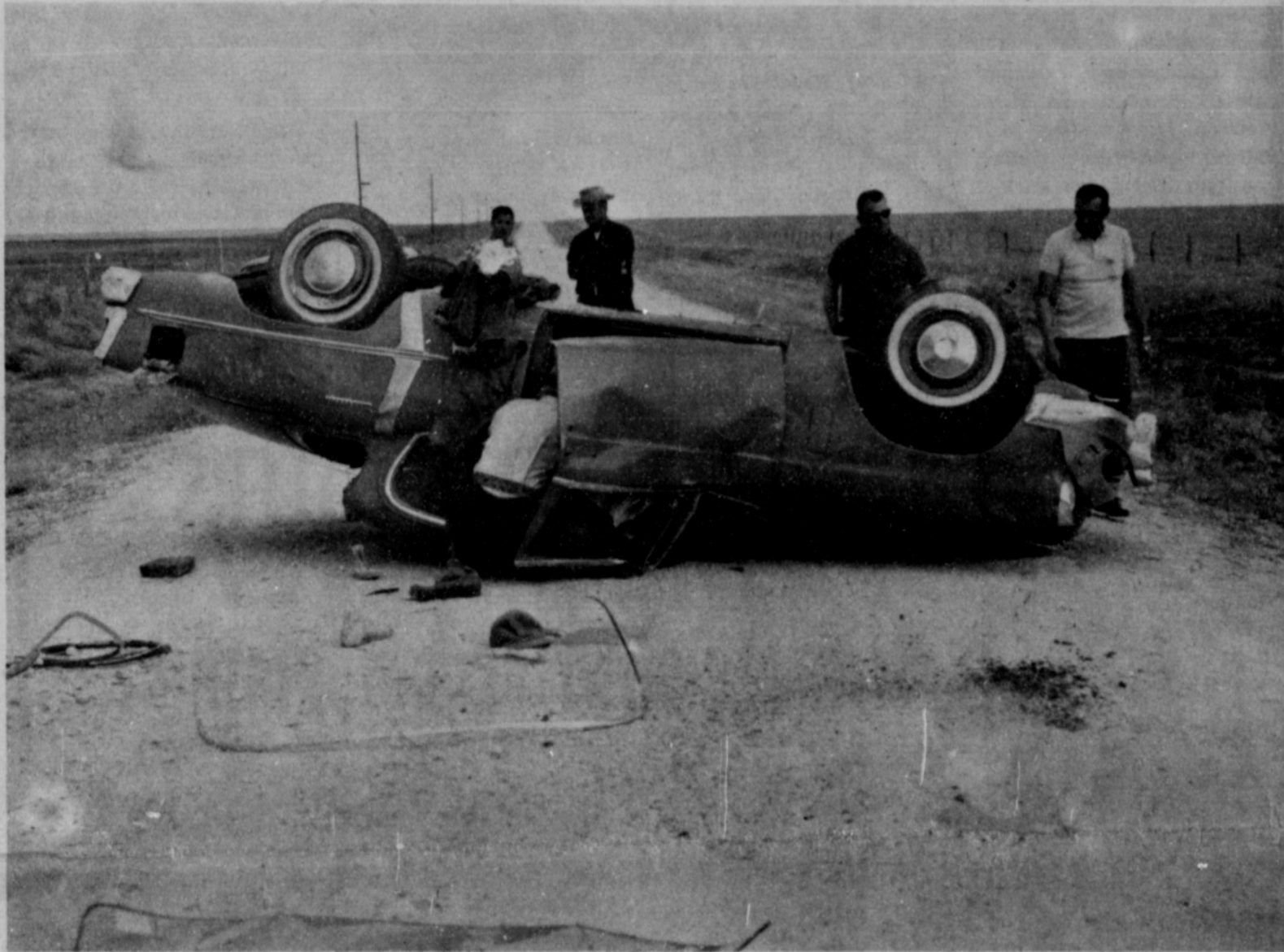




School Election Saturday

Phillips, Borger Men Hurt

Three men from Phillips and Borger were injured in North Hansford County Saturday afternoon in a one car turn-over. The injured men were Hubert J. Hill of 12 S. Johnson of Phillips and Wayne R. Smyrle of 10 S. Johnson in Phillips. The third man was K. C. Messenger of 115 Arline, Borger. The accident was investigated

by Sheriff J. B. Cooke and his deputies. The officers found that the car in which the men were riding was going east on a caliche road about 20 miles north of Spearman in the New Hope area. The car went out of control and turned over. It came to rest on its top in the middle of the road. Injuries suffered by the trio

were treated in Hansford Hospital. Hill remained in the hospital over the weekend, but he suffered no serious injury according to the doctor. Messenger was treated and released.

Smyrle was thrown from the car. Smyrle, the most seriously injured of the trio, was unconscious until Monday. The attending physician said he suffered extensive head injuries.

Callaway, Skinner, Hicks Are New City Councilmen

Spearman's two councilmen seeking re-election were returned to another term in the city election Tuesday. A farmer and real estate developer was the third candidate elected. E. J. Callaway Jr., James K. Hicks and Robert V. Skinner were selected by voters Tuesday to serve two year terms on the Spearman city council. Callaway led the ballot with 173 votes. Skinner was second with 159 and Hicks was third with 149. Virgil Floyd received 139 votes and Frank Emerson 106. Freeman Barkley and T. D. Sansing received one write-in vote each. The third councilman who

completed his term this year, Jimmie Shieldknight, did not seek re-election. Voters also approved the official closing of the small strip of Collard Street by a vote of 173 to 64. The annual elections that create much interest, school board elections, will be held in all area school districts Saturday. There are contests in Spearman, Waka, Precinct Three in the county school board race, and Morse. Only the two incumbents have filed for the Gruver posts. In Spearman, there are three men on the ballot. Incumbent J. D. Helms is seeking re-

election and candidates Roy McClellan and Ira Harbour were placed on the ballot by petition. Floyd (Slim) Cates did not seek re-election to his place on the board. He has served on the school board for 14 years. At Morse there are three candidates, Robin Giblin, Perry Dixon and Jake Giblin. Gruver voters will be voting on their incumbents, Eugene Fletcher and T. C. Harvey, Jr.

Christians Call Pastor

The First Christian Church of Spearman has called a minister to fill the vacancy created when the Rev. John Waddell moved to Arlington. The Rev. W. Graham Pugh from Heavener, Okla., has been elected by the church to be the new pastor. He and his family will move to Spearman in May and he will conduct his first service on Mother's Day. During Easter Week the Rev. Walter Fiscus of Fort Worth will hold four days of services here, including Easter Sunday. The services begin April 11. The Rev. Fiscus is a trustee and speaker for "Partners in Prayer".

There are four candidates seeking three places on the Waka school board. Raferd Clark, Leroy Reeves and Emmitt Drake are completing their terms. Clark and Reeves are seeking another term and Arthur Boese and Eldon Boese are also on the ballot. In the County School Board election, Chesta Lieb and Erlis Pittman are candidates for Precinct Four. Bob Vaughn is candidate for Precinct One and Joe Walker for Precinct Three. Duke Roberts is the candidate for the New Hope School Board. All of the voting will be at the schools in the different districts. Voters will vote on the county board at the places where they vote for their own district board members.

Mrs. Joe Fredrick of Perryton will be the speaker April 7 for the Palm Sunday services. Officials of the church invite all members and friends of the Christian Church to attend these services.

Wind Takes Rain Clouds

This area's monsoon season came to a windy end Tuesday as a strong south wind moved out the moisture that produced the first rain in many weeks. Rainfall in Spearman did little more than remind people that it can rain here. But, to the south, some beneficial amounts of the scarce commodity were recorded. The official measurement in Spearman was .12 Sunday night and .07 Monday night. Ten miles south of Spearman .45 was reported. Eleven miles south at Marvin Jones farm, one inch was reported and near the Skelly plant nine miles southeast .70 was measured. The Holt community reported .50. Only light sprinkles or just thunder were reported to the north and west of Spearman. More than an inch was reported at Perryton, but this turned out to have been a hoax and they received about the same amount as Spearman.

LETTER TO VOTERS OF SPEARMAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT

The past three years as a school trustee of the Spearman Independent School District have been educational as well as a challenge for me, and far from an easy task. In seeking re-election I ask for your vote and confidence. My purpose or aim is to:

- (1) Provide an educational system for all students which will develop each to the maximum of his ability, both mentally and physically.
- (2) Make the school attractive to the teaching profession in order to employ and retain the best qualified in each field.
- (3) Be a representative of the district rather than special groups or individuals.

The first two cannot be accomplished overnight; however, great strides have been made in the past year or two. Our teachers are paid better salaries than ever before; however, we must provide salaries sufficient to retain the qualified teachers now in the system as well as to secure new ones. Salary is not the only item of interest to teachers, and we must continue to seek ways and means of making the system desirable. If we are to train our children we must have qualified instructors and personnel.

It is imperative that we continue with all our efforts to improve the scholastic standing of our school. Approval has been given by the present board of trustees for employing a counsellor and teacher for special education. Additional courses have been and will continue to be made available. In September, we can begin classes with adequate facilities, with the high school being one of the finest in existence containing the most modern equipment.

Even though numerous changes have occurred which have improved the system, we cannot become complacent. We must at least attempt to prepare our children for the era in which they will live.

The enrollment of our school has steadily grown in the past few years, and all indications point to a continuation of this growth. A tremendous tax burden has resulted which is disliked by the board of trustees as well as all taxpayers. This is a further reason why we must produce a school system "second to none" in so far as being able to educate our children. No relief from the tax burden can be foreseen in the immediate future, but we must spend our money wisely in order to avoid additional taxes.

As a candidate for trustee I have dedicated and pledged myself to serve the Spearman Independent School District to the best of my ability. If you desire a superior school system then I solicit your vote and support on April 6th at the polls.

BEWARE HOUSE BILL 510

" A Rose by any other name would smell the same. Do not be fooled by the proponents of House Bill 510. This is compulsory pooling or unitizing legislation of mineral property, not for the benefit of the land, or mineral owner, but for the benefit of the large producers (oilmen).

The present law in Texas permits a mineral owner to lease his property on his own terms and for the consideration he deems best. NO ONE CAN FORCE HIM TO EXECUTE A LEASE; however, under compulsory pooling such as House Bill 510, if the mineral owner does not agree to the oilmen's terms and consideration then it can be automatically pooled for production, with regard to property lines, by a governmental agency. Who controls such an agency ?

House Bill 510 will not make fortunes for the mineral owner, but will increase the fortunes of larger oil companies; however, this is not the greatest DANGER of the bill. The bill will actually take away rights which have heretofore been so dear to all Americans. The present bill deals with mineral properties, but if the people of Texas permit such legislation, the next move could be similiar legislation for joint operation of surface and other properties.

If the proposed legislation is for the purpose of securing everyone his "Fair Share" then why haven't the proponent oilmen developed the leased properties where pooling is not necessary in a fair and equitable manner ? The real reason for the proposed legislation is that property owners are tired of giving their land away and are demanding better leases which protect some of their interests, and the oilmen are trying to force everyone to their terms by legislation of this nature.

Small tracts are not the properties which are over-producing. Regulations are such that allowables are based upon acreage in each unit, the small tracts receiving a reduced allowable.

Who are the members of the Committee for Equitable Development of Texas Oil & Gas Resources? From what source is the committee receiving revenue for its extensive campaign ?

Yes, we are fair-minded Texans who believe in fair play, square dealing and mutual respect for personal and property rights; and we further believe in the individual retaining unto himself a few property rights and especially the right to deal with his property in such a manner as he may deem advisable. This is the reason we are contacting our Senator and Representative in Austin asking them to vote against House Bill 510 or any facsimile thereof. You should also voice your opinion or it may be too late.

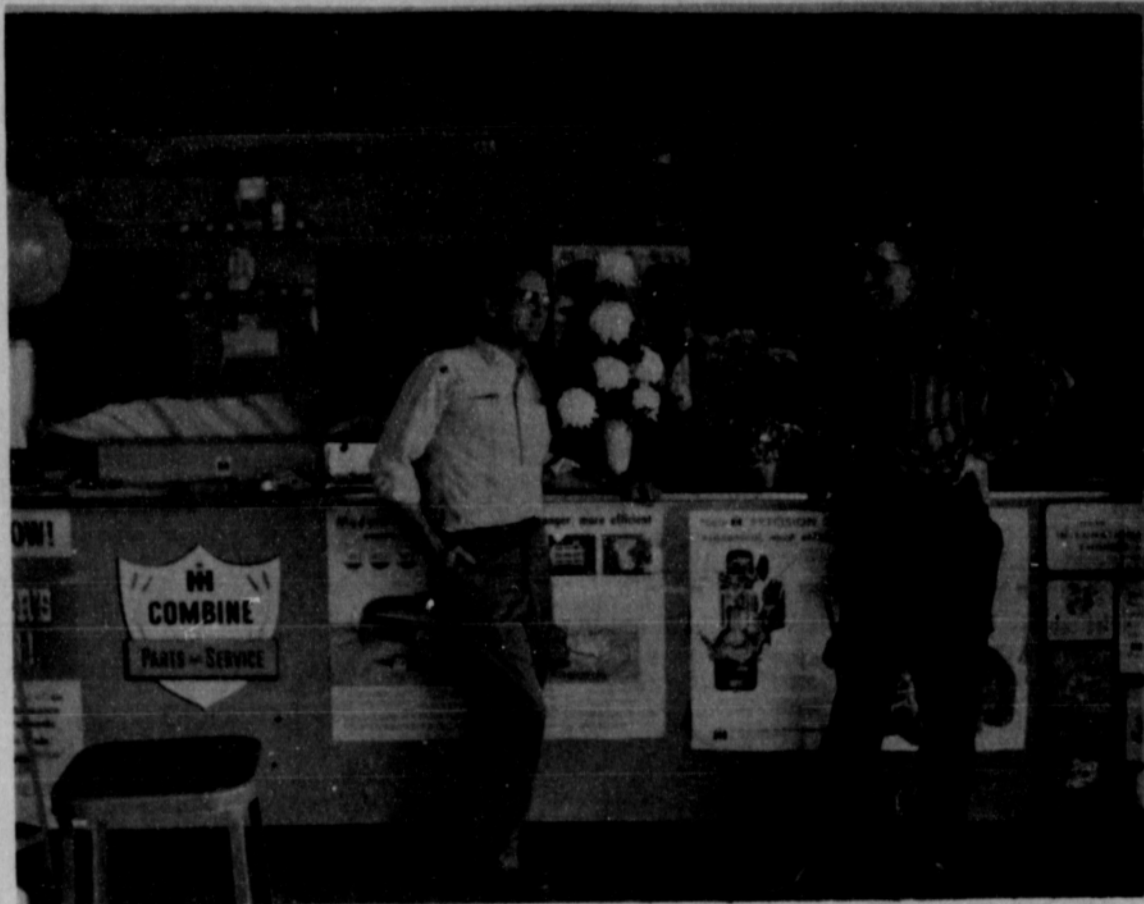

County Agent's Report

County Agent Robert Adamson and co-workers from some 20 other wheat producing counties will meet in Amarillo Thursday afternoon, April 4, to obtain detailed information on the approaching wheat referendum.

Similar meetings will be held in six other Texas cities. The meetings will all be conducted by a panel of A & M College specialists headed by John E. Hutchison, director of the extension service.

In these meetings, agents will receive material and training to prepare them to conduct educational programs on the issue.

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capital

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Texas' Padre Island National Seashore project is getting closer and closer to reality.

Already approved by Congress, it now is waiting for financing by the U. S. and approval by the State of Texas. Project could become a vast tourist attraction for Texas.

Final version of the bill giving the state's submerged lands in Laguna Madre and the state's approval of the project was worked out in conference committee. It won Senate approval. House endorsement virtually is assured.

This will convert the northern 81 miles of Padre Island into a natural reservation of seashore, to be kept unspoiled for the enjoyment of future generations.

LOANS -- One phase of the battle over interest rates has ended. But more rounds likely are to come.

Senate spent two tough days in debate before passing a bill which allows those who lend \$1,500 or less to charge more than 10 per cent interest. It does not apply to banks, savings and loan institutions, credit unions and many types of cooperative lending organizations. But it does apply to all finance companies.

Sponsors of the bill wanted to allow more than 10 per cent interest on loans up to \$3,000. But the Senate cut it down to \$1,500. Rates as high as 464 per cent were permitted on loans as small as \$5, under a fixed fee basis of calculating charges on loans under \$100.

Further revision in the House, and probably thereafter in conference committee, is expected.

NETS -- While one state agency was burning fishing nets, another was advertising for bids to buy some net. So a law change sailed through the Legislature to put a stop to that.

Old law says that when Game & Fish Commission men find an illegal net, they confiscate it, advertise for the owner, and when he does not appear to claim it, they burn it.

New law will say that when they get to the burning stage, they can give it to the Marine Research agencies of the University of Texas or Texas A&M.

BILLS KILLED -- Legislators appear to have killed some hot proposals.

One is the effort to abolish the state tax on property. Senate voted 23-4 to kill a proposed constitutional amendment to do away with the smallest part of that tax -- that which furnishes cash for state office buildings and pensions for old Texas Rangers and Confederate widows.

House killed a bill by Rep. Howard Green of Fort Worth to prevent city councils from saying that employees of their cities must live in the cities.

Also, House killed a proposal by Rep. "Red" Berry of San Antonio to allow 18-year-olds to vote. It got a bare majority -- 72-71 -- but as a constitutional amendment, it needed a two-thirds majority. Berry abandoned his proposal to allow betting on horse races in Bexar County.

Another bill to regulate companies which sell funerals in advance on the easy payment or "lay-away" plan was killed on a point of order.

FASTER SPEEDS -- The long talked-about proposal to allow 70 miles an hour speeds on open highways went to Gov. John Connally for signature.

Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo was the sponsor.

Proposal sets top speed at 70, but gives State Highway Department the power to reduce that speed limit where it is not safe.

LICENSE FEES -- House passed a bill to exempt anhydrous ammonia tanks from the license plate fee if they weigh less than 4,000 pounds and are on wheels. If weight is between 4,000 and 10,000, license fee will be \$5.

Cotton seed trailers were given the same treatment, extending to them the exemption which already applies to stock trailers.

Senate action now is required. HOME-TOWN TREATMENT -- A program aimed to save money and do a better job on treating mental illness went to Governor Connally for signature.

Rep. Malcolm McGregor of El Paso and Sen. Don Kennard of Fort Worth sponsored the plan. It allows the Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools to contract with local city or county hospitals to treat mentally ill or tuberculars in their home counties.

Authorization of such a program on a statewide basis followed a test at El Paso which proved highly successful from both medical and financial standpoints.

STUDY ORDERED -- A group of 25 Texans to be named by Governor Connally will take a long look at the state's system of education beyond the high school. Bill to allow him to appoint such a group went to his desk.

Group will report back to the next Legislature in 1965.

LAND FUSS -- A dispute over ownership of 1,812 acres of land in Laguna Madre in Cameron County has resulted in a House resolution by Rep. Eligio (Kika) de la Garza of McAllen.

Resolution now is in a House State Affairs subcommittee. It would allow J. W. Luttes and Shell Oil Company to sue the state and establish title to the Laguna Madre tract.

WATER FOR ALICE -- The city of Alice in Jim Wells County proposes to solve its water problem by creating a reservoir to capture water from Chiltipin Creek and by drawing on Lake Corpus Christi for an additional supply.

Project was approved by the Texas Water Commission.

Alice has been depending on wells, but C. R. Marks, engineer for the project, said the wells are no longer sufficient. However, they will be continued in use after the Chiltipin-Lake Corpus Christi program is completed.

SLICK OPERATORS IN LIQUOR -- An illicit liquor scheme, being worked along the Texas border in such a way as to escape taxes, is the target of Rep. John E. Blaine of El Paso.

He says his bill -- or the committee substitute for it -- would mean thousands of additional dollars to state and federal governments.

Bill, which is in a House Liquor Regulation subcommittee, would authorize Liquor Control Board to require a bonded liquor exporter, with a state license fee of \$750 per year, and eliminate a "boot-legging" operation along the border, Blaine said.

Operation, which is devious and complex, would be hampered by requiring the Texas-Mexican liquor traffic to

move by common carrier.

CANDY BARR -- Governor Connally approved recommendation of the Board of Pardons & Paroles to parole Juanita Dale Phillips, known as Candy Barr, who has been serving a prison sentence for narcotics violation.

SHORT, SHORT SNORTS

Governor Connally urged Congress to reject the changes in oil and gas tax laws proposed by President Kennedy...

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr said he will send an assistant to help in the Jim Wells County grand jury investigation of last November's general election...

Hardin, Jasper, Stonewall and Tyler Counties are among those for whom hospital district laws are being passed under a new constitutional authority. If legislators authorize them, voters in the counties can tax themselves to set up and operate hospitals...

Rep. Charles Wilson of Trinity wants to outlaw professional boxing in Texas, as an aftermath of deaths of fighters...

A Senate committee killed a bill which would have prohibited the state of local units of government from discriminating against anyone because of sex, race, creed, color or national origin.

Vote was 12-4... Flying while intoxicated will be against the law if Governor Connally signs a bill to that effect by Rep. Stanford Smith of San Antonio...

Texasans who run crop-dusting services want a state licensing agency, but there is legislative resistance to setting up any new state agencies.

Trend this year is to abolish them, not create them... Higher retirement benefits for teachers will be possible under a bill by Rep. George Hinson of Mineola awaiting the Governor's signature.

Rep. Alonzo Jamison of Denton, one of the original sponsors of the bill, voted against it on final passage because he felt it had lost its original purpose -- improvement of benefits for those who retired when teacher salaries were low.
