McLean Mayor On PHSA Board

Mr. Samuel A. Haynes is currently serving on the governing body of the Panhandle Health Systems Agency. The PHSA is actively studying the health maintenance and health care needs and resources of the Panhandle area are to determine the availability, accessibility and affordability of local health care, to evaluate existing programs and facilities, and to collect and review data regarding local health care delivery.

The governing body meets monthly on the second Thursday to help plan and encourage the implementation of a system that will deliver quality health care to every individual in our 25 county area. By volunteering time and effort, Mr. Haynes is helping to assure that PHSA remains an organization of Panhandle people serving Panhandle needs.

The Health Systems Agency has been in operation since its conditional designation on August 9, 1976. The Governing Body has organized itself into committees with specific functions relative to the development of the Health Systems Plan. Mr. Haynes is serving on the Environmental Health Committee.

The Agency has performed the "review" function on fifteen projects totaling \$22,981,460. It has begun the inventory of facilities, manpower and health services and has had a strong start on documenting the health concerns of the people in the region.

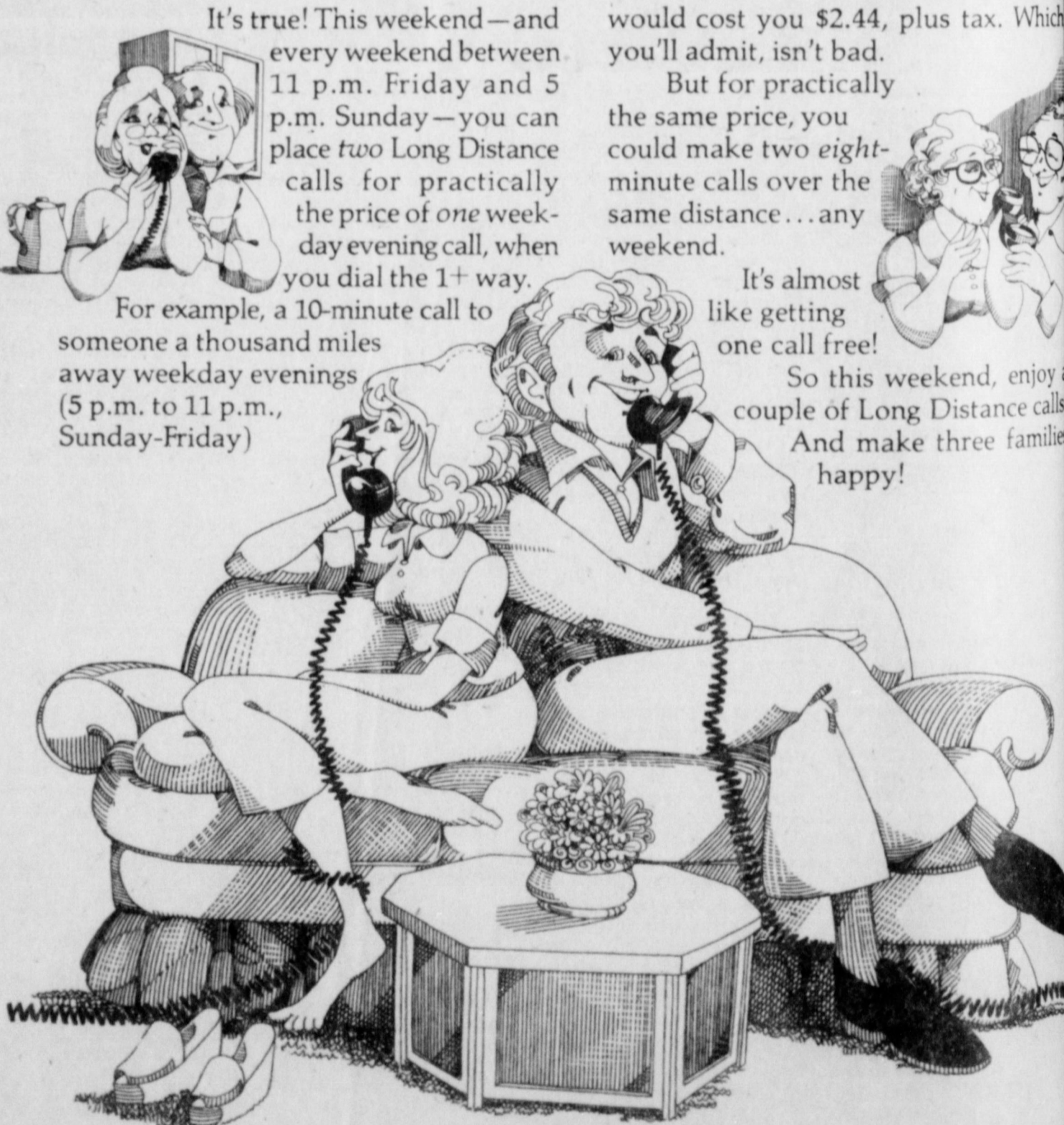

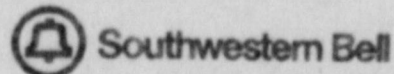

X's and O's

This article appeared in a newspaper several years ago and I thought it would bear reprinting. It is titled "What is a Football Player," and was written by Charles Loftus who was Herman Hickman's aide-de-camp at Yale University. "Between the innocence of boyhood and the dignity of man we find a sturdy creature called a football player. Football players come in assorted weights, heights, jersey colors and numbers but all football players have the same creed: to play every second of every minute of every period of every game to the best of their ability.

Football players are found everywhere—underneath, on top of running around, jumping over, passing by, twisting from or driving through the enemy. Teammates rib them, officials penalize them, students cheer them, kid brothers idolize them, coaches criticize them, college girls adore them, alumni tolerate them and mothers worry about them. A football player is courage in cleats, hope in a helmet, pride in pads and the best of young manhood in mole-

skins.

When your team is behind, a football player is incompetent, careless, indecisive, lazy, uncoordinated and stupid. Just when your team threatens to turn the tide of battle he misses a block, fumbles the ball, drops a pass, jumps off side, falls down, runs the wrong way or completely forgets his assignment.

A football player is a composite, he eats like Notre Dame but, more often than not, plays like Grand Canyon High. To an opponent publicity man, he has the speed of a gazelle, the strength of an ox, the size of an elephant, the cunning of a fox, the agility of an adagio dancer, the quickness of a cat, and the ability of Red Grange, Glenn Davis, Bronco Nagurski and Jim Thorpe combined.

To his own coach he has, for press purposes, the stability of a mush, the fleetness of a snail, the mentality of a mule, is held together by adhesive tape, baling wire, sponge rubber and has about as much chance of playing on Fridays as would his own grandfather.

To an alumnus a football player is someone who will never kick as well, run as far, block as viciously tackle as hard, fight as fiercely, give as little ground, score as many points,

or generate nearly the same amount of spirit as did those particular players of his own yesterday.

A football player likes films, trips away from home, practice sessions without pads, hot showers, long runs, whirlpool baths, recovered fumbles, points after touchdowns and the quiet satisfaction which comes from being a part of a perfectly executed play. He is not much for wind sprints, sitting on the bench, rainy days, after game compliments, ankle wraps, scouting re-

ports or calisthenics.

No one else looks forward so much to September or so little to December. Nobody gets so much pleasure out of knocking down, hauling out or just plain bringing down the enemy. Nobody else can cram into one mind assignments for an end run, a quarterback sneak, a dive play, punt protection, kickoff returns, an off-tackle slant, a jump pass a back lateral goal line stands, or a spinner cycle designed to result in a touchdown every time it is tried.

A football player is a wonderful creature you can criticize him but you can't discourage him. You can defeat his team but you can't make him quit. You can get him out of a game, but you can't get him out of football. Might as well admit it—be you alumnus, coach, or fan—he is your

personal representative on the field, your symbol of fair and hard play. He may not be an All-American, but he is an example of the American way. He is judged, not for his race, not for his religion, not for his social standing, not for his finances, but by the democratic yardstick of how well he blocks, tackles and sacrifices individual glory for the overall success of his team.

He is a hard-working, untiring, determined kid doing the very best he can for his school or college. And when you come out of a stadium, grouching and feeling upset that your team has lost, he can make you feel mighty ashamed with just two sincerely spoken words "We tried!"

Wheeler is a well-coached, disciplined, talented team. Defeating them this week will be tough. However, if our team will approach this game with the right mental attitude we can win this ball game. Last week, we received some good play from Dwayne Morgan, Sam Haynes, Curtis Simpson, Randy Kennedy and Tommy Eck. The Tigers have been working hard all week in preparation for this game and if we can get good play out of the team as a whole, we should do all right.

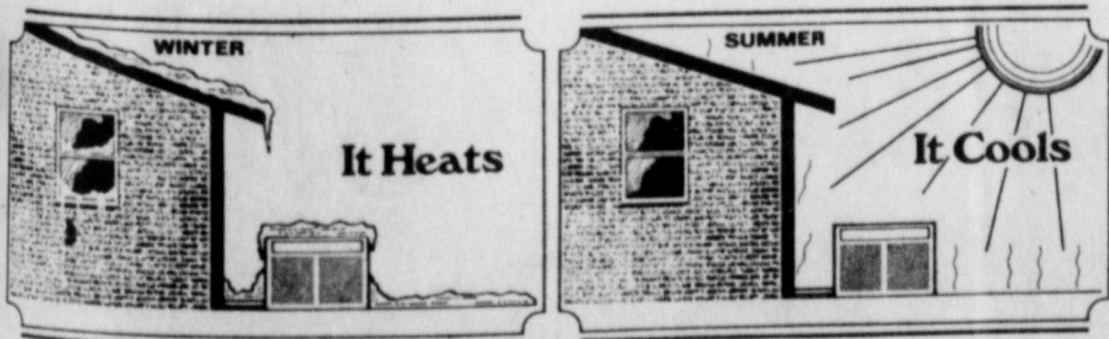

Think of it as a savings machine that costs less to operate than other electric heating/cooling systems now on the market. You know that all air—even frigid arctic air—contains heat. The heat pump just puts this simple principle to work. In winter, it squeezes heat from outside air and pumps it inside. In summer, it extracts unwanted heat from the inside air and pumps it outdoors.

Or consider something already in your home that accomplishes the same thing as a heat pump: your refrigerator. It removes heat from the interior of the box and expels it. Like a refrigerator, the heat pump's basic components are simple—electric motor, compressor, condenser, evaporator and blower system. Unlike a refrigerator, the heat pump has a reversing valve that lets it change the direction warm air is pumped—inside in winter, outside in summer.

The McLean area has the prospect of a good crop year as sorghum and cotton have about finished growing. Sorghum harvest has started and cotton is approaching harvest time. Both of these should make above average yields anticipated rather than the "prices" of farm products.

CATTLE MARKETING SHORT COURSE

A Livestock Marketing Short Course will be held November 1st and 2nd in Pampa at the Gray County Courthouse Annex meeting room starting at 7:00 p.m. each night. This educational activity was planned by our County Livestock Program Building Committee to assist producers in learning how to do a better job of marketing what they produce.

Dr. Ernest Davis, Extension Livestock Marketing specialist will present the program which will include: Market Situation and Outlook, sources of market information, marketing alternatives an use of futures and hedging. The program will be interesting and practical exercises in the use of hedging will be presented. Mark these dates on your calendar and plan to attend. Some idea you hear may help you make a profit next year.

CORN CONDITION KEY TO CALVING

The key to having a corn calve every 12 month period is to keep the cow's body in good condition. Delayed re-breeding means fewer pounds of calf weaned per year and is money lost. For cows to have a high reproductive rate, they must have adequate levels of energy before and after calving. Divide cow herds into three groups based on body condition—thin, moderate and good. Feed accordingly for 90 to 100 days before calving is scheduled. This will give the cows the opportunity to gain some needed weight with extra feed to maintain their status, some may even be too fat and can lose some weight.

PEACH TREE BORERS
 Now is the time to treat Peach trees infested with

peach tree borers. These are the borers that infest fruit trees near the soil level. If you have borers up in your fruit trees well above the ground, then you probably have the lesser Peach tree borer.

To treat Peach tree borers you can use para-dichlorobenzene crystals.

For the lesser Peach borers, which cause damage above the ground in the tree trunk and limbs, control borers in wounds by painting affected areas with PD and dormant oil. Prepare this mixture by dissolving 2 pounds of PDB in 1 gallon of miscible dormant oil and diluting with 2 gallon of water. Treat only affected areas and do not circle the entire trunk or limb. Apply on a warm, sunny day after trees have shed all foliage; do not apply when fruit is present.
