School Bond Hearing Set Monday Night

A public hearing on the proposed school bond election will be held Monday at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Members of the School Board and the School Administration will be at the meeting to answer questions and explain the need for the bonds.

The money will be spent for repairs to the junior high school building and parking areas around the school; parking areas around the high school; moving the New Hope School Building; and building a new and larger athletic field at the high school.

The meeting will be held after the regular P-TA meeting.

Cotton Vote Is Tuesday

Hansford County cotton raisers or landlords with an interest in a cotton crop can vote Monday or Tuesday in the national cotton referendum.

Tuesday from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. is the regular election day, but interested farmers, landlords and their wives can vote absentee Monday.

Any farmer and his wife or land owner and his wife who had an interest in a cotton crop this year are eligible to vote in this election. The only landlords not eligible to vote are those who had their farms cash leased.

Local ASC officials urged all eligible farmers and their wives and landowners and their wives to vote. This will help increase the possibility of larger allotments in the future.

The county received an allotment of 1,065 acres this year, then received an additional 77 acres from the state reserve.

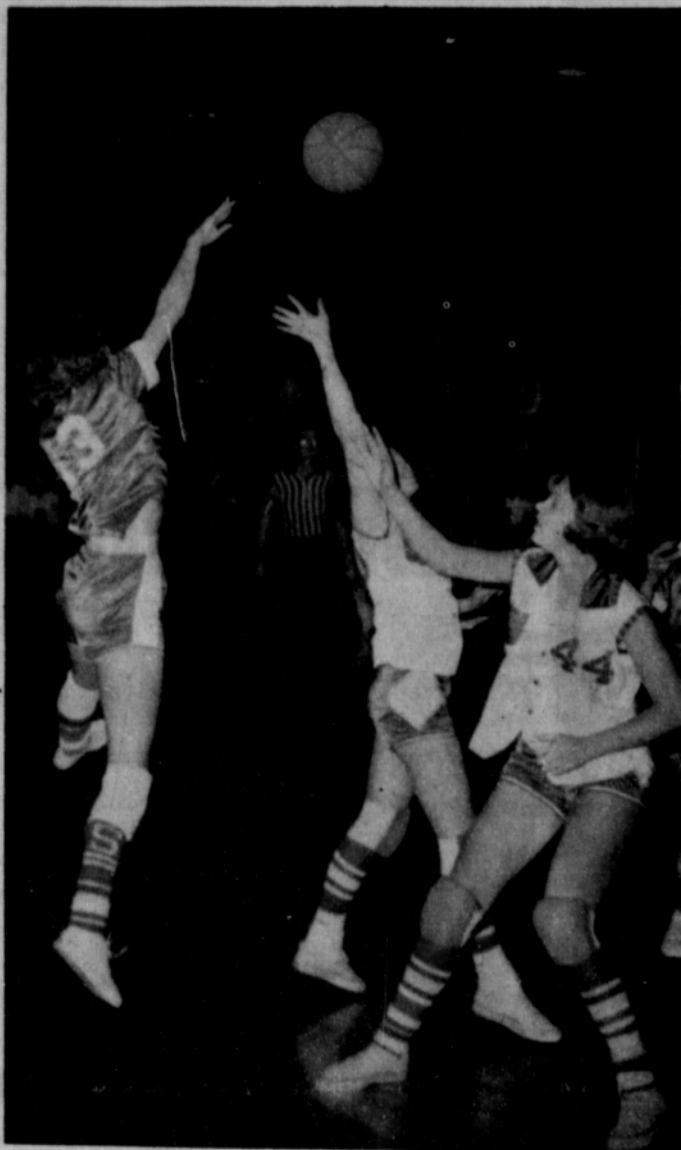
A 1100 acre cotton crop in the county should mean a 1500 to 2000 bale crop. This would be an extra \$225,000 agriculture income for the county.

While the young Wilde was having one of her finest nights, she was pressed hard by two old pros, Vicki Wilde and Phyllis Patterson, who pumped in 18 points each. Barbara had 20 points.

All three of the starting forwards pumped in more than 50 percent of their shots. Barbara Wilde hit 10 of 16 for 63 percent, Patterson had 7 of 13 for 54 percent and Vicki Wilde hit 8 of 15 for 53 percent. The team hit 25 of 45 free shots for a 58 percent average.

While the forwards were ram-paging, guards Bethany Donnell, Susan Hutchison and Kathi Pattison, along with Robbie Ownbey and late in the game, Linda Smith and Linda Lesly, held Miami to a 35 percent shooting average.

New Steer Class, Judge Added To Stock Show

The Hansford County Junior Livestock Show board of directors set up a new class of steers for the March show and

selected a new judge at a meeting Thursday. The board also drew up plans for the re-organization of the

board and set two meeting dates.

Complaints about the judge for the steer show were solved by dividing the steer show into two classes. This year the steers will be shown in classes for crossbred steers and English breeds. Durham from Texas Tech will judge the crossbred steers and Milton England of Panhandle A & M will judge the English breeds of steers.

This action was taken after some complaints were received because Durham had been selected to judge the show. He is a leading exponent of the bigger, leaner crossbred type steers.

The show board will reorganize after this show with three directors from the Spearman area, two from the Gruver area and one from Morse, along with the three agriculture teachers in the county and the County Agent.

The board will have a president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer. The teachers and county agent will not serve as officers.

Funeral Rites Monday For Mrs. Jackson

Funeral services for Mrs. Myrtle Jackson, 89, of Pampa, grandmother of Everett and Ellzey Vanderburg of Spearman, will be conducted

at 2 p. m. Monday in Pampa. Mrs. Jackson died Friday afternoon in Highland General Hospital in Pampa after becoming ill at her home earlier in the day.

Mrs. Jackson had lived on a ranch south of Pampa since moving there with her children in 1904. She was born in Tarrant County Dec. 9, 1875 later moving to Greer County, Okla. There she married Sid Davidson, July 6, 1892. He died in 1904 and Mrs. Jackson and her children moved to Gray County.

She married J. L. Jackson in 1938 and he died in 1960.

Mrs. Jackson was a member of the Lefors Methodist Church.

Besides her grandsons in Spearman, other survivors are a daughter, Mrs. Ethel Vanderburg of Pampa, another grandson, Fred of Pampa, 11 great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

Karen Gibson continued to play both ends of the court and Susan Hutchison who has been outstanding after being converted to a guard this year went back in as a forward and scored two points on a driving lay-up. Gibson had three points.

Lynx Fall From Race For Gruver Trophies

Fouls and a last quarter collapse rolled the Spearman Lynx out of the championship bracket of the Gruver Tournament Thursday as they lost to Darrouzette 54-53 in a wild fourth quarter.

Spearman went into the final eight minutes with a nine point lead and starter Jim Kirkland out of the game on fouls.

Bob Phillips, the leading scorer, had four fouls when the quarter started and was soon out of the contest.

Failure to get the ball down court, some fumbled passes and inability to get rebounds, spelled the end of the Lynx lead.

Darrouzette took the lead with just over a minute left and forced Spearman to come after the ball. Spearman went back in the lead one more time, but then fouled and Darrouzette hit the winning free shots.

Phillips had 17, Ken Shufeldt with 13 and Larry Butts with 12 led the Lynx scoring. A cold night at the foul line hurt the Lynx. They made only 13 of 25 free shots.

Darrouzette scored on 18 of 33, but the six extra were enough to overcome the Lynx 20-18 bulge in field goals.
