Avoiding Milk Fever.

When pasturage is not available succulent food, such as silage, is very desirable for breeding animals, more so, of course, for cows than horses, as it helps to keep the system relaxed and does not produce an undue amount of fat, says Professor A. M. Soule, Milk fever, or what is generally known as parturient apoplex, is one of the most dangerous diseases with which the breeder has to contend, and it is more likely to occur when the breeding animals are fed on dry roughness and rich meals, such as corn meal and cotton-seed meal. 
