## October 10-15 Is 'ZIP Code' Week

Residents in the McLean area will be offered an opportunity to ZIP Code their mailing lists during October, Postmaster Frank Simpson announced today.

The project will be a feature of "ZIP Code Week," to be celebrated locally Oct. 10-15. Throughout the nation 95,000,000 cards for obtaining ZIP Codes will be delivered.

"This is a good time to get the ZIP Codes missing from your lists," Postmaster Simpson said. "This Christmas, ZIP Code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for the efficient and on-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks."

After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post Office personnel will add the proper ZIP Codes and return the cards to the sender.

President Johnson has proclaimed Oct. 10-15 as "ZIP Code Week" to promote greater use of ZIP Code.

Local cards will be printed with blue ink and out-of-town cards in red.

Addresses which cannot be ZIP Coded because of insufficient or improper addresses will be forwarded to the city indicated on the card, if legible, and the codes will be added there.

Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards, the postmaster said. ZIP Codes indicate delivery areas for the postal service, not individuals.

## McLean Man Aids In Rescue Mission

The cry of "Mayday, mayday," picked up simultaneously by Tyndall Air Traffic Controllers and an HH-3E helicopter on a routine training flight from Turner AFB, Ga., set in motion the guiding and working hands of a rescue mission that saved the life of Capt. Norman G. Thiel last Aug. 29.

Tyndall traffic controllers picked up the international distress call about 9:20 a.m. Traffic Controller T/Sgt. Harold E. Richardson, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Richardson, McLean, radioed to the chopper which was spotted by Watch Supervisor M/Sgt. Marvin L. Koene of the Radar Approach Control.

Less than 30 minutes after the distress call was heard, a helicopter was hovering over the flaming wreckage.

After getting the helicopter close enough to the wreckage, the pilot was cut free and flown back to the Tyndall base hospital where medics, alerted by the tower controllers, met the aircraft.

Officials at the hospital listed the injured pilot's condition as serious, but he is expected to recover.

A complete revision of the Texas Constitution, proposed by Gov. John Connally and endorsed by the state Democratic convention, looks like the big state capital news of the coming years.

Republicans likewise gave approval at their state convention to the idea of modernizing the 1876 constitution. But a long row lies ahead. Already many are expressing doubt as to the wisdom of a complete revision.

It would be a long process. First, the Legislature would ask the voters to approve the calling of a constitutional convention. Then, presumably, delegates to the final convention would be elected. Their final product would go to the Legislature for submission to the voters for approval or rejection.

Governor Connally's suggested route would be to set up a cabinet system like the federal government. This would give the governor responsibility for all phases of state government. Now he appoints only one major state department head—the secretary of state.

**BOLLWORM DEADLINE EXTENDED**—Agriculture Commissioner John White granted a 10-day cotton harvest and plow-up extension (to Oct. 5) for farmers in 13 south Texas counties under the pink bollworm control law.

Counties affected by the extension are Aransas, Brooks, Duval, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Kennedy, Kleburg, Nueces, San Patricio, Webb, Zapata and portions of Hidalgo and Starr.

**WATER PLAN RESTUDIED**—Texas Water Development Board pulled back its massive \$3,700,000,000 proposed statewide water plan for re-evaluation in view of strong criticism during its series of 30 public hearings.

Board announced 16 additional studies to determine reasonable "alternatives" which may be put into the plan in case populations grow and water needs are higher than those originally predicted.

Among subjects scheduled for new looks are:

Alternative sources of irrigation water for West Texas, including possible diversions from surplus East Texas basins;

Reduction of water quantities from San Antonio's surface water supply, originally tagged for delivery to lower Rio Grande Valley for new irrigation;

Importing water into or above Highland Lakes in the Colorado River Basin;

New sources of industrial and municipal water for Abilene, San Angelo, Odessa, Lubbock and the Trans Pecos-EI Paso areas.

Board also will cooperate with

the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation in determining costs of delivering water to West Texas, utilizing a pump-back system up the Colorado River channel.

## Tigers Down Pirates 18-0

The McLean Tigers took advantage of Lefors' mistakes Friday night and remained unbeaten for the year, running their record to 3-0.

The Tigers, led again by Fullback Raymond Baker, took an 18-0 non-conference victory from Lefors.

After playing a scoreless first quarter, the Tigers took the lead when Quarterback Joel McCarty passed to Fullback Ernest Smith for 13 yards. The try kick for conversion failed.

Again in the second quarter near the end of the half, the Tigers recovered a Lefors fumble and as the half ended McCarty went in from the two yard line, leaving McLean with a 12-0 score at half-time.

Neither team was able to score in the third quarter but Baker ended a 51 yard march for the Tigers by going the final 14 for the last score of the game.

The Tigers had 18 first downs and 263 yards rushing, with Baker gaining nearly half of that total. Lefors had six first downs and 102 yards rushing.

## HIGHWAY PLAN AIRED AT MEET

About 90 residents of McLean and Alameda turned out Thursday night for a public hearing on a Texas Highway Department proposal for construction of a 12-mile segment of Interstate 40 from the Wheeler County line to the western edge of Alameda.

The public hearing is a requirement of both federal and state governments. Next step will be design of right-of-way maps.

Jack Light of the district highway office in Amarillo said if both state and federal approval is received on the public hearing, the state will begin purchasing right-of-way in about a year. Construction, Light said, could come in about 2 1/2 years.

Under interstate highway programs, the U. S. Bureau of Roads will pay 90 per cent of the cost and the state the other 10 per cent.

Included in the project, for which there is no cost estimated, would be split interchanges on the east and west sides of McLean to serve that community; interchange in Alameda with Farm Road 291, and four-lane divided highway throughout the segment.

Major James R. Broome, son of Jesse J. Broome of Lefors, is attending the ten-month regular course at the Army Command and General Staff College, Ft. Leavenworth, Kans.

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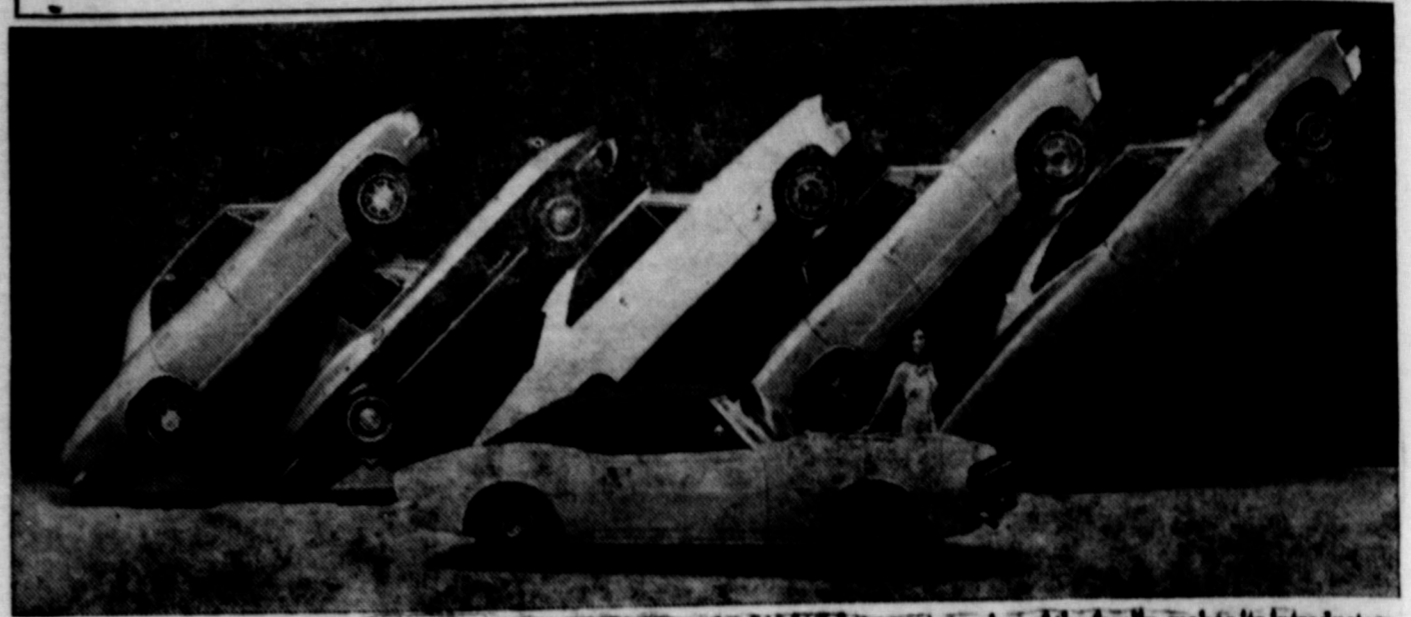

**Highway Department Is People Who Care**

The Texas Highway Department is people—people who care. Though it is one of the largest and—with 25 district offices—one of the most "far flung" state agencies, the Highway Department is not a machine that replaces feeling with red tape.

The department tradition of helpfulness to people in trouble got dramatic emphasis recently when heavy rains caused flooding in the ranching country west and north west of San Antonio.

When R. S. Cox, Highway Department maintenance construction foreman at Leakey, was awakened at 4 a.m. by a heavy downpour, he got up, checked his rain gauge and found that six inches of rain had fallen.

After he gathered his men to patrol highways and assist traffic, Cox found that the Frio River north of Leakey was on the rise. He drove south and discovered that rain-swollen creeks were emptying into the Frio.

Cox realized the river would soon carry a deadly wall of water into the low-lying camping grounds of Garner State Park. He radioed his base station to alert Garner and all camps along the Frio that high water was on the way.

Two hours later when Cox arrived at Garner he learned that some 2,500 visitors still had not been alerted. They were asleep and unaware of the approaching danger.

Joined by two park supervisors, Cox assumed a Paul Revere role, driving through the camping area to broadcast an evacuation alarm over the loudspeaker of his pickup truck.

"Wake up, move out, high water is coming!" he yelled.

The sleepy campers did not respond, and Cox and his two helpers abandoned the truck and set out on foot to warn each group of campers.

A short time later, 40 per cent of the camping grounds was under water—up to 20 feet at the lowest spot.

All of the campers escaped to higher ground and R. S. Cox emerged as a man who cares.

On the same day Cox was shouting his high water alarm, two brothers, both Highway Department employees, staged a daring rescue of two families trapped by the rampaging flood waters of Bull Head Creek in Real County.

Bayles Roe, maintenance construction foreman at Rocksprings, and his brother, Everett, maintenance construction foreman at Barnhart, found four adults and two children clinging high in a tree across the main stream of the creek. They had been forced into the tree by rising water.

The two brothers, who were on a family outing, got rope and life jackets from their camp. They went up stream and Bayles put

on a life jacket, took off his shoes and swam about 75 feet across the creek. He swam with one end of the rope while Everett held onto the other and followed as the current carried his brother downstream to the flood victims.

Each end of the rope was tied to a tree and the rescue began. Bayles himself took the youngest member of the stranded party, a six-year-old girl, across the creek. Cradling her in one arm as she clung to the rope, Bayles held to the rope with his other hand.

The others in the group were given life jackets and crossed the creek on their own.

Another example of heroism by a Highway Department employee was set in mid-July near the New Mexico state line.

Jerry Lovelace, a department summer employee and a star half-back at Texas Tech, was hauling grass and sodding slopes across from a lake on Farm Road 2396 near Bovina.

He noticed a woman and a small boy struggling in the lake and raced to their rescue.

The boy, nine-year-old Billy Bob Crane of Childress, had slipped into a deep hole while fishing. His grandmother, Mrs. J. H. Leavell of Texico, N. M., stepped into deep water trying to help him.

Mrs. Leavell appeared to be in more danger, so Lovelace tried to rescue her first. When he had saved her, he tried again and again to find the youngster by diving. He did not succeed.

Like the Highway Department workers who saved lives during the floods, young Lovelace is a man who cares. He cares a lot.

"If only I had tried harder, I might have saved the boy, too," he kept saying after the rescue.

An election will be held at the Back Store (sometimes called 9 mile station) next Tuesday, Oct. 4, at 2:30 p.m., for the purpose of electing a supervisor for sub-division number three of the Gray County Soil Conservation District. Milton Carpenter is the present supervisor of this sub-division. The southeast corner of this sub-division is on the Gray-Wheeler County line just north of the James Cleet place. It runs west about 20 miles, then north about 13 miles and then east to the Wheeler-Gray County line. The sub-division is almost 100 per cent grass land. Milton is presently chairman of the board of supervisors. He has done an outstanding job the past several years. The McClellan Creek watershed is about to become a reality as a result of Milton's able leadership.

All people owning land within sub-division No. 3 residing anywhere in Gray County are eligible to vote. Both husbands and wives are eligible and are urged to be present. Refreshments will be served.

**CATTLE SCABIES INSPECTION**

On Monday, Oct. 3, a kick-off meeting is being held at Plainview for 38 Panhandle, South and Rolling Plains counties for the purpose of visually inspecting all cattle in these 38 counties for scabies.

Presently eight of these counties are under quarantine and all Texas cattle must be dipped before they can enter California or Colorado.

The main purpose is to identify any herds that might be infected and get them treated. It is a relatively easy thing to eradicate. The ultimate goal is to get the shipping restrictions cancelled when we get rid of the ailment. Millions of dollars are wasted on dipping non-infected cattle because of regulations from other states. There will be eight teams of inspectors. One person in each team will represent the Texas Animal Health Commission and the others will represent Animal Disease Eradication Branch of the U.S.D.A.

All cattle will be visually inspected in the 38 county area. It will not be necessary to put the cattle through a chute. They can be driven through. Any suspected animals would have to be put through the chute. If the ailment has been present for any length of time, it will be early found. It will be after Nov. 1 before the inspection team arrives in Gray County.

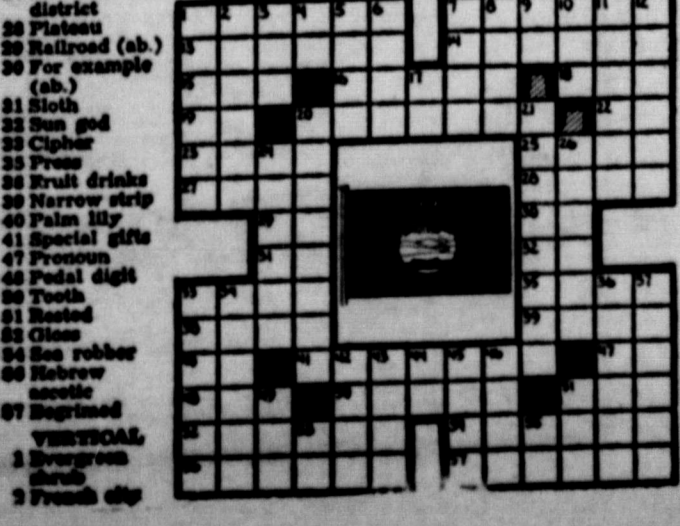

## NEWS OF CONSERVATION

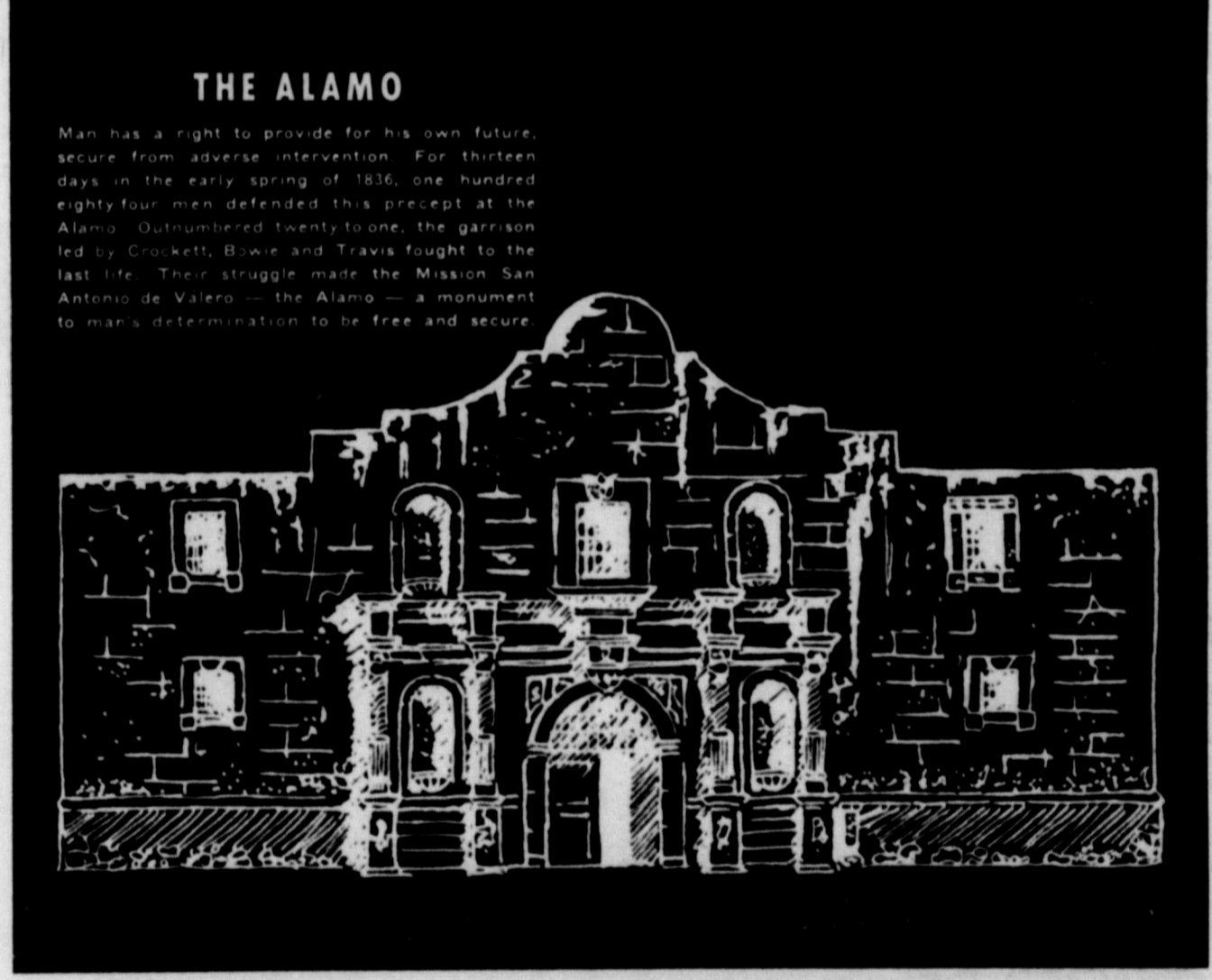
**By VAN C. MILLS**  
 The recent heavy rains pointed out the need for diversions, terraces and waterways. Some severe water erosion occurred in the northeastern part of the county. The diversion terraces and waterway recently completed on H. W. Waters and Bill Stockstill farms worked real well.  
 How much does erosion cost? In the Gray County Soil Conservation District we have from one foot to four feet of productive soil on most of our cropland. The soils in the Pampa and Groom area hold about 2.2 inches of water per foot of soil. The cropland soils in the McLean area hold from one to 1.5 inch per foot of depth. The deeper the soils, the more water and minerals we can store.  
 Our dry cropland will sell from \$100 to \$200 per acre. If we paid \$100 per acre for our land and had only one foot of productive soil, this would make our top soil worth about \$8.50 per acre inch.  
 If we pay \$150 per acre for our land and have three feet of productive soil, this would make our soil worth \$4.16 per acre inch.  
 You can see from the above figures that erosion is very costly. Every time you lose an inch of

soil, it is worth from \$4 to \$8 per acre inch. The loss of production over a period of years will make it even more costly.  
 Look at your own farm or ranch and see what soil erosion has cost you. Do you see some caliche spots showing up. If so, you have already lost some valuable soil. When you lose soil you lose part of your storage for minerals and water. How can we afford this erosion, especially when it is so easy to control?
