## Operating Room Course To Begin

An entrance test will be held Sept. 1 for a short-term health course in operating techniques, which begins Sept. 7 at Amarillo College.

"This entrance test will need to be completed before registration in the class is possible," said Anna Lois Crawford, supervisor of health care at AC. The entrance test will be held at 2 pm Sept. 1 in Room 205 of the Business Occupations Building on the Washington Street campus.

The course, designed to provide the basic skills for operating room technicians, teaches the student how to function as a vital member of the surgical team, said Mrs. Crawford.

The nine-week course will meet from 6 to 10 pm Tuesday and Thursday in Room 109 of Warren Hall on the Washington Street campus. George Nussbaum, registered nurse, will instruct the course.

Fundamentals of operating room procedures will be instructed in the course. Included are sterilization and clinical disinfectants, preparation of supplies, use and care of instruments, position and drape of patients, preparation of patient, surgical terminology, anatomy and physiology.

"This course is designed for students on the entry level in the operating room," said Mrs. Crawford. "It would be well if the student had a basic nursing assisting course or experience in the hospital setting."

Registration may be accomplished in the registrar's office in the Administration Building on the Washington Street campus.

## Gray Co. Farm Newsletter

The wheat loan rate for Gray county stored wheat is \$1.51 per bushel. Storage must be prepaid for an eleven month period from the time the warehouse receipt is issued. Present interest rate is 7 1/2 percent.

Committee elections will be coming up later in the year. This has been a one-community county for several years and will remain this way for next year. We have three county committeemen and no community committeemen.

The term of Keith Davis will expire at the end of this year. Ballots will be sent later to elect a county committee for a three year term to take office on Jan. 1 of 1977.

If you should decide to abandon some corn, grain sorghum or cotton acres---be sure to report and have it appraised before destroying it or using it for any purpose. If you decide to graze it out---have it appraised first.

This is necessary in case you have a low yield and might be eligible for payment later in the year.

If you have not reported your grain sorghum acres, you would need to report the entire acreage planted before requesting the appraisal on any of the acres.

Several wheat low yield payments have been made. We still have some more to make with most of them awaiting the signature of the owner or further information. If

## September Teal Hunt Is Set

The early teal season has been set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for Sept. 18-26, but dry conditions in some of the Panhandle and South Plains counties could hold down the number of birds bagged.

"The Hereford-Friona area has again received enough heavy rains to keep the playa lakes supplied with water," said Max Traweek, assistant waterfowl biologist.

"Ducks are already moving into the Panhandle counties from the northern nesting areas and a good population of the more numerous blue-winged teal should be available in areas with water by the time the season starts," continued Traweek.

The daily bag limit will be four teal and the possession limit will be eight teal after the second day. The shooting hours will be sunrise to sunset daily which is 30 minutes shorter than the regular duck season which starts later in the fall.

The three species of teal legal for this early hunt include the blue-winged, green-winged, and cinnamon teal. Identification of these teal by the hunter is critical and any attempt to take or possession of any other species of duck in the state will be considered a violation of the game and fish laws during this special hunt.

Sportsmen normally identify teal by their small size, rapid wing-beat, and speed.

The eating quality of these birds is considered excellent by gourmet wild game cooks.

Teal hunters will be required to have on their possession a federal migratory waterfowl stamp which can be purchased at U.S. post offices for \$5. The stamp must be signed in ink across the face of the permit by the holder. Also, shotguns used for the teal hunt must be plugged to hold no more than three shells including the chamber.

The passage of the teal through Texas in September should furnish excellent hunting and eating opportunities for Panhandle and South Plains waterfowl hunters.

# Accent on Health

Accidental poisoning is one of the most frightening things that can happen to a person -- especially if the victim is a child. Fortunately, throughout the state of Texas, help is only a phone call away, through a network of Poison Control Centers.

Horace Adrian, coordinator of the Poison Control Center program for the Texas Department of Health Resources, explains that each center is essentially a local operation. Most are located in or adjacent to the emergency rooms of publicly supported community hospitals.

However, Adrian says that the Department of Health Resources has had an active role in establishing and maintaining the Poison Control Center system. He says, "The Department acts as a focal point for the accumulation and distribution of toxicological information and data on poison case histories." Also, the state public health agency assists local centers in conducting educational programs to prevent poisonings.

According to health authorities, accidental poisoning is a large and growing health problem. Nationally, an estimated one million requests for assistance are received each year by poison control programs. In Texas, more than 6,000 accidental poisonings were reported in 1974, the most recent year for which complete statistics are available.

About half of accidental poison cases involve children under five years old according to Adrian. However, a good number of cases involve adults, which he attributes primarily to "carelessness."

Most poison cases, Adrian says, "are from ingestion of drug poisons and household chemical products." But, he adds, other cases involve "fume poisoning, such as carbon monoxide and other toxic substances that may be inhaled." Besides these sources of poisoning, Adrian says that the Poison Control Centers are concerned with poisonous plants, snakebites, and other toxic substances in the environment, although "they are a lesser

amount than the ingested sources."

Each Poison Control Center serves essentially as an information source. Lists of all kinds of potentially toxic substances are kept on file and cross-indexed to the appropriate emergency counter-measures and treatments. The centers serve both the doctors and other medical personnel in the community and the general public. Many inquiries are handled over the telephone.

When a person has been poisoned (or thinks he has), the nearest Poison Control Center should be contacted for information and assistance. This is especially important when the victim is a child, Adrian says: "In the case of a child, the parent so often is distraught and excited, and the Poison Control Center that answers her call will try to calm her down and get the true facts of the case, and give any emergency measures that are appropriate."

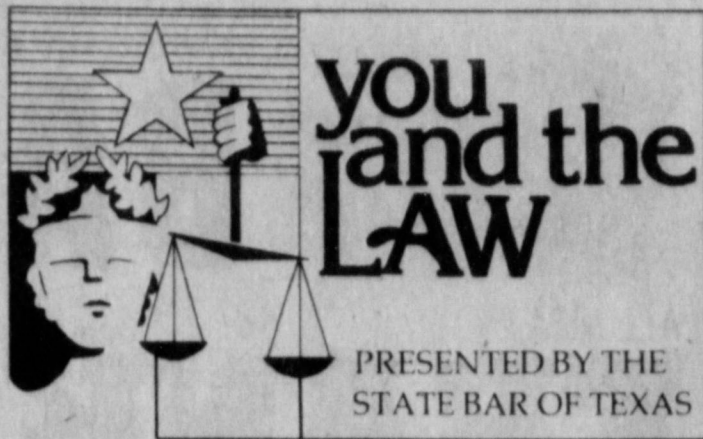
In all poisoning cases, both the victim and, if at all possible, the remains of the poisonous substance should be brought to the Poison Control Center or to the nearest hospital emergency room. Proper treatment cannot begin until the poison has been accurately identified.

Adrian says that only 21 Poison Control Centers are in operation throughout the entire state. He explains, "They are located in the geographical and population density centers that will serve the full statewide set up of hospital emergency rooms."

Each center in the network should have the latest available information on all of the thousands of potentially toxic substances.

Cities with Poison Control Centers show the listing in the telephone directory. If there is no listing in your community, you or your doctor may contact the nearest public health department or Texas Public Health Region office that serves your community.

Adrian suggests that the phone number and address of the nearest Poison Control Center be ascertained now--before an emergency occurs--



**Q: I bought a pair of boots under a lay-away plan, but am unable to complete the payments. Can I demand a refund of my payments made so far?**

**A: No.** There is no law requiring the merchant to refund your payments on lay-away purchases. You should ask the merchant whether he will make such a refund before you begin making payments. If the merchant agrees and makes refunds, this agreement should be made in writing and a copy retained by the consumer.

**Q: When I opened my new business, I was required to post a surety bond of what I considered to be a large amount before I could be issued a sales tax permit. A friend of mine in a similar business was required to post a much smaller bond. Why are bonding requirements different?**

**A:** The bond is required under the Texas Sales Tax law for all new retail businesses. Normally, the bond amount is equal to three times the level of sales tax that the merchant estimates he will collect during three months. If that estimate proves too high or too low, his bond will be adjusted up or down to reflect his actual tax collections level. This adjustment will be made by the State Comptroller of Public Accounts through the Comptroller's field offices around the state. If the new retail merchant remits his sales tax collections properly during a two-year period, the bond

requirement can be removed.

**Q: Is it necessary for me to appoint more than one executor in my will, in case the executor dies before I do?**

**A:** No, but under Texas law it is advisable. If the only person named as executor in your will dies before you die, or dies before your estate has been settled, the court can appoint an administrator for the estate when a qualified person applies. However, it will be much less expensive and much more simple to settle your estate if your will names a second person who will take over as independent executor in case the first person dies before your estate has been settled. A court-appointed administrator, unlike an independent executor, must post a surety bond.

**Q: My husband is behind in his child support payments -- can he still have the right to visit my children?**

**A:** Yes. Child support and visitation rights do not depend on each other. If your husband fails to pay his child support, your remedy would be to ask the court to enforce the child support order. Likewise, if your husband believes you are not fulfilling your obligation to allow him to visit the children as required by the divorce decree, your husband's course of action would be to ask the court to enforce the visitation rights order.

## Area Gets Rain

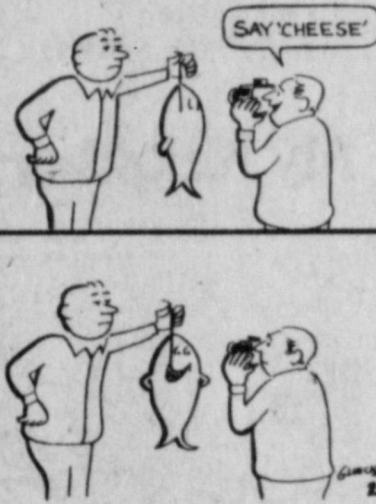
The McLean area experienced a lightning and thunder storm and along with it came a much needed rain Tuesday night.

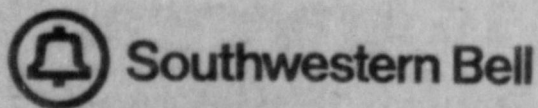

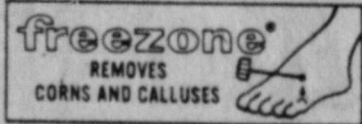

week, I asked how he  
was. "Terrible," was  
his quick reply. "Every-  
thing I have is going down  
in price and it won't rain  
either." He was refer-  
ring to wheat and cat-  
tle, which leads into the  
next subject of cattle  
prices.

It appears that the Fall  
runs are starting on  
stockers and feeders. A  
lot of the county is dry  
presently. A lot of cat-  
tlemen have missed cat-  
tle prices this summer  
because they just haven't  
gone up like some though.  
Instead prices have re-  
mained low. Fat cattle  
are selling about \$8.00  
below year ago levels  
which is keeping all other  
cattle prices depressed.

Dr. Ed Uvacek, Texas  
Extension livestock  
marketing specialist,  
looks for feeder prices  
to weaken into the fall  
and winter. He has just  
completed a trip through  
the cattle country, in-  
cluding the Corn Belt.

The reasons he gives  
for weaker feeder prices  
is that he expects contin-  
ued weakness in fed cat-  
tle prices, big feedlot  
losses, no major drop in  
sight for fed-grain  
prices, a big supply of  
feeder cattle still avail-  
able, and more competi-  
tion from other meats  
such as pork and poultry.

Uvacek thinks choice  
feeder steers in the 600-  
700 pound range will  
likely move to the low  
\$30's by October. Many  
feeder animals will move  
to slaughter during this  
period. Some price gains  
could then result as we  
move into the winter  
months and the demand  
from feedlots begin to  
recover.

Each year ranchers  
must decide whether to  
sell their calves or  
yearlings or retain own-  
ership through the feed-  
ing period. There are  
risks involved in feed-  
ing and the capital re-  
quired is increased. The  
decision whether to sell  
the cattle at the current  
market price or to place  
the cattle in a feedlot  
should be based upon the  
potential return on the  
investment for each al-  
ternative.

Custom feedlots can  
generally provide fairly  
accurate estimates of  
ration costs, percent  
death loss, veterinary  
expenses and expected  
performance of a given  
set of cattle based upon  
their own experiences  
with similar groups of

cattle. The live cattle  
futures market provides  
some insight as to the  
anticipated price at the  
end of the feeding period.

I have copies of a work-  
sheet designed to help  
the ranchers make this  
decision by estimating  
the breakeven price that  
must be received at the  
end of the feeding period  
and the price that must  
be received at the end  
of the feeding period and  
the price that must be  
received in order to pro-  
duce a desired return on  
their investment. Call or  
come by if you would like  
copies of this worksheet.  
There is no secret to  
doing these calculations  
but the worksheet has a  
place for every expense  
item so nothing is inad-  
vertently left out.
