Contested Elections Attract Big Vote

Where there was a contest in school elections in the area the voters turned out in large numbers to decide the issue.

In Spearman Roy L. McClellan led the ticket with 334 votes. Ira Harbour was the second man elected with 286 votes. Incumbent J. D. Helms was third with 167. Two seats were vacant on the board.

At Morse Jake Clifton was elected with 72 votes and Robin Giblin had 44 to fill the vacancies. Perry Dixon received 28 votes. In the write-ins Paul Preall and Tom Dortch received four each, Wilson McCloy 3 and Gene Brothers 2, and T. C. Harvey Jr., will serve another term.

Duke Roberts was elected at

New Hope.

At Waka Arthur Boeses received 35 votes, Rayford Clark 34, and Leroy Reeves 30 for the three places. Eldon Boeses got 17 votes.

In the only contest County Board race in precinct four, Erlis Pittman received 14 and Chester Lieb 1 in Gruver box, Pittman got 35 at Morse and Lieb 46. Pittman won by 49 to 47.

Joe Walker and Bob Vaughn were returned to the county board from precincts three and one.

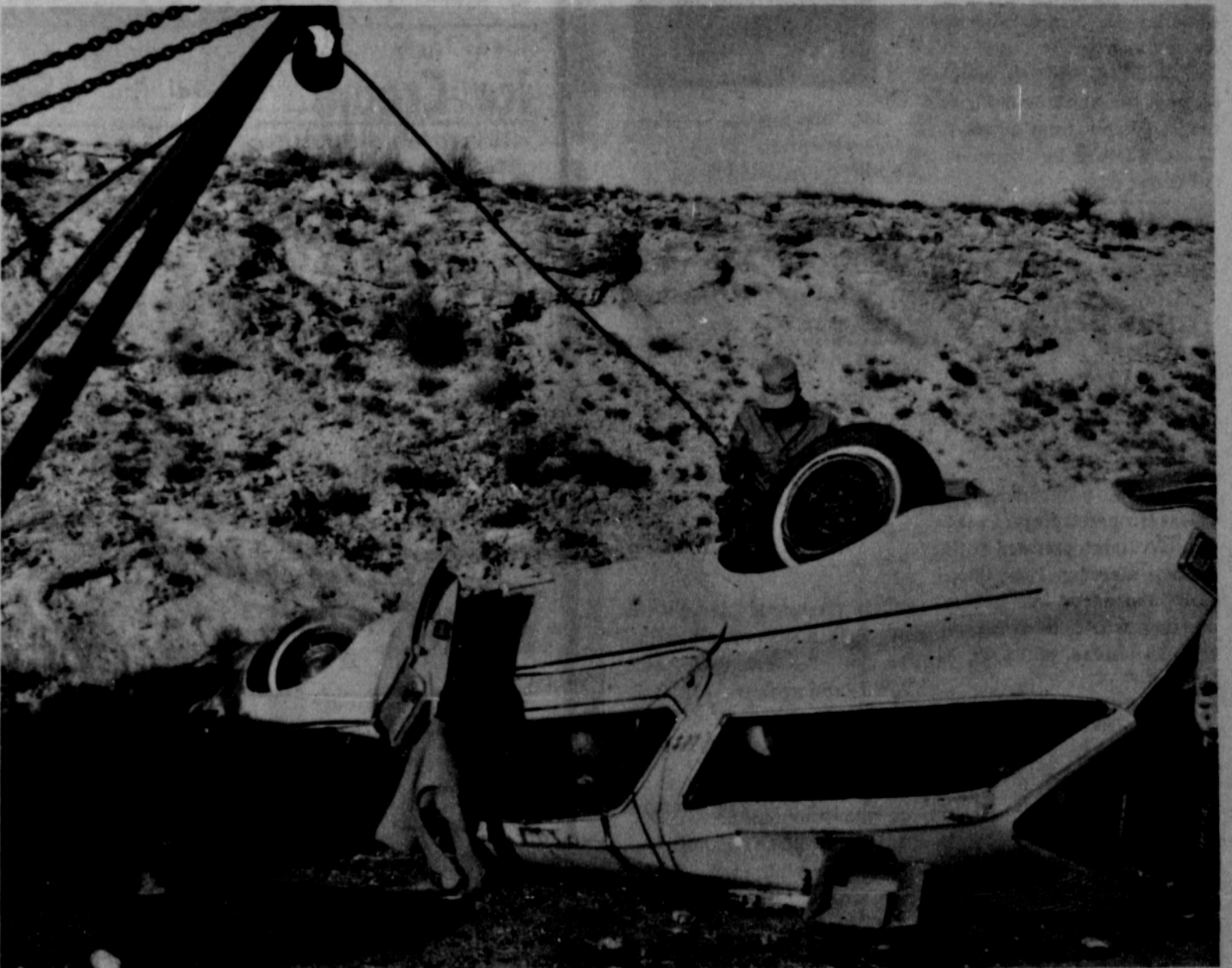

CONFERENCE ON WEED CONTROL

The 16th Annual Weed Control Conference will be held Thursday, April 18, 1963 at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland, Texas. The program will begin at 9:40 a. m. and will conclude around 3 or 4 that afternoon. Subjects to be discussed will be: Moisture Loss Due to Weeds; Control of Woody Plants on Rangeland; How to Farm a Weed Control District; Spraying Equipment for Weed Control; Progress Report on Weed Control Research.

There will be weed control exhibits to be viewed before and after the sessions. Lunch will be served on the station by Potter County 4-H Clubs at \$1.00 per plate.

Gruver LL Is Registering



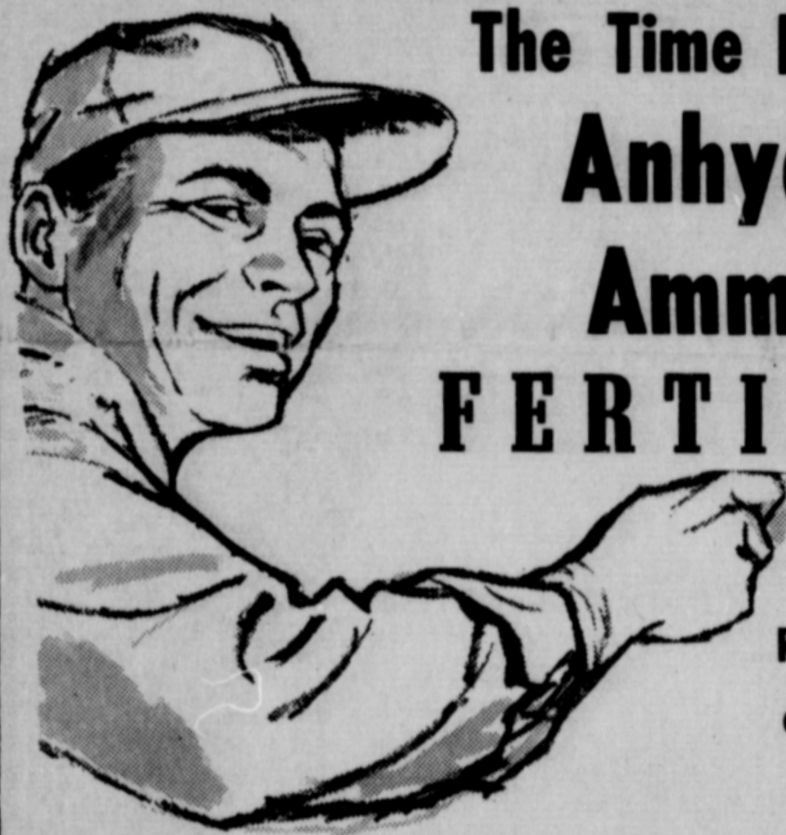

The state's May call of 462 compares with a quota of 471 for April and 404 for March. The May call is the state's share of a national quota of 10,000 men, all for the Army.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that local boards would send no men for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in May.

Local board quotas for the May call already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

The May quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on May 1, except volunteers and those legally termed delinquent under the draft law, who may be younger.

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter.
