Spearman 13, Perryton 13, tie!



TO CELEBRATE 102nd BIRTHDAY- Mrs. Hettie Davis will be celebrating her 102nd birthday Sunday, Nov. 5 from 2 to 4 p.m. at Senior Village in Perryton. You are invited to attend.

The Spearman Lynx and the Perryton Rangers played to a 13-13 tie at Ranger Stadium on Friday night. It was a real preview to the Halloween week-end for fans, who almost were in shock for the entire game. Spearman's Florencio Martinez missed a 34 yard field goal by inches as the clock ran out of time--made more difficult by a penalty the play before--and none of the more than 5,000 present, the largest crowd in 10 years, was sure of the outcome of the game until an official signaled that the kick was short by inches. While the tie will go into the record book as a tie, the games statistics may propel the Rangers into the play-offs, if they go undefeated in their conference games the rest of the season.

Spearman scored in the second quarter on an 81 yard run by Newton, and Martinez kicked the extra point to tie the Rangers, who had taken an early 7-0 lead in the first period.

Just before the half, the Rangers drove to the one foot line, and the Lynx stopped them, and recovered a fumble to thwart the Ranger scoring drive.

Bodey set up the second Lynx touchdown by racing to the one yard line, in the third period, and the Lynx took a 13-7 lead, as the try for extra point failed.

It looked like the Lynx were going to win the game, but the Rangers switched quarterbacks and put in a passing quarterback that

came back with less than 3 minutes on the scoreboard to tie the game, at 13-13. The entire Lynx line blocked the extra point try.

In the ream

In the remaining 2:40 the Lynx took the ball and drove to the 13 yard line in 3 plays. The big plays were a 22 yard pass interference call against the Rangers, which put the ball on the 49. The next big play was the third unbelievable reception by Martin in as many attempts in the second half. Though surrounded by three defenders, he pulled down a 36 yard pass as the Perryton 13 with 27 seconds left.

The rest is history! The field goal was short by only inches, and the game ended in a tie!

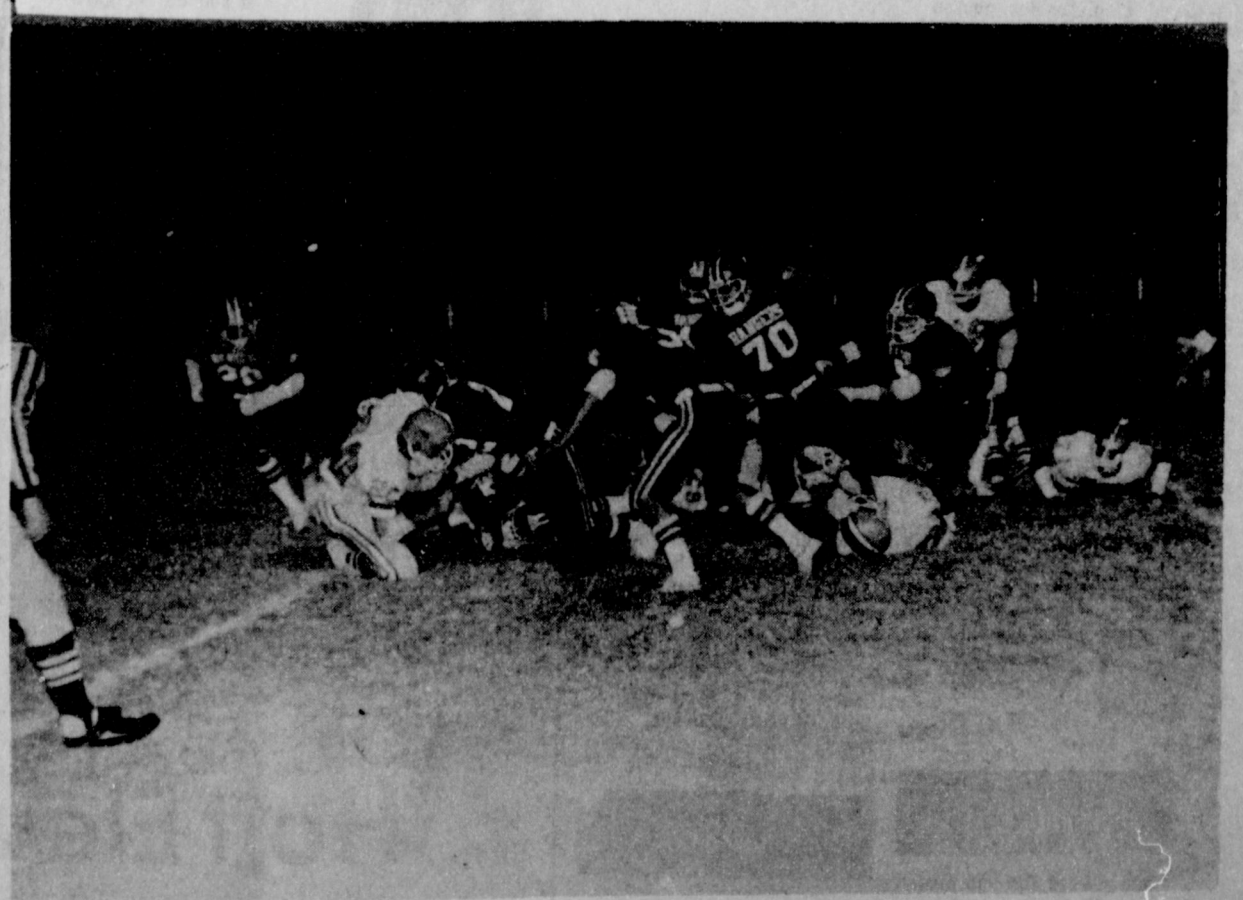

Crop & Livestock Reports Needed

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the final acreage, yield, and production of crops and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Reliable information on what is produced, how much, and where is important to farmers, ranchers, and others in making production and marketing decisions and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. These are also essential to farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning, and enacting wise legislation and are used in establishing

From mid-November to early January, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. Accurate estimates have always been of great importance to producers and are even more important in light of the supply-demand situation facing agriculture today. Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the state of Texas. Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agriculture Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

County statistics for 1977 and January 1, 1978, are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P. O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767, or by writing Reagan V. Brown,

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Texas 4-H Center To Be Dedicated

The Texas 4-H Center, completed in 1975 at Lake Brownwood, will be formally dedicated November 8, announces Peggy Winegarner, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Special ceremonies will begin at 11 a.m. and will include a "burning of the note" indicating the final payment on the \$1.5 million facility. A special plaque to be placed at the center will also be unveiled. Keynote speakers on the program will be T. Louis Austin

of Dallas, chairman of the Texas 4-H Foundation and chairman and chief executive of Texas Utilities Co. and Grant Shrum of Washington, D.C., executive director of the National 4-H Council.

The 4-H center is owned by the Texas 4-H Foundation which is a nonprofit educational organization that arranges for financial support of the 4-H program. The center is staffed by Extension Service personnel. Purpose of the center, built solely from private funds, is to

provide a setting for training both youth and adults in a wide range of areas but centering primarily on leadership, points out Mrs. Winegarner. Since the center opened its doors in 1975, some 8,000 to 10,000 persons have received training annually.

The facility is open the year round, with the summer months devoted mainly to 4-H camps and the school months used for volunteer training. Any organization with an educational program may use the center, says Mrs. Winegarner.

Canadian foliage tour scheduled October 29

The annual Foliage Tour in the Canadian area will be held on Sunday, October 29.

The event, sponsored by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, will have several programs and points of interest in conjunction with the tour this year.

The Foliage Tour will be from Canadian to Lake Marvin and A.S. Jackson's Nature Trail will be marked on the east side of the lake. The concession stand at the lake will be open. The free Hobby Show and Sale

will be at the City Hall on Main street.

The Business and Industrial Tour will start at the Moody Building, where tickets may be purchased. The tour will include the Moody Building, the Canadian Millworks, and a bus trip to a drilling rig.

Across the street from the Moody Building a film entitled "Making a Hole" may be seen before the trip to the drilling rig. Price of tickets for the Business Tour will be \$2 for

adults and \$1 for children.

The cafes in Canadian will be open that day, including the Beef Country restaurant, the Vic Mon restaurant, Sage Restaurant, Dairy Queen, Pizza Hut, Oasis Cafe, Bobby's Cafe. Also the Women's Service League will have the Kountry Kitchen open in the Coffee Shop in the Moody Building.

The cottonwoods and other trees in the Lake Marvin area are beginning to turn and it appears that the foliage will be beautiful on October 29.

Check On Your Automobile Registration

AUSTIN -- It's time for a last-minute checkup. Look at your automobile registration plate.

Does the validation sticker expire in October, 1978? If so, you have until October 31 to get a new validation sticker for your vehicle.

R.W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, reminded motorists today that they should have received October renewal registration applications by mail.

If you do not have the new three-part registration renewal card, you must take your most recent registration receipt, car title and the registration fee to your county tax assessor-collector to obtain a new validation sticker. Many county assessors-collectors will not accept checks and require cash or money

orders with the application. Under the new year-around registration law, about 700 thousand vehicle registrations expire each month. They must be renewed for one year during the month of registration, since the last of the short-term transition registrations expired in September.

The staggered registration system was conceived to eliminate long lines at the last minute when more than 10 million registrations were filed in two months. You can make the short lines shorter still by promptness in registering your vehicle.



Coyote Control Device Training Set

Area farmers, ranchers and commercial trappers will have the opportunity to become licensed in the use of the M-44 coyote control device at a training meeting on Monday, November 6 at 7:30 p.m. in the County Extension meeting room in the courthouse in Stinnett.

The program will provide the training necessary for persons to become certified users of the M-44 coyote control device. The license became a requirement with passage of the 1975 Texas Pesticide Control Act.

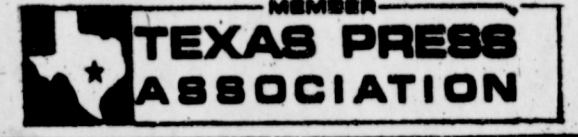
Conducting the program will be Robert Avant, Pesticide Applicator Licensing Agent, with the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin.

BREAD MAKING AT KINDERGARTEN

Thanks to the creative thinking of Miss Patty Harris and her co-teacher Miss Cindy Sweeney a new learning experience was presented to their four groups of five and six year old students. The teachers felt the student would learn by actually participating in the bread making process.

Mrs. Molly Turner gave a brief history of planting, harvesting, shipping, and milling of wheat with demonstrations to show what the whole wheat grain was changed into whole wheat flour. Bill Nelson, executive vice-president of Texas Wheat Producers, supplied her with literature to help the students to learn more about this commodity.

The students watched and participated with much excitement. A boy in the class knew that wheat was shipped to Chicago and that Chicago is in the state of Illinois. Another student wanted to know how wheat got into flour.

The children were told the

importance of bread in our daily diet and how important agriculture is to everyone.

Mrs. Elaine Odegaard began the bread making by showing the students how to measure the ingredients and what to use to make bread such as flour, sugar, milk, salt and shortening. The children asked many questions.

Each student got to taste the bread "starter" or yeast and this brought several reactions and comments. Then they each got to help stir in the flour and to knead a small portion of the dough. One of the students wanted to take the dough home with him to play with and make things.

The bread dough was left in the room for the children to watch it rise.

The highlight of each class was the smelling and the eating of hot, fresh homemade bread and butter.

A recipe was sent home with each student.

Mrs. Turner and Mrs. Odegaard are members of W.I.F.E. and their husbands are local farmers who help produce wheat to help feed the hungry world.

FLAME-RETARDANT TENTS

A 12-year old boy suffered extensive third-degree burns when a candle ignited the canvas tent and the sleeping bag in which he was camping out in his own backyard. About 5,000 injuries occur each year while campers are using portable cooking, lighting and heating equipment. Many of these mishaps could be avoided if more tents were flame-retardant.

The university of Minnesota documented 75 tent fires that resulted in 119 injuries, 27 of them fatal. Involved most often were umbrella or cabin-type tents made of cotton which can burn in 40 seconds to three minutes.

Actually, flame-retardant tents have been available for more than 30 years, and

least four states require those there to meet standards. However, only 30% of tents on the market in 1975 were flame-retardant. The Canvas Products Association International says most of its member tent makers now produce labeled flame-retardant products.

Play it safe. Always use flame-retardant tents and sleeping bags and assume materials can burn unless they are so labeled.

GSPA Officers Elected

Members of Grain Sorghum Producers Association recently cast ballots to select their county president and vice president. The farmers elected to these positions serve as "policy making" representatives from their county to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Ted Godfrey of Spearman was elected Hansford County President, and Georgia Holt, also of Spearman, will serve as Vice President.

The new GSPA directors will take office for a two year term on October 1.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association represents grain sorghum farmers in legislation at the state and national levels. GSPA's goal is to speak in behalf of sorghum producers on all farm policy decisions and to see that they get the best deal possible.

Grain sorghum targets were set at \$4.07 per hundred weight in the 1977 Agricultural Act, while corn targets were set at \$3.57 per hundred weight for the 1977 crop. The increase in grain sorghum targets was the result of Grain Sorghum Producers Association working to establish a Nationwide Cost of Production Study in 1973, and

getting Congress to set the targets of sorghum in relation to corn based upon the cost of production rather than the nutritional value.

Other activities of GSPA include foreign markets sales promotion. It is estimated that each additional million tons of feed grains exported will increase the producer's income by 8 cents per bushel.

The newly elected GSPA Directors will be supervising these activities and they invite every sorghum producer to join this worthwhile program.

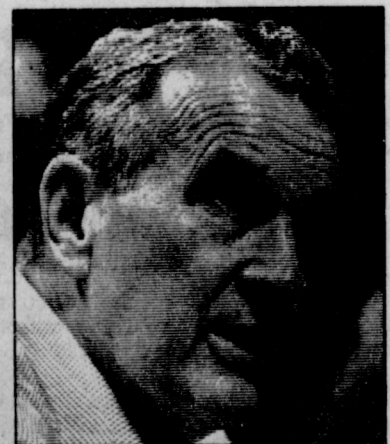

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


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
