Draft Boards To Be Terminated

Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service announced that all Selective Service Local Draft Boards in Texas will be terminated on May 8, 1976. Similar actions will occur in all states on that date as Selective Service continues to reduce its operational capability. On February 28th all draft board offices were closed.

Texas has 525 members assigned to the 96 draft boards of the state. These board members who have served in an uncompensated capacity were responsible for classifying Selective Service Registrants. Since all registrant processing has been halted there remains no active mission for the draft boards.

Only a small stand-by draft organization will remain to maintain emergency plans and train a small pool of reserve and national guard officers in procedures for restoring the Selective Service System in the event of a National emergency.

The Rich Young Ruler

Jesus was on the way to Jerusalem when a young man came running, forgetful of dignity, and knelt in the dirt at Jesus' feet. Matthew tells us that he was young. Luke says that he held high office among the Jews. And both of them state that he was rich and by society's standards, blameless.

In the conversation with this young man about his soul the Lord soon put His finger on the real problem. The young man loved his riches MORE than God. It is interesting to note that the word in the Greek language is "plousios" meaning rich or wealthy. We get our word "plutocrat" from this Greek word. But as Jesus comes to the close of the conversation, He changes and uses a different Greek word for riches. It is verse 24 of Luke 18: "And Jesus looking at him said, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!'"

The word for riches here is "chremata", which means THINGS. The root of the verb is "use" and fundamentally this means "useful things." (See also Mark 10:22)

Does this throw a new light on "riches" for all of us in this 20th century? Most of us would not consider ourselves rich, but let's insert this word in the statement of Jesus and think of ourselves. He said, "How hard it will be for those who have riches (things-or-useful things) to enter the kingdom of God!" One of the greatest threats to all of us today is that of falling in love with all of our "things", "gadgets", articles for pleasure, entertainment, and ease. Things are to be used, not loved (worshipped).

Wealth, whether it be in "things" or in currency is to be used not hoarded! God blesses the right use of money and things. The selfish person is never blessed by God. The miser, the penny-pincher, the greedy are even disliked and shunned by society. Let each of us make sure that our riches (our useful things) do not keep us out of heaven!

Market Report

"Prudent shopping" will characterize wise consumerism at grocery markets this week, Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt says.

"Few changes are apparent at the beef counter during the past week, but good values can be found on chuck cuts, ground beef, sirloin, round and rib steaks and liver.

Pork prices remain high, although specials may be found on Boston butt roasts, quarter-loin sliced into chops, smoked picnics, some brands of bacon and liver. But ham prices may increase even more as Easter nears.

Mrs. Clyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

She noted that egg prices are moderate, and she reminded consumers that protein-wise, two eggs equal two to three ounces of cooked meat, which is one serving.

In the dairy department, special prices appear on a number of cheeses, so popular during Lent.

Fryer chickens, both whole bird and pieces, are featured in some stores, and turkeys are receiving the same special price advantages.

Many grocery stores are offering features on tuna fish, peanut butter canned tomato products and cling peaches, she added.

At vegetable counters, consumers most interested in economizing will select carrots and cabbage. Also dry onion prices are a bit lower

now, and mustard, collards, turnip and greens, rutabagas, acorn and banana squash are other good vegetable choices price-wise.

Good buys in citrus fruit are grapefruit and oranges sold in bags from five to eighteen pounds. Prices on both apples and pears remain about the same this week as the past few weeks. Strawberries are in moderate supply, with prices coming down.

Large storage supplies of Red Emperor grapes indicate consumers will find plenty of good quality grapes available at pleasant prices.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Lent brings a heavy demand for fish, and frozen fish are the equal of fresh fish in appearance, flavor and food value.

Cooking fish isn't a tenderizing process, as it is with other foods, but a flavor developer and coagulant. The most important thing to remember in cooking fish is not to overcook.

Cook fish just enough so that the flesh flakes easily and has an opaque appearance--this leaves the fish moist, tender and brings out its delicate flavor.

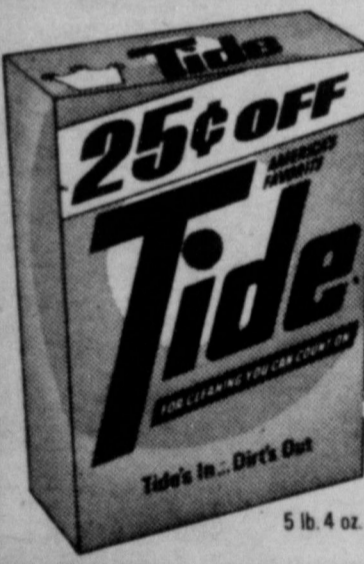

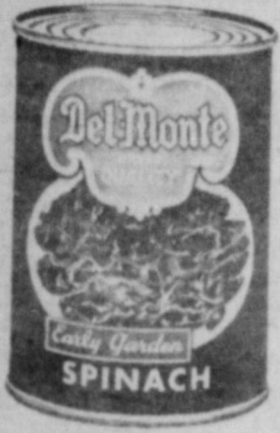

Fishing License A Bargain

The purchase of a Texas sportfishing license for \$4.25 opens the tackle box for anglers after bass, crappie, catfish or one of the other 208 species of freshwater fish in our state.

Texas has over 29 million acre-feet of conservation water storage in over 160 reservoirs. These reservoirs have over 5,000 acre-feet. Reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists indicate a good year for 1976 but before you pack your family and fishing gear into the station wagon and head for the open water, check for that new 1976 Texas fishing license.

This license is required of all persons who fish in the waters of Texas with the exception of those: under 17 years of age; over 65 years of age; fishing in private waters; fishing in county of residence with trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or winding device attached; holding a valid Texas commercial fishing license or holders of a \$.25 exempt fishing license for the blind.

The Texas sportfishing license is valid for one year from the date of issue.

You do not have to have expensive fishing gear to go along with that new fishing license. Large fish are caught

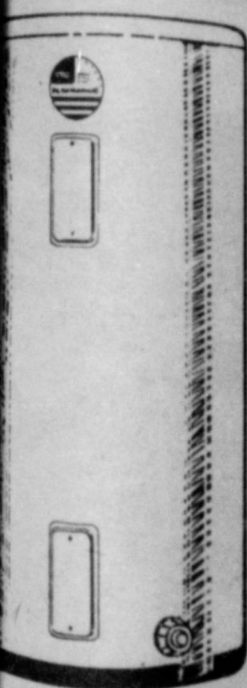

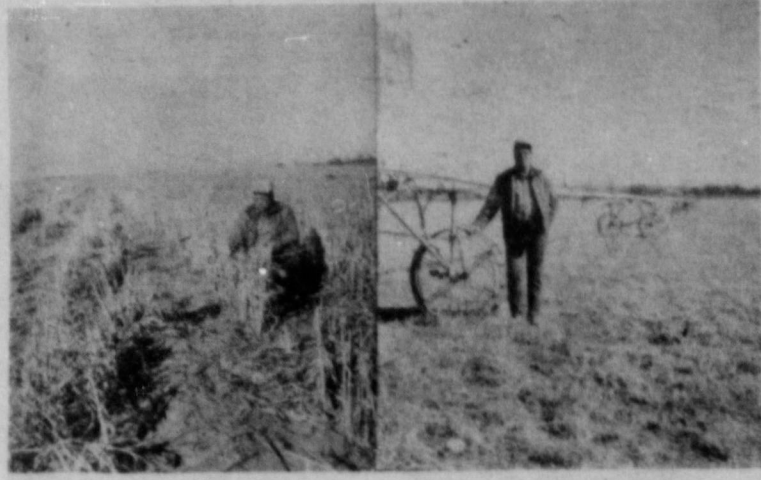

Delbert Trew Is Conservation Farmer-Rancher

Delbert Trew was raised on his dad's ranch in Donley County, Texas. In the 1930's he moved to Perryton, Texas and armed with irrigation. He was selected as the Ochiltree County Outstanding Conservation Farmer/Rancher in 1958 and in 1966 as the Jaycee's State Outstanding Young Farmer. He was also outstanding citizen of Perryton one year.

Mr. Trew moved back to the McLean Area in 1970. He served on the McLean School Board and was a Director in the Farm Bureau. He operates 2240 acres of land in Gray County comprised of 600 acres dry cropland, 240 acres irrigated alfalfa and 1400 acres of range and pastureland. He is also in partnership on a 6000 acre ranch in Donley County. His land in Gray County is all rented land.

Mr. Trew has practiced outstanding conservation especially on rented land. Mr. Trew has been a cooperater with the Gray County Soil & Water Conservation District since 1970, and most of his conservation work was done without cost-share assistance.

In 1970 he rented a section of land that he now lives on that was partially in irrigated alfalfa. He did extensive grading, shaping, and seeded about 200 acres of the sandy erodible soil to alfalfa and developed irrigation. Fifty acres of fescue grass was established along a creek bed that had been a continual erosion problem. A gravel pit was reshaped and topsoil added and restored to irrigated alfalfa. Hay and manure were applied to restore organic matter and fertility. This 640 acres of land is truly a show place and is producing at a maximum with very little erosion problems.

In January, 1975, Mr. Trew rented 640 acres of land east of McLean. The land was heavily infested with shinnery oak and part of the land had been farmed in the 1930's and had been severely eroded. No other operators in that area wanted to rent the place because of its extreme poor condition and high erodibility. A five year conservation plan for restoration of this land was developed in early 1975. In the center of the 640 acres was a 60 acres thick stand of black locust. During 1975, Mr. Trew shredded the shinnery and plowed the land several times and planted grain sorghum and haygrazer. Much of the residue from these crops was left on the soil surface and will be incorporated to add organic matter. Plans for this year are to plant a hay crop and mow the forage so it can fall on the soil and then be incorporated to build the soil to protect against erosion and increase production. Extensive grading and shaping of eroded areas

and old fence rows is complete. The black locust stand was cleared in strips to leave cover and food for wildlife. The cleared strips were planted to grain sorghum and sudan. A high population of quail, turkey, and deer was present on this area this past year that had not frequented the area prior to the reclamation work.

The next four years will consist of a soil building program by use of high residue soil improving crops. The absentee owners are so pleased with the restoration program that they are going to apply parts of the rent payment back into conservation practices, which is an unusual situation.

Mr. Trew is a sincere conservationist and has dedicated his skills and time to restoration of non productive, eroding land even though most of the land is rented from absentee owners. He is highly respected in the community and has helped to build a better place to live.

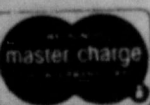

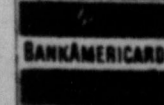
