High school winners in the second annual J.C. Penney Photojournalism Awards Day were announced Wednesday during a program at Travelodge West, Amarillo.

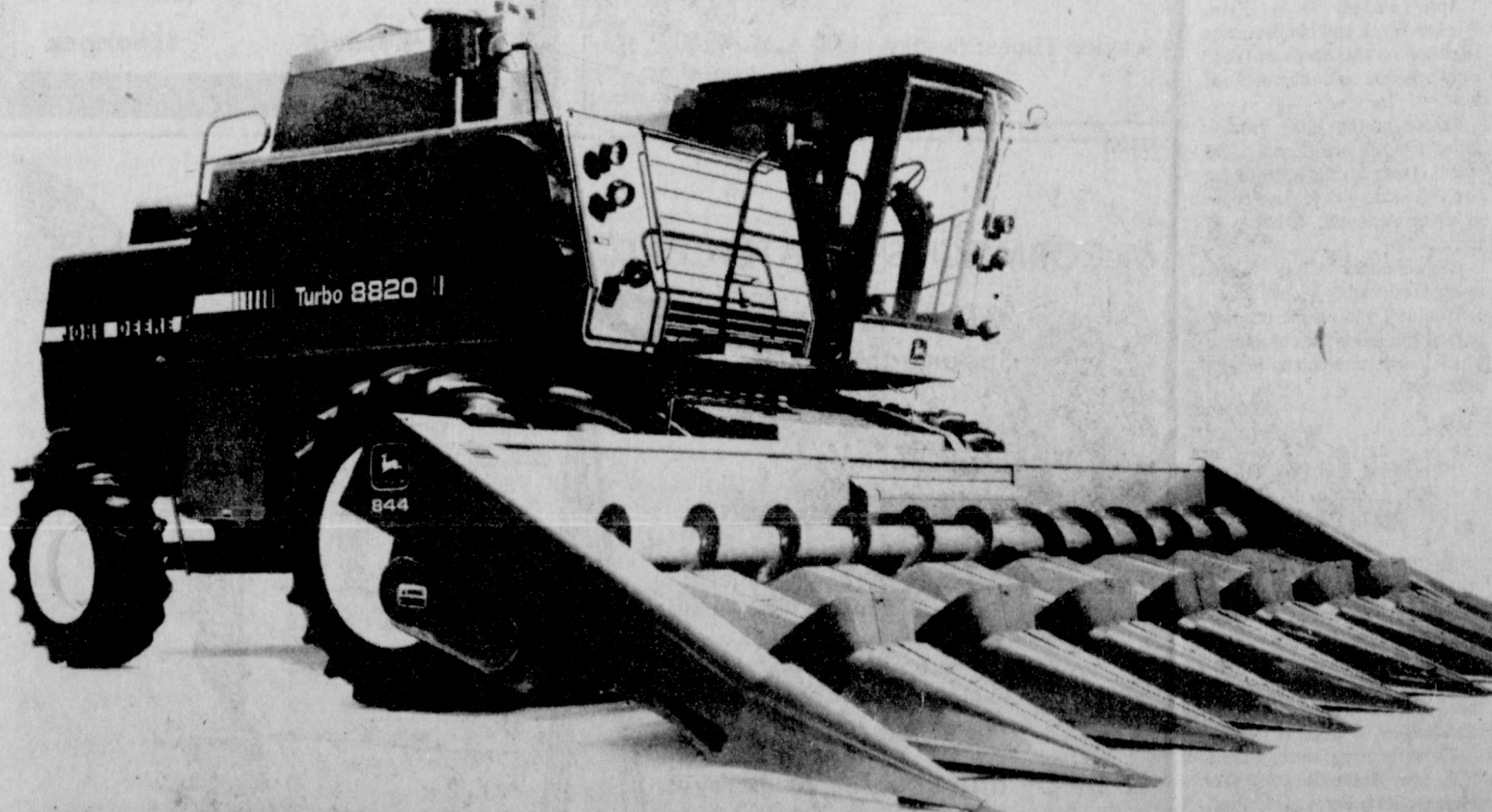
