Universities Select Two For Research

Two science students in Spearman High School have been selected as a winner and alternate in the competition for a National Foundation Science Research fellowship this summer.

David McClellan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy McClellan, has been selected as one of 36 students to attend the University of Texas this summer for the science instruction. Over 500 applied for the University fellowships.

Miss Linda Spoonmore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. E. Spoonmore, has been selected as an alternate for a fellowship at Texas Women's University at Denton. There have been 28 accepted at TWU and if any drop out, Miss Spoonmore will get to go. There were 128 asking to attend TWU.

Science department head Bob Barker said three students from Spearman took the test for the fellowship. There were over 5,000 students from Texas competing and all three Spearman students were in the top one percent.

Miss Bethany Donnell was the third student competing for the fellowship. She graduates this Spring and will attend summer school at the University of Texas.

Horse Dies of Rabies Children Taking Shots

Two children are taking the rabies shots after being in contact with horses, one of which was known to have died of rabies.

Susie and Ronnie Sell, children of Mr. and Mrs. John Sell, who live two miles north of Spearman on the airport road, began the 21 days of shots this week.

The two children began the shots after two horses on their farm died. John Sell said the results from the laboratory said the first horse did not die of rabies but the second horse did have the disease.

Sell's pasture runs along Horse creek and is just north of the dump grounds.

Sell said he had seen no animals or dogs around his place that acted rabid, but he felt sure that it was probably a skunk that was possibly on the creek that might have bitten the horses.

There are many dogs that roam the area around the junk yard and the pastures north and west of Spearman.

County Health officer Dr. Damon Gregg said Wednesday that rabies is in the wild animals of the area now. He stressed a danger from rats and other animals that live around the city dump yard. He said rats can have the disease just like any other animal.

The popular sport among teen-age and younger boys, of going to the dump yard to shoot rats can be very dangerous at this time. It is also

against city law. Parents should be especially careful of any animals their children play with at this time. Also, pets should be vaccinated and watched carefully.

City Manager Dare Foshee said the city is intensifying its efforts in picking up dogs running loose over town.

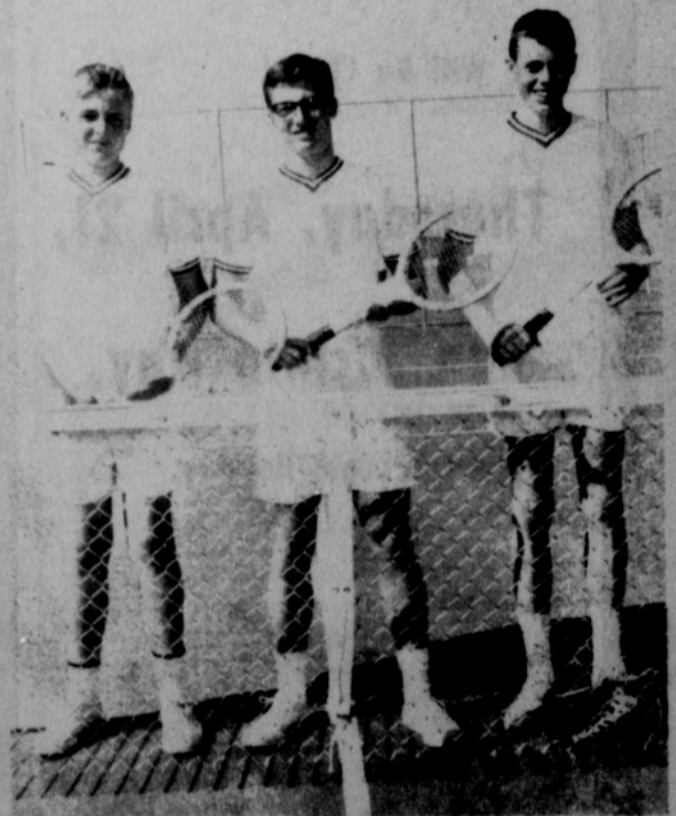
Mercury Drops To 22; Wheat May Be Hurt

The mercury dropped to a cold 22 degrees in Spearman Wednesday morning according to the official weather station maintained by Mrs. Pat Cates.

Grain men said the irrigated wheat is jointed and that is the danger period, but only time will provide the answer, because the head has not emerged yet.

Dry weather is damaging the dryland wheat more every day as the March and April rains needed to produce dryland wheat continue to evade this country.

Mrs. Bryan Receives Art Award

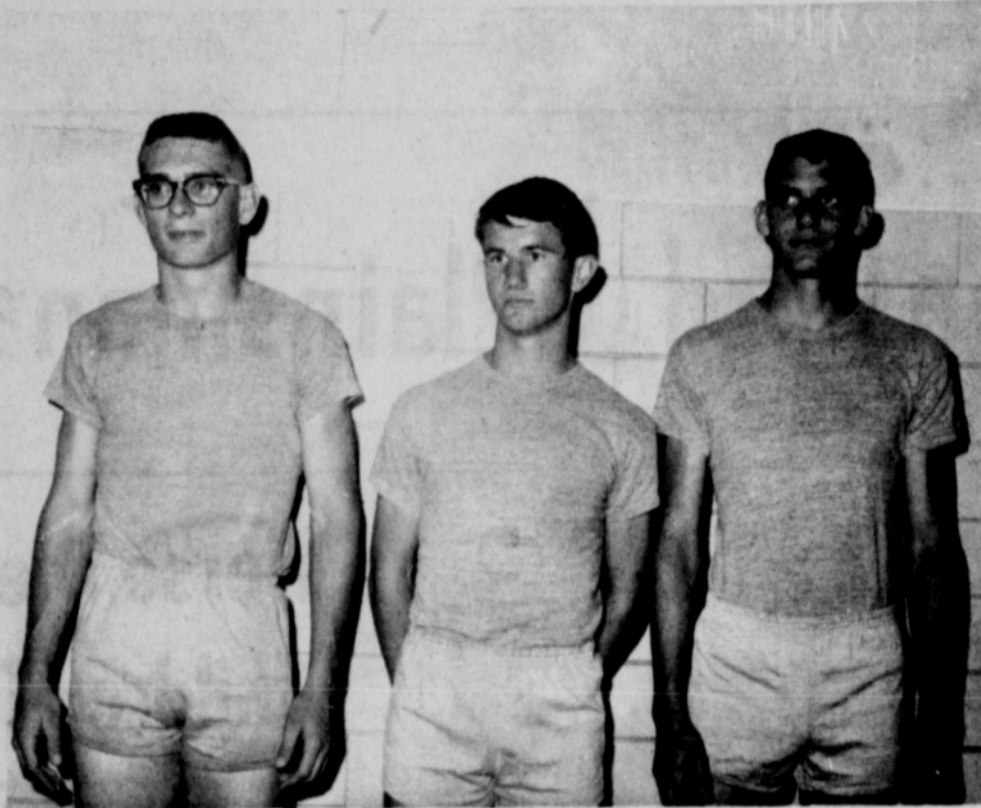

Track Team Finishes Last But Sets Some New Records

Spearman track men did not bring home any team trophies from the district track meet at Boys Ranch Saturday, but they did set some new district and school records.

The hard working Shufeldt brothers, won the only points gathered by the five-man high school track team. They also set some new school records in their two events.

Senior Ken Shufeldt placed second in the 880-yard dash and qualified to compete in the regional meeting Lubbock this weekend. He ran the 880 in 2:05.7. This is a new school record for the distance. He held the old record of 2:09.6.

Sophomore Hal Shufeldt placed fourth in the 440-yard dash with a time of 53.1. He broke a school record held by his brother.

In the Junior High competition the combined efforts of the freshmen, eighth graders and seventh graders won second place.

The freshmen finished third, but Wesley Jenkins and David Stafford set three new district

records. Jenkins set records in the 50 and 100 yard dash and Stafford set a new one in the 440 yard dash. Both the 100-yard dash record and the 440-yard records were held by Hal Shufeldt. Jenkins times were 11.1 in the 100 and 4.0 in the 40. Stafford ran the 440 in 54.8.

The 440 relay teams of Jenkins, Davis, Fisher and Stafford placed second, Roy Russell Jr. won third in discus and 4th in the shot.

Spearman had one first in the eighth grade competition. Randy Foshee won the 50 yard dash. The 880-yard relay team of Darrell Morgan, Lanny Barfield, Lewis Conner and Tony Byers finished second.

With Foshee replacing Morgan, the same runners placed fourth in the 440-yard relay.

Barfield got third in the 50-yard dash and Byers finished third in the 100-yard dash.

Barfield was fourth in the high jump and Tommy Regier was third in the chinning contest.

The seventh grade came the closest to winning first of all the teams. They won second in team totals.

Robert Archer and Tommy Loveday were the big point winners for the seventh graders. Archer won the high and low hurdles in times of 9.8 and 13.1. He ran a preliminary race with a time of 12.9. This time and the 9.8 in the high are new district records. He also won third in the shot and second in the discus events.

Tommy Loveday won second in the 100 yard dash and

first in the 50 yard dash.

The two boys teamed with Frank Lemon and Ed Womble to win the 440-yard relay.

Lemon was fourth in the 50 yard dash and Verlin Schuman was second in the pole vault. Henry Flores tied for first place in the chinning competition.

Wanda Greene Begins Season With 3 Firsts

Wanda Sue Greene, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett E. Greene of Spearman, entered her first district Play Day Horse show for this season held at Canyon Sunday.

She and her horse, Senor Ray, won first in the barrel race, with a time of 18.56 seconds; first in the key hole race, with a time of 5.29 seconds, first in the pole bending, with a time of 14.56 seconds, and second in the ring race, with a time of 14.33 seconds.

There will be five more district shows before the national finals at Fort Worth in October this year. Wanda Sue won 19 points for credit toward being eligible to go to the finals.

County Agent's Report

RAPID GAINERS ARE MORE EFFICIENT

How efficiently a beef animal utilizes its feed or forage can make the difference between profit and loss to a cattleman.

Research being done at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center, McGregor, shows rapid gaining cattle are also the most efficient in terms of feed eaten per pound of gain.

Naturally, animals which put on more weight in a specified period of time eat more but this A&M research shows they use the extra feed more efficiently to put on weight.

The research is being done by Walter Kruse, animal husbandman at McGregor, T.C. Cartwright, specialist in animal breeding at A&M and G. T. King, meat investigations specialist at A&M.

What does the feed efficiency research mean to the cattlemen? To a cow-calf operator, it means he should select rapid gaining animals for his breeding stock. Since gainability is highly heritable, the offspring should also be rapid gainers.

To the feedlot operator--it means he should buy cattle which are the offspring of rapid gaining parents. These offspring will have the high efficiency necessary for a profitable feedlot set up. Grade and conformation are also important when selecting beef animals.

In the animals on test, there was a strong tendency for feed efficiency to increase as weaning weights increased. This indicates that whatever tended to cause heavier weaning weights, other than feed consumption, relates to the greater efficiency.

In view of this, heavier calves at weaning appear to be the better bet for feedlot efficiency or to keep as breeding stock.

SHADE TREE INSECTS

Shade trees are attacked by several species of borers. The two most important are known as roundheaded and flatheaded borers.

Since the presence of borers is not always evident until it is too late to prevent extensive damage, good tree management is important in preventing borer attacks.

The trunks of young or transplanted trees should be wrapped with nursery wrapping paper, burlap, aluminum foil or newspapers to prevent egg laying by adult borers. Wrapping also aids in preventing sun scald and mechanical injury. Injured areas of the bark

are particularly vulnerable to boere attack.

The trunks should be sprayed with dieldrin, DDT or malathion before they are wrapped. Be sure to use the wettable powder form of these insecticides to avoid injuring the bark of the young trees when the wrapping is applied. Keep the wrapping on all year and replace it if it becomes torn.

Keep the tree or trees healthy and stimulate vigorous growth by proper fertilization and watering.

Prune out all dead or dying branches and paint the wounds with a good wound paint. Wounds made by lawn mowers or other machinery should be treated in the same manner.

Trees and shrubs should be selected which are adapted to the area and those which are not so susceptible to borer attacks. Ash, cottonwood, linden, soft maple and poplar are quite susceptible.

It is very important that the insecticides be applied early in the spring before the young borers get into the tree. Once they are in the tree control is very difficult. It is the larvae of the borers which cause the damage.

Information is available from my office on borer control and on other subjects dealing with the control of insects on ornamental plants. Ask for a copy of I-199, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants."

Don't you ever wonder what is behind the "miracle cures" or "quick cures" for certain diseases—what they are and do really do the job?

The answer to these questions will more than likely be "yes", because sometimes it is hard to find out facts behind labels and advertising before it's too late. And then we face the fact that although most products are what they claim to be, some certainly are not. How can we find out for ourselves?

Mrs. Leona Allman, consumer consultant for the Food and Drug Administration Dallas Division, will be in Spearman, Tuesday, April 26 for a program planned around these subjects. Her topic—"Fantastic Fads in Food and Drugs".

Every interested person in the county is invited to this program, which will be held in the Spearman Junior High School Auditorium at 2 p.m. April 26. I hope you will plan to attend, and bring your friends.

I'm sure Mrs. Allman will welcome any questions you may have after her program. This is your chance to become a wiser consumer of foods and drugs.

-If a drippy faucet has left a discoloration in your sink or tub, remove it by applying a paste of cream of tartar and peroxide.

-Freezing time will soon be here. Try flat-sided containers, which save more space than cylindrical or tub-shaped ones.

-Washing blankets, rugs or drapes in your bathtub? Use a plumber's friend to squash them up and down. This is akin to the agitator action in your automatic. If you have a small load of handwash in the sink, you can use your potato mash-

We called it "step-on pie". When we got back to the warmth and stillness of home, we carefully cut around that little footprint and with good hot coffee, the catastrophes of the season's first picnic were laughable indeed.

With the opening of Gruver's new library last weekend, we're reminded again of what an asset a library can be. By the way, I might say I think Mr. Neilson's gift of a library building for Gruver is marvelous and something for which he'll long be remembered and appreciated.

Far-sighted citizens keep reminding us, as Texans, that our public libraries are sadly lacking in equipment, methods, staffs and money. They tell us that only 84 cents is spent on each Texan annually for public library service, embarrassingly far below the national average of \$1.50. The American Library Association's recommended professional standard is from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per person.

You can see how inadequate our libraries are when you realize that if all the books in Texas were divided equally among Texans, you wouldn't even have one whole book of your own.

In a brochure from the First Governor's Conference of Libraries held recently in Austin: "A child needs good school and public library resources to prepare him for college, or for vocational training. If either type library is weak, a greater burden is thrown on the other. If both are weak, the student suffers damage that cannot be repaired later... It is too late to worry about competition for college entrance exams when a student reaches high school. The battle begins when the child learns to read. Whether he scores well on college entrance exams will be determined largely by the number and kind of books to which he has access throughout his entire school life."

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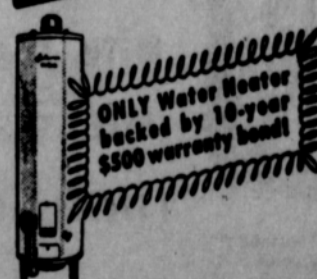
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Oslo Lutherans Go To District Conclave

Farmers, homeowners, chemical dealers and chemical aerial applicators are all being urged to cooperate in reducing the 2,4-D damage to susceptible broadleaf crops in Hansford County, according to Robert Adamson, Hansford County Agent.

The Hansford County Commissioner's Court did not invoke the Herbicide law but plans to try another year without the law, hoping that all interested parties will help reduce the damage on their own.

County Agent, Robert Adamson, lists some suggestions for all users of 2,4-D to help reduce this damage to all broadleaf crops. Broadleaf crops refer to plants such as Soybeans, Castorbeans, Cotton, Roses, Shade Trees, Tomatoes, etc.

After May 1 use the amine salt formulations of 2,4-D. They do not release enough vapors to cause damage.

Do not use the high volatile Esters after May 1 and use extreme caution with the low volatile Ester formulation after May 1. High volatile esters release vapors rapidly at about 80 degrees F. Low volatile esters release vapors at about 90 degrees F. Vapors from ester formulations can kill susceptible plants growing near the area where they are applied.

Avoid spraying on windy days and do not spray when the wind velocity is more than 10 miles per hour. Wind carried droplets of 2,4-D may kill susceptible crops near the area that is being treated.

Spray when the wind is blowing away from susceptible crops and toward the area being sprayed. Even with the amine form of 2,4-D it is recommended that a susceptible crop be no closer than 4 miles downwind when wind velocity is 7-10 miles per hour.

Use nozzles that apply a coarse spray to help reduce wind carried droplets or spray drift.

Use low pressures—no more than 35 pounds per square inch for boom sprayers, 100 pounds for spray guns.

2,4-D is a hormone type herbicide, says Adamson, which produces a physiological change in plant tissues without burning. Drift or vapors from 2,4-D causes a distortion of new growth. The time varies that this distortion begins to show up, depending on moisture, growth of plant, size of plant, etc. It can show up in a day or two or may take as many as seven days since it shows up in the new growth.

Even without the Herbicide Law in effect the farmer and custom aerial applicator are both liable for damage of susceptible crops if proof of damage can be shown.

Remember, says Adamson, if herbicides are applied carefully they can save you money and labor. If they are applied carelessly, they can kill your crops.

about it now?" I've heard, I've been inspired. Now how shall I put this point to use in my life. What will my personal response be to the sermon or Bible? How can I put it to use in daily life?

If we would do something about what we receive from God instead of just nodding our head in assent, then things would happen in Christian lives. Response is what is so often lacking. It isn't that we don't know better. It is just that we don't allow God's Spirit to put His new revelation or inspiration to work in our daily lives.

For example the closing words of Matthew 28:20 "Go... make disciples... baptizing... & teaching... and lo I am with you always, to the close of the age." A Great commission given. But a promise also to be with us always. So I live knowing God is near. I am not frightened for being afraid is a sin. I am then no longer trusting my God. So in my daily life, I think of the presence of God and His promises. It causes me to live with hope and joy and peace of mind.

I not only heard God in this verse, but I respond with action. I think about how I will live this verse, or sermon, or God's revelation. It helps!
