Lynx calm Ranger wave 44-40

Will travel to Canadian Tuesday

Christmas drawings begin Dec. 3

The classy Perryton Rangers lost to the classier Spearman Lynx 44-40, in the opening game for the Lynx here Tuesday night. The Rangers complete with a large student body "Wave" played the Lynx a much better game than local fans anticipated.

Perryton led in the first quarter until 2:14 was left and Spearman's Mark Pearson hit a field goal to tie it 6-6. The jynxing Lynx went ahead in the first quarter to take a 12-8 lead.

In the second quarter, Perrytons Monty Langford shot with 5:34 left in the second to tie it 12 all. The teams took turns and at 3:15 before the half, a free shot by Tim Willis of Spearman made it 14 all. The Lynx added another basket and took an 18-16 half-time lead.

In the third quarter Perryton took the lead 31-30 with five freeshots. In the fourth quarter, with 5 minutes left in the game, Ross Donahue tied it all up again at 37-37. Donahue pumped in 10 points in the final period.

With about three minutes left in the game, Spearman's Jeff Graves hit a beautiful shot from the left side to sew up the Lynx lead. The Lynx scored three points in the last minute to win it 44-40.

Donahue led all scorers with 21 points; Pearson had 11; Thad Reid had 3; Steve Burke, Boh Cook, Allan Mires, and Jeff Graves all had 2. Tim Willis hit 1.

The Lynx shot 59% at the line, and the Rangers 29%.

The Lynx will play Canadian there with games beginning at 4:30.

Students to give Blood

High School students will be participating in a blood drive Wednesday, Nov. 28th from 2:30 to 6 P.M.

The drive is through the Coffee Memorial Blood Center, Inc., Amarillo, and is sponsored by the student council.

Each student giving blood will receive a free T-shirt.

Each donor may give for:

1. An established blood donor club: These credits may be used to partially pay processing charges incurred by any member of the blood donor club or anyone so designated by the chairman of the blood donor club. This blood donor club would provide coverage for any person, so designated by the chairman of the blood donor club, whether they donate or not. This will not penalize persons who previously were not covered because of their in-eligibility to donate.

Each donation or credit to the blood donor club is valued at \$10.00.

In order for more members to be able to benefit from this coverage, credit will be forwarded to the hospital for each blood component used by an individual.

Most existing insurance companies pay 80% of the processing charges. Blood donor club credits will provide the additional 20% needed by the individual. So in essence their processing charges will be covered 100% through the combined use of individual insurance and the blood donor club.

Please do not confuse transfusion charges, set-up fees, and additional hospital fees for administering transfusions with processing charges.

Credits in your blood donor club are valid for a 12 month period and may be transferred at the discretion of the blood donor club chairman only.

These same credits can be

transferred to any one of the aforementioned 23 area hospitals or to other states that may be members of the National Clearing house and associated with the American Association of Blood Banks.

2. Personal Credit: Anyone may request a personal credit which would be kept on record and can be used at your discretion any time during the next 12 months.

For such purposes as:

1. transferred to a specific donor club
2. used as a replacement credit

Upon notification Blood center personnel are available for assistance in transferring these credits. 3. Replacement Credit: A \$10.00 credit will be forwarded to the hospital for each blood component used by an individual to assist him or her in paying for processing charges during hospitalization. Please indicate name of patient and hospital.

County highway work planned

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission Tuesday approved the 1985 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program that includes work in Hansford County.

The program, backed by new monies made available by the recently increased fuel tax and registration fees, includes \$180,378 to seal coat State Highway 207, from SH 15 north 19 miles to the Oklahoma state line.

Also, the program provides \$203,481 to seal coat SH 136, from SH 15 north, west and north 18 miles to the Oklahoma state line; and \$129,694 to seal coat SH 15, from Spearman northeast 7.1 miles to the Ochiltree County line.

Amarillo District Engineer A.L. McKee said a seal coat protects and extends the service of roadways—often those with cracking and slick surfaces. The seal coat work will be performed next summer.

The annual program was not undertaken last year due to limited funds.

Ed Garner is Rotary speaker

At the Monday noon meeting of the Spearman Rotary at the Cattlemen's Restaurant Ed Garner, World War POW in Japan, described very vividly the present day Japanese conditions as compared with those at those same locations during World War II.

Where there were trails with a few thatched huts with small individual rice paddies, and a town where the prison camp was located, now the trails are paved roads and in some places 4-lane highways leading to the many small factories in the North where parts, sub-assemblies, or in some cases the complete units are built. Many times within a home.

Where a village was located in 1942 there are now towns the size of Spearman or Perryton.

The village where the prison camp had been located didn't exist any more. There is now a iron ore mine and a factory and highrise apartments.

Phillips donates historical site to state

AUSTIN -- Phillips Petroleum Company recently announced the donation of a portion of the historic San Jacinto Battleground to the State of Texas in a presentation to Governor Mark White.

"I want to thank Phillips Petroleum for this impressive donation valued at over \$2.5 million. I can think of no better way to celebrate the Texas Sesquicentennial than to expand our state's parkland," Governor White said.

C.J. Silas, president and chief operating officer of Phillips Petroleum made the presentation. "It is our hope that this property will enhance the historical appeal of the battleground area and will help to commence the celebration of the anniversary of Texas. We trust that the people of Texas will regard this gift as an expression of Phillips' appreciation for Texas spirit -- a spirit that has fostered a business climate that is the envy of the nation and the oil industry."

Governor White also thanked the Texas Conservation Foundation for arranging the Phillips donation. The Foundation is a state agency which promotes voluntary support for parks and wildlife programs.

Foundation Chairman George L. Bristol of Austin said the 155-acre tract located near Houston is the most valuable property ever given to the state through the Foundation, but is only the first of many gifts anticipated in observance of the 150th anniversary of Texas.

The Phillips tract will be added to the existing 327-acre San

Jacinto State Historical Park.

The site commemorates the Battle of San Jacinto, the concluding battle of the War of Independence which separated Texas from Mexico. During the fight on April 21, 1836, the Mexican army was driven from positions in the current state park and retreated into the portion of the field now being acquired. There, many men became mired in the marshy ground and were caught by the pursuing Texas forces.

The site lies at the confluence of Buffalo Bayou and the San Jacinto River. Since the opening of the Houston Ship Channel, the area around the battleground has become a major oil port, refining and manufacturing district. Phillips Petroleum acquired the property originally for industrial development but, because of the land's historical significance, is donating it to the state as a Sesquicentennial gift.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Chairman Ed Cox, Jr. said, "The San Jacinto park is already the most visited park in the state system. With the attention of the state focused on San Jacinto during the Sesquicentennial, there will be thousands more visitors, making the additional land even more welcome."

Both Bristol and Cox emphasized the state's need for more parkland. The Texas Conservation Foundation was established by the Legislature to help businesses and individuals with details and tax consequences of donations for parks, wildlife and historic preservation purposes.

Farm production costs to rise

Farmers will once again have to deal with rising production costs in 1985.

"Production cost rises will generally exceed the inflation rate next year," says Dr. Forrest Stegelin, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "These increases in input costs will virtually offset any increase in market receipts."

Stegelin expects manufactured fertilizer prices for all forms of nitrogen, phosphates and potash to be up 6 percent by spring. However, there may be regional declines in prices due to a decline in the outlook for farm crop prices and a decline in the demand for farm goods.

The economist foresees a continued moderation in prices of ag chemicals for 1985. "While the demand remains strong for ag chemicals, prices have declined due to the demise of patents as companies try to protect their market share from free market infringement," notes Stegelin.

Petroleum prices for fuels will be up about 4 percent by this time next year, notes the economist. Seasonal variations will depend on heating needs. A 3-4 percent growth in farm demand is expected, but farm usage is so minimal relative to total usage of fuels that

farm prices will parallel wholesale or rack prices, Stegelin adds.

"Farmers and ranchers can expect rebates and sales incentive programs from the farm machinery industry which is bulging with large inventories of all items," Stegelin points out. "It's too bad the farmer is burdened with high real interest rates for operating loans."

The economist advises farmers to expect heavy price discounting for large four-wheel drive tractors and hefty price increases on some models of front-wheel drive assist tractors touting fuel efficiency and improved manageability in field conditions. Prices also are expected to be up nearly 10 percent on small horsepower tractors, many of which will be imports.

Overall, prices for farm machinery will rise faster than for any other production input, says Stegelin.

Named for King Phillip II of Spain, the Philippines were visited by Magellan in 1521. Local workers attend conference

Austin—More than 50 representatives from government, agriculture, and social service organizations participated recently in an all-day tour of project sites that utilize workers from the Green Thumb senior employment program.

Girlstown needs financial help

Girlstown USA's Borger campus needs help—at least \$163,000 worth-by Nov. 30.

The rejuvenating facility four miles east of Borger hopes to build a \$1,016,000 residential treatment center as part of its revamped program, but there's a catch.

The Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Okla., has offered Girlstown a \$399,000 challenge grant, but the Borger center first must come up with a total of \$667,078, by Nov. 30, Director Don Myers said Friday.

Myers said a Pampa woman has donated a 258,000 section of land to Girlstown, but the center needs to sell that and apply the cash toward its \$877,000 goal.

"We need to sell that land. It would be a tremendous jump for us if we could do that," Myers said. "My work's cut out for me."

"But from what I've seen, there's enough interest in Girlstown and what's going on here that I feel we'll accomplish it," Myers said.

He said the residential treatment center for which the money is needed is a major part of the restructuring of

Girlstown's operation.

For the past 17 years, he said, the Borger campus has operated as a basic child care institution with a licensed capacity of 25 girls.

Girls who suffered from abuse or neglect, whose parents were unable to care for them or who were simply unwanted were taken to the Girlstown campus.

But only nine to 15 girls, ages 5-17, were usually in residence at the campus, and the Girlstown Board of directors concluded that the facility wasn't reaching its full use potential, Myers said.

So last year, he said, the decision was reached to convert Girlstown to a residential treatment center.

The "new" Girlstown will help teenaged girls who are runaways, who have suffered family abuse or have become victims to alcoholism or drug dependence, Myers said.

"You wouldn't believe how many teenager alcoholics there are," he said.

Girls who enter the Borger campus will not be there for a number of

years, as had sometimes been the case in the past.

The new entrants, who will range from 12 to 18 years old and mostly be residents of the Panhandle, will in many cases remain there only six months to a year, Myers said.

"It will be more short term. We expect them to stay about six months to a year. It won't be a situation where they come and grow up here," Myers said.

He explained that whereas the present Girlstown staff consists of five members (a counselor, an administra-

tor and three dorm mothers), the new staff will number about 23 and will consist of psychologists, psychiatrists, psychiatric social workers and other specially-trained personnel.

The staff members will work with girls to solve their problems so they can assume a normal, useful role in society, he said.

The center will have a 30-girl capacity and already has three times that many referrals, Myers said.

"We're also going to increase our budget from \$100,000 to \$500,000, so we feel we're going to contribute
