MINUTES OF THE REGULAR CITY
COUNCIL MEETING

The City Council of the City of Spearman, Texas met in Regular Session in Council Chambers of City Hall, 30 S. W. Court, On August 12, 1986. Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Aldermen present: Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Burl Buchanan, Mike Cudd. Alderman Absent: Ed Garner. Staff Present: Jim Murray - City Manager, Cheryl Gibson - City Secretary, Joe Raper - Police Chief, Ronnie Antalek - Fire Chief, Ed Williamson - EMS Director. Visitors Present: Eschol Blankenship, Superintendent - Larry Butler, Tamra Boyd, James Noble, Inez Holland, Esther Stewart, Myrtis Ball, Ruth Baker, Virus Wilbanks, Willie Wallis, Caro Lee Frantz, Dimple Jetton, Myrtle DeArmond, Susan Delk, Tom Latta, Floydian Gatlin, Blanche Mize, Irwin Delk, Fay Klutts, Mr. and Mrs. R. PLEDGE AND INVOCATION.

At 8:00 p.m. Mayor Blodgett declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was lead by Mayor Blodgett and followed by the Invocation given also by Mayor Blodgett.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MINUTES OF REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON JULY 29, 1986.

Motion was made by Nicholson to approve the minutes of the Regular City Council meeting held on July 29, 1986, as written. Second by Cudd Motion Unanimously carried.

PUBLIC HEARING CONCERNING THE PROPOSED USE OF REVENUE SHARING FUNDS FOR THE 1986-1987 FISCAL YEAR.

Mayor Blodgett stated that the City expects to spend \$15,297.00 of Revenue Sharing Funds which are carry over funds from the 1985-86 Budget. Mayor Blodgett asked if anyone had input on how the funds could be spent. Marsha Murphy, representative of the Golden Spread Senior Citizens, stated that they had received a portion of these funds in the past years and could put any Revenue Sharing Funds received to good use. Eschol Blankenship, Tamra Boyd, and Tom Latta, representing Family in Action, stated they would be appreciative of a portion of the Revenue Sharing Funds to help start a Teen Center in Spearman for the youth. After all comments were heard, Mayor Blodgett stated that these suggestions would be noted and studied and since Congress has not re-enacted Revenue Sharing Funds as of this date, the city did not expect to receive any Revenue Sharing Funds in the near future. Mayor Blodgett thanked all citizens for their interest and attendance. No action was taken.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE #536 AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND POSSESSION OF OPEN CONTAINERS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR DEFINITION OF TERMS; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Larry Butler, Superintendent of Spearman Independent Schools, was present and said that the Board of Trustees unanimously passed a resolution in support of this ordinance. Tom Latta and Tamra Boyd also stated that they would like to see Ordinance #536 be adopted. Sheriff R. L. McFarlin was present and stated that he was in favor of this Ordinance Prohibiting Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages and Possession of Open Containers of same and had seen the same work in other towns and cities. Mayor Blodgett stated that he had received some calls and letters from citizens and groups expressing their concern and interest of this Ordinance. Motion was made by Buchanan to adopt ordinance #536 an ordinance prohibiting consumption of Alcoholic Beverages and possession of open containers of Alcoholic Beverages in the city of Spearman, Texas; Providing for definition of terms; providing a penalty; providing a severability clause; and providing for an effective date. Second by Nicholson. Motion carried, McClellan abstaining.

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION #10-86 A RESOLUTION REPEALING RESOLUTION #8-86 THAT PROVIDES FOR GROUP HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE FOR ELECTED MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNING BODY AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Motion was made by Cudd to Adopt Resolution #10-86 a Resolution repealing Resolution #8-86 that provides for Group Hospitalization Insurance for elected members of the governing body and providing for an effective date. Second by Buchanan. Motion Unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO SOLICIT BIDS FOR A WRECKER SERVICE FOR THE REMOVAL OF JUNKED AND IMPOUNDED VEHICLES.

Motion was made by Nicholson to Authorize the City Manager to Solicit Bids for a Wrecker Service for the Removal of junked and impounded vehicles to accommodate our Police Department. Second by Buchanan. Motion Unanimously carried.

A REPORT CONCERNING THE CITY AUCTION HELD AUGUST 7, 1986, TO BE GIVEN BY THE CITY MANAGER.

City Manager, Jim Murray, reported that the City Auction was a success. The city grossed \$9,166.00 and achieved getting rid of old excess Surplus Equipment.

FIRM gives up on PCB landfill

We congratulate the Hansford Community for their winning of the ANR Pipeline Battle. Hansford County residents have foiled ANR Pipeline Co.'s plans to bury PCB-contaminated soil at a compressor station in the north-east corner of the Panhandle.

Wednesday evening, Marian Droll spokesman for the company in Detroit, Mich., said the company's polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) wastes will be disposed of at a commercial landfill in Utah and not at the company's E.G. Hill Compressor station near Gruver.

"The Hansford County residents were concerned about the landfill," Droll said. "We decided there would be too many protracted delays in obtaining the final permit."

A number of Hansford County residents formed an activist group called Citizens Against Poisonous Pollutants (CAPP) after news of ANR Pipeline's plans for a landfill broke last December.

CAPP's constituency - mostly farmers were concerned that the PCBs would get into the area food chain.

Barbara Stavlo, president of CAPP, said she and her group were delighted to hear that ANR had changed its plans.

"We worked real hard to get this far," she said. "We feel like we deserve to win."

In December ANR Pipeline filed an application with the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency to build a 2.5 acre above - ground landfill to hold 20,000 cubic yards of contaminated soil.

ANR Pipeline had been using a fire-retardant lubricant at its compressor stations which eventually leaked into retention ponds along its pipeline, contaminating them with PCBs.

The company planned to build a landfill at its E.G. Hill Compressor station to dispose of the contaminated soil. It was considered an ideal site because of the dry soil conditions there and because the site had already been contaminated with PCBs.

But now the company plans to take the contaminated soil out of the retention pond at the E.G. Hill station County and dispose of it in Utah, Droll said.

Under the plan-which was approved by the Texas Railroad Commission-the soil will be placed in special containers and hauled out by truck and railroad.

Droll said the company would be going to slightly greater expense to dispose of the waste in Utah, but she said the company's permit to build a landfill would have been constantly delayed by lawsuits from Hansford County residents.

The commercial landfill option also became more attractive when ANR found a landfill that did not require the PCBs to be mixed with hazardous wastes. PCB is considered a toxic waste by the EPA and not a hazardous waste.

GTE News Bulletin

Installation work is nearly complete and final testing has begun on the new digital telephone switch at Spearman, scheduled to be in service later this year.

Bob Meyers, Operations Manager said test calls to customers began last week and will continue for about a month.

"Customer tests will begin at 8:00 a.m. and last until 8:00 p.m. each day. The process involves a call to each customer number and then a return call to the GTE technician, using the new switch."

"The new technology will bring some changes for our customers. It will be necessary to dial all seven digits to place a local call to another Spearman telephone. Also touch call (push-button) dials must be connected through a special touch call line in the switch in order for them to operate. The touch call line carries a small monthly charge. Customers should contact our business office to make sure their line is equipped for touch calling, otherwise the instrument won't work after the conversion," said Meyers.

"About 150 party line customers will require a ringer change and they will be notified individually."

"Custom calling features will be available in the new switch, which include speed calling, call waiting, call forwarding and three-way calling by contacting the business office number listed in the directory," he said.

"A massive cable replacement project is underway in town and in the rural areas around Spearman, which will be completed prior to the conversion," he concluded.

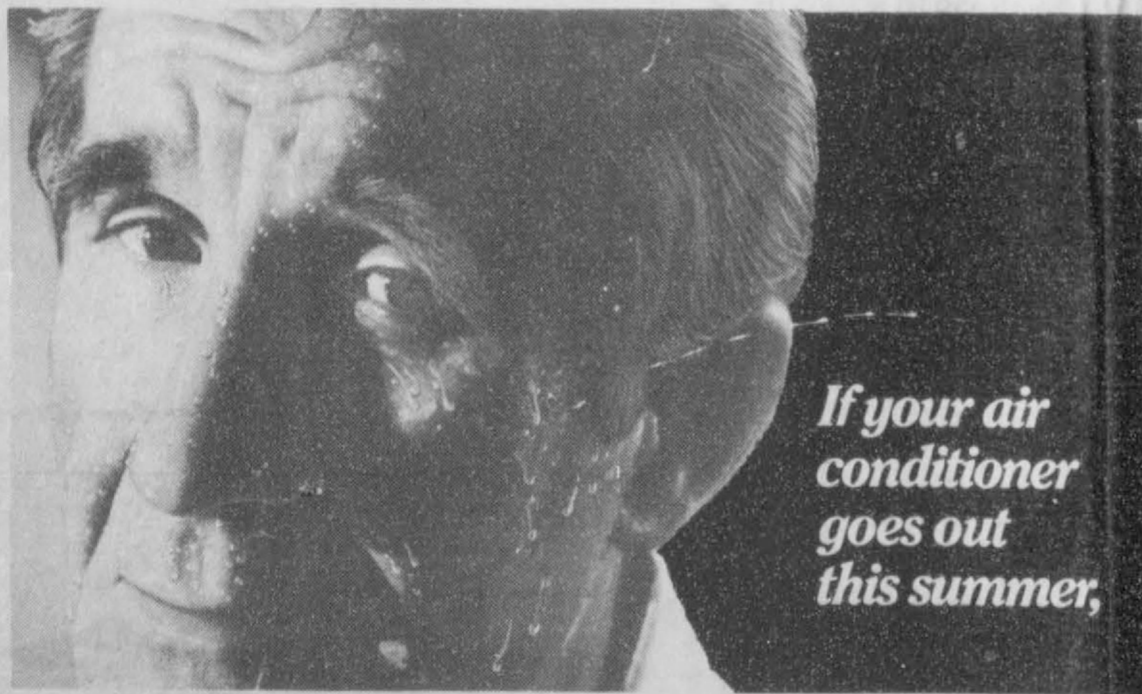

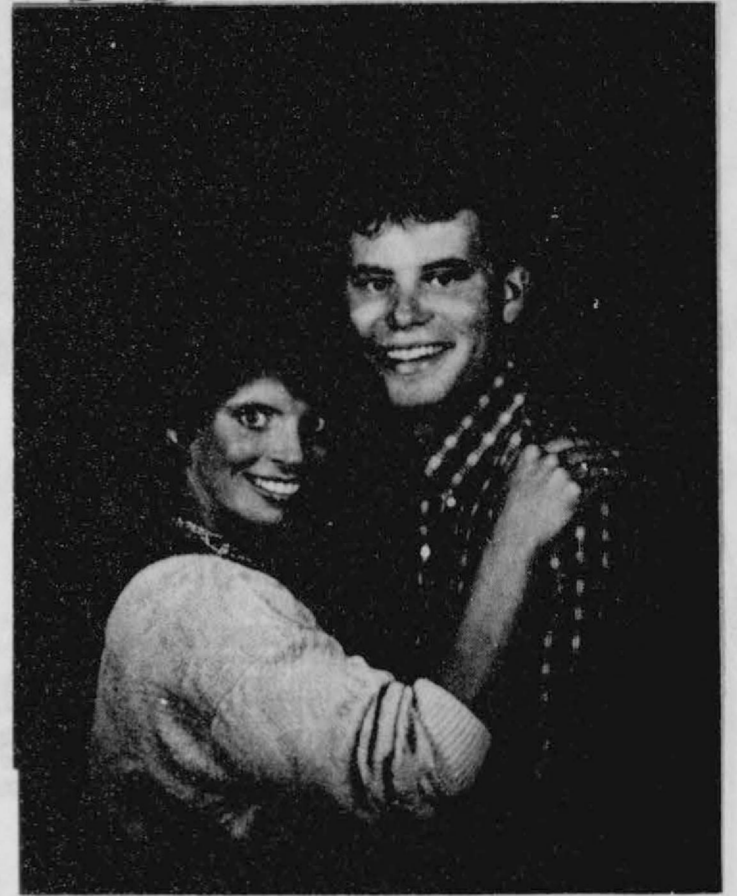

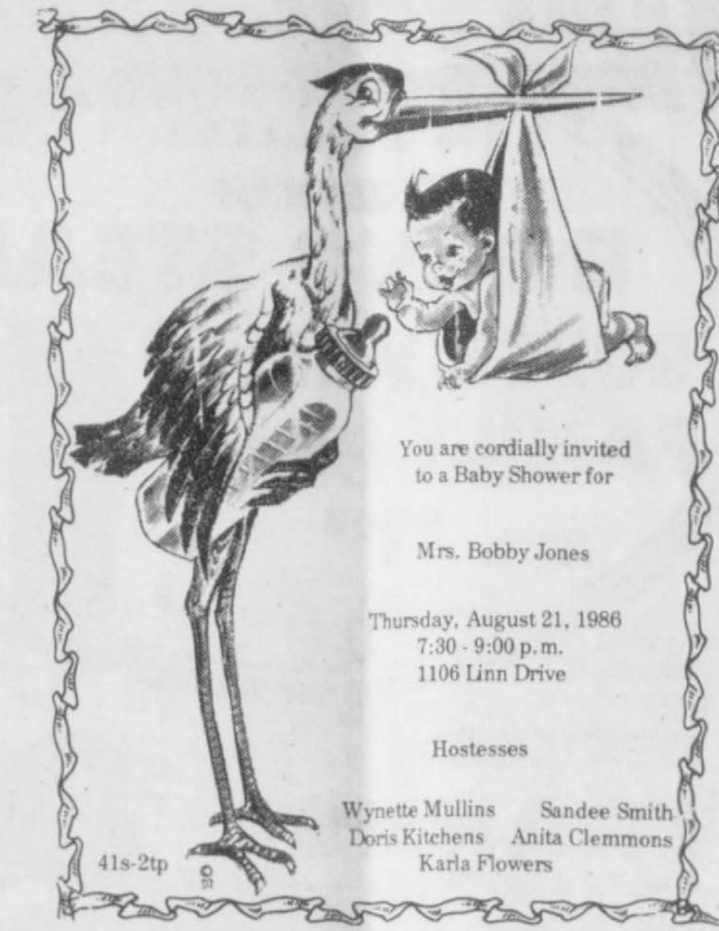
