Rainfall Improves Outlook in County

A SERIES of rains starting here Saturday afternoon, and spreading over most areas of Motley County in the past three days have greatly improved the agriculture and stockraising outlook.

Various amounts have been reported in different areas. The amount registered here Tuesday

night by Bob Stanley was over 2 inches.

The moisture was not considered as general rains up until yesterday afternoon. In some areas sufficient moisture has fallen to make it possible to continue planting. Some areas needed more moisture yesterday. Some rain has been reported in all county communities, varying from two inches to little more than a trace.

Much of the ranch land has received beneficial moisture and in some places water holes have been filled.

The rains have been accompanied by storm conditions which extended to the Lubbock area with three days of tornado alerts. No damage has been reported.

Several To Attend Texas 4-H Roundup

The Texas 4-H Roundup scheduled for June 3-5 at College Station, will be attended by delegates from Motley County, who were winners in the district contests.

These will include Jeanette Day, Matador, in the Girl's Public Speaking contest; Linda Cammack and Paula Pallmeyer, Matador in the Natural Resources Demonstration; and James Pritchett, Matador, David Hunter and Billy Green, Flomot, in the Share-The-Fun contest. Leaders attending will be Mrs. E. A. Day and Mrs. Bill Pallmeyer of Matador and Wayne Hunter of Flomot.

Some 850 boys and girls plus about 350 4-H adult leaders and County Extension agents who have coached and supervised the county and district winners will attend. Also attending will be sponsors of judging and demonstration team contests and members of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation.

One of the entertainment highlights will be a Golden Anniversary Dinner.

Lions Captain Refutes Claim

What appears as a breakdown in the friendship of two members of the Matador Lions Club has resulted in the statements last week that the Go-Go's had won the attendance contest over the Rockets.

Lion Ben Edwards, captain of the Rockets, told the Tribune that he had not seen Lion Billy Wason since the last club meeting.

He said further, "I did not shake hands with Wason and concede defeat. I am going to demand a complete audit of the attendance records during the period of the contest. Furthermore I want the audit certified before I implicate the loyal Lions on my side to do any culinary work for the Ladies Night banquet, June 16."

Edwards was bitter in his denouncement of the statement published last week and released by Wason, who was captain of the Go-Go's.

MESSAGE CHALLENGES CLASS TO ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY

A challenge was issued to members of the Matador High School graduation class, Sunday night in Baccalaureate services held at the First Methodist Church—a chal-

lenge to accept and assume the responsibility for the future.

In a message delivered by Rev. John Fitzgerald, Methodist pastor, the class was told, "The foundation for the future is laid in high school. The definition of education is to draw out, rather than to put in, as is commonly thought. You have a responsibility to yourselves, to your parents, and to God—God expects you to use that which he has given you, and to use it wisely."

Quoting from I Thessalonians, 5:23, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ," and from Hebrews 4:12, "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword..." Rev. Fitzgerald distinguished between the body, soul and spirit and used as a basis for his sermon, "What you are; who you are; and why you are what you are."

"As individuals," he stated, "we have a responsibility to meet spiritual needs if you can live with contentment with yourself, you'll have no trouble living with others."

Invocation was by Glendell Smith, and music, in addition to congregational singing, was an organ and piano duet by Brenda Wason and Gail Lynn, who played an arrangement of "The Lord's Prayer." Benediction was by Stuart Dixon, Processional and recessional marches were played by Mrs. John V. Stevens, organist.

Robert Clem was elected president of the men's golf association of the Airport Country Club in a meeting held at the VFW building Friday night, May 23.




