Walter Jones: Barbecue Chef

EDITOR'S NOTE: February is Black History Month, so the Tribune takes this opportunity to spotlight Walter Jones.

Walter Jones, longtime Barbecue chef cooked for the first time at the age of 7. He made cornbread. Jones stated in an interview that he used to stand on a box and watch his aunt cook. One day he was left in charge of watching the beans while the adults worked in the field, so he decided he would fix the cornbread. He remembers when he took it out of the oven it was as white as it was when he put it in the oven. He had not put in any baking powder or salt.

Walter has cooked for many organizations, ranches and private dinners. One of the largest ranch feeds he prepared food for was the S Lazy S Ranch at McAdoo where he got to meet movie star Dale Roberson and have his picture made with him. He has cooked for Burleson Ranch, Matador Ranch occasions, as well as the Old Settlers Reunion. Mr. Jones stated that he especially enjoyed cooking for the Cottle County Horse and Colt Show and for the Father and Son Banquet in Matador.

Walter was born in Taft, Texas in 1923 to Sebe Ann and George Bill. He moved to Matador when he was four years old with his aunt and uncle, Ear-

nestine and Hezekiah Jones. Walter had two sisters, Stella Powell and Nell Ruth Jones and two brothers, Bobby Lewis and Earl Davis.

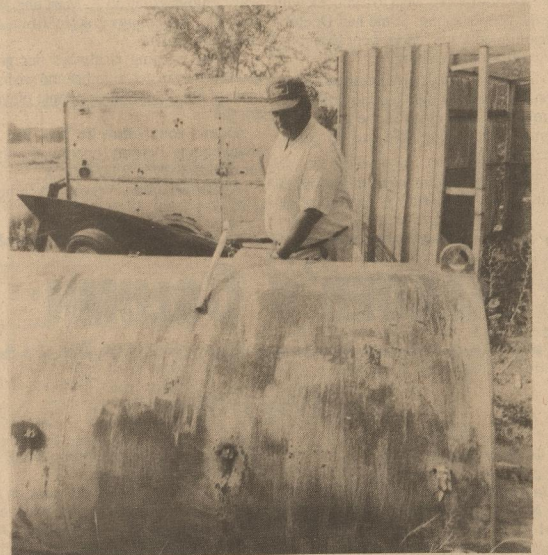
Walter and Algaree were married December 29, 1942 and Walter went into the Army December 5, 1943. While stationed at Ft. Benning, Georgia, Walter would go to Columbus, Georgia on his days off and watch a man cook barbecue. When he returned to Matador in 1946, he helped Mr. Budlow prepare barbecue for an American Legion celebration at the City Park.

Walter and Algaree have two daughters Bobby Ann Cole and Evelyn Jones, both of Lubbock and two grandchildren Mack Cole and LaFonda Cole and one great granddaughter, Ashley Cole.

His son, George Dean died in 1962 at 15 years of age and they had two children who died at child birth, Mildred and Walter.

Wayborn's Cafe hired Walter to be their breakfast and dinner cook for a number of years. He also cooked at Bob's Oil Well Cafe.

Walter still cooks for the Matador Lions Club every first and third Tuesday and other civic functions as well as private gatherings.

More Dogs Die From Poisoning

Three dogs were reported poisoned this weekend, which brings the total to approximately 30 dogs which have been poisoned since Thanksgiving.

Lubbock T.V. Channel 28 reporter, Valerie Avery, was in Matador Tuesday, February 21 to interview local citizens L.J. Barkley, Jr., Charley Johnson and Tony Rose about the excess of dogs being poisoned since November 23.

Mr. Barkley informed the Tribune that he had spoken to Don Renchi of the Texas Agricultural Department. Mr. Renchi is the head of pesticide and poison control. Renchi informed Mr. Barkley that the department would definitely send someone from his office to investigate this case.

Parents are concerned for the safety of their children and every dog owner is in fear of their dogs lives.

Petition in Circulation to Keep Present Status of Flomot Post Office

Material has been received in the Flomot area in recent months concerning changing the status of the Flomot Post Office. Residents are attempting to preserve the Flomot Post Office under the same status that has served well during most of this century. All those contacted are satisfied with the present postal system and do not want it changed to a Community Post Office administered by the Quitaque Post Office as Donald S. Boyd, the MSC Manager/Postmaster of Lubbock suggests.

Besides signing the petition, residents have written Senators Bentsen and Gramm, U.S. Congressman Sarpaluis, Mr. Boyd and the General Manager, U.S. Post Office, Oklahoma City Division.

Some of the recommendations in Docket Number 79234 that do not give a complementary boost to the area are: Reduce the postal hours from 36 hours per week to 24 hours per week; a local resident to be the operator of the CPO and receive a fee that is only one half of the present salary allowed for a postmaster; the contractor would furnish his or her own fringe benefits, pay for relief help and pay the cost of rent and utilities of postal office. Proposals in the CPO Docket have disadvantages compared to a post office and will necessitate a trip to a nearby town.

The Docket states that Flomot has no elected officials. The town does not have a city government, but to say that Flomot has no elected officials the following is

Flomot has an elected Commissioner that serves on the county Commissioners Court; Flomot Water Supply Corporation is headed by an elected president and board members; Precinct Chairmen are elected by Democrat and Republican parties; Flomot Ex-Student and Teachers Association, Community Center Association, Volunteer Fire Dept. and Flomot Cemetery Association have elective officers.

Also, utilizing the Flomot Post Office are the Flomot Gin, Lee Insurance, Valley Turner Gin, Flomot Arts and Crafts, Roys Trucking Co., the United Methodist, Flomot Baptist and Church of Christ Churches besides the personal family postal boxes.

Flomot residents feel it is not justifiable, the taking of the Flomot Post Office and replacing it with a lesser service.

School Board Attends to Business In Regular Meeting

The Motley County Board of Trustees made numerous decisions at the February meeting held last Monday night. Board members Guy Campbell, Donnie Cruse, Randy Barton, Coy Franks, James Palmer, Leslie Jameson and Alvin Alexander were present with High School Principal Don Ewing, Elementary Principal Oran Hamilton and Superintendent Ron Cummings also attending.

The first order of business was for the minutes to be read by Randy Barton, the bills were reviewed and all approved. The budget amendments were discussed at length and changes made before it was approved.

Cummings informed the Board of the request by the Tax Appraisal District asking them to change the Tax levy from 2.225% upto 4%. He explained this was due to changes being made in the tax bookkeeping expenses, that had been operating on a shoestring. The Board approved this motion.

Several items of business were discussed and included approving the Asbestos Management Plan sent by the State and selecting Tri-State Communications for the long-distance phone service. The Board agreed to advertise for bids on termite control and electrical rewiring of the old Grade School building. If they don't get started on the rewiring, the Fire Marshall could close down the use of this building. The Board discussed the cost of these repairs to the old Grade School building and the cost of a

new building. A new building would be less expensive in the long run but from all the problems in the demolition of the old High School, they decided they had rather spend more money than go through the trouble with the citizens in tearing down the old building for the sentimental attachments.

Cummings proposed the school use a drug awareness seminar for their Community Interaction program they were required to have. Motion passed.

Cummings explained that in the process of the insurance company changes it appeared that in the month of November they were not covered by any insurance company, but had withheld the cost from the salaries. So he wanted the board to decide what to do about the medical bills for that month and the reimbursement of the collected funds for that month. The Board elected to pay the bills out of the total and refund the money pro-rated.

Cummings informed the Board that Appian and Abell-Dougherty were ready to start on the track as soon as the weather cleared up. He also announced that the District Track Meets would be held here if possible in April.

The Board elected to call the election for May 6, for the places of two 3 year terms, for places held by Guy Campbell and Randy Barton. The filing dates are February 22-March 25.

Board elected to go into closed session.

Program Presented On Drug Dogs

Thursday afternoon approximately 27 lawmen and county officials from the four county district of Motley, Floyd, Dickens and Briscoe met with Carl F. Rickert, Jr. of Gainsville. Rickert is a licensed and bonded dog trainer. Rickert explained in person and by video tape how he trained his dogs to be Drug Dogs, and the excellence of his dogs. Rickert stated his dogs are working dogs trained by working people.

After a period of questions and answers, Rickert thanked Dude Speed and the DPS and other county officials (sheriffs, judges, commissioners) and Becky McPherson, District Attorney for allowing him to come and explain his system to them.

The Way It Was

In regard to the letter to the Editor of the Motley County Tribune, written by Carl B. King, asking the names of the freight wagons.

The ones that come to mind, are, Bain, Peter Schutler, Mitchell and the Studebaker.

The Mitchell and Studebaker Wagon Companies, with the advent of automobiles, turned to making cars.

The Mitchell was a good looking car, with red wheels and other attractive features. The only one I knew of, was owned by Lum Lancaster. His oldest daughter, L.V. was the only one in the family who knew how to drive.

The Studebaker stayed around for a long time, and was a good car. They might have folded a lot sooner, had it not been for one Matador owner and strong advocate and staunch supporter, James (Pup) Price. He took great pleasure telling what a fine car the Studebaker was.

The Overland was named for the Overland Stage, which piled the West before the era of the Railroad.

I was always fascinated by wheels. The little wagon was the only thing I ever owned that had wheels. I never had a bicycle. I coveted one, above all things. I enjoyed watching a wheel turn. Hence, the advent of automobiles, really caught my fancy.

Until about twenty years ago, I could tell the make and year model of almost every car I met on the road. Now I can't tell a Ford from a Honda, without looking at the name plate.

The first Model T I remember, was a 1910 Model. It had a wide track, the width of the Buggy and Wagon, so it would run in the same rut with the horse drawn vehicles.

It had a red dashboard and a brass radiator, and no top. It was called a Runabout.

All cars of that era, had a cloth top, and were one, or two seated. The seat had to be removed to fill the gas tank.

I knew one lady who refused to ride in one. She said, "what if it blows up."

The Brass Raidator and red dash stayed around, until 1914.

The self starter had not been invented. All the cars were equipped with the hand crank.

The gas and spark levers were located on the steering column, under the steering wheel. It was a must that the spark lever be pushed up (retarded) before cranking. If not it would back fire, or kick. If it kicked, sometimes it would break an arm, above the wrist.

It was a very common sight to see someone with their arm in a sling, after being kicked by the crank handle.

The Ford had three pedals which operated the car. The left pedal was the clutch, which was pushed in low gear, then released for high at the speed of five to ten miles per hour. The center pedal was reverse, and the right pedal was the brake.

On the left there was a lever, when pulled back, it was in neutral and it was also an emergency brake.

It was equipped with a planetary trans-

PAPERS TO KEEP IN A SAFE DEPOSIT BOX

Keep these papers indefinitely unless otherwise noted. Keep a list of the contents of your safe deposit box in your home files.

* Abstracts of title and deeds for real estate - include burial lot deed and to prove clear title, keep deeds until the property is sold.

* Adoption papers, birth and death certificates - need these to prove age for starting school, to obtain some jobs, driver's license, prove voting age, qualify for Social Security benefits and retirement and for a passport.

* Automobile, truck and tractor titles - necessary to sell or borrow money on a vehicle. Also is evidence of ownership.

* Church records - Baptismal and confirmation certificates are acceptable evidence of your birth date when obtaining a delayed birth certificate.

* Citizenship - necessary to obtain certain jobs, passports, or to prove eligibility to vote.

* Copyrights and patents - these prove ownership rights.

* Deeds and mortgages - include your title policy, copy of property insurance policy, mortgage and receipts for mortgage payments. Keep records of improvement to compute capital gains or losses; of the day, month, and year you acquired or sold property; of the gross sale price; of depreciation; of legal fees and the expense of a sale. Use for income and estate tax purposes.

* Evidence of debt - includes promissory notes, mortgages, installment contracts, and liens. Once debt is paid, bundle papers together and keep at least 10 years. Also keep records of what others owe you.

* Household inventories - description of household articles to keep at home and in the safe deposit box.

* Marriage and divorce records - need for proof of marriage, to collect insurance and Social Security and for settling your estate.

* Military records - includes orders to active duty, commissions, medical treatment or disability and papers connected with benefit claims.

* Stocks, bonds, certificates, U.S. Savings Bonds - your broker may hold these for you.

* Wills - essential for satisfactory settlement of your estate, original executed copy should be kept in a safe deposit box, your attorney's file or the office of the county judge. An unsigned copy may be kept at home for reference.

Mrs. Potts stated they had a VCR video tape catalog to order National Geography and other tapes to be checked out.

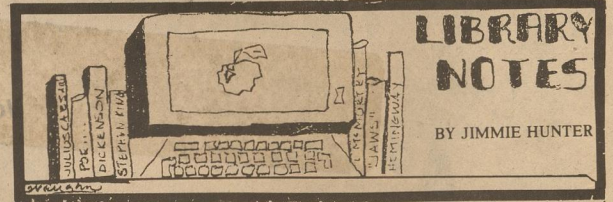
Potts said the Mural still was a tourist draw.

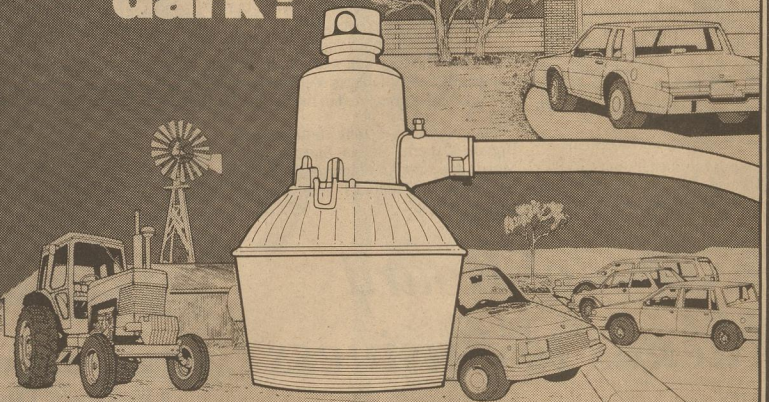

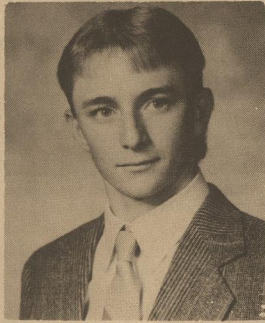

The Motley County FFA had their annual Pancake Supper Monday night. The Pancakes and Sausage were really good, guys!

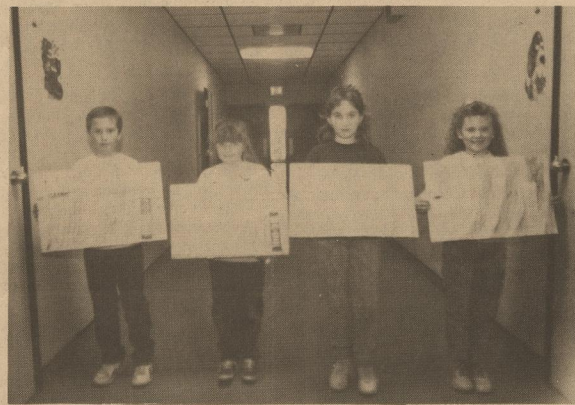

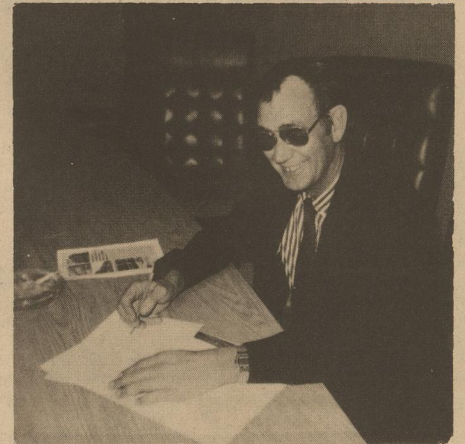

Mr. Ron Cummings, the Superintendent for Motley County, has been here for four years. He and his family moved here from McLean, Texas.

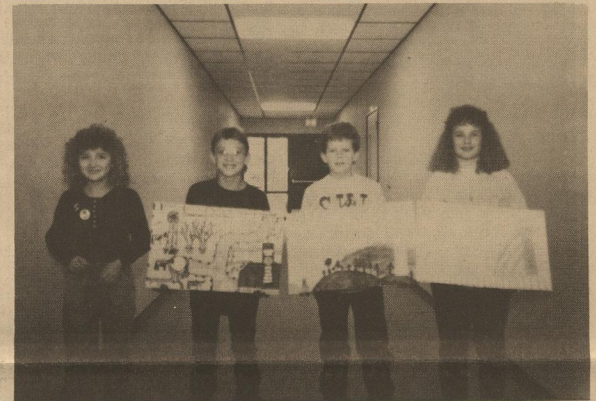
He has taught Math, English, Speech, Coached and was a Librarian. For twenty-five years, he has been in the school system.

Mr. Cummings attended Quail High School in Quail, Texas, then went to Clarendon College and West Texas State University.

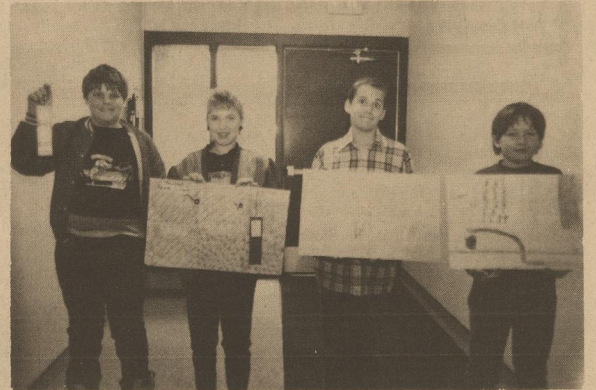
He is married to Marie and they have three children, Tanya is married and attends College, Tina, a Senior at Motley County High and Jimmy, a Sophomore.

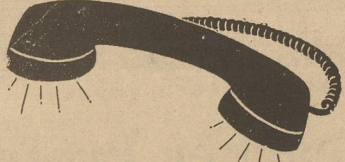

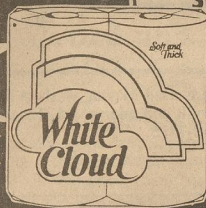

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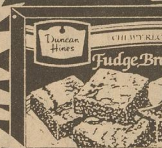
