Cortez Is Rally Speaker



Don Cortez, head football coach at Panhandle State University was the speaker for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes 7 p.m. Back To School Rally held August 19 at Spearman High School. Coach Cortez is beginning his first year as coach at PSU after having spent the last year as administrative assistant and recruiting coordinator at West Texas State University under Bill Yung. Prior to his duties at WTSU, Cortez served on the staffs at the University of Oregon and at San Francisco State University. Before entering

the college level of coaching Coach Cortez was football and baseball coach at Moreau High School in Hayward, Calif. Ed Mooney, former All American football player at Texas Tech spoke at the 4 p.m. assembly. A hamburger supper was served in the cafeteria between the programs. Music for both programs was provided by Debra Martin and Jan Jeter of Altus, Okla. Youth from Quanah, Abernathy, Amarillo, Lubbock, Gruver and elsewhere were present to join in the singing, testimonies and sharing.

Stolen Baptist safe recovered!

Sheriff R. L. McFarlin reported this week that the Baptist safe, which was stolen this summer, was found in Perryton. Marcus Henry Hoover IV, allegedly took the safe from the church. Hoover is now living in Perryton, Texas, and has resided there for approximately one year. Texas Ranger Bill Baten of Pampa, and Sheriff Jim Rhodes of Perryton arrested Hoover. He was wanted for escaping from the Penitentiary, and a warrant has been issued for the alleged safe robbery. The safe, which contained little or no money, was pried open, and is ruined according to Sheriff's officials.

Sales Noted

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that gross sales in Texas for the first quarter of 1978 totaled \$42.4 billion, up 15 percent over the same three-month period last year. "All the signs point to another record economic year," said Bullock. Bullock's office released computer analyses showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties. Hansford County gross sales were \$8,120,570, gross taxable sales \$3,993,066. The total amount subject to tax was \$2,729,803.

Meeting

Some 35 or 40 people were present Thursday evening at the Golden Spread Center Building for a meeting sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, concerning obtaining a nursing home for Hansford County.

Orvil Brummett, chairman of the Medical Services Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, stated that the meeting was very informative. B. A. Hyatt, Senior Vice President of Service Ministries of Management Services Consultation Associates of Lubbock, spoke to the local group about the possibilities of obtaining a home for Hansford County and how his company could help. The MSCA is a division of MBFA Foundation which is a non-profit organization interested in serving humanity. He was accompanied by vice president Alvin Chilton.

He presented different ways that the consulting firm can work with communities in acquiring a home, and also in managing such a facility. Hyatt stated that the possibility of locating a nursing home here was feasible because of the location, and being able to serve residents of several counties.

Fiery Crash Kills Two, Another Injured

A Morse woman, Rose Marie Crowl, is in critical condition at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo, with burns suffered Tuesday in a fiery collision of a pickup camper and a semirig near Pringle that claimed the lives of her 2-year-old son, Kevin Bryan, and Daniel L. Morava, 27 of Ulysses, Kan., the driver of the semirig.

The accident occurred about 4:20 p.m. on Texas 136 about 3 miles north of Pringle in Hutchinson County. The DPS said Mrs. Crowl was northbound on Texas 136 and was attempting to make a right turn onto a field road when her vehicle was struck by the semirig, which was attempting to pass the camper on the shoulder on the right. The semirig struck the passenger side of the pickup where the child was riding. The child was dead at the scene.

The semirig trailer continued 200 feet along a ditch, overturning one-and-one half times, killing the driver, the DPS said. The impact knocked the pick-

up back onto the highway and ripped off its gasoline tank. The gasoline spilled and ignited, burning Mrs. Crowl as she sat in the cab.

Graveside services for Kevin Bryan Crowl were held at 11 a.m. Thursday at Lieb Cemetery near Morse. The Rev. Winfred Walker, pastor of Morse Baptist Church, officiated. Arrangements were by Minton Mortuary of Borger. Survivors include the child's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Olan Crowl of Morse; two brothers, Jackie and Jerry, both of the home; and two grandmothers, Mrs. Besta White of Clinton, Okla., and Mrs. Ila Lehman of Perryton.

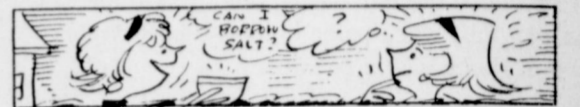

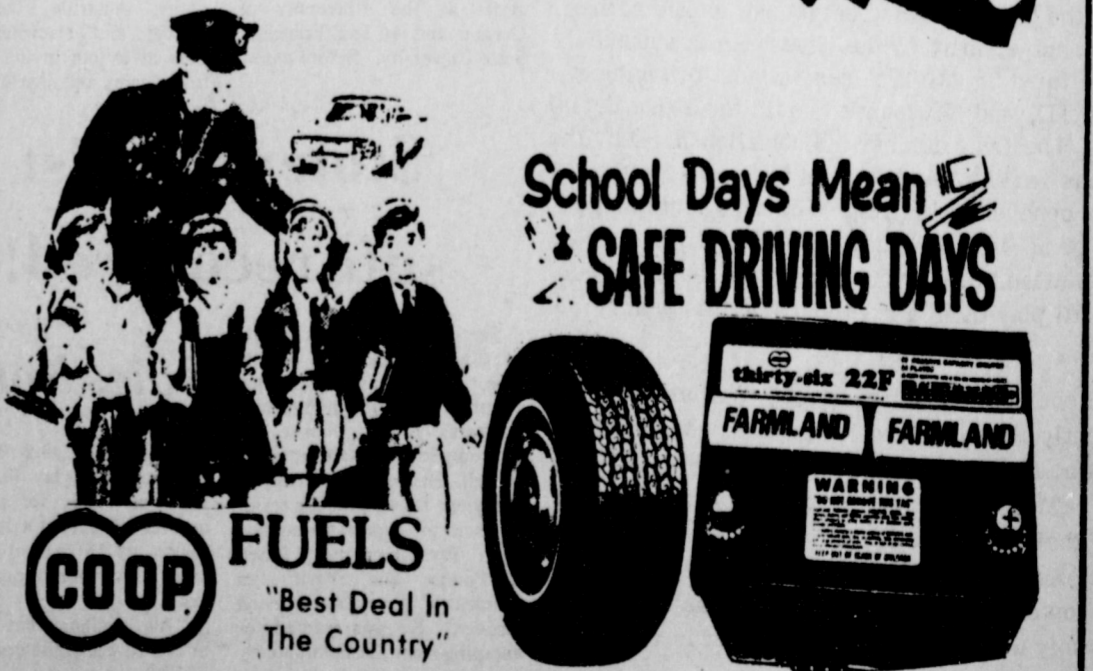
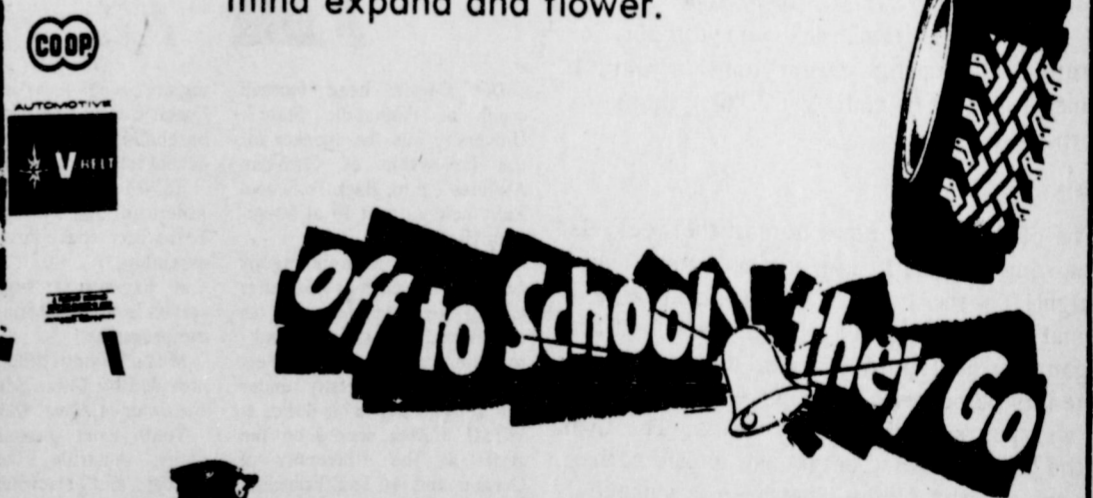

Economic Emergency Farm Loans Available

A new Economic Emergency loan service for farmers who have financial problems caused by credit shortage or cost-price squeeze is now in effect through the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Robert J. Holloway, the agency's county supervisor for Hansford, Hutchinson, Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties, reports that FmHA is prepared to take applications at its county office at the FmHA Ochiltree County office in Perryton, Texas.

Economic Emergency loans are authorized under the Agricultural Credit Act of 1978 signed by President Carter Aug. 4. They offer special help to farmers who are hard-pressed by recent shortage of credit from their regular lenders, or by debts accumulated during the recent period of low farm prices.

Mr. Holloway said the Economic Emergency loan program was enacted by Congress, with Administration support, in recognition of the fact that "economic conditions, as well as weather, are often beyond farmer's control." FmHA emergency credit has previously been confined to livestock

producers affected by economic conditions.

Under the new Economic Emergency program, any established farm operator - individual partnership, corporation or cooperative - experiencing scarce credit or an overload of debt coming due, may apply for up to \$400,000 of credit through FmHA. It will be at an interest rate equivalent to the cost of money secured by the government through sale of its securities to the public plus an administrative add-on of up to one percent. The rate initially will be 8 1/2 percent. Guaranteed loans will be made at rates negotiated between borrower and lender, with FmHA providing the lender up to a 90 percent guarantee against loss.

Loans for operating purposes will be made for terms of up to 7 years, with loan consolidations and rescheduling for another 7 years permitted, and 20-year payment authorized under special conditions. Real estate loans may be made for up to 40 years. Loans for annually-recurring expenses will be repayable annually.

Mr. Holloway said initial inquiries about Economic Emergency loans can be made either

through a commercial agricultural lender or the county FmHA office serving the county where the farm is located. The Act calls for decision by FmHA on individual applications within 30 days.

While introducing the new Economic Emergency farm loan, FmHA will continue all pre-existing services. They include various programs of non-emergency real estate and production loans to family size farms, terms of which will soon be broadened under the recent Credit Act; emergency loans to farms damaged by natural disaster, and loans or grants for housing, community facilities and business and industry in rural areas.

Use Caution Near Schools

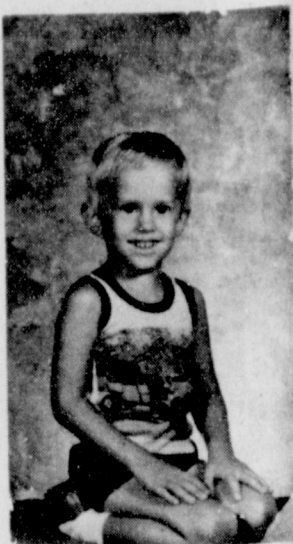
Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety at Lubbock, said today, "There are hundreds of thousands of good reasons why Texas motorists should use extra caution while driving near schools this month.

"Many of our youngsters will be going to school for the first time and will not be aware of the many hazards existing on Texas' busy streets and highways.

"Precautionary measures, such as traffic signs and signals, safety zones and pedestrian crosswalks, are virtually useless if your children have not acquired good pedestrian safety habits."

Children's responsibilities to and from school include: observing all traffic signs and signals, walking against the flow of traffic when no sidewalk is present, crossing streets at designated crosswalks, and maintaining orderly conduct while enroute to and from school.

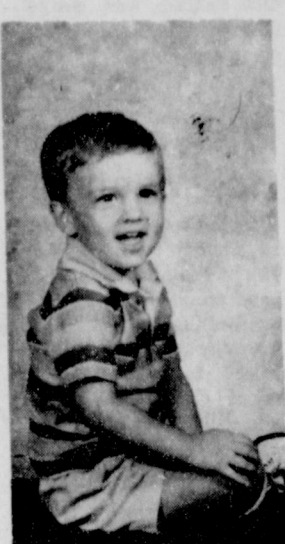

Bathroom Electrocutation

Never plug a radio in where it could fall into a tub or sink (battery models are safe). The same goes for a record player, hair dryer or any other appliance. Even if you're not taking a bath or shower, be cautious with electricity. Don't touch any electrical fixture or appliance with wet hands or while you're standing on a damp floor. Get into the habit of being one-handed. Avoid touching an appliance with one hand while you turn on a faucet with the other. Another safety tip: When you disconnect an electric shaver or other appliance, remove the cord from the wall outlet, not from the appliance. If it is left dangling, it can become lethal if dropped or knocked into a sink filled with water.
