New chemical blood analyzer at local Hospital

The Hansford Hospital informed the newspaper this week that they have a new Chemical Blood Analyzer that will enable the hospital to analyze blood almost five to six times faster than in the past and will take the "human element" of risk out of analyzing blood. Doug Holmes, lab supervisor at Hansford Hospital, stated that the new machine is a computer blood machine and actually uses computer-punched cards to check blood on patients. Holmes went ahead to say that in the past when a patient came in with an emergency, sometimes it would take as long as 30 minutes to check a certain type of blood and this has been cut to as much as 6 minutes on the same blood check. This will be very valuable in the case of diabetes who might go into a coma, etc.

The new machine is programmed for the following 20 readings: Salicylate, Calcium, Cholesterol, SBP, CHS, Albumin, Globulin, Direct Bilirubin, Gamma Gplus, Uric Acid, Total Iion, Glucose, Total Protein, Bun, Total Bilirubin, Alk Phosphatase, SGO plus, SGP plus, LDA and CPK.

The Hansford Hospital is taking great strides to meet the needs of a booming county-wide need for medical services to the people of Spearman, Gruver, Morse and surrounding towns. This is another in many more modern, medical facilities for the Hansford Hospital. The new heart machine is being installed this week by the telephone company and will be in operation in the near future. Pictures and details on the new cardio machine will be run in all 3 county papers as soon as the installation is complete!

Absentee voting for the November 2 General Election will begin Wednesday, Oct. 13, at the County Clerk's office in the Hansford County Court House.

Absentee balloting will be conducted from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on days the Clerk's office is open.

The absentee balloting will continue through Oct. 29 at the close of business.

The Nov. 2 General Election will highlight the race for 64th District State Representative, the presidential contest and a hot senatorial contest.

The contest for State Representative for the 64th District is between incumbent, Bob Close of Perryton, and Dalhart ranchwoman, Daisy Moore.

A state wide campaign has also developed into a horse race, with incumbent, Senator Lloyd Bentsen, a Democrat, being challenged by a young and fast-rising Republican, Alan Steelman.

The only other contested state races are for State Railroad Commission where three candidates are battling for a seat.

Add to all this the presidential race with Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale representing the Democratic Party and Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole, the Republican interest, and this has created a lot of voter interest in Hansford County.

According to Helen Dry, tax assessor-collector, there are approximately 3,552 registered voters in Hansford County.

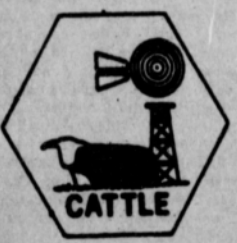

Well I could just go on and on because it is almost impossible to write about the women who have made our company what it is — women of every walk of life — every nationality, every age (the oldest patron I can think of was 94, the youngest was 7). The 7 year old was the daughter of a school teacher — the manager in that salon at that time is now our national supervisor. When I was visiting with her I asked her "Michael, what is the best thing that has happened to you and your new little figure." She replied "two things: they call me skinny at school and now I can sit on my Daddy's lap." You see I'm very lucky to have such gratifying memories.

So all so fortunate to have had such wonderful and dedicated personnel — women who are understanding of such problems are brought to us each and every day 6 days a week.
