Banker Will Speak Here

A banker who has been active in soil and water conservation for several years will be the speaker at the annual Hansford Soil Conservation Bankers Award Banquet at 7:30 p. m. Thursday, Nov. 14 in the Spearman Elementary School Cafeteria.

O. R. Stark, Jr., executive vice president of the First National Bank in Quitaque, has been selected to speak. Stark has been active in promoting irrigation in the Quitaque area and was also active in securing the Kent Creek Water Conservation project in his area.

To be honored at the banquet, also, are the outstanding Conservation Farmer of the year and the outstanding Soil Conservation District Supervisor.

The banquet is sponsored each year by the First State Bank of Spearman and the Gruver State Bank of Gruver.

Tool Takers Work Again

Tool thieves are back at work in the county, Sheriff J. B. Cooke warned farmers, contractors, and drillers this week.

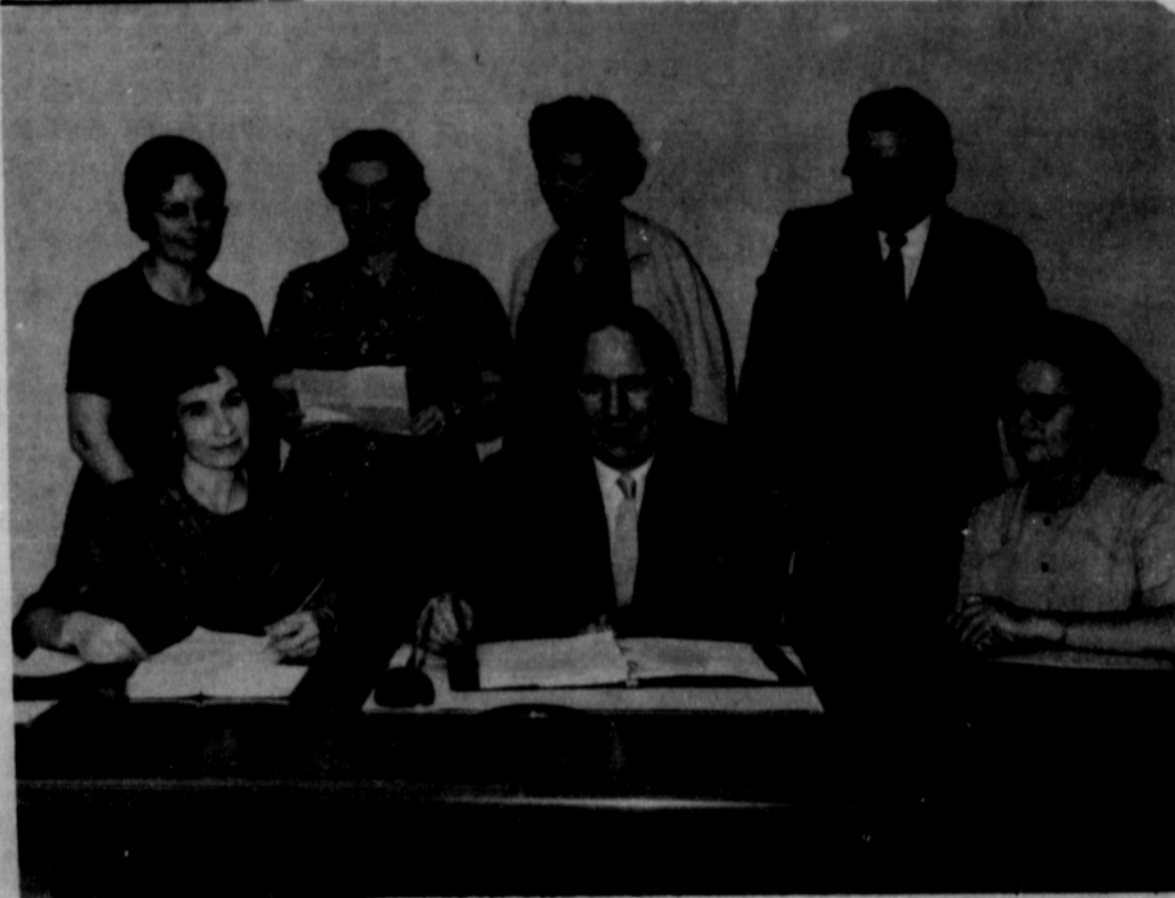
Over \$500 in tools have been taken from pick-ups and combines in the past week. Two batteries have also been taken from equipment.

Cooke said Bobby Nollner, J. L. Brock, both of Spearman, and a custom cutter, B. J. Buchanan, all reported the loss of tools from equipment left in the field.

The Nollner tools were taken from equipment south of Gruver. Brock lost his tools from equipment southwest of Spearman and the Buchanan equipment was 11 miles west of Gruver.

Charles Parker reported two batteries stolen from equipment east of Spearman.

Officers also arrested three persons for being drunk and two men for removal of mortgaged property from the county. Both of the men removing mortgaged property were fined, and one was given a year's suspended sentence and the second received six months, suspended.

Spearman Station Gets Federal OK

Spearman will soon have an FM radio voice, Coy Palmer announced this week.

He said the Federal Communication Commission has approved his request for a permit and he hopes to have the station on the air by Nov. 20. The permit was issued Oct. 28.

There are no call letters for the station, yet. But, it has been assigned 98.3 on the FM dial. Palmer pointed out that a new station has to wait for a permit for a station before applying for call letters.

The studio will be located at 603 E. Kenneth, where Mrs. Ruth Caro did live. Construction on the broadcasting tower will begin either this weekend or Monday.

Palmer said he and his son, Brice, will operate the station. E. J. Copeland, manager of Equity Elevator, will do the farm broadcasting for the station.

The manager said the station will be on the air from 6 a. m. until 10:30 p. m. when it starts regular broadcasting.

The station cannot be heard on regular radios.

State's Top AA Team Meets Lynx Friday

The top AA football team in Texas will invade Spearman Friday night to be the third district opponent for the Spearman Lynx.

Dalhart's rampaging Wolves will bring an untested ballclub to town. Tucumcari, N. M., is the only club to come close to the Wolves this season, and in that game three of the starting Wolves backfield was on the sideline. Dalhart won 56-48.

Quarterback Ronnie McClelland and twins John and Jeff Colquitt have been giving the Wolves their big offensive punch behind a line that has been able to keep the ground offense moving.

Dwight Clifton, a 205 end, is the biggest Wolf lineman. He has plenty of help from the group of 160 to 180 pounders.

Spearman coaches say the Dalhart club stays close to the ground, but can throw when they need to loosen the defense.

Spearman will have all of its players back for the game. Halfback Mike Morris was working out this week with his wrenched knee heavily taped and in a brace. He said it did not hurt, but was weak. Guard and defensive rover, Don Archer got a

go ahead from doctors.

Last week Dalhart whipped the Stinnett Rattlers 38-0 in a game that had been billed as the top AA game in the state. Stinnett was rolling along undefeated before meeting the Wolfpack.

Namon To Be Here Tonight

The President of the Texas Farmers' Union will be in Spearman for the second time this year for a meeting Thursday night, according to the Union's local publicity director, Mrs. Robert Ownbey.

Jay Namon will be here for a meeting at 7:30 p. m. Thursday (tonight) in the Community Room of the First State Bank.

Namon will be here to help organize a resolutions committee and get work started on resolutions concerning the new wheat program and a resolution on natural gas as it effects this area.

Hansford County voters go to the polls Saturday to vote on four amendments to the patchwork Texas Constitution. There will be voting booths in all 10 voting precincts in the county and they will be open from 7 a. m. until 7 p. m.

The four amendments are: Removal of the payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting. Extending the life of the veterans' land program. Allow higher state welfare spending. And, permit Jefferson to provide retirement, disability and death benefits to its employees.

Last year a straw vote showed that Texas favored doing away with the payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting. The legislature has already passed a law setting up a voter registration system in the state. There will be a 25 cent registration fee if the poll tax is voted out.

There has been little active campaigning on any of the amendments. However, some groups opposing the poll tax change says doing away with the poll tax will allow more block voting in the cities and give liberals more votes.

The proposed amendment on the welfare spending in the state would change the ceiling allowed from \$54.5 million last year to \$60 million this year.

The welfare amendment will also remove the residence requirement for persons drawing welfare payments. It also allows the removal of a \$25 per month ceiling on payments to needy old people and a \$20 per month ceiling on payments to disabled persons.

The extension on the veterans land program will allow the state to continue its program of financing land purchased by veterans of World War II and the Korean action. Despite the black eye this program received in the scandals, it has been straightened out. Land commissioner Jerry Sadler disposed of all the land the state acquired when the scandal broke, at a profit to the state. Before the program is completed, it will make the state \$80 million dollars.

The fourth amendment concerns only Jefferson county, but must be approved by the entire state.

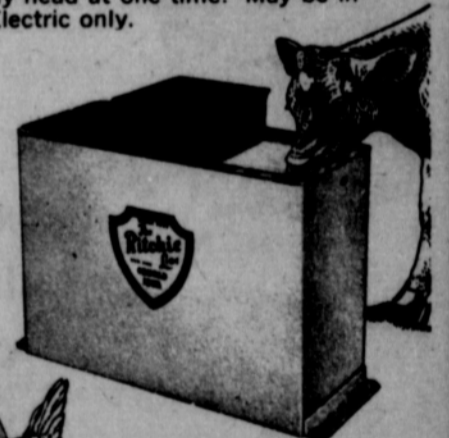

He was born April 4, 1882 in Erath County, Texas.

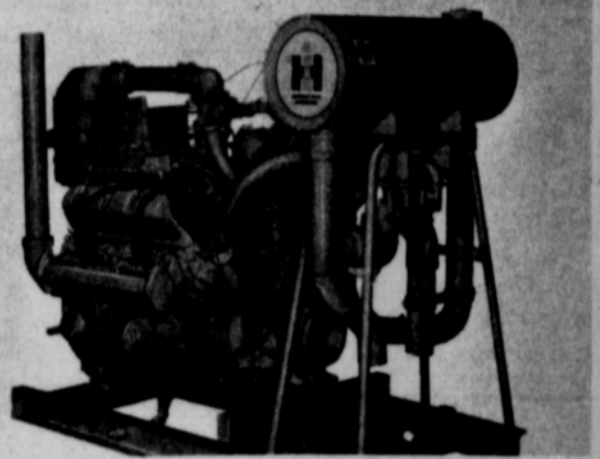
