We always had coffee for breakfast and a gentle memory includes my mother holding a square coffee mill between her knees and grinding the whole berries for our meal. Buying instant coffee today leaves me with a guilty feeling that I am in some way cheating on the past.

One of the most honorable men I have ever known told a group that he had seen one during a morning drive and described every detail of the craft. The man did not drink. He saw what he described and I believe him.

## Former Resident In New Command

A former Matador resident and graduate of Matador High School recently assumed command of Headquarters Command at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C.

He is Major General M. R. (Maurice) Reilly who was officially instated as commander for Headquarters Command, USAF upon the retirement of Maj. Gen. John L. Locke.

Change of Command Ceremony was held at Andrews AFB, February 25. A reception, attended by some 500 guests followed at the Andrews Officer's Club. Guests said goodbye to General and Mrs. Locke, and welcomed General and Mrs. Reilly.

An impressive ice sculpture depicting the seal of Headquarters Command, done by Lt. Col. Ronald E. Pickett, club officer, glistened in the candlelight as guests enjoyed the conversation and hors d'oeuvres.

Among the distinguished guests were Gen. Richard H. Ellis, Air Force vice-chief of staff, and Lt. Gen. Daniel James Jr., deputy assistant to the Secretary of Defense.

BORN in Great Falls, Montana, on August 27, 1921. General Reilly was reared in Matador, where his father, the late M. J. Reilly was superintendent of the Matador Ranch, and where he graduated from high school in 1938.

For most of his military career, the general has been a civil engineer, and since January 1972 he has been the Director of Civil Engineering at Headquarters USAF. In this post he was closely associated with facilities at Bolling and Andrews bases. He has also been deeply involved in defending construction requirements for the bases before Congress. He feels that "Because of my involvement and familiarity with Bolling and Andrews, plus my familiarity with the Air Staff here, I can presume it all helped in my selection."

It was during his boyhood days in Matador when "I was raised as a cowboy... that the general decided he wanted to be an engineer. He spent two years in prep school at Lake Forest, Ill., where he was tagged with the nickname "Tex"... a label he has carried ever since.

The Matador track team finished the pre district track season successfully in winning the Roughneck Relays last Friday, March 28 at Sundown. The track team gathered up 78 points, while defeating 22 other class B schools.

In the 440 relay, the Matadors won the fourth consecutive meet, with a time of 45.6. The relay, made up of J. D. Hurt, Joe Campbell, Castulo Gonzales and Gary Richardson is undefeated this year and will take this record into the district meet at Jayton, April 4, (today).

In the 880 Larry Pitts placed fourth. Johnny Palmer was second in the 440 yard run. Thomas Tilson placed fourth in the shot put.

In the 100 yard dash Gary Richardson won with a time of 10.6. Richardson also won the 220 with a time of 23.8, with John Nimmo finishing fourth. Bucky Marvel was fourth in the mile run.

The mile relay was second, with this year's best time of 3:37.3. Castulo Gonzales, Steve Stevens, Billy Osborn and Johnny Palmer make up the mile relay.

The Matador track team wishes to dedicate the Sundown victory to track coach, Stan Irvine, who was unable to attend because of an injury.

The track team will travel to Jayton today to participate in the district track meet.

# Church and Society

## Women Featured In Texas Day Program

El Progreso Club met March 28 in the home of Mrs. Raymond Davis for its required Texas Day program, "Our Texas Heritage."

The program, presented by Mrs. Furman Vinson, featured wives of prominent Texans, and other prominent Texas women.

Mrs. Bill McCaghren, first Vice-president presided in the absence of the president. Routine business was transacted and Mrs. McCaghren also served as leader for the day, reading the yearbook quotation, "If I were asked - to what the singular prosperity and growing strength of that people (the American) ought mainly to be attributed, I should reply: To the superiority of their women."

In her talk Mrs. Vinson stated that usually heads of state descend from great families who have helped make Texas great. "In our own Lone Star State, for instance," she pointed out, "the present political leadership includes such names as Houston, Hobby, Culp, Briscoe, Tom Campbell, Daniel and others."

She touched on Mrs. Janey Slaughter Briscoe, wife of the present governor, who is a descendant of early American colonists, the George Slaughters, members of the Jamestown colony of Culpepper County, Virginia in 1613. "She (Mrs. Briscoe) has maintained a lifelong interest in the history and culture of her country."

"THE NAME Hobby has become a tradition in Texas government - a tradition covering three generations and reaching back 100 years. William Hobby's wife, Diana Poteat Stallings, was the daughter of a noted playwright and author. She relinquished her job to hit the campaign trail."

"Nellie, (Mrs. John) Connally made a lasting and measurable contribution to our state's heritage," Mrs. Vinson continued, "by making sure the grounds of the Governor's mansion were insured of perpetual beauty through her work in making useless parts of the grounds into useable gardens and beauty spot for future governors and for the citizens of Texas to enjoy. In Austin in July of 1967 she was quoted to have said, 'Texas someday will have a new official residence for its Chief Executive, but it will never replace this historic mansion in the hearts of Texans.'"

"OTHERS mentioned were Mrs. William P. Clements, wife of the Deputy Defense Secretary, second in command in the Defense Department to Elliott Richardson who lived in Dallas until January, 1973; Mrs. George Bush, whose husband is Republican National Chairman, and Mrs. Leon Jaworski, wife of the special Watergate prosecutor."

"This past year has been a disillusioning one for Mrs. Bush, with Spiro Agnew looking her in the eye, saying he wouldn't resign, and three weeks later did; Watergate that has involved the President, Vice President and high ranking Republicans. Their former home is Houston, and they hope to return there someday... but her home is wherever her hat is."

"Mrs. Jaworski has been in Washington just since the first of the year. Her husband has been there since Novem-

ber, 1973 and after flying home every week end, she went with him to Washington, after the Christmas holidays. Those who live in hotel-apartments have tried to add personal touches to their home, but they still have a cold, impersonal atmosphere."

MRS. VINSON also touched on the life of Barbara Jordan, the only Southern Black woman in Congress. "She avoids cocktail parties and feels they are filled with inane talk. She has tremendous self-confidence and dignity, and is always in complete control of herself. She has a near perfect attendance record in committees and present for 99 percent of the roll call votes in the House. She listens instead of talks and only talks when she has something worthwhile to say."

"In Washington, as in the Texas Senate, Barbara Jordan has followed her own statements so often given at churches and commencement - 'There is no obstacle in the path of young people who are poor or members of a minority, that hard work and thorough preparation cannot cure. Do not call for black power or green power; call for brain power.'"

"As to the future - she just hopes she is in the right place at the right time - five years ago she didn't think she would be where she is now."

Inspirational Thought: for the day was given by Miss Mary Keith.

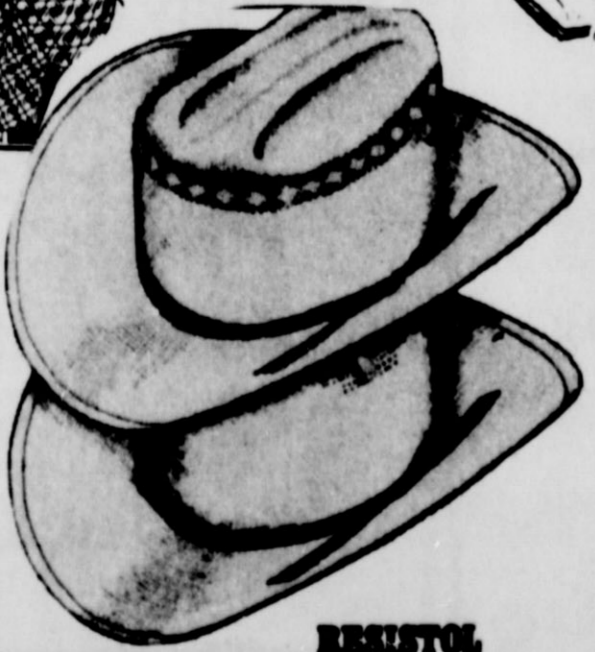
