STATE EXTENSION CONFERENCE

We were sorry to lay out on you last week. We were attending a state county agents conference at Texas A and M University, College Station.

We have been attending these conferences since 1949 when we entered the extension service. The recent one was by far the finest of any we have attended.

Gov. John Connally topped the list of some of the finest speakers that I've had the honor of hearing. Others included Dr. Bruce Ratchford, vice president for extension, University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo., and Dr. Carl S. Winters, General Motors Corp., Detroit, Mich.

The conference was a real inspiration to all county extension agents. Four training sessions in various extension activities were held as study groups.

WHEAT PRICE

Everything points to a better price ahead for wheat as well as most other farm commodities. As one fellow put it, we have crossed from surplus agricultural era during the last four months to a shortage producing area. One noted economist with the Washington State University, Mr. Karl Hobson, warned the people of an impending wheat shortage two years ago in an article in Farm Journal Magazine. More recently he has produced some fresh figures that will make us all appreciate the abundant producing U. S. farmers in years past a little more. The time appears to be behind us when the general public will look on surplus products as a scorn.

Hobson points to the main cause of our shortage—the national and international population explosion. As recently as 20 years ago the population increase was 26 million annually. Presently the increase is running 65 million annually. Within a few years it could reach 100 million.

Our use of wheat in the world in 1950 was 6.3 billion bushels. The past year we used 9.3 billion bushels in the world.

According to money authorities, feed grains will follow as being on the short side. Cotton is about the only farm commodity that is being produced in surplus.

Cattle numbers are decreasing at a rather alarming rate. It appears the farm and ranch people might be in the saddle after a century of being over-produced.

Because of the prosperous era that appears to be just ahead many economists are predicting less government assistance and interference in farm and ranching.

National Highway Week Sept. 18-24

Chambers of Commerce, service clubs and many other local organizations throughout Texas this week were urged to participate in observance of Highway Week in Texas Sept. 18-24.

Ray M. Keck, Jr., president of the Texas Good Roads Association, noted that many local groups in every section of the state already have begun planning special observances of the event.

Theme of Highway Week in Texas is "Better Highways Save Lives — Time — Money".

Said Keck: "Highway Week is the time set aside to remind Texans of the value of highways today and the importance of even better highways in the future."

The Texas Good Roads Association, a citizens' group dedicated to better highway transportation for all Texans, is sponsoring the observance.

Herald of Truth To Be Broadcast; Local Church Sponsor

Dave Oakley, local minister for the McLean Church of Christ, informs us that word has been received by the elders for the Highland Church of Christ, Abilene, that the Mutual Broadcasting System has scheduled a special 50-minute documentary program featuring the Herald of Truth radio and television programs.

The program—"Broadcasting: A Voice for Morality"—has been scheduled for Sept. 11, at 4:05 p.m. The network is contributing, as a public service, 25 minutes of its time, pre-empting the regular programming. The Herald of Truth is releasing the regular 25-minute time period. The broadcast will be in two parts, separated by a regularly scheduled newscast.

The program will go behind the scenes of the 1966 Herald of Truth Workshop, held Aug. 17, 18, and 19, and excerpts from the actual speeches will be included in the broadcast. Emphasis will be given to the need for a universal return to moral values that will strengthen the character of our nation.

The Church of Christ in McLean has been active in its support of this widely known religious broadcast. You are urged to be tuned in to the Mutual Broadcasting network Sunday, Sept. 11, to hear this interesting and vitally important program concerning the morals of our nation.

Acreage Survey To Begin Sept. 14

Postmaster Frank Simpson announced this week that rural mail carriers will begin distributing 1966 acreage survey cards to patrons on their routes about Sept. 14.

The Post Office Department assists USDA in making this survey each year. These reports, directly from farmers, are the basis for official estimates for Texas acreage of all crops harvested in 1966.

To be sure this community is well represented in the survey, Postmaster Simpson urges each patron receiving a card to fill it out and return it to his mailbox. Rural carrier working on this project is Jim Hathaway, route 1.

LIONS CLUB TO FETE TEACHERS

McLean Lions Club will hold its annual "Teacher Appreciation Night" next Tuesday, Sept. 13, in the Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

The program will be brought by Glenn Scott, Southwestern Bell information supervisor. Scott's program entitled "Information on the Move," will describe the growing volume of man's total knowledge, and methods used to store, select and communicate it effectively.

Because most information must be moved from one place to another to be useful, telephone scientists and technicians are concerned with ways to move it with great speed and accuracy.

Such information can range from payroll data to pictures of a person's heart action, as Scott will show. He will demonstrate how written messages and signatures, electrocardiograms and other types of information can be transmitted instantaneously over telephone lines.

Those present will have a chance to participate in some of the latest communication processes as Scott reveals developments that will have an increasing effect on the lives of McLean residents.

Local Couple Attends Synod of Texas Meet

Mr. and Mrs. David H. Thomas of McLean attended the 124th annual meeting of the Synod of Texas, United Presbyterian Church in the USA, which opened Tuesday, Aug. 30, at Trinity University, San Antonio, and continued through Thursday, Sept. 1.

The Synod of Texas, Trinity's parent body, is composed of more than 100 churches in Texas and Louisiana, and both ministers and laymen attended the meeting.

During business meetings, the Synod considered administrative measures for the coming year, elected a moderator for the next 12 months, and elected several new Trinity trustees.

Meeting concurrently with the Synod was the Texas Synodical Society, the sister organization of the Synod. Synodical members held joint sessions with the Synod including Bible study meetings, worship services and special dinners.

Trinity's board of trustees reported on the University's progress during the past year. Board Chairman Forrest Smith of San Antonio made the report, which included a projected look at events during Trinity's 50 million centennial program earmarked for completion by 1968, the university's 100th anniversary.

The centennial program includes the completion of the basic campus under a master site plan. The university now has 38 buildings completed, with four on the drawing boards. The centennial program also calls for increased endowment, enlarged library facilities and additional faculty. Another feature of the program is the initiation of doctoral studies in five to seven academic disciplines by 1969.

Safety Is Keynote Of 4-H Project

Through membership in automotive programs, 4-H'ers from coast to coast contribute to safety on the expressways, city streets and country roads. Both teen-age drivers and pre-drivers are engaged in 4-H automotive projects, according to T. W. Thompson, service director of the National 4-H Service Committee.

With the help of authoritative manuals, 4-H'ers work on both the inside and outside of the vehicle, said Thompson. Checking mechanical defects, safety hazards and keeping the vehicle clean are some of the main jobs.

Showing young people how and why the family car or truck performs as it does, and calling on traffic officers, mechanics, safety engineers and extension specialists to advise and instruct, makes this program an excellent supplement to other driver education, Thompson Committee.

Successful car check and safety campaigns have been inaugurated by 4-H automotive clubs. Many have become annual events attracting hundreds of motorists.

Girls are as enthusiastic about the program as are the boys. Each year they claim their share of honors. All 4-H'ers have a chance to win county, state and national recognition and awards provided by the program sponsor, the Firestone Tire & Rubber Co.

The state winner will attend the National 4-H Club Congress held in Chicago right after Thanksgiving. During the congress six national scholarship winners will be announced.

Firestone has supported 4-H Club work for nearly a quarter of a century, and the automotive program specifically for the last seven years.

Parents interested in having their sons and daughters participate in the automotive program should contact the county extension agent in charge of 4-H Club work.

TREASURY SURPLUS CLIMBS—Biggest fiscal year-end surplus in the general fund in Texas' history was recorded Aug. 31 by State Treasury Jesse James. Total ran \$138,000,000.

James reported the surplus as \$1,600,000 higher than the previous year. Current biennium ends Aug. 31, 1967.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES—A road district can be formed which encompasses territory lying in more than one county. So held Gen. Waggoner Carr in an official opinion. However, the entire area of each county making up such district must be included and counties involved must be contiguous to each other. "Road districts," says Carr, "may acquire right of way for use by the State Highway Department to improve and extend the state highway system."

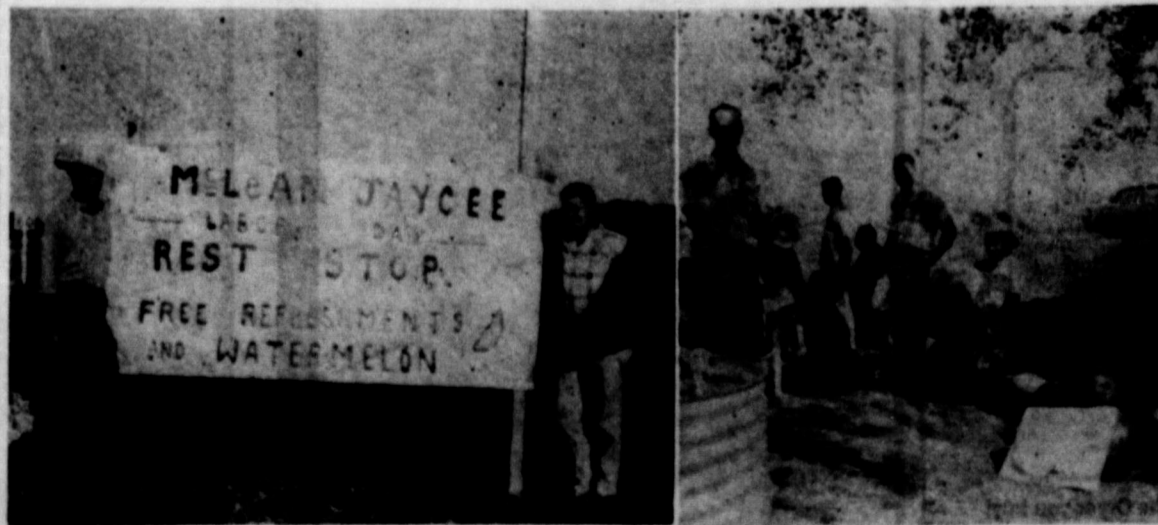
In other opinions, Carr held that Texas Parks and Wildlife Department may buy Calhoun County land under a law authorizing purchase of property "near Rockport" for a salt water experiment pond.
