



School Board Employes Three New Instructors

Two teachers were hired and one tentatively hired Tuesday night by the Spearman School Board in a session that was talked into the morning hours.

Miss Doris Deere was given a one year's contract as a girl's physical education teacher. Milton Buchanan was hired on a one-year contract to teach language arts in the junior high grades.

Miss Deere is a June graduate of PAMC. She is the daughter of Mrs. Dee Deere, a first grade teacher in the Spearman schools.

Buchanan replaces Miss Pat

Wiens who accepted a position in the Perryton school system. Buchanan holds a master's degree from Austin College and has 24 years teaching experience.

David Laurie was conditionally hired as the second vocational agriculture teacher. Spearman has more than enough agriculture students to qualify for the second teacher but it has not yet been approved by the state. When the second teacher is approved, Laurie will be the teacher.

He is married, has three children and is a graduate of Ok-

lahoma State University. Laurie is a native of Darrouzett and has taught in Mobeetie two years.

The hiring of a counselor and another first grade teacher was delayed until the board can interview the counselor. The two applying for the jobs and recommended by Supt. Bramlett are man and wife.

A long discussion was held concerning the need for a counselor in the school. The board finally voted 3-2 to continue to seek a man to fill the position. One board member was absent.

The board voted to buy two gas ranges from Western Auto, one electric range, a deep freeze-refrigerator and one washer and one dryer from Community Public Service. These items will all be sold to the school at factory price, plus freight. Then each year the companies will replace all these appliances at no cost to the school. Community Pub-

lic Service is replacing one range this year that has been in the school.

The board voted to take a contract rate for electric power offered by Community Public Service under study.

As compensation for the use of the Jaycee Park in the fall as a junior high football practice field, the board paid the organization \$500 to be used for the upkeep and reseeding of the grass on the park.

The board also gave \$300 to be used in the summer youth program this year in Spearman.

A representative of Fred Buford and Associates, architects for the new school, told the board the contractor would meet the completion date on the building and was doing good work.

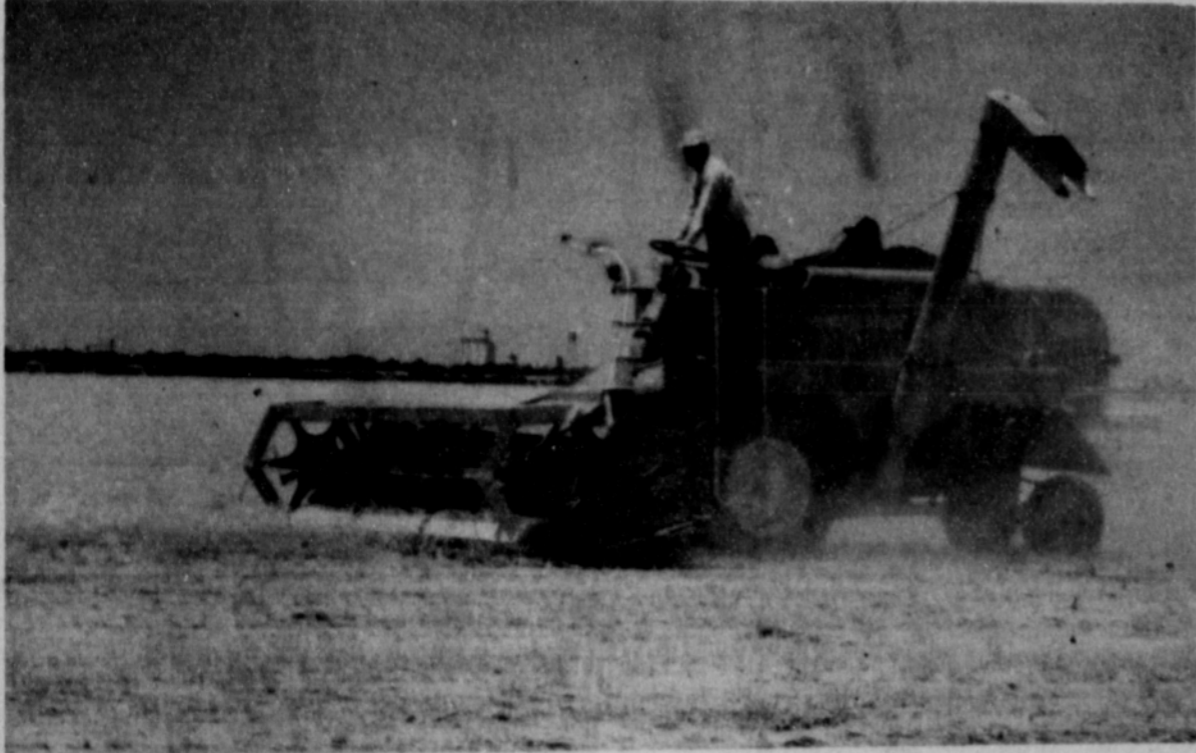
After hearing the report, the board voted to ask Buford to

come to Spearman and meet with them and explain why several things in the building are not being done as the school wants.

A band budget of \$5,700 was approved for the coming year. This included \$2,000 for 25 new uniforms.

Charles Gill was given an afternoon bus route and put in charge of the night study halls. His request to be relieved coaching duties was granted.

More minor equipment for the new building and the offices was purchased. Also flag poles for the new school and the football field were bought.

One Injured

Worker Electrocuted On Water Rig Mishap

One man was killed and another injured when a water well drilling rig contacted an electrical power line northwest of Farnsworth Saturday afternoon.

Electrocuted in the accident was Truman Odell Reed, 28, of Spearman. Bob Marshall received burns on the feet, stomach and hands, according to the attending physician.

Marshall was treated at Hansford Hospital and released Saturday afternoon.

The accident happened on a drilling site two miles west and four miles north of Farnsworth.

Funeral services for Mr. Reed were conducted at 2 p. m. Monday in the First Methodist Church in Spearman with the Rev. Charles Gates, pastor, conducting the service. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery in Pampa.

The water well drilling operator has lived in Spearman for a year and a half. He was born Feb. 20, 1935 in New Mexico. He lived in Pampa before moving to Spearman.

He was a member of the Methodist Church and a veteran of military service.

Survivors included his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur

Reed of Spearman, two brother, Thomas L. of Spearman and Donald E. of Albuquerque; one sister, Mrs. James King of Amarillo; two grandmothers, Mrs. T. H. Coffin of Pampa and Mrs. Edith Reed of Borger. Pallbearers were Bob Close, Bob Pylant, Max Taylor, Billy Joe Reed, Richard Holton and Dean Howard.

Harvest Hits Full Speed

It's an early wheat harvest time and from the speed it is moving the small number of irrigated acres will be harvested before the normal starting date for harvest.

The first loads of wheat started moving to the elevators in Morse and Gruver on June 5. Spearman got its first wheat on June 6. Since that time the harvest has picked up steam.

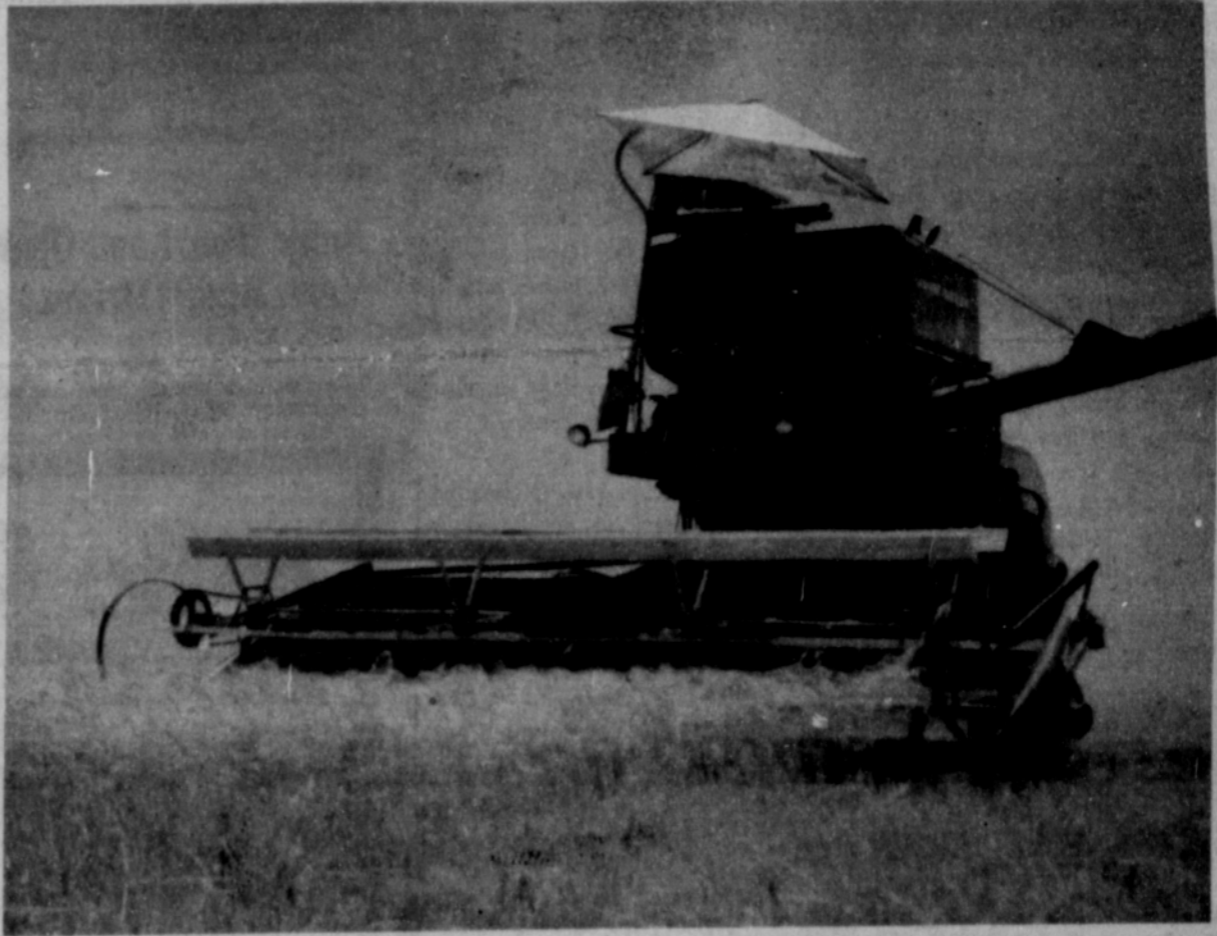
There is very little dryland wheat to cut and much of that has been abandoned after the combines made a few rounds. The best report on dryland wheat was an unofficial eight bushels per acre.

Irrigated wheat is covering a wide yield range. From lows of 15 bushels per acre in fields stunted by disease to as much as 50 bushels per acre in some of the better areas.

Rain Fails To Dampen Irrigation Drilling

The rains have brought the grass to the land and smiles to faces, but they have not stopped the irrigation well business.

Dallasene Reynolds, Secretary of the Water District Office here, said Wednesday morning that she has not noticed any big slow down in well applications.

"We now have six applications waiting for approval. They all came in since the rains started," she said.

Since Jan. 1, of this year, there have been 125 applications for wells and five of these have been cancelled.

If all of these applications turn into wells, the county will have 404 farm irrigation wells. This would be less than half the number of wells the county has water and room for.

Soil Conservation Service boss here, Wayne Chapman, said the

county has 357,500 acres of land which has water and is suitable for irrigation.

With this much land suitable for irrigation, Chapman says the county could easily have 1,000 irrigation wells, or about one on every half section.

FHA Loans Are Available For Irrigation, Water Systems

The county Farmers Home Administration office at Perryton, now serving Hutchinson, Hansford, Ochiltree, and Lipscomb counties, provides credit to farmers, other eligible individuals, and groups of farmers or rural residents. The kinds of financial assistance available include loans for water systems for irrigation, domestic water, land development, and soil conservation. Funds are available for construction or repair of ponds, tanks, and terraces as well as for the installation of underground pipe and all other irrigation needs. Loans are also made to clear and level land, carry out basic land treatment practices, construct fences, and establish permanent pastures. The interest rate for this type loan is 5%, and it is scheduled for repayment in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay over a period not exceeding forty years.

Watershed loans may be made to local organizations to help finance projects that protect develop land and water resources in small watersheds. These loans are made only when watershed plans are approved by the Soil Conservation Service.

In addition to the individual soil and water loans and to the watershed loans, this agency provides credit for farm oper-

ating, purchase of farm land, and for the construction and repair of dwellings and farm service buildings. This housing loans bears interest at four percent and is scheduled for repayment as appropriate with the maximum repayment period of 33 years. Emergency loans are made to eligible farmers in designated areas where natural disasters such as drought have brought about a temporary need for credit not available from other sources.

A new loan authority for the purpose of helping family farm-

ers earn additional income by developing recreational facilities on the farm was authorized by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1962. Overnight accommodations for vacationers, a small community golf course, and production of game for controlled hunting are some of the first enterprises financed nationwide under this authority.

Farmers Home Administration loans of all types are made only on a supplemental basis. Technical farm and financial management assistance is supplied with loans where it is needed.

Fly Factory Will Be Enlarged To Fight Worms

The fight to eradicate the bothersome screwworm from the Southwest is receiving increased momentum as the plant in which sexually-sterile screw-worm flies are reared is being modified to facilitate production of more than 130 million flies per week.

Officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program announced that the increase in sterile flies should be available by mid-July. The additional flies will be used to combat isolated screwworm outbreaks outside of the area where the insect can normally survive winter temperatures, as

well as to eliminate native flies in the southern parts of Texas and New Mexico which comprise the overwintering area.

No increase in building space is required in order to expand production, officials stated. Some modifications of existing equipment are necessary and an increase in personnel and cost of production and distribution is expected.

The plant near Mission was completed in June 1962 and was designed to produce an average of 50 million flies per week with a top production of 75 million. As a result of ex-

perimentation that developed many improvements in fly-rearing techniques, more than 100 million flies have been produced each week for several months with little change in original plant and equipment.

The announcement that the "fly factory" is to be modified comes at a time when Southwestern farmers and ranchers are experiencing less than 10% as many screwworm infestations as last year. Since Jan. 1, 1963, about 1,200 screwworm cases have been reported in the eradication area composed of Tex., New Mexico, Oklahoma, Ark. and Louisiana, in contrast with more than 8,500 cases reported for the same period in 1962.

Despite the marked decrease in infestations, officials have warned that livestock producer cannot afford to relax their vigilance. Stockmen should continue to look for wounds invested with larvae and immediately report infestations by collecting larvae samples from wounds and sending them to the Mission laboratory or taking them to the local county agent.

Production Down

Agriculture Department estimated this year's wheat crop today at 1,084,095,000 bushels.

This is 40,424,000 bushels less than last month's forecast of 1,124,519,000 bushels. It compared with 1,091,787,000 produced last year and with 1,225,262,000 for the five-year (1957-61) average.

This year's crop is being grown under federal planting allotments and marketing quotas supplemented by a voluntary acreage reduction program providing for payments to cooperators. The combined measures are designed to prevent further overproduction at a time when there is a surplus of the grain.

Teachers Study On Scholarships

Two Spearman science teachers are this summer studying on National Foundation Science Scholarships.

Edwin Percy, the seventh and eighth grade science teacher, is at Kansas State University at Manhattan, Kan., studying courses in meteorology and geology.

County Agents' Report

Kids today run everything around the house-except errands.

USE 2, 4-D CAREFULLY

With all the rain we've had recently there could be a lot of weeds controlled with 2, 4-D. Farmers are urged to use caution in applying 2, 4-D near cotton as it is a very susceptible crop.

The safest thing a farmer can do in using 2, 4-D near cotton is to use the amine salts or low volatile esters of 2, 4-D, spray when the wind is blowing away from susceptible crops and toward the area being sprayed, talk with cotton farmers before applying 2, 4-D.

PRICKLYPEAR CONTROL

I have noticed the pricklypear showing up pretty good on many ranches. Want to control it? This could be a good summer for controlling pricklypear as a wet summer or ample moisture increases effective-

Evaporation Study Made

Hexadecanol, a commercial alcohol product, has been used in limited experiments to reduce evaporation of moisture from soil by 43%.

This finding by scientists of the US Department of Agriculture and the Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station may point the way toward the solution of one of agriculture's most challenging problems-how to reduce loss of soil moisture from evaporation.

It is estimated that 123 million acre-feet of water evaporates annually from cropped and fallow land in the 17 Western States, where water resources are often inadequate for agricultural and other uses. This loss represents about 43% of the water used annually in all homes, industry and agriculture of the continental US.

In the Colorado tests, hexadecanol was applied to the soil at rates of 660, 3,320 and 16,600 pounds per acre. It was mixed with the surface quarter-inch of soil; mixed uniformly with all of the soil in the container; layered 1 inch below the soil surface and layered 3 inches below the soil surface.

Water was added to saturate the treated soil and the amount of water lost by evaporation was recorded for 10 days. This cycle was continued for 14 months.

ness of chemicals used. The best method of control is to use 2, 4, 5-T in diesel oil or kerosene. The correct solution can be prepared by mixing 1 gallon 2, 4, 5-T containing 5 lbs. acid per gallon of diesel oil or kerosene. The solution should be agitated or shaken to keep the solution properly mixed. Both sides of the pads as well as the base of the plant should be sprayed in the hottest part of the summer. This same mixture also will control mesquite and yucca, applied to the individual plants.

LIGHT FOR EGG PRODUCERS

With the longest day of the year, June 21, right around the corner, Bill Cawley, Extension poultryman, says decreasing day length is a problem that will soon be confronting egg producers.

He suggests that you calculate the number of hours of light, both natural and artificial, that your birds are getting on that day and see that this amount is not allowed to decrease. Normally, Cawley says, we do not think of day length hours decreasing until about September 1, but such is not the case. Actually, there is a gradual decrease in daylight hours that will amount to 1 hour and 3 minutes per day by August 21, and a full 2 hours by September 1. This can be a critical factor in your egg production program.
