

Construction Of Nursing Home To Begin

Construction of the new 54 bed nursing home for Hansford should begin the latter part of August.

That is the word from Hospital Administrator Jerry Taylor.

He said an important hurdle was cleared June 3 and the final decision on the part of the health service agency will be made Monday. Taylor assured there was no further problems anticipated.

As soon as the official go-

ahead is forthcoming Monday, the project will be advertised for bids the first week in July. Bids will be opened the first part of August and Taylor foresees the contract being let and construction underway before the month of August ends.

A house was moved this past week from the proposed site of the nursing care facility east of the hospital and foundation test holes were put down.

Evans street will be closed for

the block east of the hospital and will become the driveway for the nursing home. The main entrance will face this drive and a portico will be constructed completely across to shelter cars driving up to discharge passengers.

Entrance will be through two sets of doors to form an airlock to insulate the lobby from heat or cold on the outside. The entrance hall will lead to a nursing station located at the

"hub" of the facility's two main hallways.

On the south side of the entrance (on the left upon entering) will be a large day room where residents and relatives can visit outside the residential rooms. Entrance to the day room is from the large vestibule area surrounding the nursing station. Outside the east windows of the day room a large terrace is planned. This terrace will have a mate

single occupancy rooms. All will be reached by a north-south corridor with the nursing station in the exact center.

From this nursing station, all resident room entrances will be visible as will the dining room entrances and other service rooms. The east-west corridor is also the access to the hospital.

Opening from it, directly across from the dining room, will be three therapy rooms that

will serve both hospital patients and nursing home residents. One of these is the inhalation therapy unit that is so important to the elderly in seasons of upper respiratory infections.

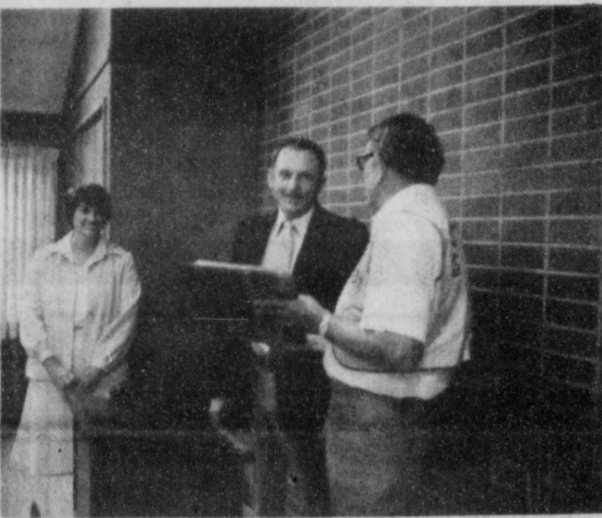
While the initial planning of the location of these therapy units was to serve nursing home residents, the plan also benefits the hospital in that emergency room facilities can be enlarged and improved and a second operating suite created.

Completion date would be an unsupported guess, according to Administrator Taylor, until bids are opened and professional builders provide their estimate of the number of days actual construction will take.

Taylor emphasized that this phase of work will be solely the nursing home facility. Future additions to the hospital proper will be another planning phase beyond completion of the nursing home.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has put his nose in the ring with some distinguished proposers trying to avert a recession with the statement that sales tax rebates to cities were down almost \$2.5 million for the month from the same period last year and Bullock thinks consumer spending caution is to blame.

According to the comptroller's figures, payments for this second quarter will be \$65.3-million compared to \$67.7-million last year.

Bullock says sales tax returns are now picking up the period where national credit restraint was being urged but he said no definite peak would be seen until second quarter returns are filed and analyzed sometime after July 31.

Once again, in the face of such an opinion, sales tax returns to Spearman, Gruver and other trade centers of the high plains are up over the same period last year.

Rebates to Spearman were up 36 percent or some \$20-thousand-plus.

Gruver receipts were up 53 percent. In one direction, Dumas was up 14 percent; in another, Borger was up 36 percent. To the east, Perryton was up 32 percent; Booker, 42 percent; Darroulette, 44 percent; Follett, 62 percent.

It must be remembered these figures represent one percent of the across-the-counter retail sales for one month. The additional activity of non-taxable sales in any given area are nowhere represented in the figures from the comptroller's office.

Figures from the state's principle metropolitan markets might be void in supporting Bullock's consumer-caution theory. Houston was down \$800-thousand. Fort Worth was down \$300-thousand. San Antonio was down \$59-thousand. Dallas was UP \$100-thousand.

However, we are dealing with almost \$15-million for Houston; almost \$3-million for Fort Worth; \$3.5-million for San

Antonio and \$8-million for Dallas.

The economic health of these metropolitan areas was further bolstered, according to the comptroller's figures, by Metropolitan Transit Authority payments of \$1.7-million to San Antonio and \$14.4-million to Houston. This is a total of \$104-million in MTA payments to Houston and \$13.6-million to San Antonio.

These funds filter down to those cautious consumers in the form of wages paid by these cities and goods and services purchased locally.

Losses in the metropolitan area tax rebates account for almost half the total \$2.4-million decline defined by Bullock.

Where is the other half?

Comptroller Bullock says it is in the pockets of timid souls staying out of the market place. However, the comptroller's own figures tell a different story. The validity -- or lack of it -- of Bullock's premise of the hesitant buyers is not worth the space to analyze all the cities reported by the comptroller to have received less tax rebates for this period of 1980 than last year.

In this general area, Canyon is down 48 percent. A visit to that city reveals retail sales are down the usual percentage due to the summer hiatus of the university student body. The most blatant economic novice should be able to see Canyon's loss in the tax rebate area is due to large business houses moving outside the city limits on the expressway between Canyon and Amarillo. It does not stand to reason that people with buying power in two cities 17 miles apart would withhold almost half their purchasing power in one city and increase it 16 percent in the other.

Canyon and the small East Texas town of Avinger, down 52 percent, represent about the largest losses over last year released by the comptroller. Avinger has lost about 50 percent of its population and 75 percent of its retail outlets plus the famed East Texas Sawmills which has shut down. Ten miles from the sprawling Lone Star Steel plant and 22 miles from

one of the largest lignite coal operations in the U.S., Avinger's decline is not due to cautious buying.

Not far from Avinger, another small town, Monticello, showed tremendous gains over a five-year period only to decline 22 percent in this month's report from Austin. The gain was due to the fact that tiny Monticello was the only source of beverage alcohol in a 30-mile radius. In the past months, liquor has been approved nearby both to the north and the south. And so it goes.

The list of minuses on Comptroller Bullock's report are, in the main, declines of one to ten percent and the towns are suburbs where small businesses decide to compete no longer with nearby metropolitan markets.

So, it would seem from Bullock's own figures, consumers are not cautious; they are merely ambulatory. Solid cities such as Spearman that are based on an established economy year after year show an increase in buying and selling.

Father Of Local Man Dies

Memorial services were held at 10:30 a.m. Friday, June 20, at the Lazbuddie Church of Christ for Edwin L. Clark, 93, who died Wednesday. He is the father of Albert Clark of Spearman.

David Lasater, minister, and David Cox, minister of the Muleshoe Church of Christ, officiated. Burial was in the Lazbuddie Cemetery by Singleton-Ellis Funeral Home of Muleshoe.

Mr. Clark, born in Joplin, Mo., moved from New Castle to the Lazbuddie community in 1939. He was a farmer and a member of Lazbuddie Church of Christ. His wife, Irene Josephine, died in 1975.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Laura Eddlemon of New Castle; four sons, George Clark of New Castle, Ed Clark of Friona, Albert Clark of Spearman and Wayne Clark of Lazbuddie; 21 grandchildren; 45 great-grandchildren; and 15 great-great-grandchildren.

Grasshopper Control Program Started

The Cooperative Rangeland Grasshopper Control Program has been started in Hansford County as a result of the meeting held Tuesday, June 17. Approximately 60,000 acres were signed up at the meeting.

The grasshopper control committee is as follows: Chairman - Gus Renner; Vice-Chairman - Joel Lackey; Secretary-Treasurer - Billy Logsdon. These gentlemen will be coordinating the signing up, mapping of the areas to be sprayed, and collection of money along with USDA and TDA officials.

To sign up for the program, rangeland operators or owners need to come to the County Extension Agent's office located in the basement of the Courthouse in Spearman. Rangeland operators must draw their acres on a map and pay 70 cents per acre for the spraying. The cost of spraying is figured at \$2.10 per acre with 1/3 by the State, and 1/3 by the Federal government. This program is for rangeland only.

All interested parties are encouraged to contact the committee members or County Extension office for more information.

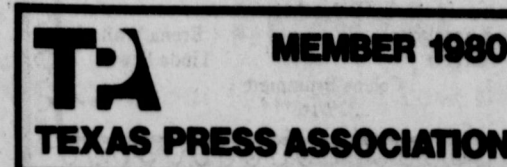

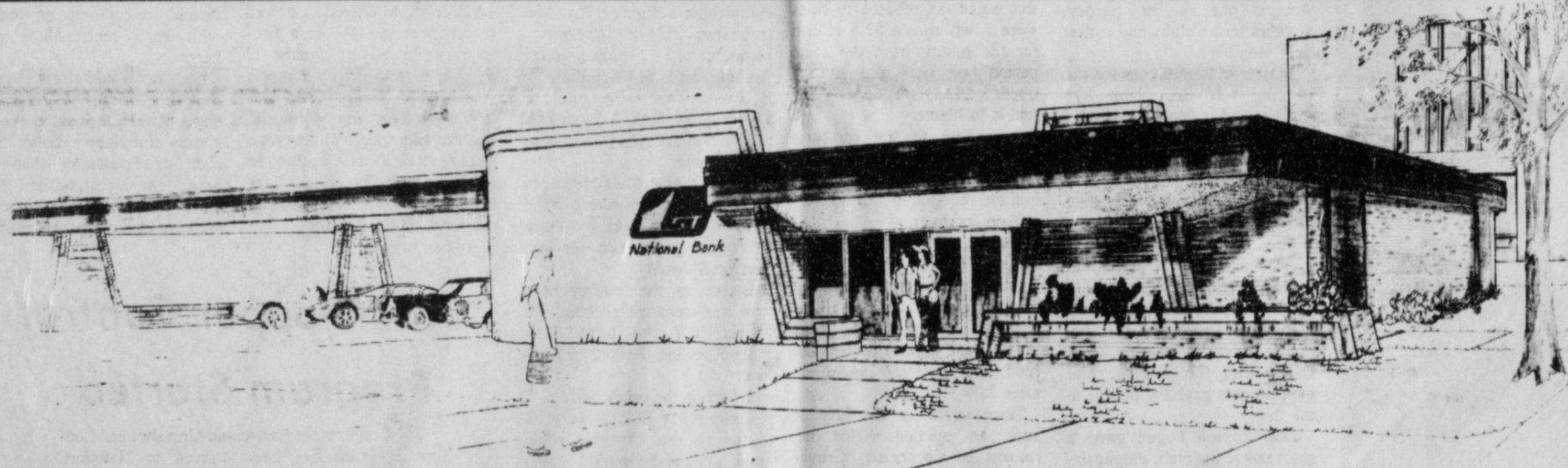
After a Colorado honeymoon the newlyweds will be at 118 Greentree apts, Lubbock, Texas, where both will continue their education.
