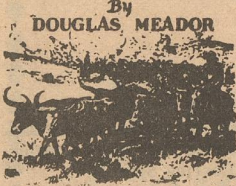

Mr. Blevins passed away about 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, at Motley General Hospital, Matador, following a lengthy illness.

He was born Sept. 30, 1901, at Mount Pleasant, Texas. He was married to the former Iris Hoover, June 18, 1927, at Rankin, Texas and they moved to Motley County in 1939 from Kent County. They have made their home here since that time. Mr. Blevins was a farmer and stockman until his retirement due to ill health. He was a member of the Matador Church of Christ.

Mr. Blevins was preceded in death by a daughter, Lucille, in 1951.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Ray Blevins and Lewis Belvins, both of Matador; two daughters, Mrs. Walter Ray (Pauline) of Pilot Point, and Mrs. Lois Rainbolt of Spur; three sisters, Mrs. John Acrey of Tatum, New Mexico, and Mrs. E. W. Weyant, both of Odessa; 10 grandchildren, and a number of nieces and nephews.

A Junior Rodeo Association Play Day and open show at halter has been set for Saturday, Sept. 10 at the Roaring Springs Old Settlers Arena, it was announced following a recent meeting of the officers and directors of the Motley County 4-H Junior Rodeo Association. The meeting was held in the Commissioners Court room at the courthouse.

The open show at halter will feature mares and geldings in several classes, followed by Western pleasure, reining, barrel racing, pole bending, and flag races.

Competition will be in three age groups in all except halter, it was announced. These will be Pee Wee, 11 years and under; junior, 12 through 15; and senior, 16 through 18.

John Stotts will serve as judge of the show.

It was ruled that contestants must ride only one horse during the riding events.

The play day events will start at 10 a.m. and entry fees will be \$3.00 for halter and \$4.00 for each event in riding classes.

Buckles will be given for 1st place riding events; plaques for 1st at halter events; 2nd place winners will receive rosettes, and ribbons will be given through 6th places. A trophy will be given for grand and reserve champions in halter class.

The public is invited to attend the rodeo and there will be no admission charge.

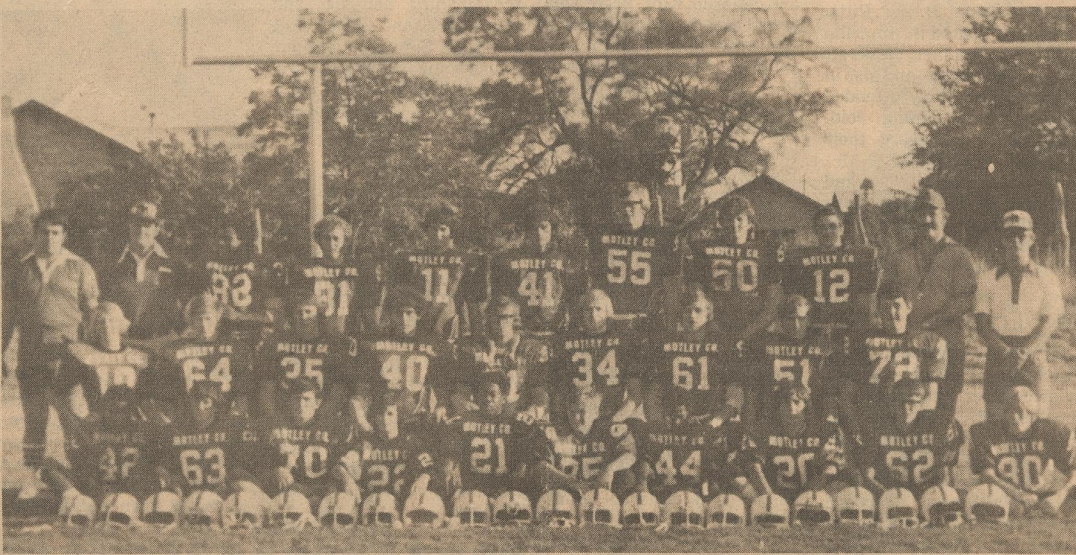
mainstay of the Matadors.

He was a retired rancher and was well known over this area, having worked for several ranches in this vicinity, including the Matador Ranch during his early years. In 1974 he was presented with silver spurs at the Matador Cowboy's Reunion at Channing as the oldest Matador cowboy in attendance.

Born March 24, 1899 in Collin County, Texas, Mr. Stephens died Sept. 6, 1977 at the age of 78 years, five months and 12 days. He was married to the former Judson Allen, May 21, 1922 at Whiteflat, Texas.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Morris Stephens of Star Route, Matador; a daughter, Mrs. C. R. Brandon (Eva) of Hereford; two brothers, Earl Stephens of Plainview and Marvin Stephens of Tulia; one sister, Mrs. Beulah Jameson of Floydada; six grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

### County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Future cotton varieties, herbicide research, soil fertility research and water use efficiency will highlight the 68th annual field day held at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, Tuesday, Sept. 13, starting at 1:00 p.m. it was announced by Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

More than 100 new and improved cotton varieties which are looked at for disease resistance, nematode tolerance, quicker fruiting and glandless production will be included in the tour.

Herbicide stops will include preplant applications, post-emergence applications, and new herbicides that are currently under development for use in various crops.

How to correct nitrogen, phosphorus, iron and zinc deficiencies in cotton and sorghum will all be included in the tour.

Other items to be included are grape research, sorghum, sunflower and soybean varieties as well as a display of farm machinery and irrigation equipment.

The first insecticide treatment in the 1977 Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program started Tuesday, Sept. 6. Mapping has been completed in a 15-county control zone

area along the Caprock and survey teams have already finished their first field inspections according to county Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer. "The general survey is carried out by 44 two-man survey teams." These teams provide weekly information on the 400,000 acres within the control zone which serves as a basis for selecting fields which need treatment.

According to Pallmeyer, bollworm counts are being made right along with the weevil counts. Special attention will be given to fields treated during the early part

of the program to avoid creating any bollworm problems for program participants. Only those fields having large numbers of weevils or square damage will be treated with the first application. The second application is planned for September 19. This and later treatments will be more intensive. The purpose of these applications is to reduce the numbers of diapausing boll weevils.

Overall, boll weevil infestations have been light up to this time. However, some fields have developed heavy weevil infestations. It is important that treatment be initiated on these fields with the first application to prevent damage and to limit the spread of weevils into other fields.

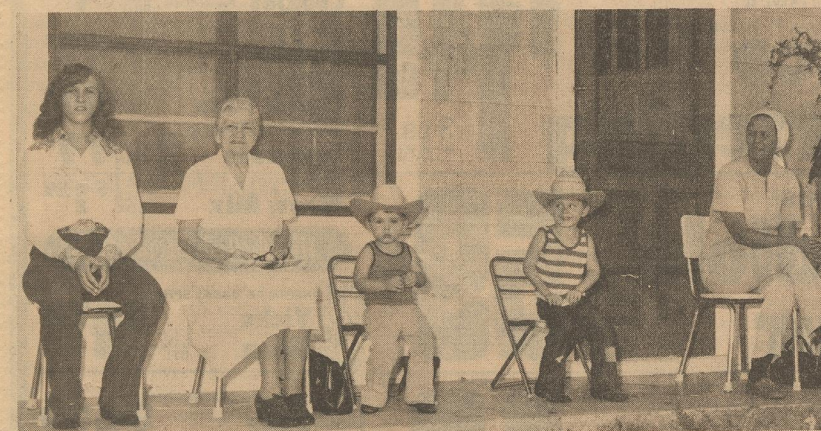

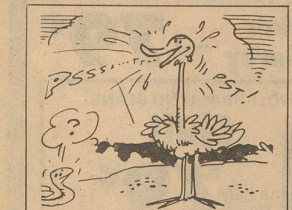

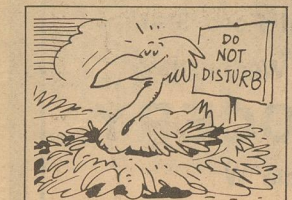

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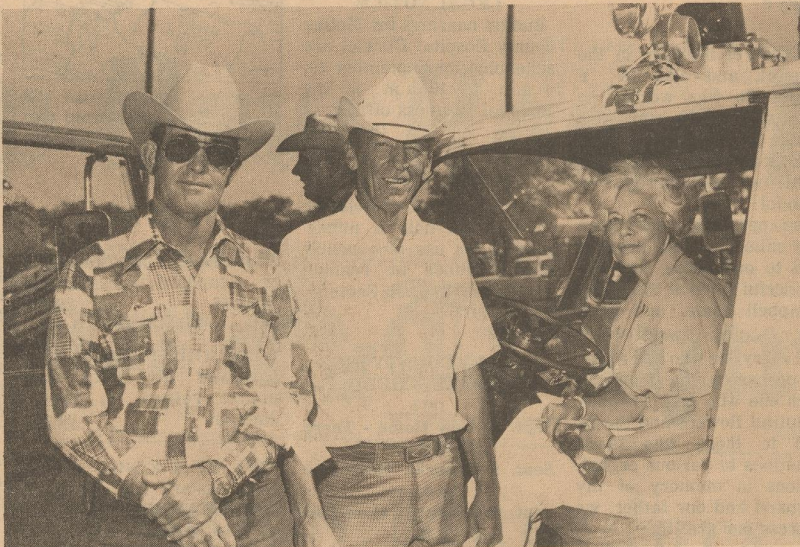

## Lubbock Lake Site Excavations Show Span Of Cultures

LUBBOCK - The prehistoric West Texas range, where the mammoth, the bison and the saber-tooth tiger roamed, was home to culture after culture - from the stone age Clovis and Folsom man to the Apache, then the Comanche Indians and finally to man of the tin can age.

It is this span of cultures that archeologists at the Lubbock Lake Site have been exploring this summer. Four different sites within the lake site area have been painstakingly excavated to provide scientific explorations at opposite ends of the time scale.

The site is recognized nationally for its unusual continuity of cultures.

Thirty-five people, 20 of them students from 10 states and one foreign country, were engaged in the research sponsored by private and public funding. They used trowels to scrape through the ages and then dental picks to lift bones and artifacts, which are the telltale signs of early life at the site.

Soil removed from the site was sifted and washed and studied for evidence of pollen, insect remains and small animal bones to help determine changes in climate and biological environment.

Principal investigator was Dr. Eileen Johnson, zoo-archeologist, who has said that the Lubbock Lake Site exploration, begun accidentally in 1939, should probably continue another five or six years to give researchers a clear picture of its evolution from stone to pop bottle age.

At the four areas open at the site this year, the archeologists have found evidence of the Clovis period about 12,000 years ago, a Folsom butchering area about 10,500 years ago, a Plainview butchering site 9,800 to 10,000 years old, a late paleoindian camp probably 9,000 years old, Apache, Comanche and early pioneer life.

An early prize this year was discovery of a metacarpal from the forefoot of the extinct bear, Arctodus, to add to the early tools and bones from the saber-toothed cat, prehistoric elephant and horse, bison and mammoth. Also located was a Plainview butchering tool and manufacturing debris from tools made by Folsom man, intermingled with bone fragments.

Historians located within about 50 yards of one of the digs, the pioneer George W. Singer store, which became a landmark and focal point for settlers before 1886.

"We would like to make a determined effort as soon as possible," Johnson said, "to determine the exact location of this early store. It burned in 1886 and was rebuilt, and the evidence of its location should be available."

Indicative of the site's importance is this summer's guest list: visiting archeologists from Australia, Michigan and Colorado as well as representatives of the Texas Archaeological Society and the Smithsonian Institution.

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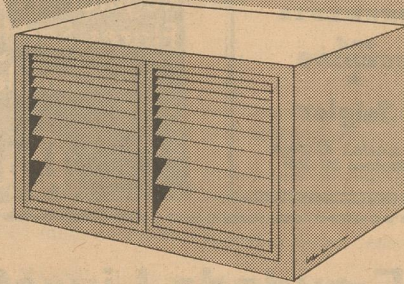
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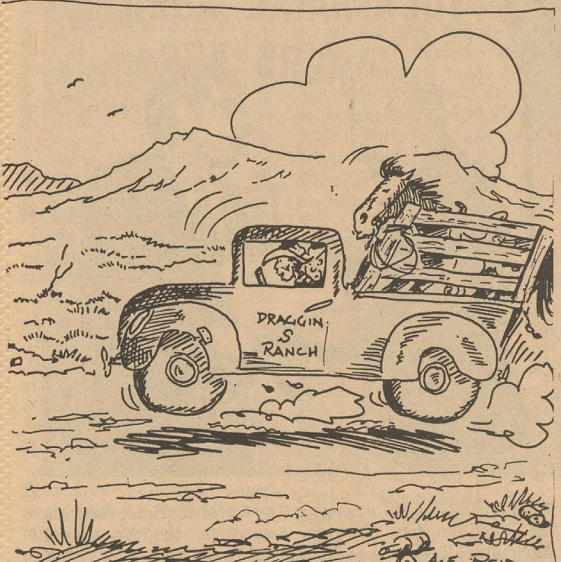

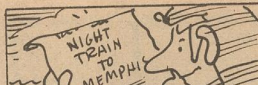
