ates Named Task Force

Rep. Phil Cates of Pampa, has been named a member of a nine-member House Task Force on Crime and its Control by House Speaker Clayton.

The task force will have as its specific goal, presentation of the 65th Legislature of major legislation aimed at the control and eradication of crime.

"Rep. Cates' experience in the House Business and Industry Committee will be helpful to the task force because crime cuts across all boundaries of our society. We need broad representation in helping convey ideas to the legislature and to touch on every inroad of crime," Clayton said.

The task force will consider means by which to deter and prevent crime; ways in which to deal with persons charged with crime; and ways to punish and influence those who have been convicted of a crime so that they, or others like them, will not again commit criminal acts.

"Texans clearly are asking for a new inroad of crime," Clayton said. "The task force is charged with finding strong solutions to this growing plague," Clayton added.

638 Texans Drown During 1975

Caucasian males between the ages of 21 and 30 swimming in waters close to home had greater chances of drowning during 1975 than any other group of water recreationists.

Water safety officials at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have compiled drowning statistics for 1975 and of the 638 persons who lost their lives in the water, most fit into one or more of those categories.

Of the total fatalities, 546 were male, 388 Caucasians were involved; accidents while swimming accounted for 318 deaths; 135 were in the 21-to-30-years-of-age bracket; within 25 miles of the victims home.

Drowning fatalities in 1974 totaled 725.

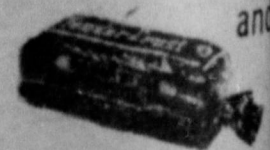

CHRISTIAN UNITY

Every year we hear more on the subject of "Christian Unity" while at the same time many explanations are given for not having unity. The most common explanation given is that "all churches are just different roads that lead to heaven." But are they? Let us suppose that an evangelist comes to our community to conduct a religious meeting and proceeds as follows: At the first service he preaches that salvation is by faith only, but at the next one he contends that it is by faith exercised in obedience to the gospel rather than by faith alone. At the third service he declares that either sprinkling, pouring, or immersion is baptism, but at the fourth service he plainly shows that immersion only is scriptural baptism. At the fifth service he tells the people that they ought to baptize their babies, but at the sixth he says that penitent sinners are the only scriptural subjects of baptism. At the seventh service he preaches once in grace, always in grace; but at the eighth he tells the people that it is possible for them to fall from grace, that some have fallen, and that the Bible tells how to keep from falling. At the ninth service he teaches that it is all right to have human creeds, but at the tenth he declares that we should take the Bible as our only guide in religion. No thoughtful person would continue to listen to ONE preacher each like that, but the majority of RELIGIOUS PEOPLE are perfectly willing for TEN DIFFERENT preachers to preach these conflicting doctrines! They say that if one man should preach that way, he would contradict himself and be inconsistent. What kind of a God do they suppose we have, who endorses all these conflicting doctrines and sends out the preachers to preach them?

No where in the pages of Holy Scripture can we find approval of division or denominationalism. In Proverbs 6:16-19 we have a list of seven things that are an abomination to the Lord: seven things that HATES! The seventh: "He that soweth discord among the brethren." It can be no plainer than that the Lord HATES those that are responsible for division. In the face of this passage and others like 1 Cor. 1:10, Rom. 16:17-18, Matt. 15:9, John 21-22, people still contend that unity is not possible. Why not? There was unity once. "...them that believed were of one heart and soul." (Acts 4:

Since there was unity once, there can be again. It does not require the impossible. In order for there to be unity, there must be a basis for it. We have it. "The law of the Lord is perfect converting the soul" (Psa. 19:7) James calls it the "Perfect law of liberty" (James 1:25) That basis is GOD'S WORD ALONE! Only by giving up all things that the Bible does not authorize can there be religious unity in the world. All creeds, works, names, baptism, worship, and all other religious acts which are unscriptural in nature must be given up. To those that truly love the Lord, this will not be hard to do. (See 2 Thess. 2:1-12) All churches are not roads that lead to heaven, but to the judgment seat of Christ! (2 Cor. 5:10) Only those that have done the will of the Father will go to heaven. (Matt. 7:21-23)

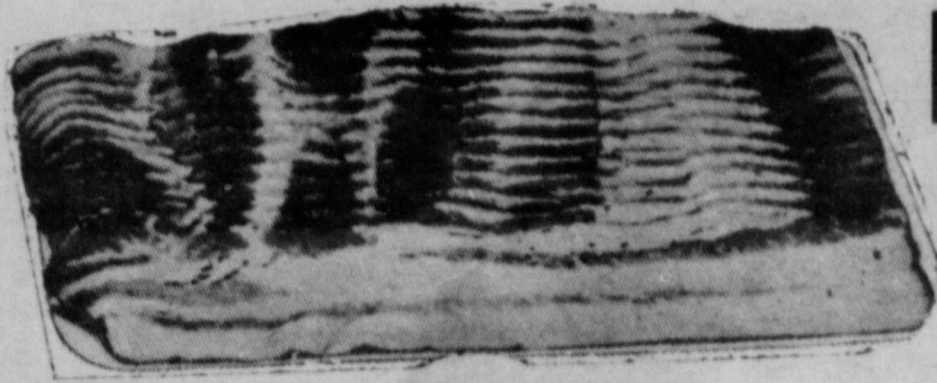

(a) In election precincts numbered All at McLean Elem. Cafeteria Building, in McLean, Texas, in said School District, with Ercy Cubine as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Sue Cubine and Mrs. D. C. Lester, Clerks, and Mrs. Newt Barker, alternate judge/clerk.

The polls at the above designated polling place shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Shirley Johnson is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Judy Morris is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting.
