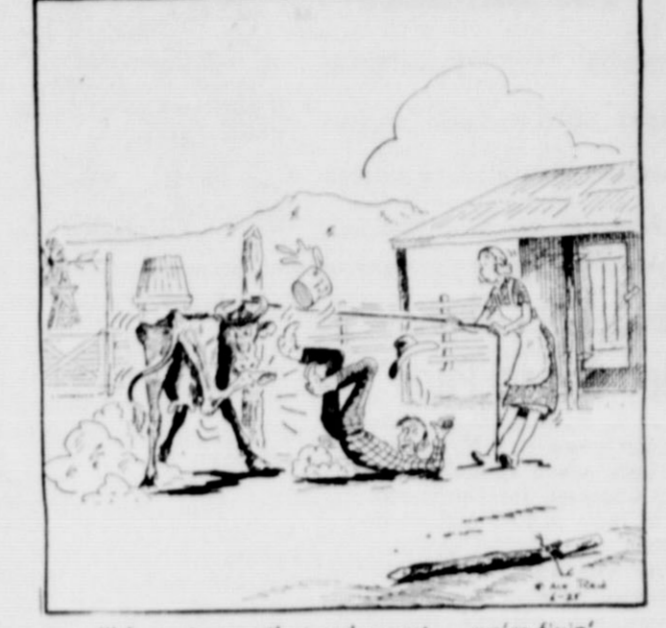

Dostoyevsky, himself, said, "The chief problem dealt with is the very one which has my whole life long, tormented my conscience. The question of the existence of God, if not, the world is nothing but a vaudeville of devils and all things are lawful."

To discuss this philosophy, he presents the Karamazov family, representative of humanity. The eldest son, Dmitri, pleasure seeking, impatient, and unruly is symbolic of the lustful Ivan, the second son, is brilliant and morose, the symbol of intellect.

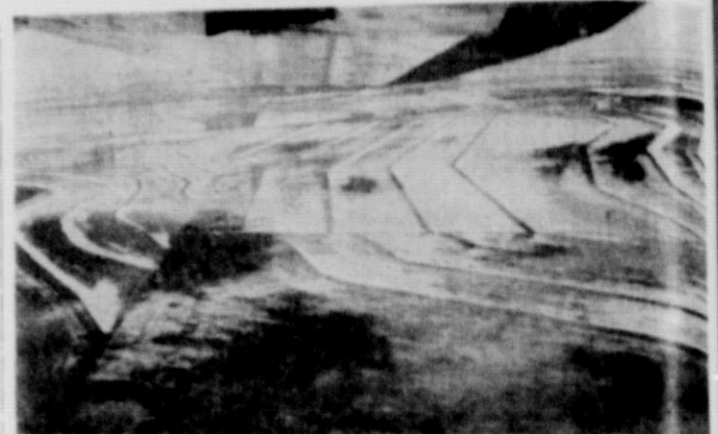

THE PICTURE above shows a parallel terrace system with one odd interval. Note how the water is evenly distributed between the terrace intervals as opposed to the standard terraces on the extreme left which have the water almost entirely in the channels.

Motley County farmers are becoming very interested in parallel terraces and many are checking into the possibility of constructing them this year, according to Ervin Willard of the Soil Conservation Service in Matador. These terraces appear to be the answer to the old complaint of farming point rows. They will undoubtedly replace normal terraces due to their ease of farming.

According to Willard, parallel terraces will fit almost any field with the more undulating or rolling land generally requiring shorter terraces. They will cost some more than standard terraces due to the leveling between lines, but will make up the difference in cost in a very short time.

The Great Plains Conservation Program will cost-share 70% of the construction which will absorb the majority of the cost. C. L. Hacker and Glynard Moore are presently doing preliminary work on M. C. Jones, Stuart Dixon, and Frasier Watson in preparation for constructing or planning parallel terraces.

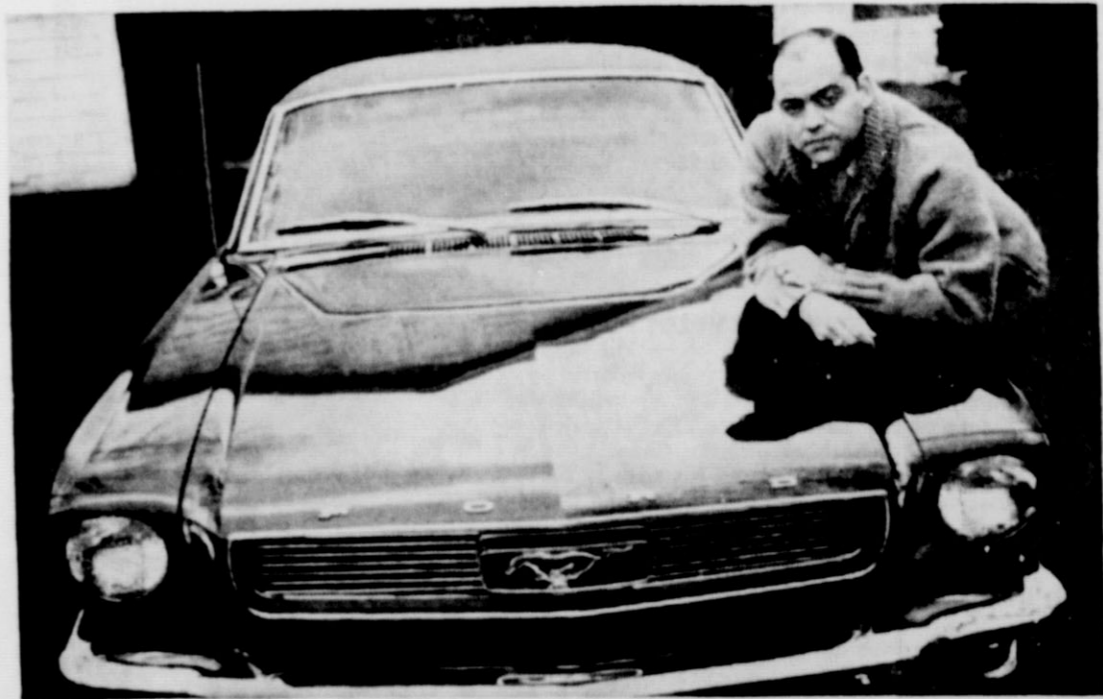

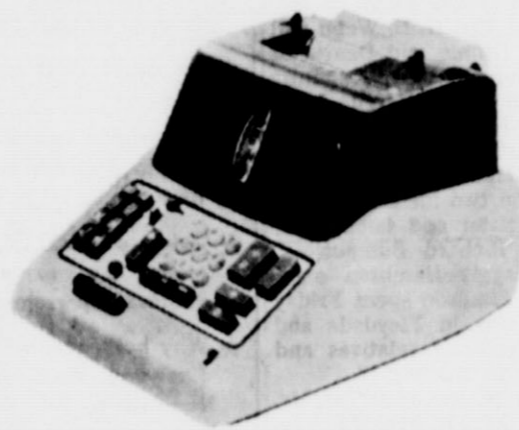
