# Library Receives "Texas Folk Songs"

Library of McLean announces the receipt of "Texas Folk Songs" by William A. Owens, a gift of Southern Methodist University Press and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities. "Texas Folk Songs"

includes 135 songs, a number of them in versions by more than one singer. The book is divided into nine chapters containing British popular ballads, Anglo-American ballads, Anglo-American love songs, Anglo-American comic songs, songs and games for children, play-party songs and games, Anglo-American spirituals and Afro-American secular

The British ballads were brought to America in the seventeenth century and later carried westward to Texas by the adventurous pioneers who settled the state. The later American love ballads are mournful and plaintive songs, while the Anglo-American comic songs are full of raw, rugged and raucous humor exemplifying the pioneer West.

New music transcrip tions of the melodies have been provided by musicologist Jessie Ann Owens from the original 4-H Texans and the recordings. ch Ness Authority Dedication For A&M Center Set Sept. 24

Dedication ceremonies for the new Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Amarillo have been set for 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 24. The Center is located at 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, in the Medical Park Complex.

Amarillo's new center will complete a chain of 13 TAMU Research and Extension Centers across the state and will bring the full agricultural resources of the university to citizens of the region. The A&M System board began the new concept of placing A&M Resident Enjoys centers across the state in 1968 to serve as focal points for research and educational activities.

Other A&M Centers, which are strategically located to enable personnel of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service to assist the people of Texas in more fully developing the total resources of a given area, are located at Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Lubbock, Overton, San Angelo, Uvalde, Vernon-Chillicothe, Ft. Stockton and Weslaco.

Presiding at the dedication in Amarillo will be Dr. H. O. Kunkel, A&M's dean of agricul-

The A&M Center at Amarillo will serve as a focal point for agricultural research and education needs in the High Plains of Texas. The facility, which will house some 25 professional staff, is located near the new A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory and provides a basis for expansion of programs to support the beef cattle industry in the High Plains. Other major thrusts are planned in Open With Breakfast the areas of animal health, nutrition and management. Research administration at the Center is directed by Dr. G. B. Thompson.

Insects continue to bother several crops in the area. The latest called to my attention is a looper, probably the cabbage looper or a measuring worm, found to be eating a lot of leaves on some soybeans in the Pampa area.

This looper seemed to be moving into a few ields and was a lot worse around field edges. With soybeans from the full pod to harvest stage, control measures need o be applied when defoliation exceeds 35 per

cent of the leaf area. Cotton farmers need to continue a watch for cotton bollworms. Prospects are good for an excellent cotton crop if the Fall weather will cooperate just a little. Farmers with questions about insect problems can call the County Extension Office, 669-7429.

CROP DEMONSTRA-TIONS

We try to get several good demonstrations set up each year. However, sometimes farmers set up good demonstrations on their own. If you happen to have two production practices you are comparing side by side in the same field, I would like to know about it. INFESTATION We have been getting a few calls nearly every week for the last few months about flea control in homes, lawns and on pets. As the calls continue, I've about decided that there must be a flea infestation going around among many of the pets in the area.

Adult fleas vary in size from 1/32 to 5/32 inch long. They are dark, reddish-brown to almost black, sucking insects with laterally compres-sed bodies. They transmit several diseases and parasites of man. Fleas usually enter the home on dogs, cats, rats and other animals. They deposit eggs loosely on hosts; these then fall into cracks on the floor, ground or similar places. Flea larvae develop on organic matter, animal wastes and debris in the soil, in animal quarters, in furniture or other areas frequented by pets.

Treat garages, lawns and animal quarters with 1,000 square feet or 4% malathion dust at the rate of 1-2 pounds per 1,000 square feet. If necessary, treat inside of homes with 2% malathion or 0.5% diazinon spray, particularly floors, baseboards and walls to a height of about 1 foot. Apply a light mist to upknow. holstery, rugs and other LIVESTOCK HEDGING fabrics. Dogs should be dusted thoroughly with 4% malathion dust or dipped in 0.5% malathion le about a school on water solution. Five per cent carbaryl dust is also effective when applied to dogs and their quarters. Follow directions on manufacturers' labels.

# CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977**

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting

(S.J.R. 13) S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of

a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable 'assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their

# NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, nondiscriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and na-'tional banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

# NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct. and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

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
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
