Palo Duro Creek public workshop here May 4

A public workshop will be held May 4, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. at the County Courthouse for the Palo Duro Creek, Texas Multipurpose Lake, Conveyance and Treatment Facility.

All persons interested in the flooding, water supply and related water resource problems of the area should attend, as well as representatives of associations, civic organizations, and local industries, representatives of interested State and Federal agencies, county and city governments.

You should make plans now to attend the workshop and bring this announcement to the attention of anyone who is interested in the flood control, water supply and recreation opportunities of the area and urge them to attend and make their views known.

The meeting is being conducted by the US Army Corps of Engineers, Southwestern Division, Tulsa District.

Purposes of the meeting is to inform all who are interested in the Palo Duro Creek

Multipurpose Project; to discuss the scope of the studies and review the findings; to answer questions; to inform you of possible impacts of the proposed plan and to obtain your comments on the proposed plan.

Your opinions and ideas concerning flood protection, water supply, recreation, conveyance and treatment facilities for the five-county study area. The draft survey report concerning the problems has been developed and the public review is nearing completion. Any additional information or ideas that you may have will be considered in further developing a solution to the problems.

Council considers study

The Spearman city council bowed to Daylight Savings Time and started the regular meeting, Tuesday night at 8 p.m.--which will be the starting time for council sessions throughout the summer.

"More than an hour of that time was spent on the first agenda item: presentation of a proposed flood analysis of the city of Spearman by the Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Almost any explanation of the flood plain, created by federal government back in the seventies, that will fit in a news story will be an over simplification, hence the time taken at the meeting.

When the flood plain concept was created, guide lines were misinterpreted in many places causing panic among persons buying land and building and among financial houses lending them the money. The first general interpretation was: money could not be loaned on property in a flood plain. The flood plain was defined as any portion of land that would be under water some time in the next 100 years.

As one of the SCS engineers present, Tuesday night, explained; the first maps issued to delineate flood plains were prepared and delivered in 18 months and bore "straight line" boundaries. This took many, many acres out of use needlessly. These maps were translated into curvilinear boundaries freeing considerable parcels of land.

So, doing their thing--which is certainly the best any organized effort has ever done with the land--the Soil Conservation Service is trying to bring black-and-white out of a very murky gray. The SCS faces two problems: one is funding. The SCS does not secure such funding direct from congress but must convince the USDA to fund this analysis proram from its budget allocated by congress. The other problem has to do with the government agency created to sell flood plain insurance--which is presently necessary for federal approval and aid in buying and-or building in a flood plain area. Many think the SCS project is to sell insurance.

The SCS has NO connection with this agency--has no

connection with insurance at all. However, an SCS analysis just might clear some land from the flood plain and make this specialized insurance unnecessary.

For concerned county residents outside the city limits, Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan was present at the city meeting because county commissioners will certainly consider the possibility of such an SCS analysis for the county, too.

So, the situation is on "hold" right now pending a try by SCS for funding.

The council decided on a blanket fidelity bond for city hall employees. This item was tabled at the last regular session pending a study of costs. The cost is little more for the blanket coverage than was being paid for bonds for certain individuals.

Mayor Ralph Blodgett was authorized to execute a right-of-way and easement to Carla Woodington to property located at 22 W. Third, lot six, block 61, first addition, city of Spearman. This was simply a situation where a portion of property that had been here as long as the city, extended at

one point, one foot onto city right-of-way.

This would forever affect any selling or development of the property and the right-of-way and easement does not handicap the city property involved.

While on the matter of property, the panel considered an award of repairs to property at 900 S. Barkley owned by Willie Seitz. A story building was damaged by a city truck attempting to negotiate an alley during one of the snow-slick times of winter. A settlement was approved.

Ronnie Antalek was appointed to the unexpired term of Stan Hudson as a member of the Disaster Committee.

Following the regular discussion without-action item termed "Other" the meeting adjourned.

The physical location is on Highway 15 west of Spearman. This location is known to many and still affords services to the horse owner and breeder such as breaking, long slow distance, sprint training and the more comprehensive interval training with physiological

monitoring at regular points in this program.

--And to all you have found at this location is added a highly specialized veterinary clinic.

The roster of animal-owning clients and their "patients" is impressive but Bob and Bryan Cator emphasize that this is not to overpower pet owners and others who have small animals -- or large animals other than horses -- from using the services of this new veterinary medicine clinic.

The one thing the Cators would particularly like to emphasize is that people living daily with a favorite horse or a small pet are keenly aware of changes. They recommend strongly that you contact them and describe symptoms and behavior. If it is nothing, you are "home free." If your animal needs attention, you have called the right place in time.

Commissioners 'share revenue'

In regular session, Monday, the Hansford County commissioners court made short shrift of the agenda including hearings on disposition of some revenue sharing funds.

Representatives of the museum and the Golden Spread Center were the sole fund-seekers at the hearing on revenue sharing.

Commissioners approved a \$2,500 revenue sharing grant to the museum -- the amount requested -- and \$3,500 to the senior citizen center -- which was the requested amount for that facility.

Ed Garner was appointed to be the representative member for the court on the Panhandle Regional Housing Corporation.

Commissioners also authorized for bids for a new car for the sheriff's department.

The remainder of the meeting was occupied with the routine affairs of county business such as the treasurer's report and the payment of approved bills.

The next regular session of Hansford County commissioners court will be May 9.

The End Time Harvesters will be performing at the Union Church May 4th.



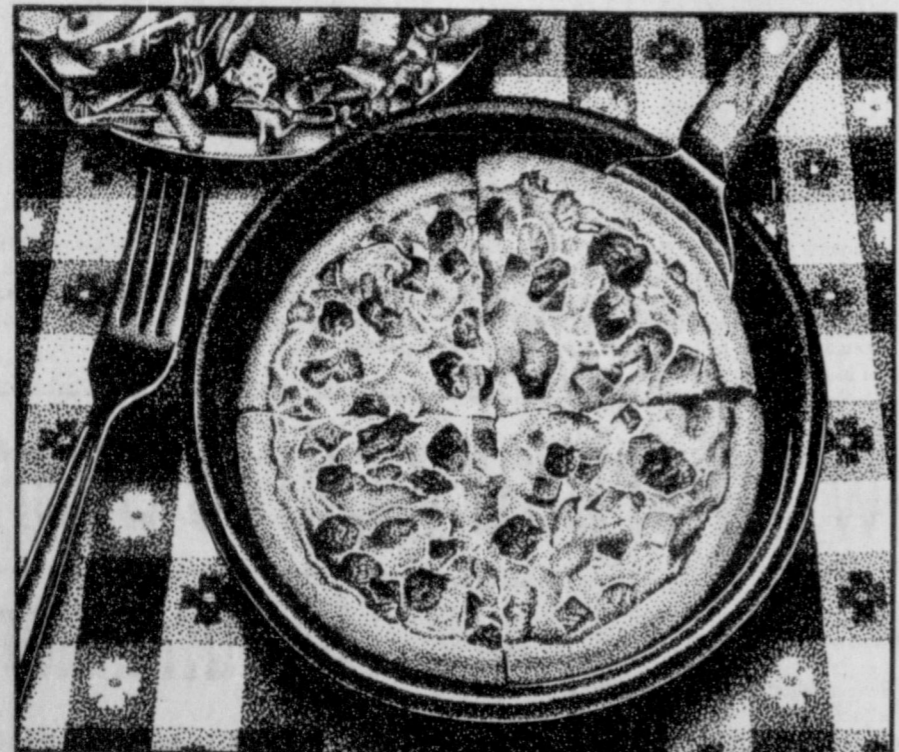

The Hansford County horse show will be Friday, May 20th at 5 p.m. at the Gruver Rodeo Arena. Anyone who is a member in the Hansford County 4-H club is eligible to enter. There will be no entry fees charged.

That was the word, Thursday, from Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin. "We received a teletype warning to pass on to the citizens of our area to beware of this group working this fraud," the sheriff said. "Beaver County Sheriff Deb McGuire has passed the word to area sheriff's departments, merchants and citizens that this group styling themselves the 'Beaver County Search and Rescue Association' is NOT affiliated with this office nor any other law enforcement agency."

Beware of officers who are not really

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Tennessee and Mississippi. Reportedly, these people work for an outfit styled "Right-Way Productions, Ocean Springs, Miss. It is believed managed by one Mike Hope and one Eddie Garrett known to law enforcement agencies in this part of Texas, Okla. and Kans. for previous frauds involving Mississippi entertainment personalities.

"These people sort of stole a march on me," McFarlin observed. "Here it is just about time for me to issue my annual Spring warning about rip-off artists, bunco operators --and the gypsies--and we already have this operation going."

The sheriff also noted that Cimarron County Bob White warned these people operating this scam drive an assortment of vehicles bearing an assortment of tags from Alabama,

Throughout the year but especially in the Spring, Sheriff McFarlin supplies a running report of possible scammers working the area with instructions for dealing with them--and still some citizens are defrauded each year in spite of the warning.

The oldest of all frauds--roof repairs or renewal--still reaps an amazing number of victims each year.

What can you do? Sheriff McFarlin boiled it down to a few words--effective if heeded:

"When approached by door-to-door solicitors, a citizen should contact the police before doing any business with them!"

New Flame Kindled Sandy was very much disturbed when his lady love married another and remarked to an acquaintance that the light of his life had gone out. A year later this friend discovered that Sandy had married and he reminded him of what he had said. "I know, another match."

Walter Elliot, of Spearman, was taken in custody for tendering a forged check in the amount of \$100 to a local merchant, April 13.

In court, Jackie Cathey, Spearman, was found guilty of entering an AGCO building, then entering a locked vehicle in that building and leaving with items from the car. He was sentenced to serve three years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

Sheriff's Dept. has day in court

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department had a busy fortnight filled with investigation, arrest -- and a day in court.

Under investigation is the theft of 20 barrels of condensate belonging to Sidwell Oil & Gas. The condensate was taken from Sidwell's location on the Sanders place northwest of Spearman, according to Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin.

James Mike Owens, 30, Oklahoma City, was found guilty of probation violation dating back to March 3. Probation was continued and he was released but the court decreed he must pay \$1,000 in fines and make restitution.

Kenneth Wayne Slaton, 20, being tried for the burglary of the local YMCA, was assessed a five-year probated sentence, fined \$1,000 and directed to make restitution of \$320. Sheriff McFarlin noted this pretty well cleared cases his department had awaiting trial but there were some ongoing investigations that should produce subsequent arrests and charges.

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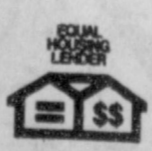

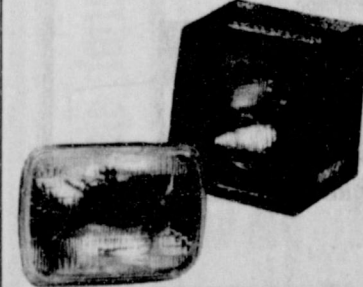

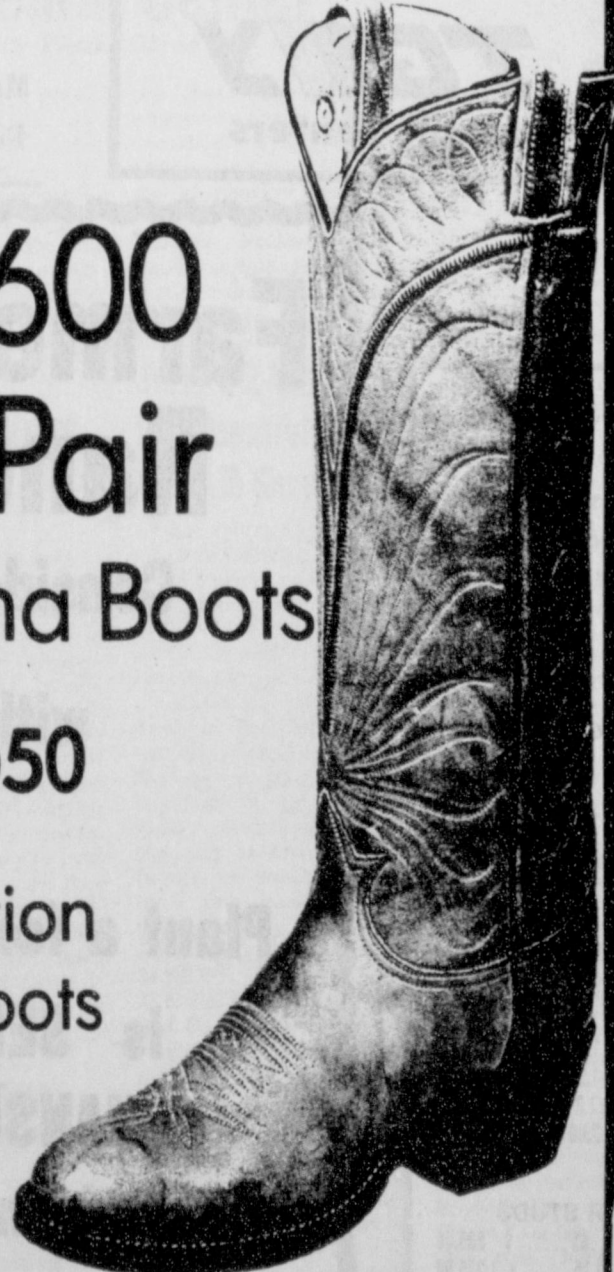

The purchase awards are available to businesses and individuals. The tremendous support of these awards help to assure a quality show from year to year. Buyers will be listed in advertising prior to the show.

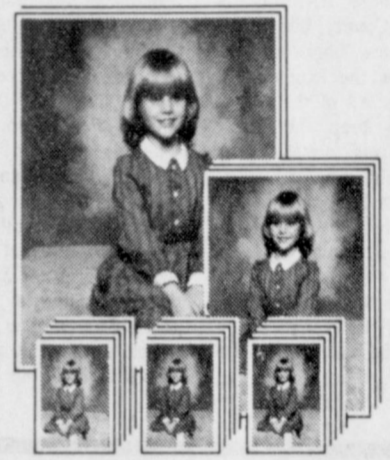
The amount of the purchase award (starting at \$50) is used

B B guns and pellet guns outlawed in Spearman

On April 20, 1983, at approximately 12:30 p.m., this office received a telecommunications report on the Texas Law Enforcement computer advising that a 1980 Chevrolet Corvette had been stolen from a business in Amarillo. The alleged suspect was believed to be an individual that at one time, resided in the Spearman area. After preliminary investigations, it was believed that this subject had returned to Spearman in the stolen vehicle. All available officers were notified of the situation and given a description of the vehicle. At approximately 1:40 p.m. the Animal Control Officer observed a vehicle matching the stolen vehicle description parked on Main Street. Officers were dispatched to Main Street for surveillance and observed a subject getting into the vehicle and driving West on Main Street. Upon seeing the officers, the subject pulled in behind the patrol vehicle and surrendered. The subject was then transported to the Spearman Police Department and processed and then transported to the Hansford County Jail to await for Randall County authorities to transport back to Randall County.

On April 19, 1983, this office received a call from the Sheriff's Office relating that a subject had entered their office in reference to a warrant that the Police Department was attempting to serve on the subject. An officer was dispatched to pick up the subject and transport to the Police Department. The warrant, which was from the Muleshoe Municipal Court, was served and payment arranged. The subject was released after payment was made and the payment was forwarded to Muleshoe Police Department.

On Friday, April 22, 1983, at approximately 9:20 p.m., an officer was dispatched to meet a complainant in reference to a party. The complainant related to the officer that several men had carried a keg of beer into a building and that drinking was taking place in the building. Two officers went to the building to talk with the individuals at the location. The owners of the building related to the officers that they had had a private party and that the doors had been locked so that no one could enter or leave during the party. The officers cleared the area.

On April 23, 1983, an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to damage being done to a fence. The officer met with the complainant and was shown the damaged fence. An investigation of the area revealed possible paint from a vehicle that ran into the fence. The investigation is continuing at this time.

On April 23, 1983, an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to windows being shot by a B-B or pellet gun. The officer investigated the area for footprints, but was not able to locate any. The investigation is continuing at this time.

On April 24, 1983, at approximately 2:45 p.m., while on routine patrol, an officer observed a pickup traveling North on Highway 207 at a high rate of speed. The officer proceeded after the vehicle. The vehicle proceeded East on Highway 15 and was finally stopped approximately 1 1/2 miles East on Highway 15 of the City. The driver was arrested for allegedly driving while intoxicated. An intoxilyzer test administered, but the subject was not to the legally intoxicated level and was released.

On Wednesday, April 27, 1983 at approximately 10:18 PM, two officers were dispatched to the Pizza Hut in reference to a disturbance. The officers were advised by the complainants that the subject causing the disturbance had left and gave officers a vehicle description. One of the officers left the scene of the incident and attempted to make contact with the suspects vehicle, but was unable to. The dispatcher on duty then contacted Perryton Police Department and Sheriff's Office and advised them of the vehicle description and the circumstances involved. Perryton Police and Deputies were finally able to stop the vehicle after a lengthy high speed chase.

On Thursday, April 28, 1983, at approximately 10:34 PM, two officers were dispatched to a Spearman resi-

dence. The officers arrived and spoke with a subject that related that another individual had grabbed a small child by the hair and threw the child away from the child's mother. The subject then was thrown against a wall by the individual, and the individual then left the scene. The case is still under investigation.

On April 28, 1983, this office received a call in reference a dog being injured by someone shooting it with a B-B or pellet gun several times. The Animal Control Officer was dispatched to receive a report and investigate. The case is still under investigation.

On April 23, 1983, a minor accident involving a vehicle and a pole was investigated by the Spearman Police Department. There were no injuries. The driver related to the investigating officer that while driving, he had dropped a cigarette and leaned over to pick it up and swerved off the road and struck a telephone pole.

On April 24, 1983, this office received a report of an accident at the Spearman Municipal Airport involving one airplane. The pilot related to the officer that he had attempted to land on the unfinished portion of the runway and veered off into a ditch. There were no injuries involved in the accident.

The Spearman Police Department would like to remind all Spearman Citizens that the use of a B-B gun or a Pellet gun is against the Spearman City Ordinances. If you should happen to see someone using one of these type of guns, please report the incident to the Police Department.

Postmaster seeks help with dogs

RIDDLE: What are the two biggest myths associated with mail service?

ANSWER: "The check is in the mail" and "Go ahead and pet him; he doesn't bite."

The Postmaster says of the classic battle between the letter carrier and the family dog, "There's irony here. Many people find humor in

this confrontation, but there is more human tragedy in dog bite cases than you might imagine."

The Postmaster says a California carrier died from blood poisoning after being bitten by a dog. "A death may be rare," he adds, "but the bites are not. The 'Dog Days of Sum-

mer' takes on very serious meaning for Postal Service letter carriers."

The Postmaster says 5,700 letter carriers across the nation were bitten by dogs last year.

The Postmaster says the Postal Service has the right to protect its carriers from injury by withholding mail delivery to any resident who keeps an unrestrained dog on a property. "In fact, a dog allowed to

room loose can result in interruption of service to a whole block or neighborhood," he adds.

The Postal Service also provides counseling to bitten carriers wishing to file lawsuits against the dog owners. It will also pursue settlement with the third party to recover losses incurred by the Service.

"Things don't have to go that far," the Postmaster says. "All we ask is that the dog

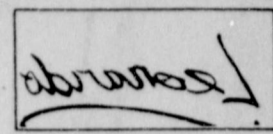
owner take a few commonsense steps to protect both their pet and their letter carrier. If the dog is kept outdoors, we ask that it be secured away from the mailbox and the areas where the mail carrier enters or leaves the property."

The Postmaster asks local homeowners to be aware of how serious dog bites can be. "We constantly alert our carriers to the problem, but we need the public's help to stop all dog bites."

"The best protection our carriers can receive is a little thoughtful action on the part of the dog owner. It's the old story of an ounce of prevention being worth a pound of cure."
