Tommy Duniven Moves To The Houston Oilers

Tommy Duniven, former McLean Tiger and Texas Tech football star, has been claimed by the Houston Oilers of the National Football League after being put on waivers by the Cincinnati Bengals. Duniven, quarterback, was drafted by the Bengals in the sixth round of the NFL draft and played sparingly in the exhibition season. Mike Voight former of North Carolina, also was waived by Cincinnati and was picked up by Houston. Duniven is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Duniven of McLean.

P&WD Charges for Stocked Fish

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will be allowed to charge for fish stocked in private ponds and lakes in 1978 as a result of Senate Bill 286.

Charges for fish will include \$2/acre for largemouth bass, \$4/acre for channel catfish and \$5/acre for sunfish. The P&WD has been furnishing fish for private waters since the 1920's without charge to the pond owner but, rising production costs and financial problems in the P&WD have required a fee system to be initiated.

According to our studies in lake and pond management, a stocking ratio of 50 fish per acre will be in effect next year.

Bass will be delivered next spring and should be the one-inch class. Channel catfish in the two-inch class and sunfish in the one-inch class will be delivered next fall.

Fish applicants will receive a notice for fish pickup at 29 distribution sites across the state. These delivery sites will be determined by computer and a centrally located point between applicant's ponds will be picked.

An application can be secured by writing the P&WD, Hatchery Coordinator, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

Amarillo Field Representative At Pampa, Sept. 21

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced he is sending a representative from his Amarillo Field Office to Pampa on Wednesday September 21, to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer J. D. Caproni will meet with local taxpayers at the County Courthouse in Gray County from 9:00 until 1:00.

"If Gray County merchants, or any one else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Mr. Caproni will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

Bullock reminded those taxpayers who are unable to meet with his representatives on September 21 that they can still get their questions answered quickly by calling his Toll-Free Information Number in Austin. That number is 1-800-252-5555.

The Amarillo Field Office, headed by Claudia Stravato, serves the twenty-six counties of the Texas Panhandle.

Texas Tech will meet the University of New Mexico in a non-conference game in Lubbock. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m.

Texas Tech defeated the Baylor Bears last week 17-7 before more than 46,000 fans in Waco. University of Hawaii 35-26 before 26,532 fans in Honolulu.

The Red Raiders are coached by Steve Sloan who is in his third year at the Texas Tech helm. Bill Mondt is in his fourth year at New Mexico. Sloan is a 1966 graduate of Alabama.

Texas Tech's win over Baylor was the 300th football victory in the school's history. The Red Raiders have played 548 games and are now in their 53rd season. Overall, the Tech record is 300 wins, 221 losses and 27 ties.

Library Receives "Texas Folk Songs"

The Lovett Memorial Library of McLean announces the receipt of "Texas Folk Songs" by William A. Owens, a gift of Southern Methodist University Press and the Texas Commission on the Arts and Humanities.

"Texas Folk Songs" includes 135 songs, a number of them in versions by more than one singer. The book is divided into nine chapters containing British popular ballads, Anglo-American ballads, Anglo-American love songs, Anglo-American comic songs, songs and games for children, play-party songs and games, Anglo-American spirituals and Afro-American secular songs.

The British ballads were brought to America in the seventeenth century and later carried westward to Texas by the adventurous pioneers who settled the state. The later American love ballads are mournful and plaintive songs, while the Anglo-American comic songs are full of raw, rugged and raucous humor exemplifying the pioneer West.

New music transcriptions of the melodies have been provided by musicologist Jessie Ann Owens from the original recordings. Although bibliographical source notes are included, "Texas Folk Songs" is not a book just for scholars. These songs have been collected, as Owens has written, "for those who love to sing them as well as for those who have an interest in the past".

Amarillo College will soon begin a service for the blind and handicapped in Amarillo and surrounding communities.

AC's radio station, KACV-FM, will broadcast an hour-long reading service with the basic purpose of "reading news items and features for the blind and handicapped," said Andrea Baldwin, station program director.

"Volunteers will edit the local morning newspaper and read from 9:30 to 10:30 each morning," said Mrs. Baldwin. This is tentatively scheduled to begin Sept. 19.

This service is provided in other major areas, says Mrs. Baldwin such as Dallas-Ft. Worth, Oklahoma City and Houston.

"We were contacted by the Texas Association for the Blind to see if we could make this service available," she said.

Many of the volunteers for the program are from the Amarillo Senior Citizens Association, she added. "We hope to expand this service and satisfy the needs of our listeners."

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Loch Ness Authority Dedication For A&M Center Set Sept. 24

Enormous and strange animals have been reported from the oceans--from large freshwater lakes--for centuries. Do they really exist? Are they surviving members of prehistoric species long thought to be extinct... or do they represent something new in science?

These questions may be answered in part by Roy P. Mackal at his 10 a.m. free lecture in the Oak Room of the Amarillo College Union Building Sept. 21, sponsored by the AC Student Activities Council.

Unexplained phenomena in Loch Ness, reported as early as the 18th century, have captured the bulk of world interest in unknown features of the deep. In 1962 The Loch Ness Investigation Bureau Limited was founded by a group of men of diverse backgrounds who wished to face the investigation of the Loch Ness "monster" on a firm scientific basis.

In 1965, Dr. Mackal became head of the scientific portion of the research team.

Dedication ceremonies for the new Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Amarillo have been set for 10 a.m. on Saturday, Sept. 24. The Center is located at 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West, in the Medical Park Complex.

Amarillo's new center will complete a chain of 13 TAMU Research and Extension Centers across the state and will bring the full agricultural resources of the university to citizens of the region. The A&M System board began the new concept of placing A&M centers across the state in 1968 to serve as focal points for research and educational activities.

Other A&M Centers, which are strategically located to enable personnel of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service to assist the people of Texas in more fully developing the total resources of a given area, are located at Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Lubbock, Overton, San Angelo, Uvalde, Vernon-Chillicothe, Ft. Stockton and Weslaco.

Presiding at the dedication in Amarillo will be Dr. H. O. Kunkel, A&M's dean of agriculture.

The A&M Center at Amarillo will serve as a focal point for agricultural research and educational needs in the High Plains of Texas. The facility, which will house some 25 professional staff, is located near the new A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory and provides a basis for expansion of programs to support the beef cattle industry in the High Plains. Other major thrusts are planned in the areas of animal health, nutrition and management. Research administration at the Center is directed by Dr. G. B. Thompson.

Insects continue to bother several crops in the area. The latest called to my attention is a looper, probably the cabbage looper or a measuring worm, found to be eating a lot of leaves on some soybeans in the Pampa area.

This looper seemed to be moving into a few fields and was a lot worse around field edges. With soybeans from the full pod to harvest stage, control measures need to be applied when defoliation exceeds 35 percent of the leaf area.

Cotton farmers need to continue a watch for cotton bollworms. Prospects are good for an excellent cotton crop if the Fall weather will cooperate just a little. Farmers with questions about insect problems can call the County Extension Office, 669-7429.

CROP DEMONSTRATIONS

We try to get several good demonstrations set up each year. However, sometimes farmers set up good demonstrations on their own. If you happen to have two production practices you are comparing side by side in the same field, I would like to know about it. The information and results might be of interest and benefit to other farmers.

Also, we will be getting some small amounts of wheat seed for variety demonstrations soon. I know many will already have wheat planted but if you have a good location for a few small plots, let me know and I will be glad to visit with you about what is involved, which isn't all that much.

Also, I can get a small amount of Walken Oat seed for demonstration purposes. In the past, this oat has appeared to have a good potential for grazing purposes. If someone wants to try this out, please let me know.

LIVESTOCK HEDGING FORUM

I've had several inquiries from local people about a school on hedging and I think several people will be interested in this program.

The Chicago Mercantile Exchange in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is going to conduct a two-day forum in

Amarillo on October 4 and 5 at the Hilton Inn from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

On Tuesday October 4, a livestock forum will be held and on October 5, an Ag Credit forum will be held. Topics to be discussed include: livestock outlook, effective hedging, basis, choosing a Commodity Broker, working with your banker, margins, margin calls and commission charges, practical application of futures trading, marketing and hedging strategies, how your neighbors hedge and technical analysis.

If you are interested and think you might attend either day, please let me know. Call 669-7429 so they can better plan for the attendance at these meetings. Also I can give you further details if you have a question.

FLEA INFESTATION

We have been getting a few calls nearly every week for the last few months about flea control in homes, lawns and on pets. As the calls continue, I've about decided that there must be a flea infestation going around among many of the pets in the area.

Adult fleas vary in size from 1/32 to 5/32 inch long. They are dark, reddish-brown to almost black, sucking insects with laterally compressed bodies. They transmit several diseases and parasites of man. Fleas usually enter the home on dogs, cats, rats and other animals. They deposit eggs loosely on hosts; these then fall into cracks on the floor, ground or similar places. Flea larvae develop on organic matter, animal wastes and debris in the soil, in animal quarters, in furniture or other areas frequented by pets.

Treat garages, lawns and animal quarters with 5% malathion spray at the rate of 2 gallons per 1,000 square feet or 4% malathion dust at the rate of 1-2 pounds per 1,000 square feet. If necessary, treat inside of homes with 2% malathion or 0.5% diazinon spray, particularly floors, baseboards and walls to a height of about 1 foot. Apply a light mist to upholstery, rugs and other fabrics. Dogs should be dusted thoroughly with 4% malathion dust or dipped in 0.5% malathion water solution. Five percent carbaryl dust is also effective when applied to dogs and their quarters. Follow directions on manufacturers' labels.

the supreme court, or
court of civil appeals jus-
tices serving in place of

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an
amendment to the Texas
Constitution to provide for
expanding the Court of
Criminal Appeals from its
current membership of five
judges to nine judges and
to permit the court to sit
in panels of three judges.

The wording of the pro-
posed amendment as it will
appear on the ballot is as
follows:

"The constitutional
amendment increasing the
size of the Court of Crimi-
nal Appeals to nine
judges, and permitting
the court to sit in panels
of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a con-
stitutional amendment to
provide for an additional
\$200 million in bonds or ob-
ligations of the State of
Texas for the Veterans'
Land Fund and to allow
surviving widows of veter-
ans to purchase tracts under
certain circumstances.

The wording of the pro-
posed amendment as it will
appear on the ballot is as
follows:

"The constitutional
amendment to provide for
an additional \$200 million
in bonds or obligations of
the State of Texas for the
Veterans' Land Fund and
to allow surviving widows
of veterans to purchase
tracts under certain cir-
cumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law
a person charged with a fel-
ony offense who has pre-
viously been convicted of
two felony offenses may be
denied bail. S.J.R. 3 pro-
poses an amendment to the
Texas Constitution which
would also result in the de-
nial of bail, for a limited
time and subject to appeal,
to a person accused of com-
mitting a felony while on
bail for a prior felony for
which the person has been
indicted, or accused of a
felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after be-
ing convicted of a prior
felony.

The wording of the pro-
posed amendment as it will
appear on the ballot is as
follows:

"The constitutional
amendment permitting
denial of bail to a person
charged with a felony of-
fense who has been there-
fore twice convicted of
a felony offense, or
charged with a felony of-
fense committed while
that person was admitted
to bail on a prior felony
indictment, or charged
with a crime involving the
use of a deadly weapon
where there is evidence
such person has been con-
victed of a prior felony
offense; providing for a
60-day limit to that per-
son's incarceration with-
out trial; and providing
for that person's right of
appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an
amendment to the Texas
Constitution authorizing the
legislature to grant exemp-
tions or other relief from ad-
valorem taxes on property
designated for the preserva-
tion of cultural, historical or
natural history resources.

The wording of the pro-
posed amendment as it will
appear on the ballot is as
follows:

"The constitutional
amendment authorizing
tax relief to preserve cer-
tain cultural, historical,
or natural history re-
sources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an
amendment to the Texas
Constitution authorizing the
formation of associations
authorized to collect certain
refundable assessments
from producers of poultry,
livestock, and other raw
agricultural or marine
products and validating the
1967 law regarding the for-
mation of such associations.

The wording of the pro-
posed amendment as it will
appear on the ballot is as
follows:
