug up and split every three to five years after the first planting. Rhizomes (thickened underground stems) should be separated and replanted only if clean and disease free. Divide healthy rhizomes with a sharp knife and replace in the soil.

Plant rhizomes 12 to 18 inches apart to prevent any disease transfer or intertwining among plants. The best garden bed for this type of ornamental plant is a well drained, richly organic soil.

Irises need little upkeep. Trim back foliage only to remove diseased material or when transplanting, cut back the foliage about one-third of its original height.

Water the flower bed generously every 10 to


