Tahoka's Lucky Fire.

Last Saturday, afternoon Mr. J. L. Wood, who lives in the south part of Tahoka, hauled three barrels of water, then took his family in the buggy and went out south of town. About four o'clock, smoke was to be seen issuing from the Wood's house, and soon men and boys were to be seen runing from every direction. Mr. Crie, of the Lynn County News started and the nearest way being through the court house, went that way. Just as he reached the south door of the court house he overtook Mr. McDaniel, our county clerk, ers, so each took one and as a two horse buggy was handy they appropriated it, and with Dr. Windham and A. V. Taylor holding, or rather, trying to hold down the hind axle, they started, with Mr. Mc pushing on the lines. It seems the team belonged to E. D. Skinner and were used to being run to the buggy after antelopes, and as and whistled they went like birds. The base ball boys saw, and started for the fire among the first, and they made the run of about three hundred yards in record time. The fire started from a tobacco box used as an ash box and had burned through the kitchen floor, the floor being on fire all underneath. While some carried water, some others cut holes in the floor, then proved that they were just the thing. So the fire was put out with but little loss. Next day a number of citizens gave Mr. Wood this advice, "Now Lum dont you get a tin bucket to take up ashes in, just get a nice wooden box. take up the ashes in it, shove it under the stove and rest easy."

Clean Up.

There is no denying the fact that Lamesa has on her her hands an epidemic of fever, typhoid or something as bad. There are more than one here who predicted such a condition when the hundreds upon hundreds of dead cattle were left on the surrounding plains last winter and spring. We were told by the wise one they would dry up as hard as a bone when the winter was over, and become perfectly harmless. But they didn't dry up. The spring was unusely wet, and the rains are continuing on into the summer. And the sickness has come, and will remain as long the causes remain which produce it. It may not be the dead cattle. We don't know, but were are among those who believe that they help to produce

Then look at the town. Garbage and tin cans are dumped out the back or front door, whichever comes handiest, We are not here to say that the rotting of tin cans will produce typhoid fever, but these cans are not always enpty.

Two things more, and it seems to us that the conditions are all that typhoid or any other fever could reasonably ask viz: foul surface closets and plenty of flies; and who can deny that we have them both?

What are we going to do about it? Three months of hot weather remain. Shall we trust to luck or pluck? A few days work in piling the carcasses, and in colecting the rubbish in town, a few gallons of oil, careful atention to closets with free use of lime will surely improve conditions. Shall we do it? If not, why? If so, when?

Later.

Since the above article has been set up some of the things mentioned have been done. Money has been raised and men employed to burn the carcasses and many of them have been burned. Let the good work go on till every foul closet in town is cleaned and thoroughly limed. Use lime freely all summer. Fix up your screens and keep the flies out of your house and off of your food. As he crawls round on your plate, lights upon your bread or drops into your coffee or milk you thoughtlessly knock him off and go on with your eating. How do you know that he hasn't just come from the foulest cloest in town? This is plain English we know, but if you don't need it, it doesn't hurt. If you do need it, you had better clean up, screen up and lime up.-Dawson County News.

QUEER LAKES.

Bodies of Water That Are a Source of Wonder to All Who Behold Them.

One of the most singular lakes in the world is the celebrated Pitch lake of the island of Trinidad. This lake spreads over an area of 99 acres, and its surface is composed of one great floating veins of clear water. From it, them. Score another triumph in the

the world's supply of asphalt is drawn, states the Washington Post.

The pitch lake is a hideous place as far as smells are con cerned, for the air all about it is heavy with noxious vapors, and from the center of the lake gushes a fountain of liquid asphaltum, in which there float and break bub bles containing most horrible gases.

The workmen go out on the surface of this lake and cut great slabs of asphaltum, which are carried away. But the next morning the hole they left is filled up again with the pitch which has risen during the night, so that the supply seems to be inexhaustible.

This curious lake was discov ered by Sir Walter Raleigh when he landed in Trinidad in 1595, on his way to the mouth of the Orino co in search of El Dorado.

Another strange lake is situated on a peninsula which juts out into the Caspian sea. The whole surface of this lake is covered with a crust of salt so thick and strong that a man can ride across it on horseback with safety.

In central Asia, near the Caspian sea, is a lake of beautiful rose color, while the banks are covered with salt crystals as white as snow. From the waters of this lake there arises a flower-like odor. The color and the odor are supposed to be caused by vegetable matter in the depths.

There used to be a curious lake on the top of the Volcano de Agua. in Guatemala, 14,000 feet above the level of the sea. It was not fed by springs nor by rivers, but was caused by accumulations of snow and rain-in fact, was an immense reservoir. It lasted for centuries. Then one day the sides of the lake gave way, and down the waters olled, dealing death and destrucn, and digging a great barran ravine, in the mountain side, which is still visible.
