Services will be conducted each night through Wednesday, May 18 beginning at 7:30 p.m. and each morning at 7:00 a.m.



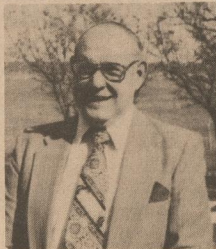
Rev. Jerry Moore

## Write-In Candidates Upset Roaring Springs Election

The City of Matador had one upset of an incumbent Saturday with L.J. Barkley Jr., won over John Briscoe, 117-115. Doyle Rose held his position on the council with 118 votes and the unopposed Mayor Gary L. Lancaster had 161 votes out of the 188 ballots counted.

Roaring Springs had two surprises in their election results with Devonne Dillard and Bill Moose both write-ins, winning seats on the City Council. Dillard with 60 votes,

and Moose with 46. Incumbent Anne Sands received 24, Harold Brantley 27, and Stacy Reid 24. The unopposed Mayor Eugene Watson received 63 votes out of 100 ballots counted.

The Motley County ISD Board of Trustees have one incumbent and two new members. Incumbent Donnie Cruse won with votes as follows: Matador, 171; Flomot, 25; Northfield, 7; Roaring Springs, 70; total 273. Leslie Jameson, Matador,

144; Flomot, 21; Northfield, 7; Roaring Springs, 66; Total 238. Alvin Alexander, Matador, 132; Flomot, 16; Northfield, 3; Roaring Springs, 33; Total 184. Other candidates were Lamar Tilson, Matador, 70; Flomot, 4; Northfield, 2; Roaring Springs, 48; Total 124. Johnny O. Scott, Matador, 78; Flomot, 9; Northfield, 1; Roaring Springs, 25; Total 113.

The Motley County Hospital District has one new member, James L. Stanley with 208 votes over J.M.

"Buzz" Thacker, with 200. Lillie Crouch and Darrell Cruse were re-elected for two more years. Votes were as follows: Cruse, Matador-174; Flomot, 27; Northfield, 6; Roaring Springs, 56; Total 263. Crouch, Matador, 168; Flomot, 12; Northfield, 4; Roaring Springs, 75; Total 259. Stanley, Matador, 142; Flomot, 11; Northfield, 3; Roaring Springs, 52; Total, 208. Thacker, Matador, 104; Flomot, 21; Northfield, 0; Roaring Springs, 75; Total 200.

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## Roaring Springs To Receive Money For Water Line

The Roaring Springs City Council met Tuesday, May 3 at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall with Mayor Eugene Watson, Councilmen Joey Thacker, Roy Hernandez, Anne Sands, Gene Brannon and Charlie Lona, City Secretary Anna Wilson and City Water Superintendent Regan Holley, attending.

First on the agenda was Karen King representing SPAG to explain Marginal Money of \$90,215.00 from the Texas Department of

Commerce plus a 25% match of \$22,554.00 for a total of \$112,769.00. This grant will cover part of the grant application the City applied for last year to lay new 4" and 6" water lines.

Jamie Johnson of Ober J. Engineering explained that with this grant they could do more than half of the original grant applied for. The Council voted to accept this money. The 25% will be raised through revenue bonds.

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## COMMISSIONERS MEETING REPORT

The Motley County Commissioners Court met May 9, 10:00 in the courtroom with Judge Billy J. Whitaker, and Commissioners John M. Russell, Precinct 1; Bill D. Washington, Precinct 2; Joseph Simpson, Precinct 3; Fraiser Watson, Precinct 4; and County Clerk Lucretia Campbell, attending.

The minutes were read and approved following the invocation by Bill D. Washington and Judge Whitaker read a letter of resignation from County Extension Agent Ray Minkley. The Court accepted this resignation.

Ed Garrett, the District Extension Director from Vernon was on hand to inform the court that since the resignation of Motley County Extension Agent, they were considering a replacement and would replace him as soon as the County would add \$5,000 to the salary for the new agent for traveling expenses. Russell and Judge Whitaker explained that the 1988 budget had been set and that they could not raise the salary this year with all the other expenses the County was receiving along with those unexpected, like the bridges

The first order of business was to canvas the ballots from the election held on Saturday, May 7. The board found an error in the

counting of the ballots, J.M. "Buzz" Thacker had 204 votes as to the reported 200.

In the more humid parts of Texas, mold can be a real problem - even on walls.

Mold grows because condensation is occurring as a result of high humidity and low surface temperatures. Furniture, pictures, cabinets and other objects mounted on exterior walls can act as insulation. This causes the surfaces behind these objects to be cooler than exposed surfaces.

If the humidity is high enough,

the temperature of the walls behind these objects can be below the dew point, resulting in condensation. Mold grows when enough moisture is available to germinate bacteria on these surfaces.

The immediate solution is to move furniture away from outside walls remove pictures, and open cabinet doors. You may also want to use a small fan to circulate air behind furniture or through closets.

Another tactic is to reduce humidity by increasing ventilation. Operate the kitchen and bathroom exhaust fans whenever moisture is being produced. After a shower, the bathroom exhaust fan should run for 30 minutes.

The long term solution to mold buildup is to improve the insulation in your exterior walls. If this isn't feasible, humidity control and good air circulation should keep the problem from recurring.

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**Representative Carriker Receives Educators Endorsement**

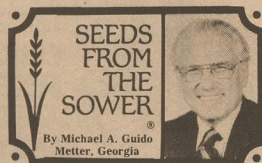

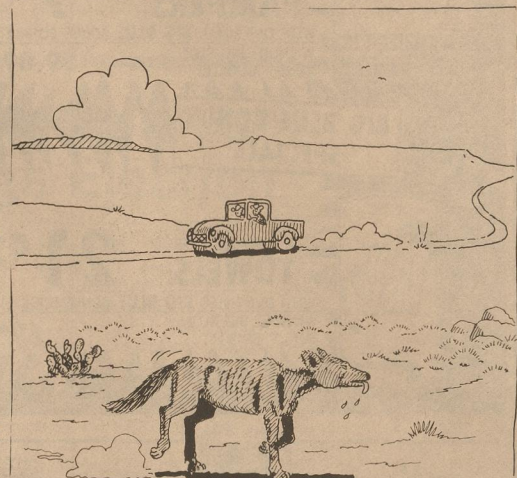
