The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Hansford County wells in 1981 enriched the county's economy and accounted for \$84.9-million of the \$44-billion value placed on Texas petroleum production last year.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association said the county ranked 109th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of value of its marketed petroleum production. This production includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 422,497 barrels of crude oil, valued at \$14.6-million, and 39.4-billion cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$70.3-million. Owners of royalty in the county received \$10.6-million as their share of the output, the Association noted.

Although the oil and gas industry is suffering through a slowdown in drilling—attributable in large part to a worldwide decline in demand for petroleum products—it continues to be the cornerstone of the economy of Texas and many of its counties," said the Association's chairman, Avery Rush, Jr., of Amarillo. "Oil and gas producers operating in Texas remain committed to the drilling of every well that is economically feasible," Rush added.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$5.9-million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$670,308, while natural gas levies totalled \$5.2-million.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 465 oil and gas industry employees

Halloween costume contest

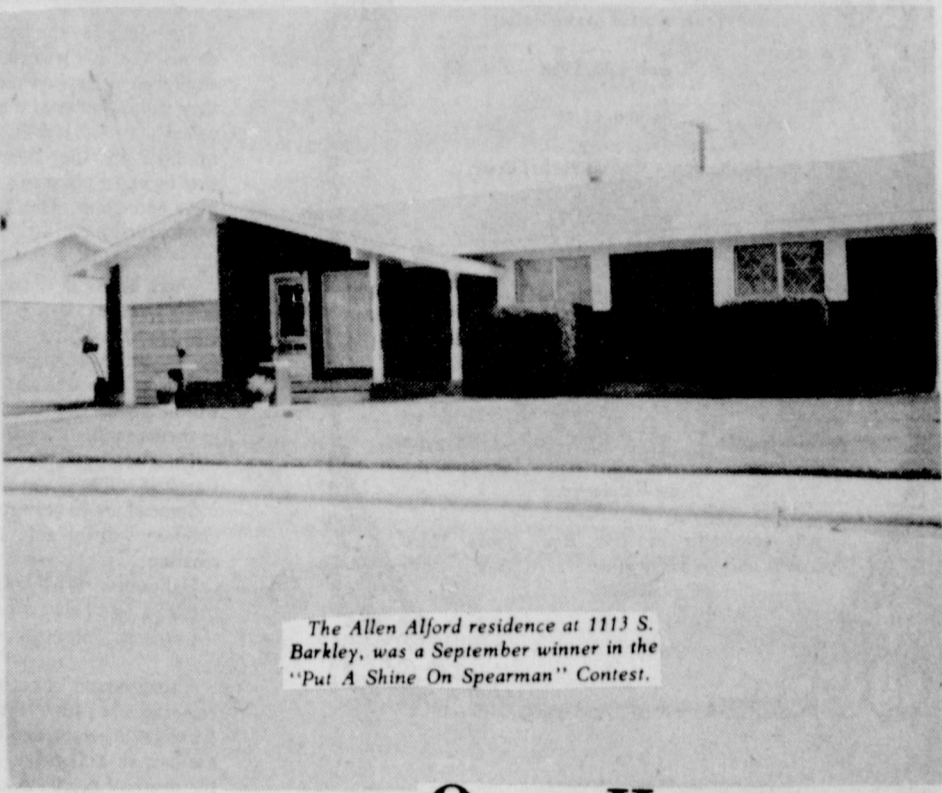
The Retail Merchants Association is sponsoring a Halloween Costume Contest and parade, October 30.

In the county received wages of about \$10.1-million in 1981.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county oil and gas operators spent a reported \$27.6-million in the drilling of 56 wells, including two wildcat, or exploratory, wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 13 oil wells and 17 gas wells, although some \$12.5-million was lost in the drilling of 26 dry holes. As of April 1, 1982, there were 875 producing wells in the county; 191 oil and 684 gas.

Petroleum processing also contributed to the county economy, with two natural gasoline processing plants, having a total daily capacity of 333.9-million cubic feet of natural gas in operation.

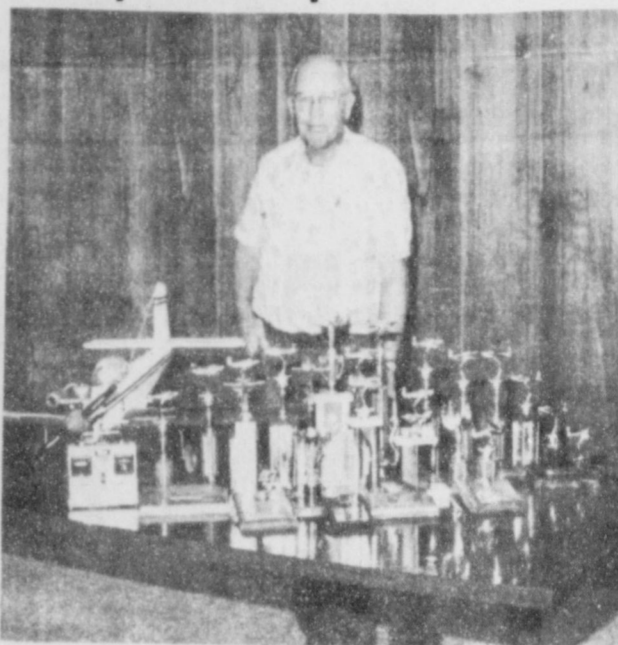
Library hours are 10-12; 2-6 on weekdays, and 9-1 on Saturdays.

Glass coating materials may be used on motor vehicles

AUSTIN--Under new Texas regulations effective October 18, 1982 glass coating materials may be installed on all motor vehicle windows except windshields.

Previously, it was illegal to place the materials on the windows to the immediate left and right of the driver's seat. However, the new regulations allow coating materials approved by the Texas Department of Public Safety to be installed on those windows.

The window film materials, which are sold under various brand names, are designed to reduce glare and the build up of heat inside the passenger compartment by limiting the amount of sunlight passing through the windows.

Glass coating materials applied to windows behind the driver's seat need not to be approved by the DPS. However, vehicles with window film applied to the rear window must

have outside rear view mirrors on the right and left sides.

Coating which meet DPS standards cannot block more than two-thirds of the light directed at the material. Laboratory tests confirming that coating meet the DPS standards must be filed with the Department before approval is granted. Regulations also require that the manufacturer's name or number and approval designation appear on the material placed on each of the front side windows.

DPS Director Jim Adams said Department staff members had received numerous inquiries about the materials from the public.

"One reason we held off changing the regulations is that until three months ago, none of these coatings had been approved by a nationally-accredited organization," Adams said.

"When the American Association of Motor Vehicle

Administrators approved several samples during the summer, we determined that the DPS policy prohibiting use of the materials on front side windows was no longer valid."

Adams pointed out that many sunbelt states do not prohibit the use of glass coatings on the driver's side windows.

DPS officials said some window film samples have already been evaluated by the Department and approved for use of the front side windows of motor vehicles.

Echocardiography aids heart disease diagnosis

Echocardiography is rapidly establishing itself as one of the most important advances in the diagnosis of heart disease.

As its name indicates, echocardiography uses high-frequency sound waves (ultrasound) to view the inside of the heart, says the Texas Medical Association. The principle is similar to that of sonar used in ships to determine ocean depth. This involves measuring the time it takes for the sound wave to bounce off the bottom and return to the ship.

Aimed at the heart, ultrasound indicates the depth of the organ's various parts and, with a timing device, allows the

doctor to determine certain aspects of the heart's motion. Problems may be detected. These include the thickening, narrowing or shortening of heart valves, which can result in valve leaks.

Echocardiography also may detect a tumor causing the heart to malfunction, heart chambers that are too small or large, or fluid around the outside of the heart. A heart wall that moves improperly or bulges out can be detected. In children, congenital problems may be found.

Echocardiography is being used successfully for screening patients and determining those who need more elaborate tests,

such as cardiac catheterization, angiography and other exams that require hospitalization and carry some risks. Though requiring rather elaborate apparatus, echocardiography involves neither hospitalization nor the use of tubes or needles. Rather a small, microphone-like device is placed on the patient's chest.

The instrument also is used to follow the progress of heart disease in patients who have

undergone cardiac catheterization and angiography. This often eliminates the need to repeat these elaborate tests.

Cardiologists--doctors who are heart specialists--also use personal history, a physical examination, x-rays and the electrocardiogram (EKG) to diagnose heart problems. But echocardiography has enabled them to diagnose these problems earlier and with greater precision.

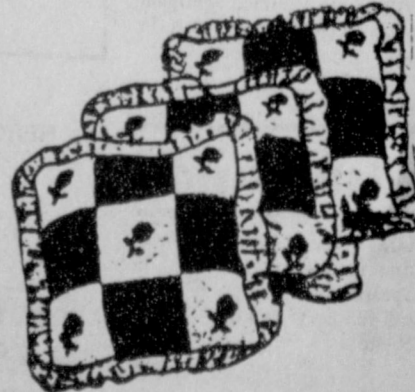

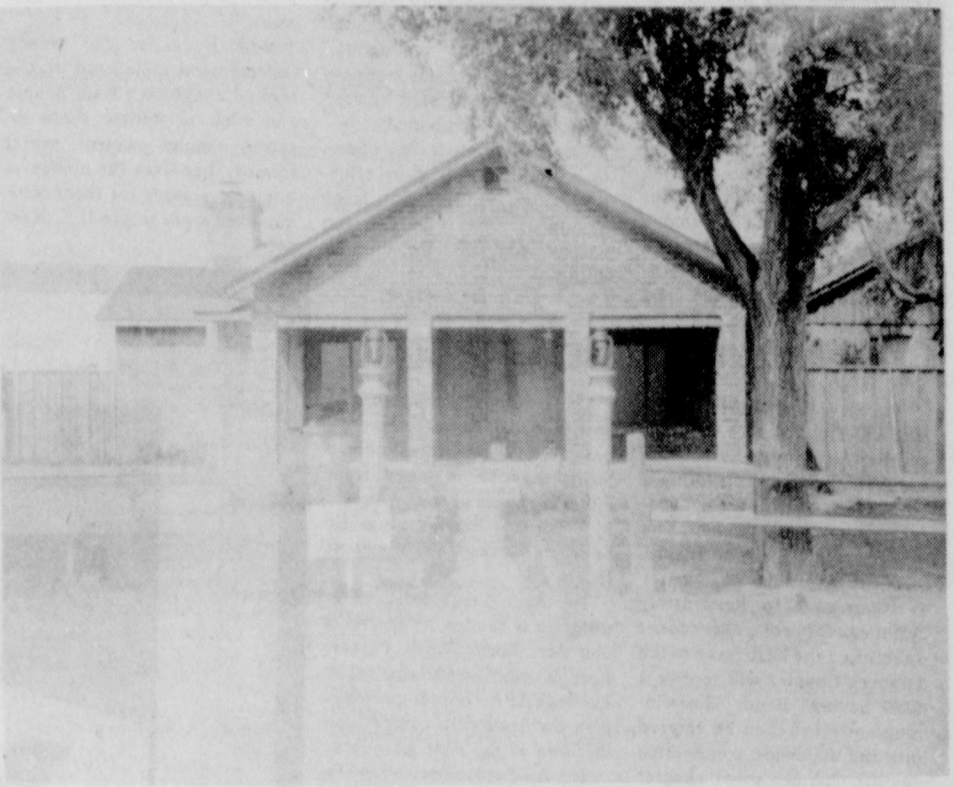
performing the classical masterpiece years ago as a Christmas service.

Arthritis quackery still big business

Arthritis has no known cure, as the 31 million Americans who suffer from it and related diseases are well aware. Just as aware of this are the inventors of quack devices and "miracle cures," says the Texas Medical Association.

For every dollar spent on arthritis research, \$25 is spent on useless nostrums, unapproved devices, unnecessary food supplements and arthritis diet books, according to Consumer Reports magazine. The total annual tab for arthritis quackery is estimated to be \$950 million.

One dangerous and powerful drug making a comeback as an unapproved arthritis treatment is Leifcort. This hormone compound was developed and promoted nearly 20 years ago by Dr. Robert Leifman, who fled to Canada to avoid arrest for selling a purported baldness cure. He continued to sell Leifcort there until his death in 1972.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration says a number of Leifman's colleagues are back in business in the U.S. and operating as the Arthritis Medical Offices and the Arthritis Medical Center. Leifcort—under new names like "Hormone Balance Treatment," "Balanced Hormone Treatment," "Holistic Balance Treatment" and

"Rheumatril"—is being sold in clinics often set up in hotel rooms. The FDA says the combination of hormones in Leifcort poses a danger to health.

Another product that the FDA says has not been proven effective is a snake venom combination called PROven. Made from cobra and krait venom, PROven has been given to people with rheumatoid arthritis and multiple sclerosis.

"Special" arthritis diets abound, but the Arthritis Foundation says what you eat neither causes nor cures the disease. Everything from cod liver oil, alfalfa, pokeberries and blackstrap molasses to a mixture of honey, vinegar, iodine and kelp have been sold for arthritis diets. In the 1960s, the FDA confiscated about 2,000 bottles of seawater to break up a nationwide swindle.

The best advice for arthritis victims is to be wary of products that offer "special" or "secret" formulas, promise quick or easy cures, or are promoted by case histories and testimonials.

The only product that seems to relieve arthritic pain effectively is aspirin in large amounts. Your doctor can advise you on the proper dosage.

Conference to examine Ag outlook, marketing strategies for Panhandle

Farmers and cattlemen in Hansford County will hear what a group of industry leaders and specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service see just ahead for Panhandle agriculture during the North Plains Outlook and Market Strategy Conference in Amarillo next Wednesday, October 27.

An outstanding group of speakers from Texas and other states will examine the economic outlook and offer marketing strategies to help crop and livestock producers in this area cope with the situation, Jim Smith, Hansford County Extension Agent, said.

The program will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West, in Amarillo. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. The conference starts at 9:20 a.m. and concludes at 3:30 p.m. A registration fee of \$10 includes lunch and conference proceedings, Smith said.

The program will deal with current obstacles to agriculture in the state and the North

"The prospect for recovery in agriculture and ways area producers can 'hang tough' is the main thrust for the conference," said Dr. Roland Smith project supervisor in marketing for the Extension Service.

The outlook for U.S. Business and economy will be examined by Jim Riley, economist with the National Cattlemen's Assn., Denver. The implications of this for area producers will be analyzed by Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist and marketing specialist, from College Station.

Problems in international trade will be discussed by Winston Wilson, president of U.S. Wheat, Inc., Washington, D.C. A wheat producer at

Quanah in addition to heading the commodity group, Wilson returned last month from a marketing trip to Russia.

Farm program decisions for 1983 will be viewed by Dr. Ronald Knutson, Extension economist and marketing and policy specialist, College Station. The grain outlook for the Panhandle will be projected by Edward G. Smith, Extension economist and grain marketing specialist, College Station.

Dr. Ray Sammons, Extension economist and marketing specialist at Amarillo will explain enterprise production costs.

The outlook for beef cattle will be presented by Dr. Edward Uvacek Jr., Extension economist and livestock marketing specialist, College Station. Marketing alternatives for cattlemen will be discussed by Dr. Ernest Davis, Extension economist and livestock and marketing specialist, College Station.

Keep your child from choking

Halloween brings ghosts, goblins and, sometimes, real danger. The American Lung Association of Texas warns about one danger for children—the risk of choking on holiday treats such as candy corn, hard candy, and peanuts.

At Halloween, children go door-to-door trying to fill their sacks full of candy and other goodies. Parents should insist youngsters bring the treats home for inspection. For the youngest—two, three or even four year olds—some of the candy can be divided or mashed before eating.

The chewing and swallowing muscles of young children may not be sufficiently developed to cope with certain treats. Choking can result. Halloween goodies may also "go down the wrong way" and lodge in the lung instead of the stomach. This is called aspiration. A "foreign object" of any kind in the lung can cause life-long problems. At times, surgery for removal is required.

The best warning is: be sure children are old enough to chew and swallow correctly before trusting them small, hard bits of food. Parents should always be on guard against "small objects" getting into the hands of children. Particularly those young enough to put everything into their mouths. Choking, blocked air passages, even aspiration into the lung can result.

Moreover, such items as eyes and buttons might "come loose from dolls, or wheels from toy cars. Set a good example. Don't

put anything but food into your own mouth. Keep the coffee table clear of small objects a child might reach for. And remember: Keep Halloween and all other times of the year safe for your child.

Lynx Face River Road At Lynx Stadium

The Spearman Lynx played an outstanding game against the League Leading Dalhart "Golden" Wolves. Although the Lynx were shut-out, the score didn't indicate just how hard the Lynx played. They had plenty of Lynx hurt only a few on the sidelines. Another thing was that the Lynx lost 28 to 0, not by 40 points or more, the way most "out-of-town" folks expected. Coach Larry Lanier, who took over for Coach Duncan has been doing a fine job, many Lynx players and fans are ready to see what Coach Duncan has done with the River Road Wildcats and to chat with him. Of course, Friday night, the Lynx will be the underdogs and the spoilers. The River Road Wildcats better be on their toes, because the Lynx are getting ready to put on the famous "Lynx Claw", once it gets a hold of the opponent, it won't let go, til either the game is over, very close game, or the Lynx come up with a big victory. The game is scheduled for Friday, October 29, beginning at 7:30 p.m. As far as the Wildcats are concerned this is the "Game of the Year" for them, because if they lose to the Lynx, which they could, they would probably be out of the race for the play-off berth, which they will if they lose. The agenda was comprised of mostly routine items. Permission was granted for seismograph operations on specified county roads. The procedure now is different from the old "coring" and blasting. Tests are conducted electronically in the spirit of advanced technology but the conduct of such tests still requires the approval of the commissioners court.

ter of some safety controls at Morse, consisting primarily of some traffic control signs. However, most of the points of need were on thoroughfares controlled by the State Highway Department and a planned program of safety procedures must be approved by that agency.

Following a mixup of time scheduling, two representatives of a Houston firm, MMM Design Group, architects, engineers and planners, appeared before the commissioners court with that firm's recommendations for "building in" needed security for the sheriff's office and jail.

At the point of chief concern was the dispatcher -- particularly on the night shift -- and the jailer. Added considerations included a secure outdoor exercise area for prisoners. The two representatives, Gregory Brezinski, architect and project manager for the Houston-based firm and Bill Pugh, had consulted with Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin previously and their appearance Monday was to deliver the results of their findings.

The estimated cost of \$40-thousand -- plus the service fees for the firm -- was beyond the thinking of the court and the sheriff for the project. However, consideration was not terminated. The firm will revise its plans and reappear before the court. The concept of the project is based around the very-present possibility that there could be an armed attempt to free a prisoner or prisoners from the county jail facilities. "It has never happened here," Sheriff McFarlin noted, "But we are living in rapidly changing times when it seems -- on occasion -- that the bad guys are winning." He pointed out that, in times past, prisoners had been mostly local or area people. Presently, with a number of persons in the lockup, only one was a local man. "This is not to say we are

KEEP WARM: A SEVEN POINT PLAN

Decided to save money and energy by lowering the thermostat setting—but now your feet are cold?

Don't blame the thermostat or your feet or your socks! Attack the situation with a seven-point plan, remembering the thermostat setting is only one of seven factors that influence thermal comfort.

Comfort also depends on clothing, radiant heating, humidity, activities, drafts, each different room and your own physical fitness—all working against each other or together, depending on you.

1. THERMOSTAT SETTING can work for you ONLY IF the area in which the thermostat is actually located has the same conditions as the room(s) you want heated, housing experts tell us. Check each room's temperature. Close off unused rooms to enhance the heating of in-use rooms, if necessary.
2. CLOTHING offers an insulative value, so take advantage of this. Wear layers of relatively thin clothing. Air will be between the layers and warmed by body heat. As you warm up, remove a layer or two. As you cool off, add some.
3. RADIANT HEAT is heat from sun rays or heat that bounces off the bricks in your

fireplace. Work where you can get the benefit of this "extra" economical heat.

4. HUMIDITY can undo all the good you've done with other methods of comfort creation, so control it. High humidity—lots of moisture in the house—causes already-cool temperatures to feel even cooler.

5. ACTIVITIES generate heat, especially when the large muscles of legs and arms are involved, so stay active.
6. DRAFTS have a cooling effect, of course, so stop them. Locate them and minimize their power or stay out of draft areas.
7. YOUR PHYSICAL FITNESS is the final key—those who are physically fit and active can better to temperature changes than those who are not fit.

Remember, you can control what you wear and what you do. During cold periods, increase your physical activities and change clothing whenever necessary to maintain comfort. If you've followed the seven-point plan, a simple solution to changing comfort problems may be as close as your closet.

Two Counties seek abolishment of treasurer office at polls

FORTH WORTH—Republican and Democratic candidates for Tarrant County treasurer held a joint fund-raiser, and the money raised was turned over to a campaign to abolish the office.

The leading organizer for the reception was County Treasurer Howard Green, who was elected four years ago on a platform to do away with the office. He has worked since to fulfill that campaign pledge.

The results of that effort will be on the ballot statewide in the general election Nov. 2 in the form of a constitutional amendment, Proposition Number Five, which would allow Tarrant and Bee Counties to abolish the office in those counties only.

Democrat Jack Bean and Republican Vince Sprinkle were nominated this year on a platform of abolishing the office. It was the most recent in a string of actions by Tarrant County voters which really began in 1968.

That year the state passed a constitutional amendment which allowed Tarrant and El Paso County governmental entities to combine offices upon a vote of the people. Two years later that was expanded by another constitutional amendment to all counties. In both elections, the amendments won handsily in Tarrant County.

In 1978 Green announced for election on a platform promising to work to abolish the office, and won over six opponents. A year later the legislature passed a bill to allow the county to combine the office with that of auditor, and once again the voters said "yes" overwhelmingly.

But the courts held that the office was a constitutionally mandated one, and invalidated the election. Again the citizens of Tarrant County were thwarted in their efforts to pare some governmental costs.

But with Green still pushing,

Tarrant County Rep. Lanny Hall submitted a constitutional amendment to allow Tarrant to abolish its treasurer's office. The legislature once again agreed, and that amendment will be Proposition Number Five on the Nov. 2 ballot.

Bee County legislators asked the legislature to include their county. Only those two counties will be affected, but the amendment must carry statewide.

Even when it passes, the citizens of the two counties will have to hold a referendum one more time. On the basis of elections involving the question since 1968, there seems to be little doubt what they will do if their fellow Texans allow it.

Garland Head 'Hall of Fame' bound



Saturday, Nov. 13, county commissioner and long-time area agriculturalist Garland Head will become the fifty second inductee into the Texas Tech Red Raider Hall of Fame. Ceremonies will be at half-time of the Red Raider-Southern Methodist U. Mustangs game.

Head will be one of two inductees installed. He will be well-accompanied by a four-star general of the army!

He played through the 1941 season both football and basketball then had a "time-out" for World War II. Following the war, Garland Head returned to Texas Technological University--known around the world as "Tech"--and resumed his education and his athletic performance.

Tech at that time was a member of the now legendary Border Conference that included, along with Tech, West Texas State University; Hardin-Simmons U., Abilene; Texas School of Mines, (now UT at El Paso); Arizona State U., Tempe; Arizona U., Phoenix and other school over a wide area of the "border."

"To set the stage, you must remember there were no basketball scholarships to athletes," Head told the REPORTER when asked for some of the color of his college athletic career.

"Football players also played basketball. Remember, too, we travelled by train in those days. The Border Conference covered a lot of ground. Many are the times we stopped off in Lubbock only long enough to trade our basketball gear for our football uniforms and headed for the depot again.

"--In fact, I remember one season when we ended a basketball series at the very eastern end of the conference. We didn't even stop in Lubbock. We rode those rails plumb on into El Paso where they had our football uniforms waiting for us to hit the gridiron against the School of Mines.

"This strange state of affairs and the equally strange geography of the far-flung Border Conference often had us playing one game in snow and the next week in sweat!"

Garland Head was a "natural for either game. He was a high school star at both. In this sense, his ability ran parallel to that of "Dandy" Don Meredith two decades later.

Meredith excelled at basketball over football in high school and preferred it. However, when he graduated there were no basketball scholarships open (although they now offered them) but there was football. The rest is history.

"If Dandy Don was better at basketball, I sure would like to have seen him play!" one Cowboy fan once remarked.

In the case of Garland Head, people all over the state who had followed his fortunes as a Red Raider grid star also had opportunity to discover his prowess as a cager.

Upon graduating from college, the Hall of Fame candidate became assistant head football coach and head basketball coach at Dumas. Both Dumas squads racked up victory after victory and Head took one basketball team all the way to the state finals in a series of thrilling challenges and victories all the way.

Hobby challenges Texans to overcome voter apathy

AUSTIN (October 22)--Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby today challenged Texans to overcome voter apathy and urged them to vote on November 2 for the most important office in the nation--that of citizen.

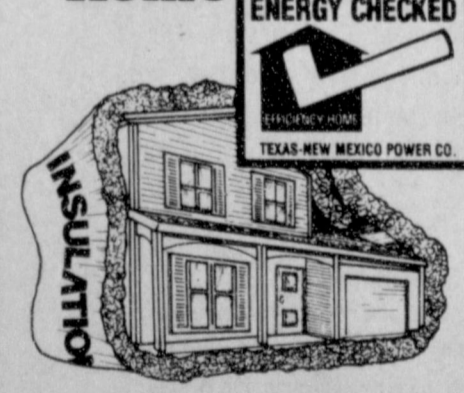

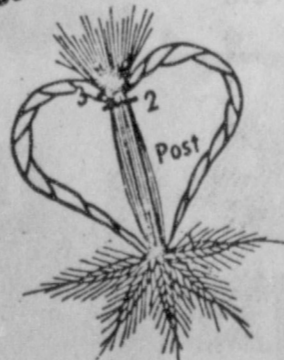

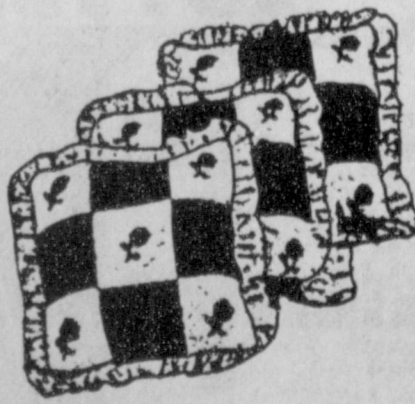

The endorsements represent more than two-thirds of Texas' 254 counties. District and county attorneys in 173 counties across the state have publicly stated their support for Mattox.

"I intend to be a spokesman for law enforcement in Texas," Mattox said. "We need better coordination between state and local law enforcement agencies to break our state's spiraling crime rate, and the Attorney General can be the one who leads the fight to do that."

Mattox also has been endorsed by five major law enforcement organizations in

Texas, including the statewide Combined Law Enforcement Association of Texas. He has received the endorsements of police officers' groups in Dallas, San Antonio, Abilene and Fort Worth, in the home country of his Republican opponent.

Mattox is the only candidate for Attorney General with prosecutory experience, having served as a successful Assistant District Attorney in Dallas County.

A third-term Congressman from Dallas County, he also served two terms in the state legislature, where he was named one of the "10 Best" legislators in 1975.

Frank Pittman elected SWCD director

Frank Pittman of Morse was recently elected to the Hansford SWCD Board of Directors. Frank Pittman will represent zone 4 of the District.

The purpose of the Hansford SWCD, with headquarters in Spearman is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Pittman will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain.

All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator. Pittman will be replacing Willard "Si" McCloy, who served on the Hansford SWCD Board for 20 years. Erlis Pittman, Frank's father, has previously served as a SWCD Directory many years.

Irwin endorses Allen Clark for state treasurer

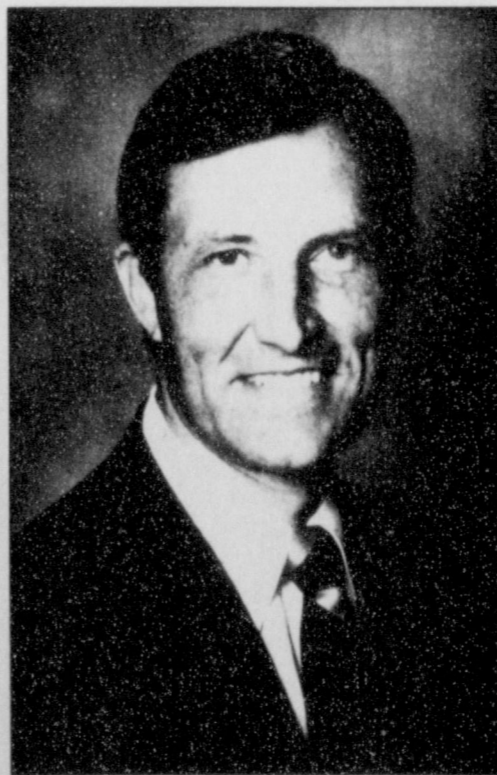
