### McLEAN VOTERS SUPPORT CARTER FOR PRESIDENT AND DEMOCRATS

Results in the Gray County general election held Tuesday showed the Republicans out front with 6,012 votes for Ford and 3,876 for Carter. There were 5,679 votes for Bob Price compared with Hightower's 4,183 votes.

In McLean this was not proven true as Democrats had high vote in all offices.

In the county Lloyd Bentsen was re-elected as U. S. Senator and Don Yarbrough had 4,457 votes.

Gray County voters turned down both amendments.

### Highway Dept. Are Taking Bids

Bids for the construction of 5.5 miles of Interstate Highway 40 at Groom in Carson and Gray Counties are expected to be received at the November letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The project will be the first phase of construction designed to close the present gap in IH 40 at Groom and will include grading, drainage structures and grade separations. It will be built on a new location north of Groom and will extend approximately two miles east and west of that city.

The new highway will be a four lane, freeway type facility with a limited amount of frontage roads. Four overpasses will be built: at the east and west intersections of IH 40 and US Highway 66, and at the intersections of Farm to Market Road 295 and FM 2300.

A second construction phase would involve paving the 5.5 miles.

District Engineer A. L. McKee of Amarillo will be in overall supervision of the work, while George J. Cannon of Amarillo will be the de-charge of the project.

### CATTLE FEEDING SHOWS INCREASE

Despite high feed prices and continued pressure on fed cattle prices, cattle feeding increased in the seven major cattle feeding states during the past year, notes a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The number of cattle on feed in these states on Sept. 1 was up 8 per cent over last year's totals while in Texas the increase was even higher 10 per cent. Placement of cattle and calves on feed was up sharply in August compared to last year--10 per cent in the seven states and 25 per cent in Texas--while marketings were also up more than 30 per cent.



 The snow and wet weather last week caught most people by surprise. Farmers with sorghum and cotton in the field didn't exactly welcome the moisture unless they had some wheat that was getting dry. And, most wheat fields were getting to the point of needing additional moisture. Some of the wheat had previously been showing up a little on the yellow side and I am inclined to think that this was caused somewhat by dry soil moisture condition around the young wheat plants.

We have had reports of coyote problems lately, especially around cows that are calving. Some interest has been expressed in a wide-spread coyote control program such as was conducted in 1972 in Gray County with helicopters. Fairly large acreages would need to be blocked together for an aerial hunt. Probably something like a minimum of 10 miles square for any control program to be very effective as coyotes will travel a long ways in search of food. Also, if small places are not signed up, it creates problems for the pilot to avoid the non-participants.

The program will cost \$115 per hour. Based on average results obtained here in 1977, 274 coyotes were killed on about 280 square miles, almost 1 per section; at the rate of 8.6 coyotes per hour or a cost per coyote of \$13.37 based on the current cost.

If you are interested in participating, you can call the county extension office, 669-7420. In the McLean area, you can contact Ted Simmons, 779-2258.

Cattlemen can obtain M-44 units to control coyotes on their own property. These are similar to the old coyote getters but are a lot safer and are permitted to be used. A booklet MP-1181, Using the M-44 in Coyote Control, and information on how to obtain the units can be obtained at the county extension office, courthouse annex.

bushels an increase of 1.7 percent above last year's production. U.S. sorghum production is estimated at 713,919,000 bushels, a decline of 6 percent from last year's production. The total decline in sorghum production can be more than accounted for by the drop in Texas production, where the sorghum production decline was mostly offset with corn production increase.

Stocks of Grain in all positions on Oct. 1 is estimated by USDA to be almost 2 percent above year ago levels for the four feed grains (corn, oats, barley and sorghum) earlier levels by commodity were 11 percent for corn, 2 percent for barley, and 51 percent for sorghum. Oat stocks declined 13 percent from a year earlier. Stocks of all wheat were up 14 percent from year ago levels.

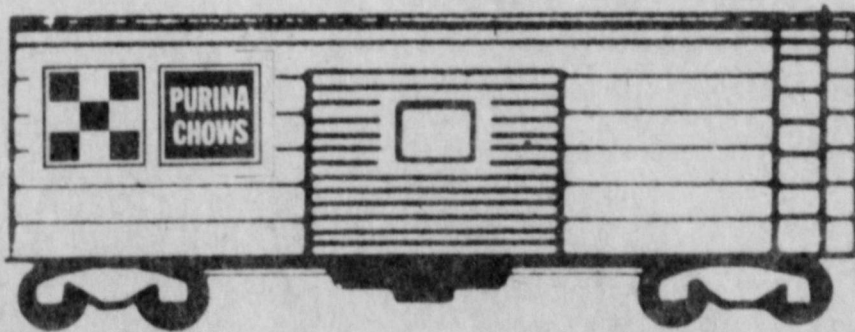
