A TEACHER who came to the little one-room schoolhouse at Cottonwood (now Patton Springs) 65 years ago, as Myra Kelly, Mrs. Duff Green of Roaring Springs, Friday night was crowned 1965-1966 Homecoming Queen on Patton Springs Ranger Field during the half-time ceremony. Her escorts were Captains of the Rangers team, John Ho-Gland and Larry Lawson.

Mrs. Robert Forbis, 1963-64 Queen, the former Pat Gage, class of '56, presented Mrs. Green with her crown, title, and a dozen red roses. She rode on a dark red convertible driven by Tom Wallace Yeates of Santa Fe, New Mexico, former graduate of Patton Springs, while the Ranger Band played "Let Me Call You Sweetheart."

Three score and five years previously Mrs. Green had ridden horseback to the one-teacher school. Part of the time she was paid in gold for teaching. Her salary was \$40 per month with board and room, during the five years she taught.

Mrs. Green named the post office of Afton, location of the Patton Springs school district. She said they wanted a short name and her selection was Afton.

MYF Will Make Drive for CROP

A drive for funds will be made here Sunday night (Oct. 24) between the hours of 8 to 10 p.m. for CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program) by the Matador First Methodist Church MYF.

Announcement was made this week by Glen Brotherton, counselor for the group of young people. Last year nearly 67,000,000 pounds of government donated commodities were given to the Church World Service for its overseas program. A donation of 50c will provide a bowl of cereal for 30 children each day for a month.

"But CROP also provides additional supplies of food, cotton, and self-help items that would otherwise be unavailable," Brotherton said.

"\$1 in the total program of CROP will provide nearly 70 pounds of aid," he declared, "and \$3 will provide a glass of milk a day for a child for a year; \$4 will provide rice to feed one child a meal a day for a year in Child Feeding Program of Church World Service in Hong Kong."

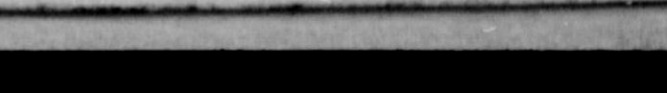

Motley Farmers Use Parallel Terraces

(Upper Pease Soil Conservation District)

Parallel terraces were developed to adapt to current and future farming methods. They are better adapted for land with uniform slopes and where minor earthmoving will not destroy productivity of the soil. Terrace spacings are arranged to fit a multiple of the width of machinery selected. Along with the terrace ridges being parallel, the upper channels are leveled for a given distance to help in the spreading of water accumulation.

Parallel terraces usually require land smoothing to help in their alignment. This consists of filling low places and cutting of higher places. Because of the additional work involved the cost is a little over three times that of standard terraces. The savings on time and equipment, by the elimination of point rows, usually pays the difference in a short while. Plowing time can be reduced by at least one-third and additional savings by the distribution of water over a larger area with few or no wet spots.

Jack Case, in the extreme northern part of the county, has the only set of parallel terraces, to date, in Motley County. His system was installed in the spring of 1964 through the Great Plains Conservation Program. Frazier Watson, of Roaring Springs, plans to install a set this year through the GPCP. A large area of the Whiteflat and Flomot country could be worked into parallel systems.

Farmers who think they might like parallel terraces should contact their Soil Conservation Service personnel in Matador.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

These "meat tips" appeared in AGRICULTURAL MARKETING: Water used by meat packing plants in the processing of meat must pass requirements prescribed for potability by the US Public Health Service. Such tests must be performed by official health agencies; tests by packing company labs are not acceptable.

Use of the term "enriched" is not permitted on labels for meat products, because from the consumers standpoint, there is no established standard as to its meaning.

Labels containing coupons or prize offers can only be used during the actual period of time which the offer is made.

Net weight declaration on labels for canned hams include the weight of the gelatin and cooked-out juices. This is due to the fact that these juices are

developed while the ham is being cooked in the can, and become incorporated in the gelatin. These juices are actually composed of cooked-out meat proteins and fat, and constitute a part of the food in the can.

Such products are labeled as "cooked ham with natural juices." This is contrasted with labels for meat food products packed in brine, vinegar and agar jelly. In such products the packing substance is not regarded as being part of the food in the container. Thus, the net weight statement on the label for these products represents the drained weight of the product, excluding the packing substance.

The term "Polish" has been associated with a popular sausage product for many years, and for hams originating in Poland. Therefore, its use is not permitted in connection with other meat products.

Availability of most plant nutrients is influenced by the soil pH or degree of alkalinity or acidity of soil. Growth and development of plants depend on many factors. These include climatic conditions, diseases, insects, soil texture, soil structure, soil fertility and management practices. If any of these factors are unfavorable, plant growth will be unsatisfactory.

The soil reaction range (pH range) is sometimes overlooked as a soil characteristic that can be used to determine whether sufficient quantities of soil nutrients are available to plants. Soil reaction can be determined only by a soil test.

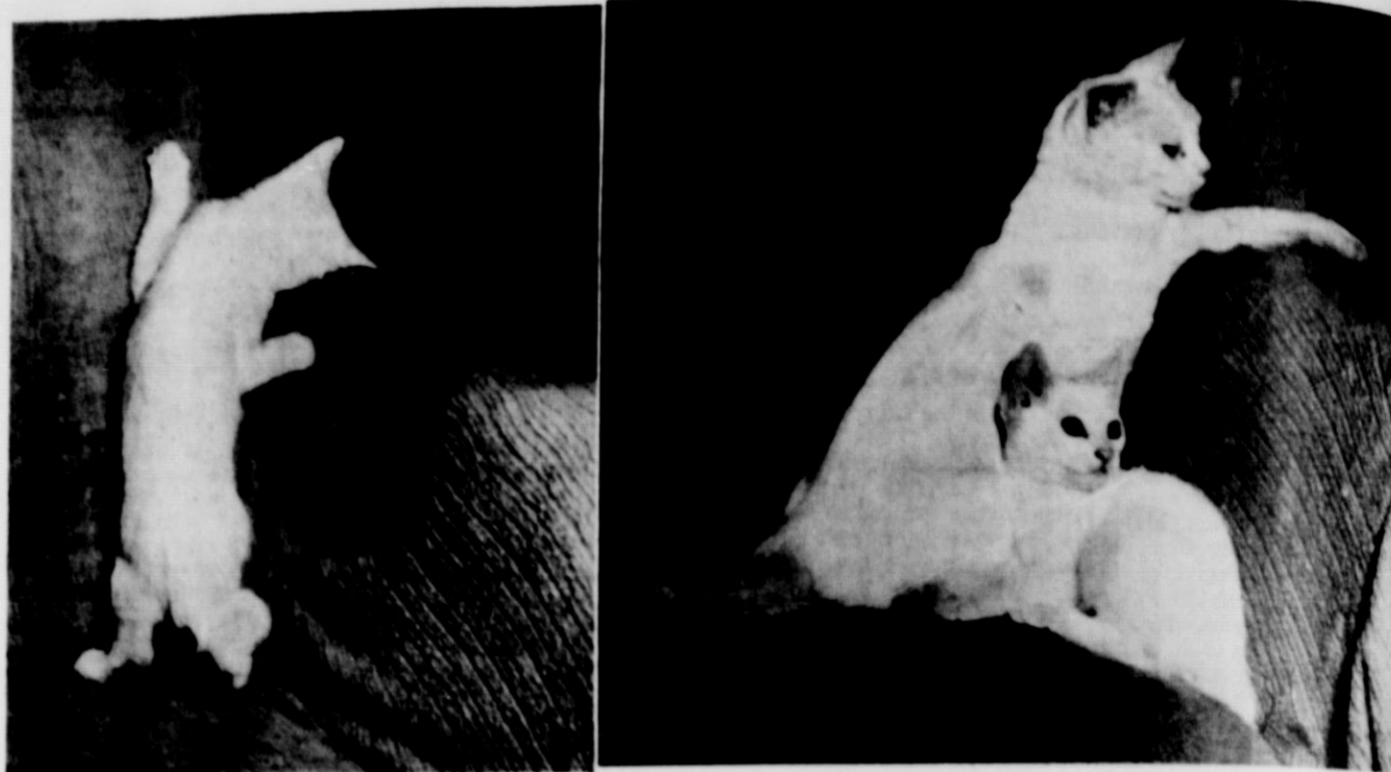
Certain soil amendments change the reaction. Lime increases soil pH (makes it less acid), and sulfur, iron sulfate or aluminum sulfate can be used to decrease soil pH. The quantity of these amendments to be used depends not only on the present pH but also on soil texture, organic matter content and exchange capacity of the soil.

No general recommendations for using soil amendments can be given, as they are based on a soil test. As most of the soils in Motley County have a high pH, this is one reason why it is difficult to grow roses. Sulfur added to the soil may help correct this situation.

Will you help in the search for former 4-H club members? The Federal Extension Service estimates that there are 23 million former 4-H Club members in the United States and many of these may be due recognition through the 4-H Alumni Program supported by Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp.

Businessmen, homemakers, farmers, teachers, public officials and others have received awards during the 13 years the program has been in effect. In each county, four pins are available each year and some of these have been awarded in Motley County. State plaques are also awarded as well as eight selected to attend the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Trees satisfactory for this area are: Austrian pine; Black locust; Black walnut; Catalpa; Chinese elm; Mulberry; Osage orange (Bois d'arc); Red cedar; Euonymus; and Buffaloberry. For bottomland sites, Sycamore and Cottonwood are also available.

I have a supply of order blanks that should be used if you desire to order some of these plants.

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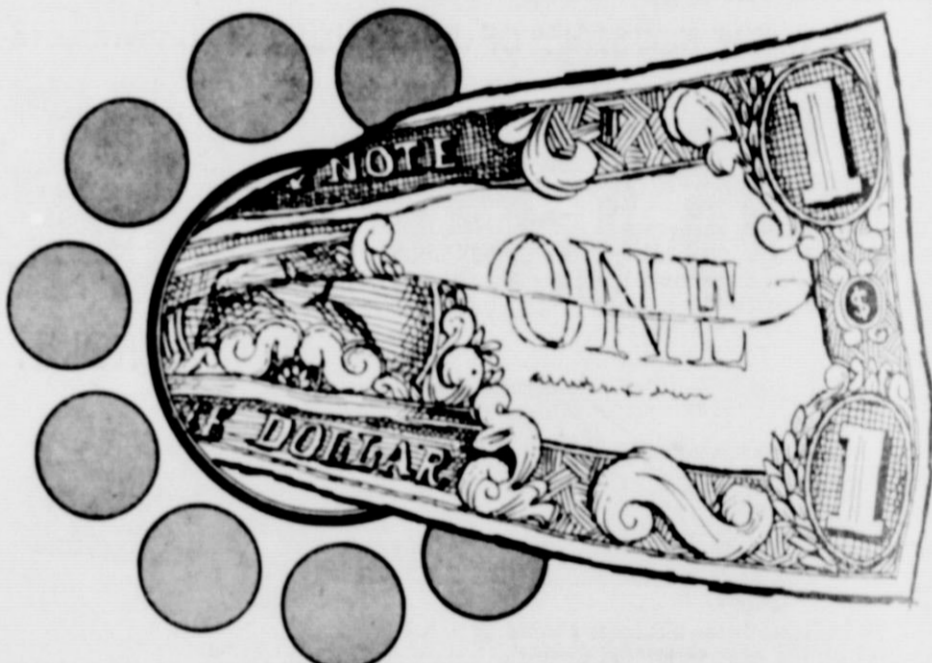

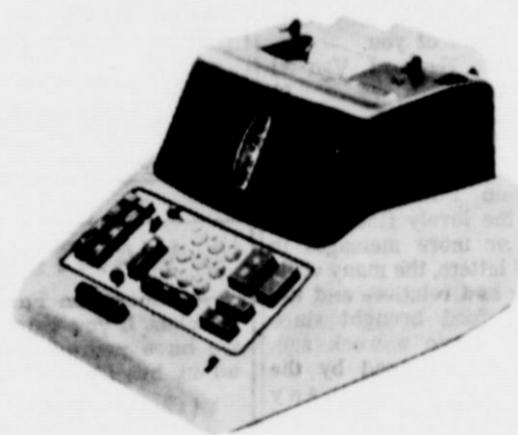
