# Pipeline Construction Starting Here

A 93-mile pipeline will be constructed from the Michigan-Wisconsin Plant in northern Hansford County to the Wheeler gas field.

A crew for the R. H. Fulton Pipeline Construction started unloading pipe here Saturday morning. There will be a pipe yard here and one at Bernstein.

A total of 500,000 tons of 20 inch pipe is scheduled to be un-

loaded here this week. A Santa Fe agent said this is probably the largest single shipment of pipe ever sent to Spearman. There will be about 200 cars of pipe.

Ford Bacon and Davis Engineering Co. is in charge of building the line for the Michigan-Wisconsin organization and R. H. Fulton Construction Co. is the contractor for the line.

The Gagebee-Creek Extension, a 20-inch line, will be started at the Michigan-Wisconsin plant and run southeast to Wheeler County. It will pass just north and east of Spearman and will join a gathering system just north of Wheeler.

Jeff Touzet will be the inspector for the Ford Bacon Davis

firm. Two more men from that firm will be here also.

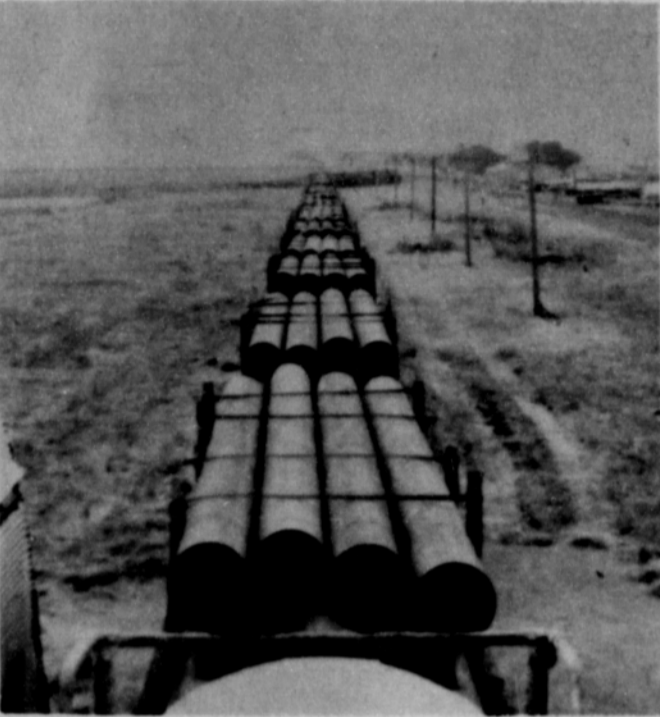
H. M. (Smokey) Kirby and Frank Tidwell are in charge of the Fulton crew.

Kirby said Saturday he was not sure how many families would move to Spearman with his firm. He said there would be at least 50 families and probably more.

"Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas are home for some of our workers and they may send their families home and just stay here while at work," he commented.

The Fulton crew coming here has been in Washington on a pipeline job.

The construction crew expects to be in the Spearman area until November and possibly longer.

## Four Field Stops Set For Annual Field Day

There will be four field stops in the farm tours at the High Plains Research Foundation Ninth Annual Field Day Thursday Sept. 8th. Large trucks equipped with seats will transport visitors over the research farm at Halfway. The tours will continue from 1 to 5 p.m. and will give the guests an opportunity to see many of the 54 research projects underway. The trucks are loaned to the Foundation for the day by

many firms handling agricultural products in the area.

Members of the staff at the Foundation will explain the research underway at the various stops. Guides will accompany each truck and will explain many of the research programs seen enroute. The guides will be men who are professional agricultural leaders familiar with the farm problems of the area. Included among the guides will be County agents, Soil Conservation and Farm Home Administration personnel. Organizing and dispatching the trucks will be Ollie Limer, County Agent of Hale County, Lee Dent, Manager of the Hale Center Chamber of Commerce and Merwyn Igo, board member and Halfway businessman. Members of the Foundation staff who will describe the research underway at the various field stops will be Dr. Arthur F. Gohlke, Senior Soil Scientist and Assistant Director, Barry Love, B.S., M.S., Agronomist; James Valliant B.S. ## Naman Says Farm Bill Is Good

In a letter to the twenty Texas congressmen who voted for the recently passed House version of the farm bill, state Farmers Union president Jay Naman of Waco expressed commendation and appreciation for their favorable vote.

Naman stated that the passage of the farm bill was "a great victory for the farmers and ranchers of Texas; and that the result would be increased net farm income in addition to a reduction of government costs and prevention of the further accumulation of excessive government stocks of surplus farm commodities.

He said that the "great majority of Texas farmers is in strong support of the concepts embodied in this legislation." "Farmers Union has made dramatic membership gains in 1965, . . . and I feel that our opportunities for growth in Texas are unlimited because we support the farm policy views of most commercial family farmers," Naman told the congressmen.

Farmers Union has traditionally supported the direct payment concepts which were extended to wheat and cotton in the recent legislation. The enactment of a four year commodity program, 100 per cent of parity on domestically consumed wheat, a dairy bill including manufacturing milk, and retention of the present rice program were supported by the Farmers Union.

Farmers Union sponsored a Washington Flier Project under the auspices of which sixty Texas farmers and ranchers were flown to Washington during the time the farm bill was being considered by the congress. These representatives whose expenses were paid by the people in their local communities, took documented economic facts from their local financial and business institutions to show members of congress and dramatize the need for good farm legislation.

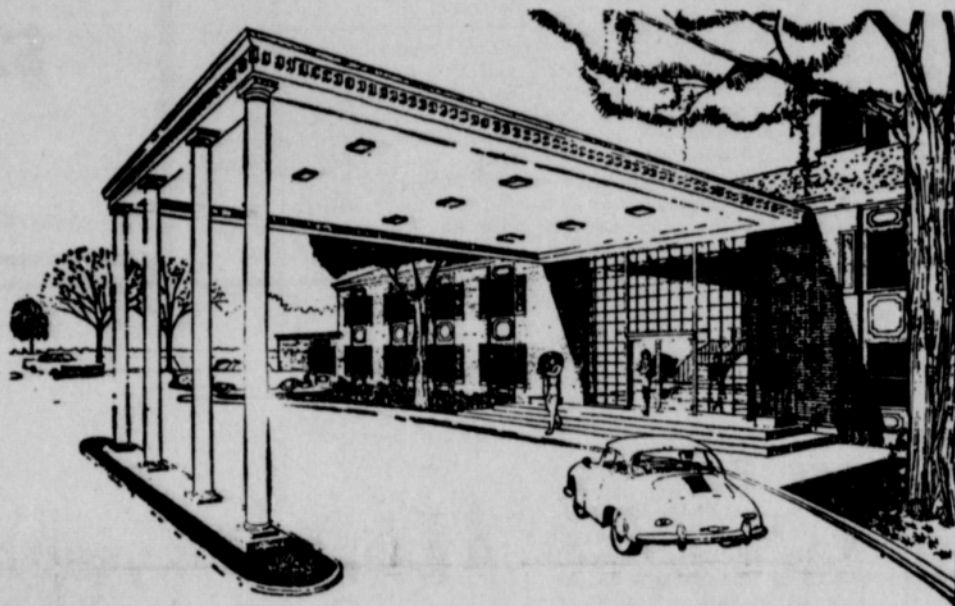

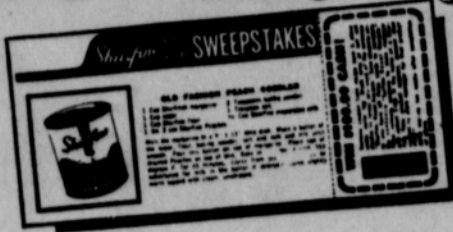
