Thoughts For Thursday

In this day when pious super patriots run their radars day and night in search of cracks in our spiritual and political morality when both God and Rev. Billy Hargis are listed as proponents of their cause, it seems a little strange that these "religious" prophets seem to exhibit such little evangelistic concern for their brothers in other lands.

The same Bible which teaches that the principles of Communism are wrong also teaches that the haves have an obligation to the have nots. It tells something of a Good Samaritan. This might even be interpreted to mean what some people call "foreign aid."

Walter Lippman writes, "The poor wretches who have to sell foreign aid to Congress have been taught that they are advocates of an act of unnatural generosity. The cardinal rule is that they must avoid the suspicion that our motives in giving foreign aid are in the smallest degree disinterested. They must hide any compassion that they may have or any feeling that the powerful and the rich have obligations to the weak and the poor. The accepted way to get the money voted is for the President to cross his heart and swear that every dollar will be used to hire allies and to confound our adversaries."

"I do not think I have overstated very much the squalor of the annual argument. Of course, our missions abroad tell the foreigners that we wish them well. It has even been whispered by reckless men in Washington that we would wish to help the poor even if the Soviet Union and China disappeared completely and troubles us no more. But benevolence abroad must be hidden when the real business begins of persuading the Congressional committees to vote the money."

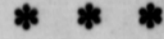
It is true that foreign aid can be justified for mercenary reasons. We would hate to have a family of 15 living across the alley from us, starving to death, living in disease and squalor, all through no fault of its own. Physically, we wouldn't feel that our home and property were safe if such a family could see the food and clothing we wasted from day to day, extravagant comforts and luxuries on every hand.

But we feel that there would be more compelling motives for sharing with this family. And we don't think we should apologize for these more compelling motives.

Lippman summarizes by suggesting that our soft talk abroad makes us look like suckers at home, and the tough talk at home makes us look hypocritical abroad.

Why not quit our lying about foreign aid? Why not be honest both with ourselves and with our neighbors? If we oppose it, let's admit the reason for our objection. If we approve it, why apologize for being Christian in our relations with our neighbors.

Representation Sorta Lopsided?

A proposed Constitutional Amendment has been introduced in the Texas Legislature aimed at correcting some inequities in representation on Commissioners Courts in a lot of Texas counties but it isn't likely to get much farther than that because the County Judges and Commissioners Association, one of the most powerful lobbies in the state, is opposing it.

Still, the proposal offered by Rep. Lindsey Rodriguez of Hidalgo makes considerable sense, and would correct some of the more glaring inequities.

Under Rodriguez' plan, if the total number of votes cast in two or more commissioners' precincts amount to less than 20% of the total vote cast in the election of all four commissioners, the commissioners in the small precincts would be required to run on a countywide-at-large basis.

Eighty Texas counties, in which two county precincts or more represent a minor fraction of the total county vote, would be affected, and Hemphill county could be one of them.

Rodriguez describes the most extreme example of the situation he's trying to cure as that in Kleberg county where two of the county's four commissioners' precincts "are behind locked gates" on the King Ranch, where 80 voters live.

His solution, of course, would affect only the worst of the inequities, and still leave scores of Texas counties with lopsided representation on the Commissioners Court (Hemphill might be a borderline case)... but if the County Judges and Commissioners Association is opposed to the measure, it isn't likely ever to get as far as the public voting stage.

Track Teaches

The school year is about over and with it comes the end of another successful athletic year. It was a successful athletic year because another group of youngsters learned what it is to compete and the sacrifices necessary for victory. Probably none learned the lesson better than those competing in track and field events.

The entire program of interscholastic and intramural sports is set up to teach children to compete, to sacrifice for victory, to accept defeat and to develop strong bodies. These lessons are driven home more drastically in track and field than in any other sport. There is no place in the sport for the weak and faint hearted. At no time can a track competitor slack up and let his teammates carry the load. The victory goes to the individual who wants it the most. Because of the individual competition it is the best from every team that advances. The hard workers and the strong are not required to carry those who do not care to put forth the effort to excell.

It is not always the boy with the most ability that wins in track, a majority of the time it is the boy who can combine ability and hard work that wins. So often in track talk, one hears, "he had the most ability, but he quit or ran out of gas in the stretch." And, while the quitters are quickly noted there is no criticism for the contestant who gave his best and failed to capture any points.

If you want your son to learn the toughest lesson in competition and excelling as an individual, then hand him a pair of track shoes. If he can fill them he has learned a valuable lesson.



Elsewhere on this editorial page (Calm Opinions) you will find a mushy editorial by H. M. Baggarly of the Tulia Herald promoting foreign aid because it is our Christian duty.

We realize, of course, that nothing the "Cradle to grave people" do is wrong in Baggarly's thinking. However, we cannot believe he thinks foreign aid is fulfilling our Christian obligations to be our brother's keeper. Tacking that thinking on to the reason for foreign aid is about like the political candidates who make a big thing out of their church membership.

We agree that many people are going to have to account for their lack of interest in the welfare of the sick, downtrodden, and hungry, but the billions in foreign aid will not count much on the debt. It does not count because too few of the needy people of the world ever see any of the help.

In a big part of the world where our foreign aid goes, there are two classes of people, the filthy rich and the filthy.

It is the first group that operates the country. They have not shared their own wealth with their masses and they are not sharing the new found source of gold. If the billions in foreign aid have been going down to the people, why have their conditions not improved? If you think the people get a big part of the money, just talk to people who have visited, worked or been stationed in some of the countries that are up on the help list.

We know H. M., that you believe the government and superior planners can do everything better, but charity and compassion for your fellowman is not something that can be turned over to someone else. You mentioned something about a Good Samaritan. Remember, he did not send a bigger tax return to Rome and tell them to do the good work, he started the project and then left his money with an honest individual to complete the task.

We agree that we should be honest and quit lying about foreign aid. Let us admit that foreign aid is being continued long past its need because many powerful people on this and the other side of the pond are being made richer by it. And, there are just as many elephants as mules with their heads in the feed bag.

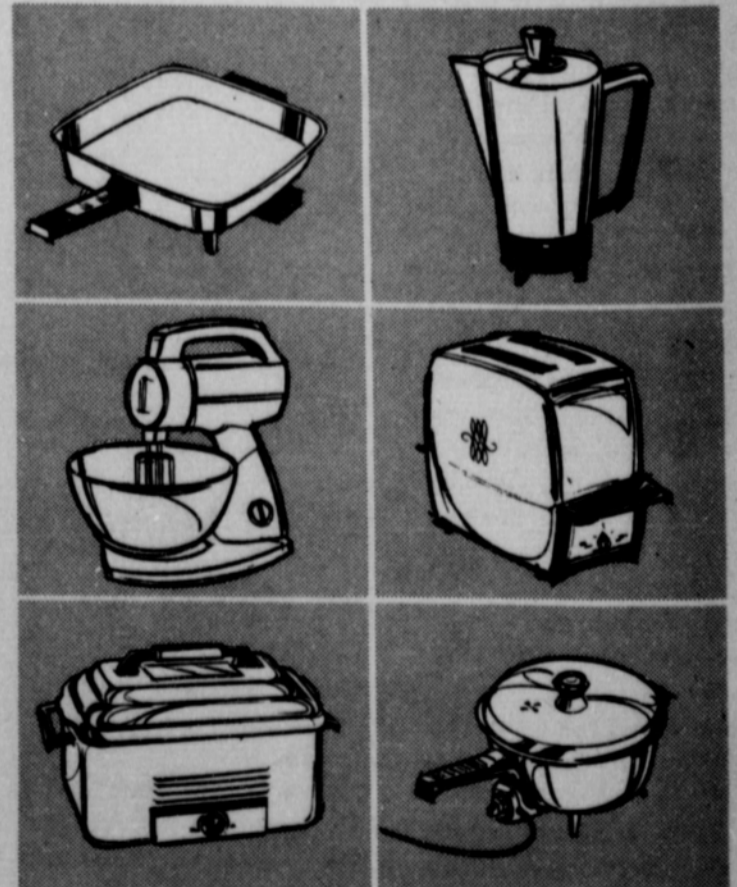

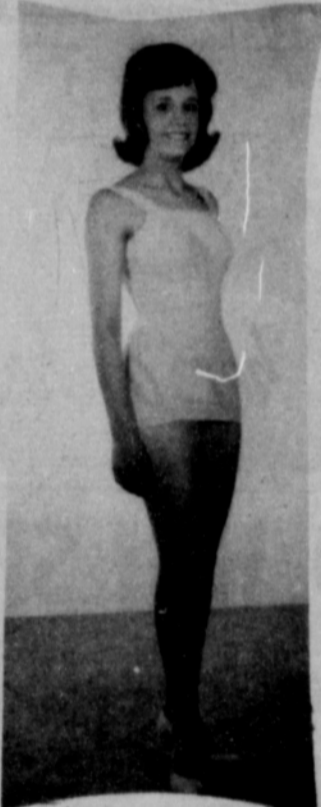

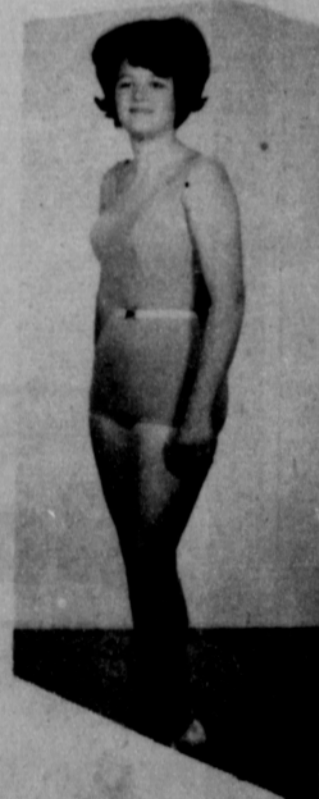

## Five County Men Develop Soil Conservation Contracts

W. M. Murrell, Don Robinson, Joel Stavlo, Eugene Wood, and F. K. Banister have recently developed Great Plains Conservation Program Contracts. This brings the total in the Hansford Soil Conservation District to 51 contracts. The contracts cover 70,000 acres and have \$125,000 cost share obligated to these 51 farmers and ranchers.

Sherman County Farmers have developed a total of 8 Great Plains Contracts covering 8400 acres with \$24,000 cost share obligated. N. F. and Ralph Renner were the last Sherman County Farmers to develop Great Plains Contracts in October 1962. Sherman County farmers and ranchers may make application for this program at their ASC Office.

This program was set up in 1958. It is a program which a farmer or rancher can use to treat all his soil and water conservation problems on a planned basis.

He may receive free assistance on working out his Engineering, Soils, Range, or Agronomy problems from Soil Conservation Service Technicians, the County Agent, or other agriculture department.

After he works out what he plans to do to solve his Soil and Water Conservation Problems he submits his plans to the Soil Conservation Service. If his plan is acceptable as one that treats all the conservation needs of his place, he will receive guaranteed Cost Share Assistance to do the complete job.

Cost Share Assistance varies from 50% on practices such as Cross-fencing and Dams to 80% on practices such as building waterways and planting grass etc.

He may draw up to \$25,000 and take from 3 to 10 years to complete his work.

Wayne Chapmen, our local SCS Work Unit Conservationist reports that both Hansford and Sherman County will receive a new appropriation July 1. Acceptable Great Plains Plans will be processed and work may be started prior to July 1, with cost

share claimed after that date. His office is in the courthouse in Spearman and is receiving applications. Drop by and discuss your Soil and Water Conservation Program with Wayne and his staff.
