Savings, Loan Plan Building in Shamrock

Announcement was made Friday that plans are underway to establish a savings and loan association in Shamrock, which would be named the River Savings and Loan Association.

Phil Cates, state representative and Shamrock chamber of commerce manager, who made the announcement

and organizers believe there is a public need for additional savings and loan services in Shamrock, Wheeler County, Collingsworth County and portions of Donley, Gray, Hemphill and Roberts counties.

Cates said the proposed association will have a total capitalization of not less than \$1 million.

The association will be formed under the Texas Savings and Loan Act, having a single class of capital stock consisting of Permanent Reserve Fund shares.

Members of the board of directors for the proposed association include Don Wells, Don Biggers, Ernest Henderson, Glynn Bell, Raymond Moore, Don Tarver and Johnny Carpenter.

Clean Up Your Driving Act

"How many times have you seen driving errors of other drivers that were contrary to courtesy or good practice, or even endangered your own safety?" asks Dr. Gary S. Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "When this happens to us, it is natural to feel frustrated and wish for some means to correct the discourtesy or injustice."

Some positive action can be taken, contends Nelson, if we learn from these incidents and apply the results to our own driving.

He offers an example from experience. "Recently I was following a car when the driver slowed by coasting and then turned left without signalling his intentions. Without the clues of seeing brakelights or a turn signal that would have indicated his intentions, I had to brake more suddenly than usual until the way was clear. While thinking derogatory thoughts about the 'other driver's' actions, I made a right turn. After completing the turn I noticed, with some embarrassment, that while my thoughts were occupied with another driver's error, I had myself failed to signal my own intentions to turn."

We are quick to criticize other drivers for errors we make ourselves, points out Nelson. However, he suggests following the old saying, "We should wash our hands before point-

Tigers Sink Pirates To Groom Friday

The McLean Tigers won their homecoming last Friday as they defeated the Lefors Pirates 29-14. It was the Tigers first district game of the season. The black and gold scored early in the first quarter as Sam Haynes went over from the two yard line. Randy Kennedy's kick for extra point was good. The Pirates then came right back and scored on a 42 yard pass play from Keith Robertson to Floyd Cotham. Their conversion for the extra point failed. The Tigers then got a safety

as Sam Haynes blocked a Pirate punt and it went out of the end zone. The score at the end of the first quarter was 9-6, in favor of the Tigers.

Tommy Eck scored on a 12-yard run in the second quarter. The kick by Kennedy split the upright. Curtis Simpson ended the scoring in the first half as he romped 54 yards for the touchdown. The conversion after was no good. The score at the halftime was 22-6. The Tigers came out in the second half and Curtis Simpson scored three times, but all of the touchdowns were nullified by penalties. Sam Haynes then scored from two yards out. Kennedy's kick was good. The Tigers second team offense played most of the last half. The second team defense played most of the last quarter. The Pirates' only score in the last half was on a 77 yard touchdown pass from John Tarbet to Billy Crain. The Tigers totaled 308 yards rushing for the game. Leading the Tigers were Sam Haynes (16 carries for 97 yards), Curtis Simpson (eight for 82) and Tommy Eck (8 for 53). The Tiger defense held Lefors to five first downs.

McLean now stands at 2-1 on the year and 1-0 in district play. Lefors is now 0-3 and 0-2 in district 1B play.

The Tigers will be playing this week at Groom at 7:30 in an important district 1B game.

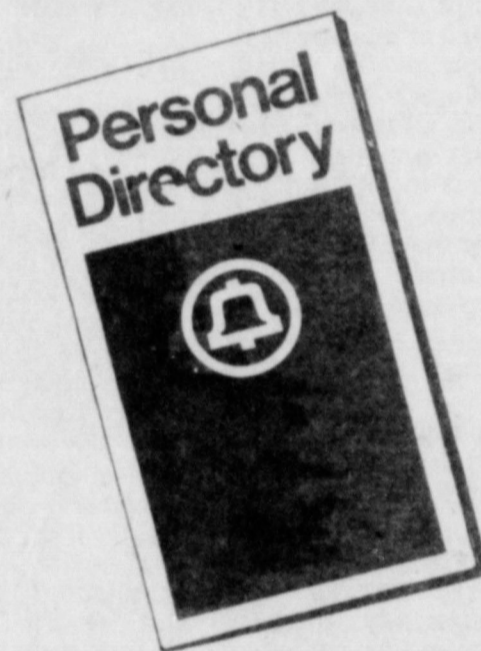
There are 18 students in our class. We have elected best citizens of the week and they were Amber Kingston and Shawn Studer.

Contract Let For Highway Project

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has awarded contracts totaling \$4,162,000 for construction of a highway project in the Pampa area and Donley county. This is the second of a three stage project on Interstate 40, a portion of the national interstate system being built from Alanreed to Pampa.

Motorists passing through the area will be warned of the construction and barricades will be erected for safety purposes.

Successful bidders are Gilvin-Terrill Inc. of Amarillo and H. B.

Zacery Company of San Antonio, joint bidders. The construction engineering will be handled by the Office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Pampa under the supervision of R. R. Kelley, supervising resident engineer.

According to the contracts submitted by the contractors, construction will begin Oct. 24 with completion due by July 1978.

Motorists passing through the area will be warned of the construction and barricades will be erected for safety purposes.

The Pampa Area has certainly been ravaged by weather the last several days. Farmers south and east of Pampa have suffered some severe hail storms on both Thursday and Friday of last week. Some of damage on Friday night was also caused by wind which blew some buildings down and caused lodging in some crops. Much of the damage was to irrigated crops -- corn, sorghum, soybeans, sunflowers and sudan that were approaching harvest.

When you are farming in a year like this and crop prices are below cost of production and then you suffer yield loss of 50 to 75 percent, you come up far in the hole.

People who are not involved in agriculture sometimes think that farmers are all wealthy. However, the risks and chances farmers take would drive most Las Vegas gamblers insane. Many people will tell you that farmers are the biggest gamblers in the world. A lot of times when farmers "win" and produce a good crop, the profit isn't there because crop prices are down, while production costs are up. Farm prices certainly are depressed now and farmers need to get more for their production than current prices. The age old problem is trying to figure out how to accomplish this worthy goal.

 Wheat farmers need to keep a close check on wheat fields for fall armyworm's until frost. The armyworm has a reputation of wiping out an entire field in a few days time so fields should be checked every few days. They have destroyed a few fields in Wheeler County already this fall. Conditions are such that the potential for armyworm problems is very good according to our Area Extension Entomologist, Carl Patrick.

The full grown caterpillar is from 1 to 1.5 inches long and varies in color from light brown or green to black. There are several lines extending down the back and on the sides of this insect. The larvae have a prominent white inverted "Y" shaped suture on the front of the head. There are several important natural enemies of the fall armyworm, in-

cluding parasitic flies, wasps and predatory beetles. However, with the heavy population pressure of worms this year, these insects have been unable to keep this pest in check.

When larvae are abundant and the food supply becomes exhausted, they migrate as do true armyworms.

If the infestation is rather uniform throughout the field, it will be necessary to spray the entire crop. However, if the larvae are migrating from grass and weeds in fence rows or from adjacent crops, a chemical barrier can be applied to reduce migration into uninfested fields.

If a heavy infestation is present in adjacent fence rows, or on other crops it might be wise to apply a heavy chemical barrier before wheat emerges from the ground.

Beef is plentiful, eggs are economical, soft fruits fade out as citrus fruits begin to appear and some vegetables -- among them potatoes -- are good choices this week, says Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

In beef, look for economical buys on chuck roasts and chuck steaks, shoulder roasts and ground beef. Good buys are the longer, slower cooking selections. Pork production is seasonally down, but scattered specials include Boston butt roasts, pork shoulder steaks and smoked picnics.

Eggs offer an economical protein choice. Whole fryers are one of the better choices in poultry this week, Mrs. Clyatt says.

Soft shell squash, carrots, Bell peppers, cucumbers and cooking greens are other good vegetable choices, along with potatoes.

Supplies of soft fresh summer fruits -- peaches, plums and nectarines -- are lower, but as autumn progresses fresh oranges, grapefruit and other citrus fruits will be more available. Stocks of frozen orange juice concentrate are below last year's levels, but are offered as a "special" in some stores.

New crop apples, oranges, pears and grapes, cantaloupe and honeydew melons are available at varying prices.

As for milk and dairy foods -- any selection is a wise choice -- buy according to family needs, but for real thrift, non-fat dry milk is the best buy, she advises.

CONSUMER WATCHWORDS: In choosing potatoes look for firmness, regular shape and smoothness, with few eyes. In cooking potatoes, remember that cooked in the jacket, they retain most of their food value.

In recent years, Texas has made important strides in providing better living conditions and educational opportunities for migrant farm workers, according to Reagan V. Brown.

Price Support Loans Available For Shipping

Tightness of grain storage space for sorghum in some areas of the country, particularly in wheat producing areas of Northwest Texas, has aroused substantial interest in the Commodity Credit Corporation "County Plus" system of price support loans on sorghum, wheat, barley and rye.

Roland Smith, grain marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, explains the system.

According to price support loan regulations, any of the four covered crops can be transshipped to a location closer to and on line of transit to, export ports with CCC loaning the producer sufficient funds to offset transportation costs. In other words, the producer receives payment for entering his grain under loan at the rate applicable to his county. But if local elevators do not have sufficient space to store the grain, the producer is not penalized by being forced to ship the grain elsewhere for storage.

Smith gives the example. If a Texas sorghum producer desires to place his crop under loan but his local elevator has no space, he can arrange to have the sorghum transshipped to a terminal elevator in line of transit to the Gulf for export. He then can recover his cost of transportation plus the receiving and loadout charges at the local elevator from CCC. If the producer subsequently forfeits the grain to CCC, it is advantageously located for shipment to a Gulf port and CCC does not have to bear shipping costs. If, on the other hand, the producer decides to repay the loan, he must also repay the additional amount for transshipment and handling which has become a part of his loan. However, the producer will then have grain closer to the export market, which should make his sorghum more valuable to potential buyers.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of judges, justices, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."
