MISS GRIMES STATE REPRESENTATIVE TO EUROPE

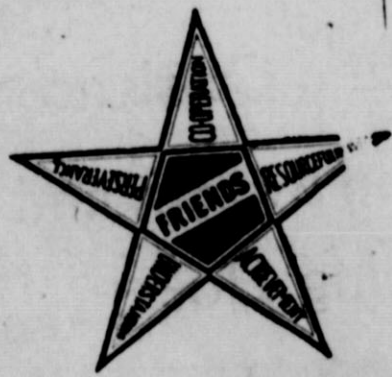
Miss Nauffleet Grimes who has been acting as County Home Demonstration Agent in Motley County for the past two years left for a three months trip to Europe for the purpose of studying the Domestic Science and Art of the leading European countries. Miss Grimes goes as the official representative of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and is one of a number of the outstanding Home Demonstration Agents of the country to be selected for this work. Only one agent from each state being allowed to go. During her stay in Europe Miss Grimes expects to visit Great Britain, France, Denmark, Belgium and passibly Switzerland and The Netherlands. The various studies that Miss Grimes expects to make in the several countries are cooking and dress making in England, cooking and designing in France and butter and cheese making in Denmark and Switzerland. The work of Miss Grimes in this county has been of outstanding quality and all of her friends rejoice that she has this great opportunity for adding to her education and training that will better fit her for the work she has chosen. In the girls clothing work that she supervised last year more girls completed their work in this county than any other county in the state regardless of population and one of the girls, Miss Lucille Robinson of Whiteflat won first place in the state contest. In all other lines of work both with the women and girls, she has had great success and Motley county feels that it has been exceedingly fortunate in having such a Home Demonstration Agent as Miss Grimes. We hope that she has a very pleasant and profitable trip and that upon her return that she will report to Matley county as our agent.

WEEKLY NEWS SUMMARY

Ropesville—This little city of but a few months has received an offer from the West Texas Utilities Company to extend their high line here. The business men will meet their requirements and soon have electric lights. Slaton—The business men here met recently and organized a Retail Merchants Association. J. H. Brewer was elected Secretary of the new organization. The Santa Fe railroad company has just approved plans for a \$50,000 hot water washing plant and will soon complete their \$45,000 water system. When completed this will be one of the best water systems the Santa Fe has in the state. CCrowell—This city will enter the contest at Paducah, June 18th for the next West Texas Chamber of Commerce District Convention. Snyder—The Stranahan, Harris & Oatis, Inc. of Toledo, Ohio have opened offices here and will be on the ground to purchase West Texas bonds. Bog Lake—The County seat of Reagan County will be moved here according to a recent election held in this county. Stamford—Porter A. Whaley, Manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, recently attended the State Secretaries meeting at Marlin. Spur—The SpSur Chamber of Commerce has purchased a large quantity of Arsenic and will distribute same among the farmers for poisoning grasshoppers. Graham—The local Chamber of Commerce is in the midst of a big membership drive to increase the annual budget. Many new members are expected to enlist and help put over a larger and greater years work. Abilene—A \$25,000 new exhibit building will be ready for the county and individual agricultural exhibitors this year when the West Texas Fair opens September 21st to 26th. Decatur—The daily shipment of milk from here continues to increase with more than \$5,000 receipts from weekly sales. AUTO RACES A BIG FEATURE

Abilene, Texas—Announcement here that Eddie Hearne and Frank Lockhart, world-famous speed kings would take spectacular part in the racing classic of Abilene July 4, sent interest in the coming Independence Day events sky-high. Hearne and Lockhart have already signed entry blanks and together with Steve Elmore, the Hollywood racing marvel, will load their cars out for Abilene immediately. These outstanding racers, with Phil ("Red") Shafer, who has been monarch of the Abilene course for several years, and who this year finished third in the great Indianapolis classic, will give West Texans who expect to make a big holiday of it at Abilene, some of the biggest thrills ever experienced this side of the famous Indianapolis speedway.

Eddie Hearne, one of the best known racing champions of the country, holds all world's championships for the years 1919 and 1923. He is driving a Miller special straight eight. Frank Lockhart, the "boy wonder" racing driver, driving a Miller special at Bakersfield, California recently shattered all world's dirt track records making a mile in thirty-nine, four-fifths seconds. He also won the 250 mile road race at Ascot last December. He alone will give the spectators plenty of sensational thrills.

Steve Elmore of Hollywood who has also signed up for the Abilene event will drive a Miller special. Elmore won the sixty mile race at San Luis Obispo this year showing a speed of eighty miles an hour on one mile track. These famous drivers will reach Abilene some time prior to the races to tune up for the big event. Although Red Shafer has not yet signed an entry blank he is expected to be on the job again as usual. With the real competition afforded by this year's entries, the race crowds which park the city of Abilene on July 4 are assured the best contest ever staged here.

News of these outstanding entries was wired into the air Association headquarters by D. H. Jefferies, official of the A. A. contest board, under whose sanction the races are held. He reports that Abilene has the reputation of having the best dirt track in the Western states. Work has speeded up on three additional sections of grandstand to accommodate some 3000 more people this year. The track is receiving unusual attention and will be in perfect condition for the big day.

Abilene is also staging on July 4, following the races, at Lytle Beach, a "Bathing Girl Revue", in which fair bathers from all over West Texas are invited to participate. The winning lady will get a trip to Atlantic City.

MORE COTON ON FEWER ACRES

In order to afford every Texas cotton grower opportunity to enter the State-wide "More Cotton on Fewer Acres" contest the final date for entry has been set for August 1. This will give all those farmers a chance to enter who got a late start in planting their cotton and who thought they were out of the running. Many a field which started off poorly has developed wonderfully of late and farmers are urged to select any five acres out of their cotton field and enter them in the State contest.

It does not matter what shape the field is in. If a check or ditch runs through the field that will make no difference as land on both sides can be measured just so that there are five acres, on more; no less.

All land must be measured by August 1. The measuring committee should consist of two farmers living in the community or county with the entrants and one merchant or business man from the nearest town. Large counties with many entrants may appoint as many measuring committees as may be necessary to divide the work. Affidavits can be obtained at all Chambers of Commerce and County Agents or from the Agricultural Editor of the Dallas Morning News and The Semi-Weekly Farm News.

TO ADDRESS ANNUAL CONVENTION

Fort Worth, Texas, June 15:—Jesse H. Nelson, president of the National Education Association and superintendent of schools in Denver, Colorado, will make an address before the annual convention of Texas State Teachers Association, which meets in Dallas, Nov. 27, 28 and 29. Nelson, a leading figure in the school life of the nation, has just accepted a place on the program at the invitation of Lee Clark of Gainsville, president of the Texas association. Miss Lucy Gage, chair man of the National Primary Education Association and teacher in the Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tenn. and A. H. Harmen, superintendent of Montgomery County, Alabama, schools, have likewise accepted places on the program.

FORD PRODUCTION ON INCREASE

World production of Ford cars and trucks is now slightly above 8,125 a day, a daily output greater than at any previous time in the history of the Ford organization.

This is the astonishing record of Ford accomplishments as re-

vealed in figures just given out at the general office in Detroit covering the combined production of domestic assembly plants, foreign plants and associated companies and the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Ltd. It is not only significant as indicating the growth of the automobile industry both here and abroad, but it presents the world-wide acceptance to motor car transportation, for while domestic plants of the company have for the last few weeks been setting new production records, foreign plants also have attained to new marks.

Since the first of May the Ford assembly plants in the United States have been averaging a daily output of more than 7,200 cars and trucks and this in the face of several days when operations at one or more plants were more or less curtailed due to delays in arrival of parts.

During the same time plants in Europe and South America likewise set new records and these with the daily output of Ford of Canada, which supplies Canada and the British Colonial possessions, have added a daily average of 925 cars and trucks to the production figure bringing the total up above 8,125 a day.

On May 19, when the domestic plants went to the new high mark of 7,858 cars and trucks, foreign plants and the Canadian company produced 892, setting as the record for all the remarkable total of 8,750 Ford cars and trucks.

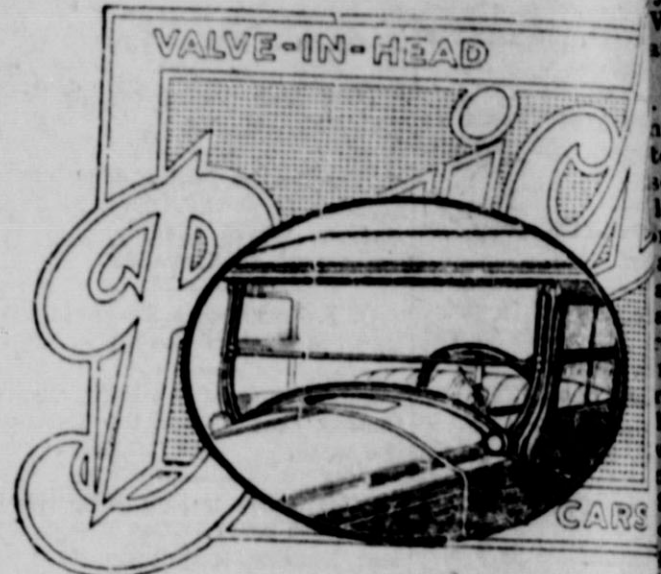
