Senate Candidate To Be In McLean Friday, October 28

Burk Whittenburg, candidate for State Senate, will be in McLean, campaigning on Friday, October 28th. He will be meeting with friends and supporters and conduct a door to door campaign.

Whittenburg said, "I have been to each town in this senatorial district several times since I launched my campaign over three months ago. My wife and I have traveled thousands of miles and worn out lots of shoe leather."

"Campaigning for the position of your Senator has been a most rewarding experience for us and we have thoroughly enjoyed it. Absentee votes dribble in

Only 18 persons have voted absentee in the Nov. 8 election to fill the state senate seat vacated by **Max Sherman** and the on the constitutional amendments.

Gray County has an estimated 12,000 eligible voters.

"This is extremely slow, and there are no ballots in the mail - none have been requested," according to **Wanda Carter**, county clerk.

She added that polls for the voting will be reopened this year at **Alanreed School**, Precinct 4, and at the processing plant at **Laketon**, Precinct 6.

Aoudad Sheep Hunt To Begin

Sportsmen will have an additional week to bag an elusive aoudad sheep when the season begins Nov. 5 in the Texas Panhandle.

Eight counties will host the season which continues through Nov. 18 in **Armstrong**, **Briscoe**, **Donley**, **Floyd**, **Hall**, **Motley**, **Randall** and **Swisher** with a season bag limit of one sheep per hunter by permit only.

A total of 444 aoudad permits will be issued to 100 landowners this month prior to the season and hunters must obtain this permit from the landowner before hunting the sheep.

Hunters unfamiliar with the aoudad sheep should become acquainted with the habits and characteristics of this imported mountain climber.

The aoudad or barbary sheep is rufous or tawny brown with dark brown areas about the head and forequarters. The inside of the legs, the chin, a line on the under parts and the inside of the legs are whitish in color. There is no recognizable color variations between the sexes or between seasons.

The main on the older males may nearly touch the ground even when the head is held upright. A distinctive characteristic is the long, tufted tail which normally reaches the vicinity of the rocks.

Horn characteristics on both sexes include horn tips that remain sharp through life and sweep outward, backward and then inward reaching a tip-to-tip spread of over 30 inches on some animals. A full curl is never reached by the aoudad as on native North American bighorn sheep.

The aoudad is gregarious and generally associates in small family groups consisting of an adult male and female with their young offspring of various ages. They escape detection by remaining motionless rather than leaving whenever danger threatens.

The aoudad is highly resistant to internal parasites which helped the P&WD transplant these animals to various parts of Texas. Aoudads are adept at climbing and jumping. They have been observed readily jumping a four-foot livestock fence and if pressed, they can jump a seven-foot fence, although it will normally contain them.

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Air Force Unit Plays Santa Claus

The men and women of Detachment 2, 11th Weather Squadron, Eielson AFB, Alaska are getting ready to give Santa Claus a hand with his mail, as they've been doing for the past 22 years.

In that time they have helped children share Christmas joy by returning some 165,000 letters to youngsters through the Santa's Mailbag program.

The program involves taking letters sent to Det 2 by the children's parents, written in the guise of Santa Claus, and mailing them back to the children. The letters are personalized with Santa's picture and bear the postmark of North Pole, Alaska.

In addition to the letter from the child to Santa, the parents must include a letter to their child from Santa Claus, along with a self-addressed, stamped envelope. When the letter is received by Det 2, it is placed in the self-addressed envelope, embellished with Santa's picture and delivered to the North Pole Post Office for mailing back to the child.

Major Mike Fox, 2 commander, urged parents to be sure to include the letter from Santa to their children and the self-addressed, stamped envelope. "We handled more than 16,000 letters last year and a continual problem was that many had no letter from the parents to be sent back to the child. This triples processing time and more than once we had to pass the hat to get postage funds when parents did not include the stamped envelope."

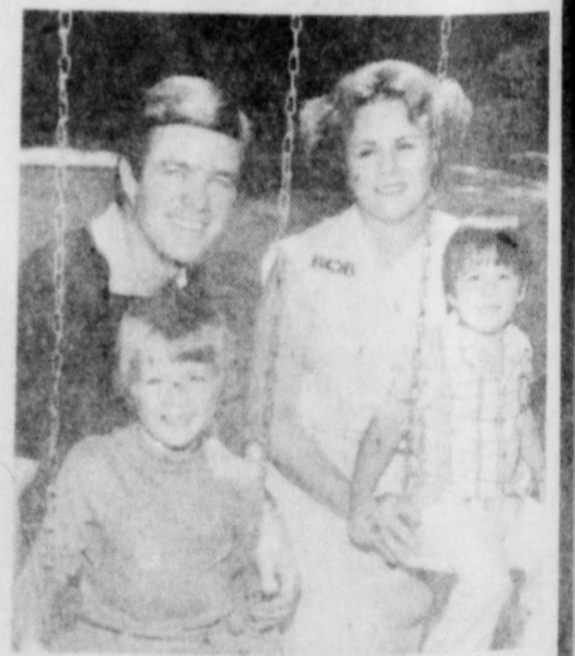

WHY BUM MUMS?

If your mums aren't doing too well this fall there may be a good reason. Mums need full sunlight, good air circulation and well-drained soil. There should be no tree roots interfering with plant growth. And mums should not be planted where they will be affected by outdoor lights at night as this will interfere with their growing patterns. When buying mum plants, get the early flowering type.

Tips On Losing Extra Pounds

There's no doubt about it. Many of us are too fat.

And almost everyone who is too fat would like to slim down to average size for his height and build. Many women would like to be on the skinny side.

The American Medical Association points out that most physicians consider obesity an important factor in personal health. It is associated with increased sickness and death rates notably in respect to heart, circulatory, kidney and metabolic disorders as well as surgical and obstetrical complications.

Obesity can be successfully treated to help control the associated medical conditions. The evidence for generally adverse health effects from obesity seems too massive and too consistent to ignore.

Okay. So we need to lose weight. It should be simple. Everyone knows that all it takes is to cut down on the calories. Unfortunately, it usually isn't simple. Taking fewer calories than are needed seems to be within the theoretical capability of most of us. Yet results suggest that this is difficult and often not achieved. Long-term observations indicate poor success for most dieters.

An important factor in overweight is psychological. Psychological factors may help cause

overweight or help to maintain it. Seldom is psychiatric consultation required. The family doctor, the internist, the pediatrician usually can provide suitable guidance and support as part of the weight reduction program. The physician's aim is to prod and reinforce our will to lose weight, to help us be so determined to trim off excess pounds that we will stick to the reducing regime.

The physician may prescribe drugs at first, as a crutch to help us get started. These can reduce the appetite, promote a feeling of well being, add bulk in the stomach, eliminate excess fluids. They can, at best, offer only temporary help. They postpone the day when facts must be faced, when we finally

Hunters Should Be Alert To Fire Hazards

Hunters, full of anticipation when at last they head for the country, already have had a lot on their minds in the way of preparation. There have been leases to arrange, permits to obtain, and their equipment and themselves to get into condition.

However, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department warns there is another important matter that should not be overlooked. It has to do with fire safety.

Extreme caution always should be used in the outdoors, to prevent grass and forest fires. This year after such a long, dry summer, there is even more need for awareness.

Be sure the exhaust system on your vehicle is in good condition and drive only on defined roads. Catalytic converters can be especially dangerous. When camping, build fires only in designated areas, and get permission from the landowner if you are on private land.


Gasoline lanterns, stoves and heaters should be allowed to cool before refueling, then placed on the ground in a cleared area to fill. If any fuel is spilled move stove or lantern to a new clearing before lighting. Always recap and store flammable liquid containers in a safe place. Never light lanterns and stoves inside a tent, trailer or camper. When you must use the lantern or stove inside one, be sure to have adequate ventilations.

It Does Make a Difference!!

We are living in an age of religious indifference. Nearly anything in the name of religion goes "if you are sincere." As far as most people are concerned the Bible is a book of broad principles in which man is guided in a general way, but the details are left up to the individual.

Does it really make a difference whether or not we follow the Word of God exactly?

Cain and Abel testify that it does! God instructed them to offer a sacrifice, Abel was careful to do exactly as God said; but Cain substituted something he thought was just as good. God accepted Abel's sacrifice, but rejected Cain's (Gen. 4:1-4). This teaches us that it does make a difference whether we follow the directions of God closely or not!

Nadab and Abihu testify that it does! These were the sons of Aaron whose duty was to offer incense upon the altar. They were to use a certain fire which God has commanded; but when they offered "strange fire" before the Lord, fire went out from the Lord and devoured them (Lev. 10:1-2). This incident should impress us with the importance of doing exactly as God has commanded.

Uzzah testifies that it does! God had commanded that the ark of the covenant be transported on the shoulders of men of the tribe of Levi by the use of staves placed through rings in the ark. When the ark was placed upon an ox cart, this was a substitution of God's arrangement. Uzzah raised his hand to steady the ark and when he touched it, he died (2 Sam. 6:6-7). This should teach us how important it is to adhere closely to the instructions of God.

Bear in mind that the apostle Paul wrote in Rom. 15:4 that "whatsoever was written aforetime was written for our learning"---speaking of the O. T. Scriptures. The above examples plainly show that God will accept no substitutes. Any careful student of the Bible will agree that it has always made a difference with God how closely we follow His instruction.

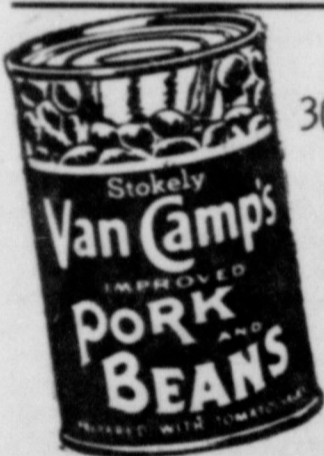

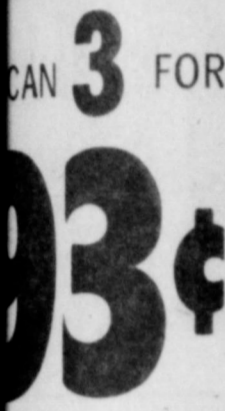

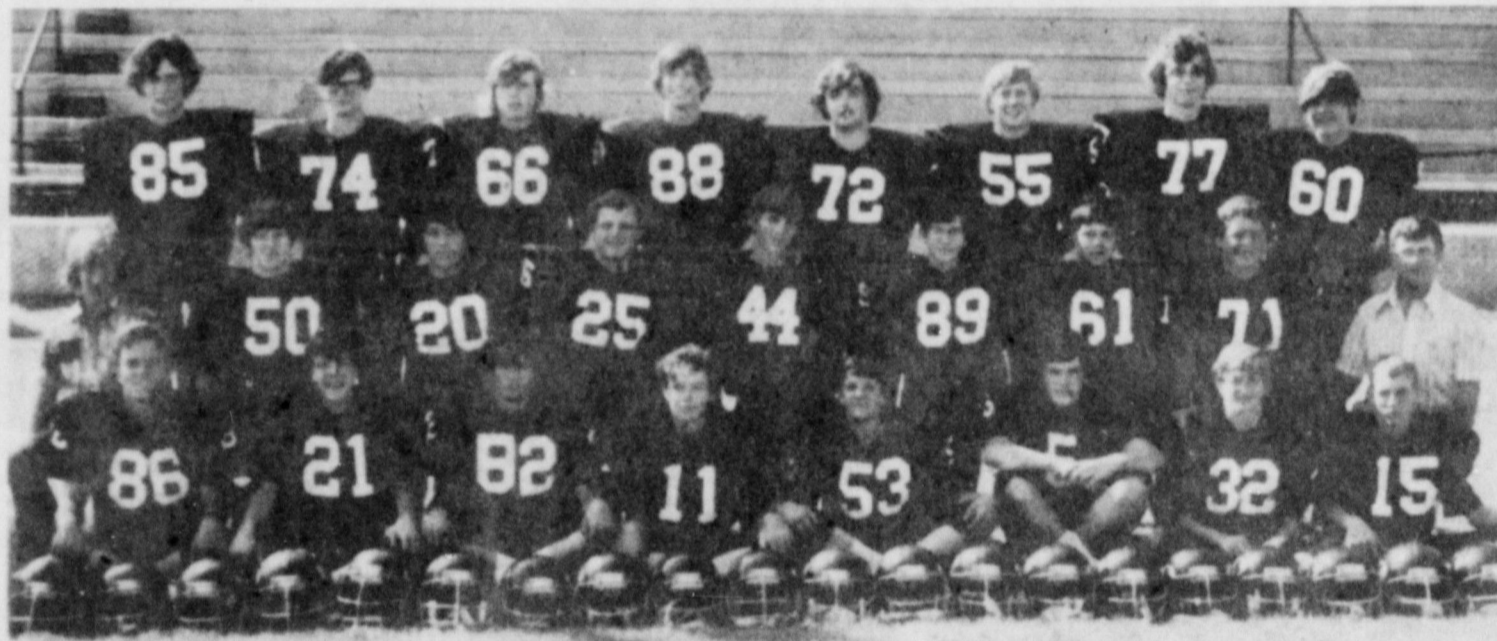

1. SOURDOUGH STARTER

1 package active dry yeast
 1/2 cups warm water (105° to 115°)
 1 cup instant nonfat dry milk
 2 tablespoons sugar
 4 cups all-purpose flour

Stir yeast, water, dry milk and sugar in 2 1/2 quart crock or non-metallic bowl until yeast is dissolved. Stir in flour gradually until a dough forms. Let stand loosely covered in warm place, 3 to 5 hours. Stir down batter occasionally. Store loosely covered refrigerator.
 Replace exact amount of starter used for each recipe by stirring equal amounts of homogenized milk and flour back into starter. (For example, replace 1 cup starter with 1/2 cup homogenized milk and 1/2 cup flour). Let stand loosely covered until it bubbles, overnight. Repeat. Each time this process is repeated, the starter becomes more active and develops a more sour flavor. Note: if stored as much as two to three weeks between usings, just pour off the watery layer and replace following procedure in (b).

2. SOURDOUGH BREAD STICKS

1 cup instant nonfat dry milk
 1 cup warm water (105° to 115°)
 1 cup Sourdough Starter (see Recipe No. 1)
 2 cups all-purpose flour
 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
 2 teaspoons salt
 2 teaspoons sugar
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 to 1 cup all-purpose flour
 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted

a) Mix dry milk, water, Sourdough Starter and 2 cups flour in non-metallic bowl; cover loosely. Let stand in warm place until mixture is coarse and bubbly, at least 8 hours.
 b) Mix oil, salt, sugar and baking soda into sourdough mixture. Stir in enough of the remaining flour to make dough easy to handle. Knead dough lightly on well-floured board, about 2 minutes.
 c) Roll dough into rectangle, 15 x 10 inches, on well-floured board. Cut into fifteen 1-inch strips. Roll each strip into even round strand, about 14 inches long. Double strand over and twist to form bread stick. Place bread sticks on greased baking sheet; brush with melted butter. Cover with plastic wrap. Let rise in warm place until double, 1 to 1 1/2 hours.
 d) Heat oven to 375°. Bake bread sticks until golden brown, 30 to 35 minutes. (Makes 15).
