Mrs. Bird was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Harrison Williams. She was born Aug. 11, 1896 in Matador and her early life was spent in Motley and Dickens counties where her father was a pioneer rancher and later operated a hardware store in Matador.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Friday in the Newbie W. Ellis Chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Ray Riddle, associate minister of the First Presbyterian Church in Midland. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery there.

Speaker was Curly Hays of Abilene, who entertained the audience with humorous incidents, then announced that his subject was himself. "I know more about me, than

Homer T. Bouldin, 69, of Houston, a native of Matador and nephew of Mrs. J. L. Woodruff, died Friday, Feb. 21 in a Houston hospital.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 24 at South Main Baptist Church Chapel in Houston. Burial was in Memorial Oaks Cemetery.

He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. T. T. Bouldin, early residents of Matador, who moved to Mineral Wells in 1919. ## Needs Of Elderly Discussed At Meeting

NEEDS of elderly persons in the county — especially those who are described as house-bound and have difficulty in caring for themselves — and the part that the more active citizens over 60 can take in assisting in community projects, were topics discussed in a meeting Thursday night at the school lunchroom.

Meeting with 20 Matador and Roaring Springs concerned residents, was Miss

Judith Jackson, Director of the Regional Office on Aging, of the South Plains Association of Governments, and Judge Forrest Campbell, who sponsored the meeting.

Miss Jackson, who is Aging Services Co-ordinator for S.P.A.G. said there are nearly 700 persons in the county over the age of 60. "This is not a welfare program and is not related to income," she declared. "The aim of this office is to assist communities in utilizing the

resources and abilities of older persons."

She suggested "meals on wheels," and other personal services for shut-ins. She explained that there are three categories of aged persons: those who are active (about 10 or 15 per cent), those just above nursing home level (15 to 20 per cent) and the nursing home population, about 5 per cent.

During a question and answer period, Miss Jackson explained that the mini-buses

which several counties had obtained to provide community transportation, had been made available through Farmer's Union, from the Texas Governors Committee on Aging. She said, however, that the supply of buses had already been exhausted.

Transportation to community affairs is one of the major problems confronting the elderly people, it was conceded. Activities were also mentioned as a local concern. In this respect, a discussion evolved regarding

two existing organizations — the Sunshine Club and the Motley County Arts and Crafts Club — in which older persons are already participating.

It was further stressed that projects should be considered as community affairs, rather than on a county-wide basis.

"No problem is unsurmountable if the community wants it," said Miss Jackson in summing up the discussion.

She also announced that May has been designated as National Senior Citizens Month, in recognition of the universal needs and problems of those who have reached this stage in life.

Another meeting will be held to continue the discussion of this movement. This will be March 20 at 7:00 p.m. in the school lunchroom. Judge Campbell announced this week.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

##### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51a, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

##### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

Although we cannot make the call personally, we will locate someone qualified to help you. The telephone number for ambulance service will be changed in the very near future, but until that time, we will be glad to take all calls and refer them to the proper people.

We want to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their concern during my illness, and the assistance of friends and business associates who have made it possible to continue with both the funeral home and ambulance service during this period of convalescence.


